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# Welcome to Camp Oljato!

Our Camp Vision Is to give every Scout a truly memorable outdoor experience while building Scouting ideals through advancement and mentorship.

## **General Camp Information**

Camp Oljato (Ol-JAY-toe) has been in existence since 1941. The name Oljato is Navajo, meaning “Starlight on the Water.” Oljato is a magical place! It is located at 7,000 feet in the Sierras (Kaiser Peak Range) on the shores of Huntington Lake. Access to the heavily wooded camp requires a one-mile boat trip across the picturesque lake. From the moment of arrival to the last day of camp, Scouts are immersed in the outdoor adventure of Scouting. Waterfront activities are a key element of the Camp Oljato experience. Huntington Lake is a well-known sailing lake, and Oljato is fortunate to have one of the most sheltered coves on the lake. This location allows Scouts to learn and explore on comparatively calm waters. During a week at summer camp, virtually all camp participants engage in several waterfront activities. Some of the other offerings that Camp Oljato has are programs including shooting sports, climbing, welding, nature, and Scoutcraft. Your Scouts will have a great time!

Additionally, the campsites have magnificent giant pines, plenty of wildflowers, a cool mountain stream, and no poison oak (which does not generally grow at this elevation). There are platform tents within the multiple troop campsites. Each site has tables, and fire rings. Restrooms and showers are located nearby. In the center of camp, the Trading Post and rustic Dining Hall can be found.

Surrounding these buildings are our newly constructed, premiere program structures, and state of the art restroom and shower facilities for your enjoyment. Many of these structures around Camp have all been completed in the last 15 years. We hope that you will truly enjoy the benefits of these incredible program areas!

At Camp Oljato, we look forward to assisting you and your unit to have the best summer camp experience possible. Please read this leader’s guide and make sure you participate in our leader webinars and attend the pre-camp meeting prior to your unit coming to camp. We have something for everyone from the first-year campers to adult leaders.

## **Accreditation**

Camp Oljato is fully accredited by the National Council, BSA and operates under the strict health, safety, and management guidelines established by the Boy Scouts of America, the United States Forest Service, the State of California, and the County of Fresno.

# Getting there and the first day

## *Where do we go?*

Scouts will arrive at the public dock at the Huntington Lake Boat Launch (appears on Google Maps as: Camp Oljato Meeting Location). Please note, do NOT enter “Camp Oljato” in Google Maps as your destination, as that will lead down an inaccessible logging road.

## **Transportation to Camp from your location**

Transportation to camp is by vehicle and is the responsibility of your unit. Please abide by seat belt policy and be sure to check insurance coverage for all vehicles used to transport Scouts.

**NOTE: Lunch is not served in camp on Sunday; please plan accordingly.**

## *Parking*

Parking is extremely limited, please bring as few vehicles as possible. Many units have found it beneficial to use charter bus services. For those driving, Camp Oljato will pay for parking for 1 vehicle from each unit at the public dock. Additional cars can be parked at the public dock parking lot at the driver’s expense.

Once you have arrived at the public dock, you will be greeted by a camp commissioner who will assist in directing you to a temporary parking spot where you will unload your gear. Adult drivers must remain with their vehicles. Units are encouraged to leave trailers at home as they are difficult to find parking spots for.

Please be respectful of all other boaters, as the public dock is frequented by sailors, especially during the regatta season. Remind your Scouts to respect the restrooms and other dock facilities. For safety reasons, please keep all personal gear and camp equipment off to the side and out of the way of other vehicles until it is time to load the barge. BEAR PROOF your car. Do not leave trash or food related items in your car.

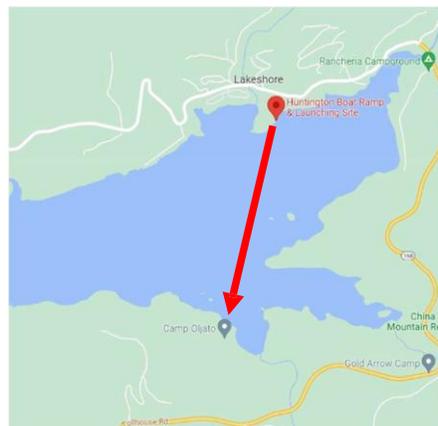
## Barges into Camp

All units are brought into camp via passenger barges. About ten days before camp, you will be assigned an arrival time typically between 12:30pm and 4:30pm, depending on the number of units scheduled. Due to our fixed number of barges, troops that arrive early will still need to wait for their scheduled departure time.



### Barge loading

Following parking, a staff member will be waiting to assist you with equipment and the trip into camp. All equipment should remain off to the side until the staff member begins your loading process. At their instruction, please have your senior patrol leader organize the Scouts into a single file line heading down the dock. Begin passing equipment down the line until the barge has been loaded. At this point passengers may board the barge at the captain's direction. PFD's are required for ALL individuals riding on the barge.



## Coming into camp – Important

Camp Oljato uses CampDoc as its primary method for collecting medical (Forms Parts A, B, & C) and other required forms before attending camp. Paper forms are allowed, but it may impact the check-in process for your troop. If you are using paper forms, please have your annual health forms (alphabetical order and separated by youth and adults), medications (in the original containers), YPT and other required forms with you when reporting for check-in at the dock, before entering camp. Show proof that all adult leaders in your troop are currently registered in the Boy Scouts of America and trained in Youth Protection and that at least one is current in his/her Hazardous Weather Training. Verification of these items may be done by showing electronic documents on your phone or tablet. Membership verification is by current membership cards which may be downloaded on [my.scouting.org](http://my.scouting.org). (See appendix)

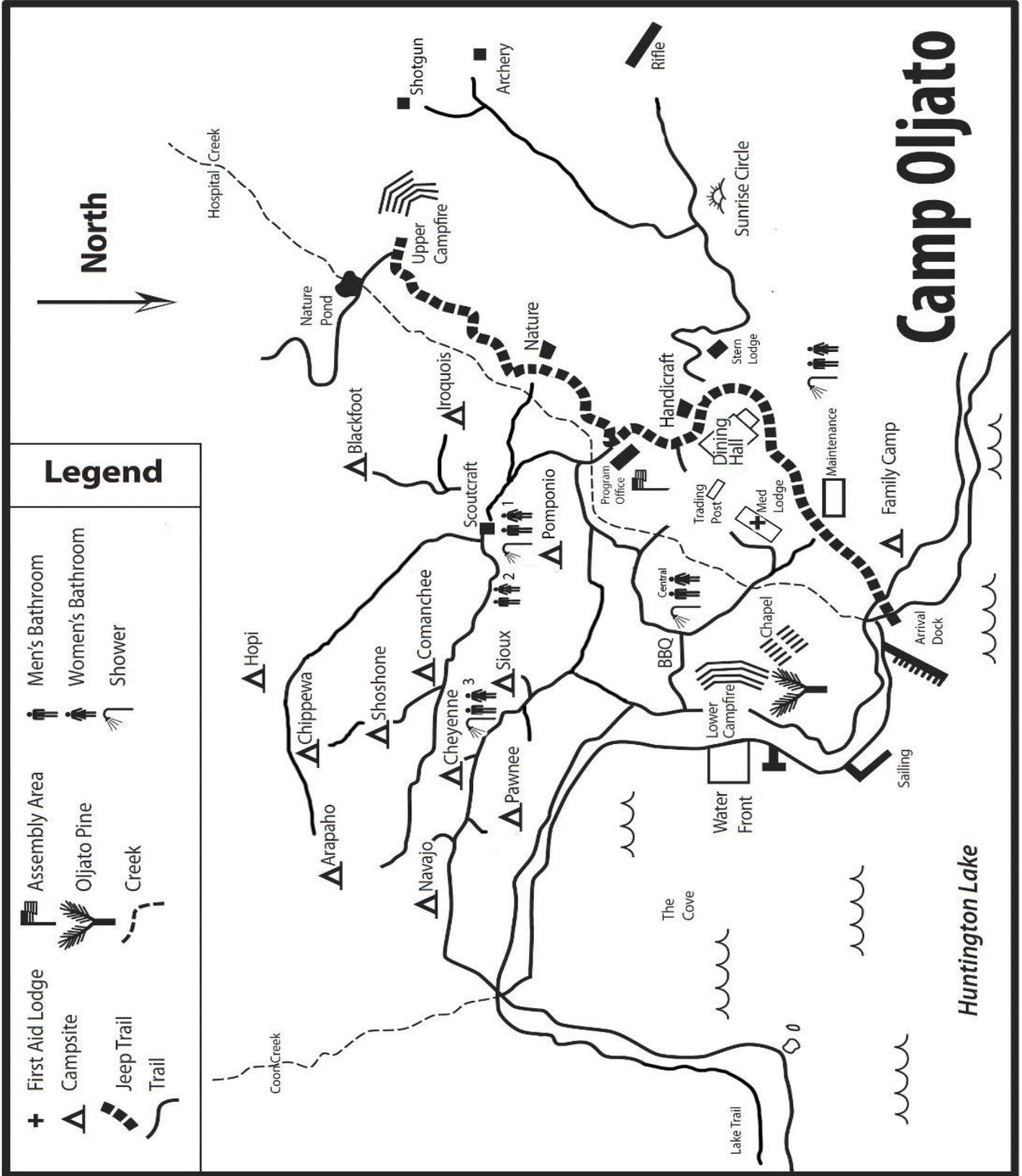
Upon arrival in camp, your Troop Friend will lead your troop on an important orientation. They will take you to your Troop site and help you set up camp for the week. The Troop Friend will also take Scouts on a camp tour prior to dinner (or just after dinner depending on when your troop arrives). **Swimming tests for your Troop will be a part of your tour**, so swim items (bathing suits, towels, etc.) should be packed for quick access upon arrival.

Set up your campsite to your troop's delight, but please be careful not to damage natural surroundings. If you have equipment problems, or any other needs at your campsite, please inform your Troop Friend or Commissioner. When it comes to troops bringing in their own equipment, try to "pack" everything in. It can make a more difficult arrival and set-up experience for everyone in your Troop if people pack more than they can carry on their back or in their hands for a quarter mile. It cannot be stressed enough, please have scouts use packs rather than large, heavy duffle bags, as these can really make the arrival experience a struggle for the scout.

**Wheeled bags or wagons will NOT work well for bringing equipment into camp due to soft and uneven ground.**

# Camp Oljato

### **Troops That Want to Arrive Early**

Camp Oljato cannot accommodate units arriving before Sunday afternoon. If your troop needs to arrive earlier (e.g. for travel reasons), please plan to camp at the various public campgrounds that are located around Huntington Lake (due to limited availability, these should be made well in advance). The phone number for the National Campground Service is 1-877-444-6777 or visit the website: [www.recreation.gov](http://www.recreation.gov). Ask for the College or Rancheria Campground at Huntington Lake.

Camp Oljato does not provide camping before your Session starts.

### **Individual Arrivals**

Any Scout arriving late to camp must report directly to the program office.

### **Health Statement**

**Please assess the health of campers BEFORE they attend camp.** If a scout or leader has a fever, is showing other illness symptoms, or has just recently been directly exposed to a contagious illness like Covid-19, please reconsider sending them to camp. In the past this has resulted in illnesses spread to tent-mates or merit badge classmates, and resulted in scouts camp experiences being cut short. Please consider the health and safety of your scouts and their fellow camper

IF DEPARTING EARLY FROM CAMP, INDIVIDUALS MUST SIGN OUT AT THE PROGRAM OFFICE. FOR SCOUTS LEAVING EARLY, THE ADULT SIGNING OUT THE SCOUT MUST BE INDICATED ON THE SCOUT'S BSA HEALTH AND MEDICAL RECORD AS AUTHORIZED TO TRANSPORT THEM FROM CAMP AND MUST PRESENT THEIR PHOTO ID AT THE TIME OF PICK UP.

# Camp Logistics

## Adult Leadership Requirements

- Each Troop is required to have 2 registered leaders over 21 years of age.
- If Troop is a Female or Family Troop, one of the registered leaders must be a female over 21 years of age.
- The unit is responsible to ensure sufficient leadership in camp at all times. **The recommended ratio for leadership is 1 to every 10 Scouts.**
  - If there will be a changing of adult leadership, we recommend the incoming leader arrive 1 day prior to taking over to provide for a smooth transition.
  - Leaders arriving after the initial arrival time must report to camp office where training, registration, health forms will be verified.
- Training requirements for adult leaders in Camp (completed on [my.scouting.org](https://my.scouting.org)):
  - Must have current Youth Protection Training, which does not expire before or during your Troop's stay at camp.
  - Must have 1 leader in camp that is Hazardous Weather Trained at all times.
  - Additional Training Requirements for California based units: AB506 California Mandated Reporters California Mandated Reporter Requirements for all youth serving volunteers :

- Live Scans: You must use the forms for your unit's council. Go to <https://californiascouting.org/training/> (and scroll down) to find your council's Live Scan form and upload your other AB506 forms to your council.
  - Do not Submit individual AB506 requirements to the Pacific Skyline Council.
  - Completed [AB506 Summer Camp Verification Forms](#), signed by your council, must be emailed to Pacific Skyline Council's registrar at [adela.wright@scouting.org](mailto:adela.wright@scouting.org) no later than May 1.
  - More information, including forms and training, are available at [www.californiascouting.org](http://www.californiascouting.org). AB506 does not apply to any units who are chartered outside of California.

## ***Paperwork Required from each Troop***

- [California Range and Target Activities Parental/Legal Guardian Permission Form](#) for ALL Scouts wishing to participate in archery, rifle, or shotgun programs (four copies)
- [BSA Health and Medical Record, Parts A, B, and C](#) for ALL Scouts and Adults Verification of membership in the BSA for ALL Scouts and Adults
- Youth Protection Training Certificate for ALL Adults
- Weather Hazards Training Certificate for at least one (1) Adult
- [AB506 Summer Camp Verification Forms](#) for CA units. Must include all adults at camp. Visitors/Guests
- All Visitors and Guests must make prior arrangements through the Camp Director. You may not arrive unannounced. When you arrive in camp you must report to the Camp Director.
- Visitors: We encourage all visitors to find sleeping arrangements at the various public campgrounds and other lodging options nearby as lodging opportunities in camp are extremely limited.
- Any visitor staying overnight must meet with the onsite Camp Health Officer to turn in a completed BSA Annual Health and Medical Record Parts A and B. Completion of [California Mandated reporter training and LiveScan prior to camp](#). If the visitor is staying longer than 72 hours, then they must also turn in Part C, which requires a physician's signature. Only the current form as found on <http://www.scouting.org> will be accepted.

## ***Scheduled Boat Runs (Monday through Friday)***

Regular boat runs generally leave camp each day at 9:00am, 1:00pm and 5:00pm. These same runs leave the Public Dock at Lakeshore back into camp 30 minutes later at 9:30am, 1:30pm, and 5:30pm. If you need to make use of one of these boat runs please check in well ahead of time at the **Program Office** so that we know the boat run is required. If a boat run looks to be empty it may not always be taken.

Other arrangements may be made for special boat times in the program office. A fee may be charged for any special trips across the lake.

For safety reasons, 7:00pm is the latest camp boats will cross the lake. (New arrivals must plan accordingly).

## ***At the end of the camp session:***

Checkout procedures (Saturday morning):

- On Friday afternoon, thoroughly clean all camp equipment. No equipment should be left unclean.
- It is strongly encouraged to have your troops pack most of their gear the night before departure (aside from what is needed for the final night of course).
- Your Troop Friend will be with you all morning on Saturday.

- On Saturday morning, once your troop is all packed up, check:
  - Site is free of ALL litter – strip ALL paper from bulletin boards. All campsite tools are present and clean.
  - Tents are in good repair and properly erected.
  - Fire is TOTALLY OUT (cold to touch) and pit is clean. No ashes, wood, or charcoal should remain. Troop Friends will inspect the camp site on the day of checkout to make sure all is in order.
  - Proceed to the dining hall for a continental breakfast. Turn in evaluation forms and receive remaining paperwork, returned medical forms, medications, and patches.
  - Take all troop gear to the dock and get instructions for loading the boat for departure.
  - Boats depart between 6:00 and 8:30 a.m. The Saturday departure schedule will be finalized at the Adult Leader meeting earlier in the week.

We need every troop to do its best to adhere to these procedures and times. Our turnaround period is very short, and the staff must be released by 10:00 am (for a required 24 hour time off). They need some time to relax and unwind from the week's demanding work. We need to make sure the camp is prepared and set up for the next week before they do so. Your support is greatly appreciated.

## ***Reservations and Payments***

### **2026 Payment Schedule**

- October 31, 2025: Early registration discount for troops ends at 11:59 PM.
- January 15, 2026:
  - Payments open: \$200 per youth + \$150 per adult
  - Registration for Provisional Campers opens
- February 15, 2026: 2<sup>nd</sup> Participant deposit: \$200 per youth, no additional adult fees due
- March 15, 2026:
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> Participant deposit: \$200 per youth + \$150 per adult
  - **LAST DAY TO REMOVE CAMPERS FROM YOUR ROSTER WITHOUT PENALTY**
- April 15, 2026:
  - Final payments due for youth, adults, and any additional fees (such as Horsemanship).
  - AB506 Summer Camp Verification Form due for all California-based troops.

Youth registrations added after May 1 will incur a \$50 late fee (\$890) even if your troop qualified for the early registration rate.

Participants must be paid up to the current fee schedule at the time of merit badge class selection.

**LATE FEES:** +\$50 over regular registration after May 1

Units will be charged a late fee for each individual (youth or adult) who is newly registered on May 1 or later. This late fee applies to all troops, including those who qualify for the early discount rate or the regular rate.

### REFUNDS AND TRANSFERS

The full Pacific Skyline Council Payment and Refund Policy can be found online at <https://pacsky.org/payment-refund-policies/>. Pertinent excerpts are below.

### PAYMENT REQUIREMENTS

To ensure the Council can provide the best service to its members, participant and rental fees are required to be paid in advance of the activity or rental. Participants are not considered registered for any activity until payment in full has been received. Some activities have a deposit/staggered payment system (e.g., summer camp). This is indicated in the registration information for the individual activity. Campsite rentals require a minimum payment of half of the total possible rental fees for the site for the rental period to reserve the site. All other facility rental fees require full payment to reserve the site.

### REFUND POLICY

Refunds may be requested no less than 30 days prior to an activity or rental reservation. Some activities, such as summer camp, may have additional restrictions that apply (see "Summer Camp Fees" below). Any refund granted will be less an administrative service charge of 15% of the total fees due for the activity or rental. This includes duplicate registrations/reservations. I.e., if the total fee of the activity is \$100, and \$25 has been paid, the council will refund up to \$10 only, if the cancellation and refund request is made no less than 30 days prior to the start of the activity. If the cancellation and refund request are made less than 30 days prior to the start of the activity, no refund will be issued.

### Summer Camp Fees

Since Summer camp registration requires a deposit and has a staggered payment schedule, and the administrative service fee is based on 15% of the total event registration fee and not the amount of fees paid at the time of cancellation.

Alternatively, prior to May 1, Scouts BSA Summer Camp fees may be transferred to another person attending the same summer camp program in the same year prior to May 1 of that year. After May 1, fees may only be transferred to a person newly added to the unit's registration. No pro-rated fees will be given to youth wishing to attend a partial week of Scouts BSA Summer Camp.

For Camp Oljato, your unit's participant counts verified May 1 of the year you are attending camp will be used for the unit balance and invoiced amount due. The unit will be charged full rate for any individuals removed from the roster after May 1, other than in specified exceptions (see "Exceptions" below). This includes Merit Badge class changes or cancelations which must be done before May 1st.

Additions to the roster on May 1 or later will be charged at the late fee rate.

Any fees still due at the time of camp will need to be paid onsite upon checking in or the unit will not be permitted to stay at camp.

Fees for individual Scouts or Adults may be transferred to other Scouts or Adults upon request no less than 30 days ahead of your first day of camp.

## **DEPOSITS**

Deposits are not refundable. In the event of cancellation, any required deposit paid will be forfeited. Deposits may, however, be transferred to another participant that takes the entire slot for that activity only.

## **CANCELLATION BY THE COUNCIL**

If the Pacific Skyline Council cancels an event, a full 100% refund will be issued (including any deposit money).

## **EXCEPTIONS**

1. In the event a registered participant has an illness or physical ailment preventing participation in the activity and has a signed statement from a licensed healthcare practitioner, a full refund, including deposits, may be issued, less any money that has already been sent to another agency or company that has been retained for the implementation of the activity. The signed statement must be submitted with a written request for the refund within 30-days following the activity. This only applies to individual program fees paid and not group registration or rental fees.

2. In the event of the death of an immediate family member (parent, grandparent, sibling, or anyone who resides with the participant) a full refund, including deposits, may be issued, less any money that has already been sent to another agency or company that has been retained for the implementation of the activity. The council will consider other deaths, which may affect the participant, on a case-by-case basis.

## **REFUND PROCESSING**

Only a member of the council management team may approve a refund. Refunds are only issued by check written to the individual who paid the fee and sent via US mail. Allow 30 days from the date of the approval for the check to arrive.

## **CAMPERSHIPS**

A Scout is Thrifty and as such is encouraged to do all they can to help pay their way to camp. At times, however, it is difficult for a Scout and their family to raise the full fee for summer camp. Limited financial help is available from the Pacific Skyline Council on an individual basis for Scouts who could not otherwise go to camp due to financial hardships. Scoutmasters in the Pacific Skyline Council who know of any youth with a legitimate need for financial help are encouraged to help that Scout apply for a Campership. ## **PROVISIONAL CAMPING**

Scouts who cannot attend camp with their unit or who want an extra week at camp or units who are unable to provide two deep adult leadership will be registered as provisional campers and incorporated into a Troop that is in camp. Camp Staff will work with the individual and attending Troops to identify the Troop the camper will be with. Individual Scouts are encouraged to attend with a friend. Friends attending as Provisional Scouts will be assigned to the same unit and campsite. Provisional Scouts still need to pay camp fees but register as Provisional Scout NOT as part of a unit.

## **CAPACITY POLICY**

If your camper numbers increase (or decrease) after June 1, please notify the camp registrar IMMEDIATELY. Increasing or decreasing the total number of campers can impact every troop in camp that week. Every attempt will be made to accommodate an increase but cannot be guaranteed. Additionally, if your unit increases in size, your unit may be placed in a larger campsite, OR your unit may be split between multiple sites. Please be considerate when adding additional campers by informing the camp registrar at least 2 weeks before your scheduled session. If you are decreasing in size, please refer to our Refunds and Transfers Policy

# GEAR PREPARATION HIGHLIGHTS

(checklists can be found at the end of this guide)

## **Clothing and Weather**

Weather at camp is generally comfortable and sunny during the summer. HOWEVER, weather in the Sierra's is also unpredictable and campers should come prepared. For cooler days or nights, dress in layers, with hoodies being helpful. As part of scouting's ten essentials, always bring basic raingear as summers in the Sierras usually include a few days of rain. Hats can also help with cool mornings or sunny days.

## **Nights**

Weather at camp can vary. But nights, particularly in the earlier sessions, can be chilly with temperatures as low as the mid-40's. To make sure campers are comfortable, we recommend a sleeping bag rated to at least 20 degrees. Another tip is to bring a hooded sweatshirt for sleeping in (keeping the head warm).

## **Cots & Mattresses**

Cots are NOT provided by camp. Campers (particularly adult leaders) who wish to have a cot will need to bring their own. For health and cleanliness reasons, Fresno County Health does not allow us to use mattresses which are retained between sessions for the next camper.

## **Mess Kits**

**Please have your scouts bring a mess kit to camp.** While our dining hall will be providing all needed dinnerware and utensils for meals in our dining hall, we also provide other meal opportunities such as our outdoor BBQ and Dutch oven cooking. Having campers bring their own mess kits to these events has allowed us to greatly reduce waste from paper plates at these kinds of events.

## **Self Packing**

Please have scouts pack their own gear (as opposed to their parents or others). An extra pair of warm socks, or flashlight, won't do your scout any good if they don't know where they are or if they even have them. It is great to help them make sure they got everything they need but let them actually place it in their pack. Plus, it is a great way for them to learn that skill.

## **Cell Phones and Wi-Fi**

Cell phones can be hit and miss up at camp. Typically Verizon is quite accessible throughout camp with a strong 5G signal in many places. Other carriers are far less reliable and likely will only work in very open and high places, if at all. Wi-Fi is available primarily in the center of camp and access is available for a nominal fee. Please note that Wi-Fi access is for adults and staff. Scouts should not be given access. This is primarily due to the fact that our bandwidth is limited and would not survive 200+ scouts streaming content throughout the day.

# CAMP STANDARDS

A good camper always maintains high standards of safety, personal conduct, courtesy and conservation. Safety is the top priority at Camp Oljato, and we fully comply with BSA standards of youth protection.

- Scouts MUST use the Buddy system.
- Please no running
- Leader permission is required for hiking, and leaders should be advised of routes and return times.
- All aquatics activities are conducted under the supervision of camp staff.



## CONSERVATION

- Avoid using worn out areas. Let nature restore the area over time. Please use recycling bins and put trash in the proper container.
- Don't cut down any trees, dead or alive.
- Leave all axes in the axe yard. Scouts may NOT bring their own axes to camp. Never leave a fire unattended.
- Always be sure any fire is "DEAD OUT" with water prior to leaving the site or going to sleep.
- Keep campfires small. Campfires should never be more than 12" high or extend beyond the fire ring.

## UNIFORMING

Scouting is a uniformed organization. Scouts are encouraged to wear a proper Scouting America field uniform to both morning and evening assemblies as a symbol of respect for the flag and the pride of being a Scout. It is left to the SPL and Scoutmaster's discretion to decide at which other activities your Scout may need to wear the Scouting America field uniform.

## YOUR TROOP SITE

"The troop site is the heart of the camp." It is where Scouting begins at Camp Oljato. The opportunities for improving Scout skills and advancement are tremendous. It is important for troop leaders to remember that much of what can be done in a program area can also be brought into your own troop site. As young Scouts are presented with new skills, they need constant reinforcement by reviewing and using these new skills in their troop site.

The Camp Commissioner or Troop Friend will conduct a daily visitation to inspect:

- General Appearance (Including Cleanliness)
- Tents And Tent Lines
- Troop Equipment
- Bulletin Board
- Fire Guard Compliance
- Scout Involvement

## TENTS

All tents are in generally good repair and should be treated with respect and care. Please do not move any tent platforms. Moving them may create a safety issue and affect other units in the next session(s). Notify your commissioner if there are any rips that need repairing during the week. We rely on your information to ensure good maintenance of tents so please let us know. A close-out inspection will take place upon departure and any new damage must be paid for by the troop.

All Scouts should bring sleeping pads for their use. While air mattresses are allowed, they ARE prone to leaks, which makes them useless afterwards for the rest of the time there. Foam or “waffle” pads tend to work out much better.

Units must carry their equipment to their troop site; therefore, it is wise to limit the personal equipment to what can be contained in a backpack.

## LATRINES

“A Scout is Clean”

Separate latrine facilities are provided for youth and adults and for males and females. Encourage each Scout to use the shower facility regularly during their stay at camp. Latrines must be cleaned daily. Latrine duty for the week will be assigned upon arrival in camp by troop (arranged with your SPL). Each Troop will assign a senior Scout & adult to ensure that appropriate Scout behavior is adhered to while cleaning on the day latrine duty is assigned. Latrines must be cleaned daily (restocking supplies is handled by our staff). When it's your turn, clean them regularly and check them frequently to ensure that nature's call is not a terrifying experience. The best time for cleaning is after breakfast and before the first program session begins.

If there are maintenance issues, please report them immediately to the maintenance staff or to the Camp Commissioner. Troops will be charged for damage to camp property and/or camp tents. Thank you for your cooperation!

**\*Do not use or bring flushable wipes or similar products\*** These, even ones labeled “biodegradable”, are unable to be handled by our waste treatment system.

## **FIRE TOOLS**

Each troop site has fire tools that must stay in the troop site at all times. These tools include a shovel, rake, and fire buckets. Brooms, axes and saws are available for checkout from Scoutcraft if needed. Please return any broken items to the Camp Commissioner and acquire another one.

Knives and axes should only be used as tools and not toys and should be of appropriate length for the individual using them. Axes should not leave their designated ax yard unless being returned to Scoutcraft. Only Scouts who have earned Totin' Chip are allowed to use axes.

## **ASSEMBLIES**

Staff makes important program announcements during both morning and evening assemblies. Please arrive on time and in properly worn uniforms. In respect for the flag, please coach your Scouts on proper flag etiquette: how to stand at attention (no slouching or hands in pockets), how to wear their uniform correctly (shirt buttoned and tucked in), how to salute (elbow out). Above all, there should be no talking or laughing. If your unit is running late and finds that the flag ceremony has already begun, STOP as soon as you see the assembly area, be quiet, and salute the flag. Join the assembly only after the flag ceremony is completed. Dismissal order from assembly is based on flag patrol, flag etiquette, proper uniform, other factors, and courtesy.

Opportunities for troops to perform flag ceremonies will be provided throughout the week. For more information, see your Camp Commissioner.

## **HEALTH AND SAFETY**

### **EMERGENCY PROCEDURES AND INFORMATION**

Camp Oljato has emergency procedures for a variety of scenarios. This includes the "The Emergency Assembly Plan". As part of the first 24 hours, the camp will demonstrate the camp's emergency procedures by initiating the Emergency Assembly Plan. Any other alarms during the week will signify an actual emergency. The entirety of the camp emergency procedures is posted in the program office, kitchen, and each program area in camp.

### **Emergency Assembly Plan**

An alarm/siren located at the camp program will be sounded. If the alarm is not working, the dining hall bell will be rung in a repeated series of three rings. All scouts, leaders, family campers, and visitors are to report immediately to the flagpole assembly area. There can be NO exceptions to this, including adult leaders. Unit leaders will be asked to account for all members of their unit, and any missing individuals will trigger staff runners to determine their location. Once fully assembled the emergency will be explained, and further instructions will be disseminated at the assembly area. Be sure that your troop discusses and understands what to do in case of emergencies.

## **HOMESICKNESS**

For many younger scouts, camp may be their first extended stay away from home. Every troop leader should pay close attention to every Scout to make sure they are happy, healthy and involved in the

camp program. An active program is the best insurance against homesickness. Do all you can to have every Scout participate. If homesickness develops, inform the Health Officer, Program Director, or Camp Director, before permitting Scouts to contact home. Generally calling home to a parent will make things worse, so it is best to avoid that if possible. The phone in the program office is off-limits to Scouts while they are alone. Scoutmasters must be in attendance. Please use cell phones only in areas away from Scouts.

## **SLEEP**

A good night's sleep is essential to the health of each camper. Quiet hours are between 10:00 p.m. and 6:30 a.m. Each Scout needs 8 hours of sleep per night. Be respectful to your neighbors.

## **GENERAL BEHAVIOR**

- Horseplay can result in personal injury and damage to equipment. Scouts should be steered toward more constructive activities. **FUN CEASES WHEN SOMEONE GETS HURT.**
- A scout is Courteous and Kind. Please impress upon your scouts the need to respect others, whether from their own troop or others. Scouts that harass, use aggressive behavior or lash out at others may be asked to leave camp. **Any scout that physically assaults or sexually harasses another WILL BE ASKED TO LEAVE CAMP IMMEDIATELY.**

## **HAZING**

There is absolutely no room for any kind of hazing at Camp Oljato. Initiations and the like will NOT be tolerated. Troop leaders are responsible for ensuring that all Scouts are properly oriented and assisted to get the most out of their camp experience without any hazing of any kind.

## **FLAMMABLES**

Only natural wood, charcoal or propane may be used for cooking purposes. Flashlights, electric battery lanterns, or propane lanterns should be used for lighting. **WE RECOMMEND THAT EACH TROOP BRING A BATTERY POWERED LANTERN TO CAMP.**

Liquid fuel (white gas) must be stored properly by the maintenance staff and is best not brought to camp.

Only battery-operated lanterns/flashlights are allowed in the tents. **NO FLAMES IN TENTS!**

## **FOOTWEAR**

For your safety, open-toed shoes are not allowed in camp except in the gated swimming areas. If you arrive in sandals, you'll be asked to change them before entering camp.

## **PETS**

Dogs or other pets are not allowed in camp. Please instruct visiting parents to leave their pets at home. The only exception would be a service animal.

## **PROHIBITED ITEMS**

The following items are not permitted in camp at any time or for any purpose. Violators will be asked to leave camp immediately.

- Alcohol
- Marijuana in any form and for any purpose, including medicinal. Illegal Drugs
- Personal Firearms, Ammunition, or other projectile devices, including, but not limited to, bows, crossbows, arrows, slingshots, wrist rockets, trebuchets, catapults, cannons, etc. The Pacific Skyline Council will provide all necessary equipment and supplies for shooting sports programs.
- Fireworks or any explosive device

## **SMOKING**

Smoking, including vaping, is not condoned by the Boy Scouts of America. Only persons over 21 years of age are allowed to smoke per California law and only in designated areas not in view of Scouts. Smoking is considered an open flame and is treated as a potentially dangerous hazard.

## **TRASH AND BEAR PRECAUTIONS**

Bears are frequent visitors in camp. All trash must be placed in double bags and taken to the trash trailer behind the Dining Hall before 8 pm every evening for transportation out of camp. After 8:00 pm all trash, food and other smellables should be placed in bear boxes. At Oljato we actively practice conservation. PLEASE RECYCLE.

Do not leave food items in your vehicles!

## **KNIVES & AXES**

Knives may be used ONLY as tools, not toys. Please do not allow Scouts to bring knives over 2 1/2" unless they are signed up for the fishing merit badge and it is a fillet knife. Leave all axes in the ax yard.

## **GATED AREAS**

There are areas throughout camp that have a level of risk associated with them: Waterfront, Sailing, Climbing, Rifle, Shotgun, Archery, and Maintenance. These areas have specific entrances and exits. NO ONE is allowed into these areas without permission from the staff in charge! This includes when the area is not in operation and unoccupied. Verbal permission must be asked both to enter AND to leave these areas each time.

## **HEALTH LODGE**

Oljato employs a Camp Health Officer who is on duty to attend to health issues your troop might encounter. Our Health Lodge is equipped with a licensed first responder, EMT, nurse, or physician will be on site 24-hours a day.

Our Health Lodge is equipped with supplies to handle most injuries in camp. Serious injuries, which require immediate advanced medical support, will be handled by local paramedics. For less serious injuries, which still require advanced medical attention, unit leaders will be responsible for transporting the injured person to the nearest medical treatment facility. The closest full-service facility is in Fresno.

Walking in Camp is to be expected. Please no running.

Covid-19 Protocols:

In line with the [Frenso County's Covid Guidance](#). The Camp Health Officer is prepared with isolation, masks, and other mitigating factors to make camp as safe as possible.

## **PRESCRIPTION DRUGS**

Prescription drugs must be stored in a locked container at the Health Lodge. It is required that all drugs must come in the original prescription container with dosage instructions. It is strongly recommended that minimum quantities be brought to camp. It is required that Troops must assign an adult leader to take responsibility for assuring that Scouts take their prescribed medications at the assigned times. Marijuana in any form (including medicinal) is not permitted at Camp Oljato.

## **SPECIAL NEEDS**

For Scouts with special medical concerns, leaders should:

- Alert the Council office of any special needs that need to be considered in advance of attending camp.
- Must have a written record of the nature of ongoing treatment and care.  
May be required to have a parent accompany the Scout to camp.
- Pacific Skyline Council will work to accommodate any Scout coming to camp.
- CPAP machine users need to supply their own battery-operated machine, power is limited and not available in campsites.

## **SPECIAL DIETARY NEEDS**

Camp Oljato contracts with Upper Crust, a service with a long history of providing meals in college campus environments, to provide all meals in our dining hall. They have greatly improved the quality of life at camp by providing top rated food for the last few years!

If any person in your unit has special dietary needs, such as allergies or religious observances, while at

camp, please let us know by [completing this form](#) no less than two weeks before your arrival.

We are happy to do what we can to meet your needs; however, since food is purchased in large quantities, those with very restrictive diets (e.g. gluten allergies) may need to plan to bring specialty items to camp. If necessary, arrangements will be made to store and prepare food brought to camp for those individuals.

# Camp Programs

**A note on fees:** In past years, a number of activities and merit badges required fees to pay for supplies, consumables, maintenance and equipment replacement. With the exception of Horsemanship (facilities provided by an outside operator) and some available adult trainings, scout programs are now all-inclusive and simply part of the camp registration fee.

## *Range and Target Activities*

**Merit Badges typically offered:** Rifle, Shotgun, Archery

Range and Target activities include the areas teaching Rifle, Archery and Shotgun merit badges. These ranges are available for use by all campers, but do require a signed parental release form, whether for merit badge instruction or use during free time. A signed permission form (normally uploaded to CampDoc before camp) is REQUIRED to participate on these ranges. All participants must participate in a safety orientation from the range instructor prior to using any of the equipment. All ammunition and arrows are provided at the range, and NO personal equipment or ammunition is allowed.

## *Waterfront*

**Merit Badges typically offered:** Canoeing, Kayaking, Motorboating, Lifesaving, Rowing, Small Boat Sailing, Swimming, and others.

Camp Oljato typically provides sailboats, kayaks, canoes, rowboats, a water trampoline, a rolling log, motorboating, waterskiing, wakeboarding, and tubing. Additionally, Huntington Lake is home to world-class sailing. We recommend that you and your Scouts take advantage of the great opportunities offered during open program time. In accordance with BSA's Safety Afloat, everyone in a water vessel must wear life jackets and have passed the BSA Swimmer test. An orientation and demonstration of ability is required to use any equipment. Campers can bring a wetsuit if they plan on spending a lot of time using the boats or other water vessels.



## Swimming

Huntington Lake offers some of the best water recreation in the Sierra Nevada. Camp Oljato's swim area operates in strict accordance with BSA policies and is used for merit badges, rank advancement instruction, and free-time swims. Most aquatic programs require participants to pass the BSA Swimmers test that will be taken at Camp. Camp Oljato classifies all participants in our waterfront as Blue (capable), Red (beginner), or White (non) swimmers, based upon the swim test, which then determines access to different activities.

### Swimmer Test ("Blue Swimmer")

Jump feet first into water over the head in depth, level off, and begin swimming. Swim 75 yards in a strong manner using one or more of the following strokes: sidestroke, breaststroke, trudgen, or crawl; then swim 25 yards using an easy resting backstroke. The 100 yards must be swum continuously and include at least one sharp turn. After completing the swim, rest by floating.

### Beginner Test ("Red Swimmer")

Jump feet first into water over the head in depth, level off, swim 25 feet on the surface, stop, turn sharply, resume swimming as before, and return to the starting place.

### Swimwear Considerations

In addition to being comfortable and functional, the key considerations at camp are that swimwear is:

- Designed as swimwear.
- Appropriate to the activity.
- Secure enough to not shift or fall off while participating.

Remember: Safety is the most important component of any swimwear.



Although the water temperature is usually safe for regular water-related Scouting activities, there might be times during the beginning of the summer when it is colder than normal. During these times, campers can bring a wetsuit if they plan to spend a lot of time doing aquatics merit badges, participating in water activities, or simply swimming during open program time. If you DO decide to use a wetsuit for swim tests we recommend using it at all aquatics activities.

### **Motorboats and Motorboating Merit Badge Pre-requisites**

As of January 1, 2025, California law now requires that ALL people operating a motorboat must carry a California Boater Card, regardless of age. This means that anyone who wants to ride such a boat or take the merit badge must pass an online course and bring that card to camp BEFORE they arrive.

There is a \$10 fee from the state of California to apply for the card itself. The application requires an online course which is offered by a number of providers, some for a fee and some for free. More information can be found here : <https://californiaboatercard.com/about-the-card/>

## **Mile Swim**

This is an individual activity that is open to all campers, Scouts and adult leaders alike, who pass their BSA swimmer check. The mile swim is a program that requires a pre-qualifying ¼ mile continuous swim evaluation, and then a 1 mile course approved by the Waterfront Director. Please see the Waterfront Director at the start of the camp session to approve and coordinate. In addition, they will need another troop member to be their buddy and help them count laps. The waterfront director will assign times, locations, and equipment to be utilized.

## **Red Cross Lifeguard**

BSA Lifeguard is no longer offered by Scouting America and has been replaced by Red Cross Lifeguard. Those interested can coordinate this with the Waterfront Director.

Other BSA Aquatics Awards

Stand Up Paddle Boarding BSA Award, Kayaking BSA Award

## **Scoutcraft**

**Merit Badges typically offered:** Camping, Communication, Citizenship badges, Emergency Preparedness, First Aid, Geocaching, Orienteering, Pioneering, Wilderness Survival, Trail to First Class (first year scout skill program), and others.

The Scoutcraft area covers a large number of activities related to scouting life. Many of the skills needed for scouting advancement, including camping, knots, hiking, wilderness survival, totin chip, pioneering, first aid, and others are taught here. This is also the area one comes to for many campsite supplies and tools needed for service projects.

### **TRAIL TO FIRST CLASS**

Also located in Scoutcraft, the Trail to First Class program is for all Scouts needing to work on rank advancement requirements for Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class. Camp Oljato offers merit badge periods for teaching these skills. We suggest that new Scouts who are focusing on rank advancement take these classes, as they will meet every day to work on requirements. For Scouts who have only a few requirements to finish up, we suggest that they do not sign up for these classes as many of the topics covered may be redundant. Instead they might want to work on their requirements during the open program time.

Please note that the program is called “Trail TO First Class” and is intended to help scouts with many requirements. Scouts who come to camp as Scout Rank will not be First Class by the end of the week, but if they attend class every day and work hard during open program time, they will complete many of the requirements needed to advance. These Scouts will be working on aquatic rank requirements as well and should bring a bathing suit.

## **Nature**

***Merit Badges typically offered: Astronomy, Environmental Science, Wildlife Management, Mammal Study, Fishing, Geology, Soil and Water Conservation, Nature, Forestry, Oceanography, Plant Science, Space Exploration, Sustainability, and Weather.***

Located just up the hill from the Dining Hall, the nature area offers an opportunity for scouts to learn more about the flora, fauna, weather, and other aspects of the natural world around them. Fishing poles can also be checked out here.

### ***FISHING PROGRAM***

Camp Oljato is a great place to fish and encourages participation in the Take Me Fishing recognition programs. The stocked waters of Huntington Lake offer many chances to catch your fair share of Rainbow Trout. We recommend that fishermen practice catch and release, although you can keep the fish if you plan on cooking it in your campsite. If you need a place to store your catch, the nature area has a freezer designated for fish (note: the kitchen cannot store fish for you in the refrigerator). We also recommend the use of barbless hooks for easy release of the fish after they are caught. Please come to camp prepared to fish with your own equipment. The camp will have a few poles and basic equipment that can be used, but this equipment is intended primarily for those who are enrolled in the Fishing merit badge class. The Trading Post does sell fishing poles and limited tackle.

Anyone 16 years of age and older must have a current fishing license to take any kind of fish, mollusk, invertebrate, amphibian or crustacean in California. Camp Oljato will NOT have fishing licenses for sale. We recommend purchasing the appropriate license at your local sporting goods store prior to coming to camp. Make sure you have valid identification on your person to purchase a California State fishing license. When fishing at Camp Oljato it is the campers' responsibility to know the California State fishing guidelines. Camp Oljato will enforce all California State fishing regulations.

### ***Handicraft***

**Merit Badges typically offered:** Leatherwork, Woodcarving, Basketry, Textiles, Photography, Art/Sculpture, and others.

The Handicraft area offers many different opportunities for artistic and creative activities including leatherwork, woodcarving, painting, basketry, tie dying, and other art/craft options.

## *Horsemanship*

Horsemanship Merit Badge is available as a program in cooperation with D&F Pack Station across the lake from camp. Transportation across the lake will be arranged. Generally those partaking will eat early that day to leave on time and take a bag lunch for the day. Please plan on wearing long pants for the horse ride and bring plenty of water.

As it is provided by an outside agency, this is one of the few programs in camp which has a separate fee. If there is space, adults may also participate for a significantly reduced fee.

## **The Trading Post**

Our well-stocked Trading Post sells camp patches, mugs, t-shirts, snacks/drinks, personal items, camping equipment, and handicraft items. This is also where tickets for areas like rifle, shotgun, and lake inner tubing can be purchased. We suggest that each Scout bring between \$75 and \$100 to camp plus money for merit badge materials. Trading Post Hours are posted at various locations in camp and in the handout packet when troops arrive.

### **ORDER OF THE ARROW**

The Order of the Arrow (OA) is Scouting's National Honor Society. All campers and adult leaders who are members of the Order of the Arrow are encouraged to bring their OA sash to wear with their uniform on OA Day. OA Day will be held sometime during the week and in addition to wearing their sash with uniform, there will be opportunities for Arrowmen to gather informally and for all campers to learn more about Scouting's Brotherhood of Cheerful Service.



# Checklists

## SCOUTMASTER'S FINAL CHECKLIST

This checklist will assist unit leaders make a final recap before leaving for the summer adventure at camp.

- BSA Health & Medical Records, Parts A, B, and C, completed and signed for EACH Scout and Adult.\*
- AB506 - For California-Based Units Only\*: All California-based units must provide a completed Summer Camp Verification Form at camp check-in. This form must include all adults on your roster.
- FOUR (4) COPIES of the Shooting Sports Consent Form for each youth that plans to participate in shooting sports\*
- Verification of BSA membership for ALL Scouts and Adults\* (must be membership cards or copies/photos/scans/downloads thereof)
- Verification of current BSA Youth Protection Training for ALL Adults 18 and over\* (certificate of training)
- Verification of current Weather Hazards Training for ONE Adult per Unit that will be in camp ALL week\* (certificate of training)
- Back up adult leadership ready and trained – 2 deep leadership at a minimum.
- All youth and leader fees paid, by May 26
- All transportation and drivers set.
- Unit equipment checked and loaded.
- All Scouts' equipment checked and loaded.
- Tentative unit program needs prepared.
- Special unit advancement supplies, merit badge books, etc.
- Sufficient funds for emergencies
- Vehicles and trailers safety checked, flares, insurance information, etc.

NOTE: Privately owned boats are NOT permitted to dock at Camp Oljato.

(\*)All items marked with an asterisk (\*) must be turned in during unit check-in as soon as you arrive in camp.

The forms linked to in this document are the ONLY forms that will be accepted.

If you can check off all of these items, then you're prepared for an enjoyable stay at camp.

## ***OPTIONAL TROOP AND PATROL EQUIPMENT***

Your troop may want to bring the listed optional equipment:

- Battery or propane lanterns Rope and binder twine
- Ground cloths (for the wooden floors of tents) Patrol and troop flags.
- Water containers
- Dutch oven, griddle, extra cook kit pieces, etc.

Camp Oljato will provide tents for campers and leaders. If your troop has more people than the campsite's listed capacity, you will need to bring your own tents for those extra people.

## **SAMPLE PACKING LIST 2024-**

Please put your name and unit on items you don't want to lose. We will do our best to reunite you with your items.

\* Pack in a backpack if possible. The paths to campsites are not flat or smooth. Be prepared to carry all your gear for up to half a mile! Roller bags do not work at most campsites, and duffel bags can be awkward to carry.

\* Please mark all items with Scout's name

- Field Uniform/Class A Scout uniform: shirt, Activity Shirt/Class B shirt underneath, neckerchief, slide, scout pants/short/skirt, socks, and belt; closed-toed boots/trail runners/sturdy sneakers.
- 2-3 extra lightweight long or short sleeve shirts (Troop Activity Uniform if possible. NO COTTON)
- Fleece or sweater, AND a light jacket (two layers of clothing are lighter, warmer, and more flexible than one heavy jacket)
- One pair of shorts One pair of long pants
- Extra pair of shoes or boots (closed-toe) Sun hat (+ sunglasses, optional)
- Beanie Hat (For cold weather and sleeping) Light rain jacket/pants or poncho
- Extra underwear (at least 4 sets) Extra socks (at least 4 pairs)
- Pajamas or something else to sleep in (it may get cold).
- Swimwear (swim trunks or board shorts for males, modest tankini or one-piece suit for females.)  
Waterfront towel (small THIN beach towel, label with name)
- Shower towel - small, thin. Optional: face towel

## **Personal Equipment**

- Personal medications in original containers, combined in a Ziploc bag (with Scout's name and Troop Number)
- Sleeping bag (suggested rating 15°F or 20°F)
- Sleeping Bag Liner (no cotton)
- Sleeping pad or lightweight air mattress
- Reusable water bottle 1L size (labeled with name and Troop Number!). Carry leash / carabiner advised.
- Daypack to carry items around camp (Troop drawstring or similar)
- Toilet kit: toothbrush, floss, toothpaste, comb/brush, hair ties, shampoo, soap, washcloth, deodorant,

lip balm, small unscented hand sanitizer (in daypack)

- Menstrual products as needed.
- Sunblock 30+ spf recommended. Many of our scouts also wear rash guards at the waterfront.
- Mess Kit (for in-camp eating): a bowl, a spoon or spork, and a cup.
- Small personal first aid kit - Ziploc snack bag size
- Small headlamp (working!) and extra batteries [flashlight OK, but headlamp preferred] Small pocketknife
- Money: \$75-\$100, allows an adequate amount of spending money in camp. Extra: \$25-30 in separate Ziploc for lunch to and from camp
- Scout Handbook, merit badge pamphlets, etc. Pen/pencil, notebook, paper
- Any special required items for your MB
- Way to organize Merit Badge materials (clipboard? Small binder with plastic sleeves?)

If doing the Horsemanship MB: Horsemanship is a full-day program and participants will take a shuttle bus to the corral on that day. Plan to pack a daypack with extra clothes, a water bottle, and sun protection. Participants must wear long pants and flat-bottomed closed-toed shoes, or boots that can easily slide in and out of stirrups. Hiking boots work: if you already have cowboy or other riding boots, bring those!

### **Optional Equipment**

- Favorite stuffed animal (small)
- Ground cloth or tarp (to cover the wooden floor of the platform tent) Small Camping Pillow (Or stuff sack to use clothes as pillow)
- Mosquito repellent (Put in Ziplock bag as it may leak when changing altitude)
- Flip Flops for in the shower
- Work or gardening gloves (for service project) Gloves/Glove Liners (for cold mornings/evenings)
- Swim goggles (if needed)
- Spare pair of glasses (if needed)
- Camera (one that would be OK if it breaks or gets lost)
- Fishing gear (+ valid CA fishing license if 16 or older and planning to fish)
- Book, deck of cards, other games

### **DO NOT BRING:**

- Valuables/items that cannot be replaced.
- Electronics: Mobile Phones earbuds/headphones, Bluetooth speakers, iPad, laptops Sheath knives, Firearms, Fireworks, Drugs, Vapes
- Open-toe shoes or sandals (other than for the shower and swim area)

#### SUMMER CAMP RESERVATION POLICY FOR NEXT YEAR

While still in camp, troops can sign up for the same week for the following year (or for an earlier week) beginning Wednesday. A deposit and an estimate of the total number of campers is required. Registrations will open to the general Scouting public on Friday of the corresponding week.

## Mission Statement of the Boy Scouts of America
