Pacifica District CAMPERALL 2025 OVERVIEW AND OBJECTIVES

Our Theme this year is: **Jurassic Scouts!**

Our Slogan this year is: (Not Final) We're STOMPING our way to Eagle!

WHAT IS CAMPERALL?

CAMPERALL is a TWO (2) NIGHT Camping Event tailored to Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts (AOL) that is intended to:

- Expose participants to glimpses of FUN while enabling them to Learn and Demonstrate Scout Skills.
- Foster a POSITIVE high-energy environment where they can showcase their SCOUT SPIRIT!
- Aid in the Webelos/AOL-to-Scout Transition
- Provide an opportunity for Webelos and AOL Scouts, their Adult Partners and Leaders to meet local Troops in an interactive environment and become more familiar with Troops they might like to join.
- Allow parents to gain a perspective on Troop Programming.

The purpose of CAMPERALL is to create, in all Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts, a genuine desire to pursue their adventure with Scouting America, and to give them a preview, through a series of fun-filled events, of the thrills of Scout Skills.

Scouting America prides itself on being an organization which teaches young men and women valuable life skills and equips them with the abilities and opportunities to teach those learned skills to others. CAMPERALL is an Outdoor Activity Program and is one of the few opportunities that older Scouts have, outside of their own troops, to practice their skills, while teaching others who are younger or lower in Scout Rank.

WHAT to EXPECT at CAMPERALL?

Participants will have an opportunity to demonstrate their SCOUT SPIRIT and Basic Scout Skills (First Aid, Knots, Tent Building, etc.). Webelos and AOL Scout Dens will be called "Patrols" and should have a Patrol Name. The recommended size for Patrols is **6-8 Webelos or AOLs.** In previous years, Camperall Staff has found this size affords individual Webelos and AOLs the Optimal Experience & Participation Level during the Saturday Competitive Events. If needed, leaders may combine Webelos and AOLs into one Patrol.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

ALL WEBELOS AND ARROW OF LIGHT CUB SCOUTS who want to:

- Get a jump start on Webelos and Arrow of Light ADVANCEMENT
- Experience and enjoy, ahead of time, the THRILL of Competition and SPIRIT of Scouting America
- Experience competition in an environment filled with Scouts willing to lend a helping hand
- Work hand in hand with Scouts on Scouting Skills, Competitions, and Scout Spirit!

REQUIRED ADULT REGISTRATION/CERTIFICATION

A minimum of two (2) Scouting America registered Leaders MUST with a CURRENT YPT Certification and having completed the AB 506 - California State Mandated Reporter Training (Further information at: https://californiascouting.org/) and the associated background check(Live Scan) must be in attendance for each unit. A minimum of one (1) of the Scouting America registered Leaders MUST be BALOO trained.

Cub Scout parents or legal guardians taking part in an overnight Cub Scout program with their own child or legal ward are not required to register as leaders. All adults must review the "How to Protect your Children from Child Abuse: A Parent's Guide" that can be found in the front of each Cub Scout Handbook. In addition, the parent or legal guardian must be accompanied by a **Scouting America registered Leader** at any time they are with youth members other than their own child/ward.



Pacifica District CAMPERALL 2025 RULES AND SAFETY

BUDDY SYSTEM

All Scouts MUST use THE BUDDY SYSTEM at All Times, especially when moving from location to location.

GENERAL SAFETY

- Please adhere to all signage and Camperall Staff Volunteer's instructions
- Speed limit while in Camp is 5 mph
- CAMPERALL BOUNDARIES: Webelos, AOLs, Scouts, and Scouters are to stay "In-Bounds" throughout
 the event. Anyone participant outside these boundaries during Camperall will be asked to leave. These
 boundaries are defined below in conjunction with the event map in this guide.
 - o "In-Bounds" for Webelos, AOLs: Camping area marked with a bold "1" and the assembly area marked with a bold "A".
 - o "In-Bounds" for Scouting America: all of the Webelos/AOLs "In-Bounds" areas and the Scouting America Campsite Area marked with a bold "2" on the site map.
 - o All other areas are considered "out-of-bounds" unless accompanied by Den/Adult Leaders or an Adult Partner.
 - o Paved trails between around camping areas, competition area and the path to the parking area are "In-Bounds"
 - o The competition areas marked with a bold "**E**" on the site map will be considered "In-Bounds" on Saturday 9 am to 4:30pm for Webelos/AOL and 8 am to 5 pm for Scouting America.
- Thank you for enforcing and reviewing these rules with your units.

PARK RULES

- Quiet time is from 10:00pm until 5:00am
- Parking is available at the Parks.
- No areas are to be roped or staked off. All designated areas are marked off and allocated by the Camperall Staff.
- Cooking stoves and gas/electric barbecues are permitted, no charcoal.
- NO STYROFOAM IS ALLOWED AT THE PARK!
- No electronic projection equipment or televisions are allowed in Pack/Troop camping areas.

Arrival/Departure Log

Camperall Staff requests each unit maintain an arrival/departure log including dates/times/names for each individual arriving/departing during Camperall. The intent is to know who is in camp in the case of an emergency.

Accessibility for Persons with Special Needs

Camperall 2025 will be providing ADA accessible restrooms. If additional accommodations are required for your unit please contact Mr. Mark Smilor at 714-488-7564. Your unit should come prepared to support and accommodate individual scouts with special needs.

Camp Health Officer

Camperall 2025 located in Huntington Beach Central Park is within 10 minutes of an emergency medical system (EMS) support. Camperall will have on staff a person of at least 18 years of age with Red Cross Standard First Aid or equivalent and CPR/AED for Professional Rescuers and Health Care Providers or equivalents. This person will be available at the Camperall First Aid Tent or by Radio within the Camperall Boundaries.

Water

No potable water is available at the camping location. Please bring enough water for your group for the ENTIRE Weekend.

Leave No Trace

Camperall 2025 will be following the Leave Not Trace principles. These principles have been edited to better match the Camperall event. For a complete list of leave no trace principles please go here: https://www.scouting.org/programs/scouts-bsa/resources/leave-no-trace/.

Plan Ahead and Prepare

Proper trip planning and preparation helps campers accomplish trip goals safely and enjoyably while minimizing damage to natural and cultural resources. Campers who plan ahead can avoid unexpected situations, and minimize their impact by complying with area regulations.

Each unit should:

- Check the weather prior to the event and come prepared for cool and potentially wet weather.
- Minimize trash through careful meal planning and food repackaging and proper equipment

Travel and Camp on Durable Surfaces

Damage to land occurs when visitors trample vegetation or communities of organisms beyond recovery. Each Unit should plan where possible to minimize there impacts to the local vegetation.

Dispose of Waste Properly

Each unit should plan to have their trash removed daily. Please plan to pack out what you pack in.

Leave What You Find

Leave rocks, plants, animals, archaeological artifacts, and other objects as you find them. Examine but do not touch cultural or historical structures and artifacts. It may be illegal to remove artifacts. Leave only footprints, take only memories (and pictures).

Minimize Campfire Impacts

Camperall will be holding a Saturday evening campfire. As of this update use of charcoal and campfires within unit campsites is prohibited.

Respect Wildlife

Quick movements and loud noises are stressful to animals. Each unit should discuss with their campers the following:

- Observe wildlife from afar to avoid disturbing them.
- Give animals a wide berth, especially during breeding, nesting, and birthing seasons.

Never feed wildlife. Help keep wildlife wild.

Food Storage

Each unit should plan to store their food including snacks in a hard sided plastic or metal container (coolers, etc.) to reduce the likelihood of various critters in the park from getting into your food.

Be Considerate of Other Visitors

Thoughtful campers respect other visitors and protect the quality of their experience. Each unit should discuss with their campers the following:

- · Respect private property and the property of others
- Be considerate of other campers and respect their privacy.
- Be considerate of other visitors in the park

- Upon Arrival Camperall Staff Volunteers will direct you.
- Please check-in at the Camp Registration Table (located at the north end of Camperall Headquarters), to make sure that your Pack is marked as "CHECKED-IN for Camperall" and that your pack has all of the latest event information and materials.
- If you are not the first adult checking in for your Troop or Pack, you will be directed to your campsite.
- Leaders will be given the number of wristbands that correspond to Pack's registration.

Leaders, PLEASE share the check-in package information with your Troop or Pack.

Leader Meeting / Cracker Barrel

Camperall 2025 will be providing Friday evening Cracker Barrel where announcements will be made and food will be served. Camperall staff will have a certified individual meeting local standards for food handling and will provide:

- a. Proper arrangements are made for disposal of garbage and maintaining garbage receptacles in a clean condition
- b. All equipment, utensils, and surfaces used in the preparation and serving of food are clean and sanitary.
- c. Smoking will not allowed in the kitchen or dining area.

CHECK-OUT is Sunday Morning at 10:00 a.m.

- Police your area! Practice **LEAVE NO TRACE**
- Pack it IN Pack it OUT (**Please plan on packing out your own trash.**) Take All Trash with you.
- Please have one adult from your pack do one of the following to get your Pack campsite "leave-no-trace" inspected prior to leaving: A) Come to the Event Registration area and a Scout staffer will accompany you back to your site. B) Inform a member of the Scout staff that are performing inspections that you would like your site inspected
- After your campsite is inspected, event patches will be provided. You may pick up your event patches by handing in your campsite inspection form at the Event Registration area.
- Once a Camperall Staff member signs your Campsite Inspection Card you are clear to go.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- Camperall Event Patches will be distributed on Sunday after a Camperall Staff member has inspected your campsite. Should there be a delay in delivery of Event Patches, you will be contacted to arrange the best method to get these to your Pack.
- The Spirit Award will be released at the end of the event.

Camperall Ultimate Frisbee Guidelines:

The tournament will begin with the first match at 9am and conclude in the afternoon around 3pm or 4pm (dependent on the number of teams). 30 minutes time slot for each match:

- Instruction 5 minutes
- First Half 10 minutes
- Halftime 3 minutes
- Second Half 10 minutes
- Reset 2 minute break to prepare for the next match

A maximum of 12 teams/patrols/dens will be allowed in the tournament. Typical Team size consists of 6 players on the field.

Ultimate Frisbee reflects the principles of the Scout Law. Competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of respect between players, adherence to the rules, and the basic joy of play. Ultimate Frisbee Rules can be found here: https://usaultimate.org/rules/10-simple-rules/

Pacifica District CAMPERALL 2025 WHAT SHOULD WE BRING?

If your Webelos/Arrow of Light Scouts have not yet camped, please call Mark Smilor (714-488-7564) to connect you with an Order of the Arrow Member to come to talk to your unit about camping equipment and clothing needs. Many of these camping items can be borrowed from one of your local Scout Troops. This is a recommended but not limited to list of equipment.

CAMPING EQUIPMENT

- Unit (Pack) Flags and Patrol Flags (Patrol Flags should be designed and constructed by Webelos/Arrow of Light Scouts. Building one is optional but fun!)
- Tents 1 Tent for 2-3 People (Must follow Guide to Safe Scouting Guidelines.) Webelos/Arrow of Light
 Scouts may share a tent with their own family member or other Webelos/Arrow of Light Scout.
- They may NOT share tents with unrelated adults.
- Ground cloths (tarps) to go under the base of each tent.
- Sleeping bag for each person
- Propane cook stove 1 per 4-8 people
- Cooking gear large pots, large pans, stirring spoons, spatulas, hot pads, cutting board, grill for cooking stove or BBQ. - Paper plates, plastic eating utensils, paper cups (NO STYROFOAM IS ALLOWED AT THE PARK!), or mess kits and mugs - Tables for eating, folding chairs or beach chairs
- Toilet paper at least 2 rolls Portable restrooms are provided as well as toilet paper, but Be Prepared!
 Paper towels, wet wipes, waterless hand soap (antibacterial)
- Dish towels, potholders, dish soap (biodegradable), wash basin, drying rack, can opener

SAFETY EQUIPMENT

- Camp Binder (see details in this guide)
- Large First Aid Kit, stocked with Band-Aids, bandages, etc. As some people may be allergic to specific medicines or lotions, Do NOT administer any medicines unless you have the Scout's parent permission.
- Shovel
- Empty 1-5-gallon plastic buckets for water and sand (fire safety). Buckets should be painted red and should be labeled "Water" or "Sand". You will need one can of each kind to be between every two tents. This will help to demonstrate to your Webelos/AoL the importance of practicing fire safety while camping.
- Fire Extinguisher

FOOD-DEPENDS ON YOUR MENUS

(No potable water is available at the camping location. Please bring enough water for your group for the Entire WEEKEND)

- Food, snacks, beverages for your group for Friday evening, Saturday (3 meals), Sunday breakfast, plus extra water
- Coolers with ice
- Condiments, salt, pepper, seasonings, depending on your menu
- Guidelines for safe food preparation, storage, and disposal are provided in the camp literature

• 32-gallon plastic trash bags (Please plan on packing out your own trash as we pay an extra fee if we have to have trash removed from the site.)

CLOTHING- BE PREPARED

- Travel in Scout Uniform/Field Uniform (Class A) to and from the event.
- Pack/Patrol T-shirts/Polos are to be worn throughout the weekend (Casual wear) for activities, competitions and other assemblies
- Jacket/sweatshirt Poncho/rain gear Rugged pants
- T-shirts Underwear and socks Sleep wear
- Hat or visor Toiletries (toothbrush, soap, deodorant, etc.)
- Sunscreen, sunglasses Insect repellent
- Water bottles Webelos/Arrow of Light handbook (in a Ziplock bag)
- Pencil, notebook, Camera Flashlight, extra batteries

Pacifica District CAMPERALL 2025 **AWARDS**

Awards will be given out at the Saturday Night Awards and Skits Campfire. The top 3 patrols that perform at the highest levels of competition in the events on their Passports (excluding the Ultimate Frisbee competition) will receive one of the coveted awards.

COMPETITION AWARDS

Competition Awards are won by the Packs that compete and finish in the top 3 of any of the 8 Competitive Events including: Scouting 101, Fire Building, First Aid, Flag Ceremony, Kim's Game, Knots, Obstacle Course, and Tent Building.

SPIRIT AWARD and Totem

- 1. The Spirit Award is won by the top 3 Patrols that demonstrate the most Scout Spirit throughout the entire Camperall weekend
- 2. The Spirit Totem is won by the top Patrol that demonstrates the most Scout Spirit throughout the day

PRESIDENTIAL AND HONORABLE MENTION AWARDS

The top 2 overall patrols that perform at the highest levels in all 8 of the competitive events combined with a high level of overall SPIRIT will receive the top Camperall Presidential Award for First Place and Honorable Mention for 2nd Place.

"THE SCOUT SKILL TRIANGLE AWARD"

The top 3 patrols that perform at the highest combined levels of competition for Fire Building, First Aid and Knots.

PATROL FLAG - Turn in DEADLINE 4:30pm

Flags are judged on Originality, craftsmanship, and overall "Coolness Factor". Top 3 will be Awarded.

GOLDEN SPOON - Turn in DEADLINE 6pm

The Golden Spoon Award is won by the Pack that demonstrates their prowess in the fine art of campsite cooking. Please provide approximately 3 samples for the Judges (a cheeseburger can be cut into 3 samples).

GOLDEN PIE TIN - Turn in DEADLINE 6pm

The Golden Pie Tin is won by the Pack that demonstrates their ability to "Wow" the Camperall Staff with a desert that most tickles Staffs fancy. Please provide approximately 3 samples for the Judges.

ULTIMATE FRISBEE TOURNAMENT CHAMPION (in this guide)

Webelos/Arrow of Light Cub Scouts will compete in a single elimination Ultimate Frisbee Tournament between 9:00am-12:00pm and 1:15pm — 4:30pm. The top Patrol in the Ultimate Frisbee Tournament will receive a Champion Award.

Scout Spirit

SCOUT SPIRIT is at the core of Camperall. Participants will have multiple opportunities to show their Scout Spirit beginning on Saturday morning at Camperall's Opening Ceremony and continuing on through to Saturday Night Camp-Wide Awards and Campfire Program. Webelos & AOLs will be putting on skits.

Each Patrol will show their Scout Spirit by performing their Patrol Yell(s) and by making, bringing and carrying a Patrol Flag to Camperall (Guidelines for Patrol Yells and Flags are located in this guide.)

Den/Patrol Yells Guidelines ** Must be Scout Appropriate **

- Please make sure that all Patrol yells are performed in good taste and are not offensive. (If you have a question about whether or not your yell is offensive, please contact Mr. Smilor with your proposed yell).
- Funny is good, so is a "catchy" yell!
- · Yells should be fun, spirited and LOUD!
- The entire Patrol should participate in Patrol yells.
- A large part of your Patrol Spirit will be measured by how much energy and effort are put into your yells.

Please Note:

- Patrols will not be permitted to chase down our Spirit Team or have "yell offs" with other Patrols.
- Patrols MUST Be Respectful of any and ALL individual's personal space. No Yelling in people's faces.

Den/Patrol Flags Guidelines ** Must be Scout Appropriate **

• Turn In Deadline is Saturday at 4:30pm

- Patrol Flags are constructed in good taste and are not offensive. (If you have a question to whether or not your flag is offensive, please contact Mr. Smilor)
- Patrol Flags are free of any sharp or protruding components to avoid injuries of any kind.
- Your Patrol name and Pack number should be readily visible on the flag.
- There are no specific rules regarding the materials that may be used.
- As always, please have your Webelos/AOL Scouts make the flag (with adult supervision of course).
- When constructing your flag, please keep in mind that your youth will be carrying their flag for the entire day of competition.
- When designing Patrol Flags, the event theme may be incorporated into the design, but it is not required.
- Originality, craftsmanship, and overall "Coolness Factor" will be used to judge all Patrol Flags.
- Pick-Up is Saturday after 7pm

Competitive Event Preparation

To compete at their highest levels, participants should arrive at Camperall with a good working knowledge of the Basic Scout Skills for each Competitive Event. (See Competitive Event list in this guide)

Please make every effort to compete in all of the events as the top patrols will be presented awards at the Saturday Night Campfire. There are a number of opportunities for your patrol to win awards based on the participation and success in the Saturday competitions. These awards are listed in this guide.

Each event will have winners and the top 3 Patrols that perform at the highest combined levels of competition for Knots, Fire Building, and First Aid will be presented with the coveted:

"SCOUT SKILL TRIANGLE AWARD"

Patrols that participate in all 8 competitive events will be eligible for consideration for the

"PRESIDENTIAL AND HONORABLE MENTION AWARDS"

Be sure to demonstrate your Scout Spirit throughout the day from the morning ceremony and throughout all of the competitions as the patrols with the highest spirit scores will win Spirit Awards.



A Patrol will be given a Passport for tracking their progress during their Saturday events. To begin their journey, they will need to attend the Opening Ceremony on Saturday morning at 8:30am. Camperall Staff will sign your passport during the opening ceremony. Webelos/Arrow of Light Scouts will be showing their skills by completing the events listed on the front of the passport.

Event 1: Scouting 101 (DENNER INSTRUCTIONS)

Welcome to the Scouting 101!

This event will test your knowledge of Scouting and over 100 years of Scouting history.

- 1. This event will be run Relay-Style. One at a time, your Patrol members will run from the start line to the question station and be asked a Scouting 101 question.
- 2. If the Patrol member answers the question correctly, he/she will run back to the end of the Patrol line and the next Patrol member will race to the question station.
- 3. If the Patrol member answers incorrectly, the scout will be asked to perform the "bat twist" (put their forehead on a bat and turn around three times) and then run back to the end of the line.
- 4. When one Patrol member finishes the course, the next member will begin racing.
- 5. Each Patrol will randomly be asked a set number of questions.
- 6. After the last question is asked and the last member of the Patrol has returned back to the Patrol, the entire Patrol will be asked one bonus question worth extra points for the event. The Patrol will be given 30 seconds to discuss and then the answer must be given.
- 7. The total number of correct answers will be tallied along (plus extra points for the bonus question) with the total time required to run the event.

Ask any questions that you may have BEFORE you hand back the Denner Instructions to the Troop Competition Judge.

Event 2: Fire Building (DENNER INSTRUCTIONS)

Welcome to Fire Building!

You and your Patrol will demonstrate your skill in building a proper and effective fire.

- 1. You and your Patrol will be provided kindling, tinder and 3 stick matches.
- 2. You and your Patrol will build a proper fire from the materials provided and burn through a string at a height of 24 inches above the base of the fire building area.
- 3. This event is scored on Skill and Time. Proper fire building technique is required to obtain a good Skill score.
- 4. Only the bottom of the fire may be lit with the matches provided.
- 5. ONLY the kindling wood/paper provided may be used.
- 6. NO pocket knives or tools of any kind may be used and NO fire starter may be used.
- 7. Only one Patrol member may hold or light a match at a time.
- 8. The clock will start after you have read these instructions to your Patrol.
- 9. You have completed this event when you have successfully either burned through the string with your fire, when (12) minutes have passed, or when the rotation buzzer sounds, whichever comes first.
- 10. After reading the Denner Instructions, the Troop Competition Judge will give you instructions.

Ask any questions that you may have BEFORE you hand back the Denner Instructions to the Troop Competition Judge. We can't help you learn how to build a fire now but would be happy to help you after your turn.

Competitive Events List Cont...

Event 3: First Aid (DENNER INSTRUCTIONS)

Welcome to First Aid!

You and your Patrol will demonstrate your knowledge of First Aid. The First Aid competitive event consists of 2 different parts, a scenario challenge and a stretcher course challenge.

During the First Aid challenge, your Patrol will be presented with one of five different First Aid scenarios dealing with any of the following First Aid situations:

- Stopped Breathing
- Internal Poisoning
- Burns
- Hypothermia
- 1. Your Patrol will need to tell the Competition Judge what First Aid is required based on the scenario and whether or not the scenario is one of the hurry cases.
- 2. The scenario challenge is a timed event.
- 3. After completing the scenario challenge, your Patrol will tackle the stretcher challenge.
- 4. The stretcher challenge will include constructing a stretcher from two six-foot poles and a large tarp and transporting a patrol member over a designated distance.
- 5. The stretcher challenge will be timed.
- 6. Please listen and follow directions The Troop Competition Judge will give to the Patrol.

Ask any questions that you may have BEFORE you hand back the Denner Instructions to the Troop Competition Judge. We can't help you learn First Aid now but would be happy to help you after your turn.

Event 4: Kim's Game (DENNER INSTRUCTIONS)

Welcome to Kim's Game!

This Age-old game tests Memory and Teamwork Skills.

Please Note: NO Cameras, cell phones, or writing instruments of any kind are permitted for this event.

- 1. The Kim's Game tarp/blanket will be lifted to reveal a number of objects.
- 2. It's your Patrol's job to remember as many of the objects as possible.
- 3. You cannot write anything down and you cannot take pictures of items.
- 4. You'll have 60 seconds to look at the objects. After 60 seconds, the cover will be placed back over the objects.
- 5. You'll then have 3 minutes to tell the Competition Judge as many of the objects that you and your patrol can remember.

Ask any questions that you may have BEFORE you hand back the Denner Instructions to the Troop Competition Judge. Good Luck!!!

Competitive Events List Cont...

Event 5: Flag Ceremony (DENNER INSTRUCTIONS)

Welcome to Flag Ceremony!

You and your Patrol must conduct a Scouting America Flag Ceremony. Please read the requirements:

- 1. You must obtain the folded American flag from a competition judge.
- 2. You must cover all of the following ceremony fundamentals:
 - a. Call your Patrol to attention.
 - b. Your Patrol must unfold and display the flag.
 - c. Call for the Scout Salute and lead your Patrol in the Pledge of Allegiance.
 - d. You must call for the Scout salute to be lowered.
 - e. Your Patrol must properly fold the flag.
 - f. Your patrol must retire the flag back to the starting point.
 - g. You must dismiss your Patrol.
- 3. You have completed this event when the flag ceremony is complete.
- 4. You will be graded on how well you complete all of the fundamentals and your RESPECT for our Nations flag.
- 5. The event is not timed but your flag ceremony should be completed within 10 minutes.
- 6. After handing back these instructions to the competition judge, your patrol will begin their Flag Ceremony.

Ask any questions that you may have BEFORE you hand back the Denner Instructions to the Troop Competition Judge.

Event 6: Knots (DENNER INSTRUCTIONS)

Welcome to Knot Tying! This is one of Scouting's oldest traditions. Your Patrol will be tested on five knots:

Square Knot, Two Half Hitches, Taut-Line Hitch, Overhand knot and Bowline.

- 1. This is a timed event and the maximum time allowed for this event is 12 minutes.
- 2. The event will be run Relay-Style. Your Patrol will line up behind the start line. When given the signal, one member will run across to the station.
- 3. The Patrol member will be shown a card with the name of a knot on it.
- 4. Using the rope provided at check-in, the Patrol member must then tie it on the crossbar and run back to the start.
- 5. If the Patrol members cannot tie the knot, they may say, "PASS." Patrol members may say, "Pass," as many times as they choose.
- 6. If the Patrol member cannot tie any of the knots, he/she must run back to the start.
- 7. Once a Patrol member runs back to the start, the next member in line may begin running to the knot station.
- 8. This process will continue until ALL knots have been tied or the clock has reached ZERO.

Ask any questions that you may have BEFORE you hand back the Denner Instructions to the Troop Competition Judge. We can't help you learn any of the knots now but would be happy to help you after your turn.

Competitive Events List Cont...

Event 7: Obstacle Course (DENNER INSTRUCTIONS)

Welcome to the Obstacle Course!

- 1. You will demonstrate your speed and determination by running, balancing, jumping, wriggling, rolling, crawling and whatever type of physical test the Obstacle Course may present.
- 2. This is a timed event and may have point deductions applied depending upon the type of obstacle being performed.
- 3. Intentionally skipping an obstacle will result in a 20 second deduction for each obstacle intentionally skipped.
- 4. The event will be run Relay-Style. Patrol members will line up behind the start line. When given the signal one member will run through the obstacle course.
- 5. When one Patrol member finishes the course, the next member will begin racing.
- 6. Every Patrol member will be required to run the course.
- 7. Scores will be calculated by the average of all Patrol members' scores.

Ask any questions that you may have BEFORE you hand back the Denner Instructions to the Troop Competition Judge.

After reading and handing back the Denner Instructions, the Troop Competition Judge will give you instructions.

Event 8: Tent Building (DENNER INSTRUCTIONS)

Welcome to Tent Building!

- 1. You and Your Patrol will demonstrate your skill in pitching a tent.
- 2. You and your Patrol will be given a tarp and some ropes.
- 3. Four Tent pegs will be placed in the ground for your use.
- 4. A rope will already be strung between two poles and rope will already be tied to the tarp at each of the four comers.
- 5. You must construct a tent from these materials.
- 6. Start by placing the tarp over the rope that is strung between the two poles.
- 7. Next, tie the ends of the ropes on the tarp to the four tent pegs, using a Taut-Line Hitch knot.
- 8. Your Patrol will have completed this event upon successful construction of the tent using the proper knots, or when (12) minutes have passed, whichever comes first.
- 9. The clock will start once you hand in these instructions to the Troop Competition Judge.
- 10.After reading and handing back the Denner Instructions, the Troop Competition Judge will give you instructions.

Ask any questions that you may have BEFORE you hand back the Denner Instructions to the Troop Competition Judge. We can't help you learn the taut-line knot now but would be happy to help you after your turn.

Offsite Evacuation

- Activate in the event an offsite evacuation is order by the Camporee Chair, District Outdoor Program Chair, or District Executive
- Units and staff will proceed to the personal vehicles to the offsite assembly area or their homes as directed by Emergency Coordinator
- If an offsite assembly area is deemed necessary
 - An Assistant Camperall chair and District Executive will be the first to depart in order to establish the offsite assembly area.
 - Once participants and staff arrive at the offsite assembly area, they will be separated into units and dens/patrols in order to maintain a manageable span of control
 - · Participants will not be released without the authorization of the District Executive or Emergency Coordinator
 - The Camperall chair and the District Chair will be the last out to ensure that all participants and staff are out of Central Park.

Lost or missing persons

In the event that a participant becomes lost or unaccounted the following plan must be activated immediately.

- Stav calm
- Notify the Emergency Coordinator and activate the missing persons emergency action plan.
- Maintain adequate supervision for the remaining participants.
- Conduct a search of the immediate vicinity Camperall camp and event areas.

If the person is not found in within 15 minutes of plan activation:

- Contact 9-1-1
- · Contact the missing persons Emergency Contact

To avoid a missing person, units are encouraged to:

- · Frequently count the number of participants to ensure nobody is missing.
- · Remind participants to speak to authorized persons if they need to leave the group.
- Maintain the Arrival/Departure log

· Follow the buddy system.

Extreme weather/natural events

In the event of Lightning, Flood, or Earthquake activate the following emergency action plan:

- There will be a series of three horn blasts, or over the radio, or it will be announced: "Emergency, emergency, emergency."
- · All Programs stop immediately
- · Units gather into their patrols or dens, and unit leaders perform a head count.
- Once a head count is performed the units will proceed to the Camp Assembly Point (CAP) near Headquarters, see map.
- Once the unit arrives at the CAP, they will perform another head count. That head count will be reported to the Camporee Chair or the district Outdoor program chair.

Lightning - In the event of thunder or lightning activate the Lightning emergency action plan as follows:

- · Stay calm and await instructions from the Emergency Coordinator or the designated official
- All attendees will be instructed shelter in a vehicle as soon as possible and remain until 30 minutes after the last rumble
 of thunder is heard before resuming outdoor activities.
- · If an evacuation is ordered, activate the Offsite Evacuation Procedure

Flood - In the event of flood activate the flooding emergency action plan as follows:

- · Stay calm and await instructions from the Emergency Coordinator or the designated official
- There will be a series of three horn blasts, or over the radio, or it will be announced: "Emergency, emergency, emergency."
- If an evacuation is ordered, activate the Offsite Evacuation Procedure

Earthquake - in the event of earthquake activate the earthquake emergency action plan as follows:

- Stay calm and await instructions from the Emergency Coordinator or the designated official
- · Keep away from electrical lines, overhead structures and trees
- · If an evacuation is ordered, activate the Offsite Evacuation Procedure

Fire

In the event of fire activate the fire emergency action plan as follows:

- · Notify the site personnel about the fire emergency by the following means: voice communications or radio
- Camperall Staff will contact the Fire department by call 9-1-1
- There will be a series of three horn blasts, or over the radio, or it will be announced: "Emergency, emergency, emergency."
- · All Programs stop immediately
- · Units gather into their patrols or dens, and unit leaders perform a head count.
- Once a head count is performed the units will proceed to the Camp Assembly Point (CAP) near Headquarters, see map.
- Once the unit arrives at the CAP, they will perform another head count. That head count will be reported to the Camporee Chair or the district Outdoor program chair.
- Notify Fire Department about missing personnel

Fight the fire ONLY if:

- · The Fire Department has been notified
- · The fire is small and is not spreading to other areas
- · Escaping the area is possible by backing up to the nearest exit

· The fire extinguisher is in working condition and personnel are trained to use it

Communicable diseases and infection outbreaks

In the event that a Camperall Attendee or Staff becomes ill with a fever 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit or higher, diarrhea or vomiting:

- · Notify Camperall staff by voice communications or radio
- · Camperall Staff will support the Unit in maintaining the persons comfort
- Unit Adult Leadership/Camperall Staff will coordinate to contact the Attendee Emergency Contact
- Unit Adult Leadership/Camperall Staff will coordinate in sending the person home or to a medical facility (depending on the severity of the illness)
- · Record the incident

Hazardous materials exposure

In the event of fire hazardous materials exposure activate the hazardous materials exposure action plan as follows:

- Report all hazardous material spills to the Emergency Coordinator
- Emergency Coordinator will notify a local spill cleanup company or the Fire Department (if arrangements have been made) to perform a large chemical spill cleanup
- The Emergency Coordinator will evacuate the area as necessary to prevent exposure

Only those trained in emergency operations shall perform clean-up operations. Trained personnel shall take precautions to prevent the spread of chemical spills. Utilize Safety Data Sheets (SDS) to determine appropriate response measures. SDS are located in (SDS location). Spills must be handled in a safe manner, while wearing the proper PPE.

Dangerous encounters with wildlife

In the event of a Dangerous encounters with wildlife active the following action plan:

Snakes:

- · Slowly move away from the Snake to a safe distance
- · Keep others from entering the area where the snake was last seen
- · Notify Camperall staff when safe by voice communications or radio
- · Camperall staff will isolate the area using caution tape
- If necessary a unit may be moved to with assistance from the Camperall Staff
- If necessary, Camperall Staff will call 9-1-1

Bees:

- Slowly move away from the Bees to a safe distance
- · Keep others from entering the area where the Bees/Bee-Hive was observed
- · Notify Camperall staff when safe by voice communications or radio
- Camperall staff will isolate the area using caution tape
- · If necessary a unit may be moved to with assistance from the Camperall Staff
- If necessary, Camperall Staff will call 9-1-1

Coyotes:

- Make yourself appear as large as possible with items at hand (backpack over your head, etc)
- Make loud noises / yell / bang pots together
- If the coyote does not run away throw sticks, stones, balls, etc. at the coyote

- · Notify Camperall staff when safe by voice communications or radio
- If necessary, Camperall Staff will call 9-1-1

Intrusions (including active shooters)

In the event of an intrusion by a person or persons not involved with the Camperall event active the Intruder action plan as follows:

- Notify Camperall staff by voice communications or radio
- · Camperall Staff will call 9-1-1
- · Camperall staff will evacuate Camperall Attendees and staff from the intruders
- · Camperall Chair and Co-Chairs will intervene with the intruders if deemed safe

In the event of an active shooter:

- · Evacuate with your Patrol, Den, Unit
 - · Leave your belongings behind
 - · Call 9-1-1 when you are safe
 - · Help others escape, if possible
 - · Help Prevent individuals from entering an area where the active shooter may be
 - · Follow the instructions of any police officers
- · Hide out If evacuation is not possible, find a place to hide where the active shooter is less likely to find you.
 - · Your hiding place should:
 - · Be out of the active shooter's view
 - · Provide protection if shots are fired in your direction and locked door)
 - · Not trap you or restrict your options for movement
- · If evacuation and hiding out are not possible:
 - · Remain calm
 - Dial 911, if possible, to alert police to the active shooter's location
 - If you cannot speak, leave the line open and allow the dispatcher to listen
- If the active shooter is nearby:
 - · Silence your cell phone and/or pager
 - · Turn off any source of noise (i.e., radios, televisions)
 - · Remain quiet
- · Take action against the active shooter
 - As a last resort, and only when your life is in imminent danger, attempt to disrupt and/or incapacitate the active shooter by:
 - Acting as aggressively as possible against him/her
 - · Throwing items and improvising weapons
 - Yelling
 - · Committing to your actions

Natural and manmade hazards at the camp and program/ camp sites

See fire, Extreme weather/natural events and hazardous materials exposure listed above.

Equipment

Camperall will be following the rules and guidelines as identified in the Guide to Safe scouting. A generator will be on premises to support Camperall staff during the event for Campfire and Event logistics. The generator will be turned-on, turned-off and maintained by Adult Camperall Staff only.
