Many volunteers are recognized for their service by earning a Training Knot or Key for the position they serve. Displaying these knots on your uniform lets others know that you have the training and experience to offer guidance and advice.

There are several Training-Knot awards available, so please download the requirements for your current position and review them carefully. Many of these awards require attendance at a University of Scouting, which you will have the opportunity to sign up for today.



Den Chief Training

24 Scouts interested in serving as a **Den Chief** should ideally be at a First-Class rank in Scouting or higher or be a Venturer/Sea Scouts member to attend this **3 1/2 hour training course (Sessions 1-4)**. As a Den Chief, you serve as role models for the Cub Scouts you mentor and represent the highest standards of leadership within the pack.

Registration is \$30.00 (with lunch option available \$15.00 at registration) and will include a copy of the Den Chief training book, training cords, certificate, name tag, University of Scouting patch, folder, paper, pen and UOS facility. **The scout can sign up for any class in the 5th session to finish out the day.** Den Chief's will need to turn in a medical form AB.

Adult Investment

Adult Registration is \$25.00 and you will receive a great program selection, University of Scouting patch, a folder with paper, pen, handouts, the UOS facility, and a google drive location that will contain all the handouts or other items the instructors want to share. Also included are instructor activities, a campus map, and your schedule with classroom numbers. GE-5 Supporting Neurodiversity in Scouting: Practical Tools for Working with Special Needs Youth

Scouting serves youth of all abilities, and an increasing number of Scouts are neurodivergent. Participants will learn and experience why Scouting is especially beneficial for youth with neurodivergent diagnoses and review current trends prevalence of these conditions within Scouting-aged populations.

Neurodivergence as an umbrella describing individuals whose brain function differently from societal norms, including autism spectrum disorder (ASD), ADHD, dyslexia, and Tourette’s syndrome.

Explore their characteristics and how to help your youth reframe behaviors when they appear during meetings, outings, advancement, and leadership opportunities. David will include a high-

level overview of medications commonly used for these conditions, including general purposes, precautions, and potential side effects that leaders should be aware of during activities and campouts (without providing medical advice). Participants will leave with a **Toolkit of Scouting and external resources** to help you be successful when working with youth, while preserving the aims and methods of Scouting.

GE-18 Archery Equipment Maintenance for Program Sustainability

A sustainable archery program requires an inventory of well-maintained equipment for the range and for the archer. The purpose of the course is to prepare archery program managers to properly inspect and care for targets, nets, bows, arrows, personalized apparel, and range tools. Hands-on experience will include:

1. Restoring or replacing vanes on arrows
2. Restoring or replacing arrow-rests on bows
3. Comparing and selecting appropriate strings, stringers, quivers, bow stands, arrow pullers, personal accessories

4. Maintaining and repairing range tools, e.g. range finders, whistles, ropes, nets, banners, flags, cones, target stands, target butts, target faces, repair tools, etc.

For scouts to participate in the aquatic programs, scouts must be adept in and around water. With this purpose in mind, the Greater California Council and Sacramento Central Y have teamed up to conduct swim tests under the supervision of a qualified scout leader and the observation of a certified Y lifeguard. On the first Sundays of each month, scouts can be tested and rated on their swimming abilities according to the BSA requirements. The purpose of this course is to prepare scout leaders to supervise the various swim tests, e.g. BSA Swim Test, Swimming MB Swim Test, Lifesaving MB Swim Test. Participants will perform a simulation of the swim tests and their components, such as the various swim strokes, and practice how to explain, describe, and model the components of the swim tests to their youth. **Prerequisite for the course is an ACTIVE (not passive) knowledge of the principles in “Safe Swim Defense” and “Safety Afloat” guidelines found on my.scouting.org** Participants will be asked to identify the principles at the start of this course.

- Make a bead bracelet or necklace that spells a name in Morse code. An excellent gift idea for Mother's Day or Father's Day.
- Create a 3D topographical map using lasers. One can change the simulated terrain and instantly observe the changes to the topography map.
- Create a customized star chart to identify stars and constellations
