What is Range Challenge?

This is a council wide event in which you will get to camp out in beautiful northern Colorado and spend the day testing your skills at Target and Range Sports. A banquet will be held Saturday night where we will recognize our top participants.

All scouts may participate in Shotgun, .22 Rifle, Archery, Cowboy Action Rifle/Shotgun, Tomahawks, and much more. There will also be a special Conservation Project.

Cowboy Action Pistol is available to scouts that have completed 8th grade or be 14 years of age or older at the time of the event. **A permission form must be filled out by the scout and parent or guardian and brought to the event and presented to staff before a scout is allowed to participate in Cowboy Action Pistol.**

Venturers/Explorer scouts may participate in all events.

Registration and Roster Submission

Registration closes Friday, August 1th, 2025.

All scouts may participate in Shotgun, .22 Rifle, Archery, Cowboy Action Rifle/Shotgun, Tomahawks, and Muzzle Loading. There will also be a special Conservation Project.

Cowboy Action Pistol is available to scouts that have completed 8th grade or be 14 years of age or older at the time of the event. **A permission form must be filled out by the scout and parent or guardian and brought to the event and presented to staff before a scout is allowed to participate in Cowboy Action Pistol.**

Venturer and Explorer scouts may participate in all events.

Event Start Times

After registration is closed, squads for each shooting sports discipline will be scheduled with event location and start times. Each squad will have eight members. If your Unit is not able to fill full squads, the event committee will combine partial squads from different Units.

All shooting events will be held Saturday.

Headquarters

Event headquarters is located at Lions Lodge.

Arrival and Check-In

Check-in is Friday from 4:00-6:00pm at the Museum Building.

Vehicles and Parking

Parking will be in the main parking lot by the Museum. Only vehicles with PASSES will be allowed on Weaver Lake Road. Passes will be issued to the volunteers operating the event.

Camping Areas

We will be using the Camp Jeffrey campsites (see maps).

Equipment

Each Unit will need to bring regular weekend camping equipment. Units will be assigned a camping area upon arrival. Units are responsible for preparing all of their meals, except for the Saturday Banquet. You may bring your own shooting sports eye and ear protection.

Water

Water through the camp water system should be available. But all units should plan on bringing a supply of water to use at their camp site. It is important to stay hydrated. Please have a water bottle with you.

Restrooms & Latrines

Latrines will be open. Restrooms are dependent on water supply.

Fires

Subject to Ranger approval, fires are only allowed in provided fire rings. Units must observe "Leave No Trace" camping and remove all ash and partially burnt wood. **DO NOT BUILD NEW FIRE RINGS.**

Trash

Trash will be hauled out by each individual unit. Trash is not to be deposited in any dumpster on camp property due to the awakening wildlife.

Clothing and Attire

Participants should prepare for any weather conditions; hot, cold, sunny, windy or wet. All clothing must be Scouting appropriate. The Scouting America uniform is always welcome. Good shoes are a must, as all participants will be walking for several miles along the event route. **When on the ranges, NO open toed shoes are allowed. Closed toe shoes only.**

First Aid

Units are primarily responsible for their own first aid. The event staff will provide a camp health officer at the Headquarters location for medical issues beyond unit first aid. All emergencies should report immediately to the closest staff person or Headquarters.

Safety Meeting

All participants, leaders, instructors and staff are required to attend a mandatory safety briefing at Coral Rock Dining Hall Friday at 8:00pm. This will cover all range safety procedures and discipline specific instructions.

Safety wrist bands will be issued to all participants attending the safety briefing and **MUST BE** presented to the range safety officer prior to each event. Failure to do so, will disqualify you from participating in that event.

Range specific safety briefing will be held before your scheduled start time.

Cowboy Action and Hand Gun Permission Forms

Each scout participating in Cowboy Action Pistol **MUST** fill out the attached permission forms. These forms must be on your person and will be checked by the range safety officer prior to the event. Failure to do so, will disqualify you from participating in Pistol portion of the event.

Friday Night Cracker Barrel

Coral Rock Dining Hall following mandatory safety briefing.

Cleanup/Check Out

Campsites will be inspected and signed out by an event staff member prior to check out Sunday noon. Please contact headquarters prior to the awards ceremony if your unit will be checking out Saturday.

Awards Ceremony

Awards for each discipline will be announced at Saturday evening's awards ceremony.

Chapel Service

The open air Grannon Chapel is available to units for a non-denominational service. Please contact headquarters prior to service.

Event Tear Down and Cleaning

At the end of the day's events, the last group at each event will assist staff in the tear down and cleaning of equipment.

Range and Target Equipment

All equipment needed for your range and target activities will be provided.

DO NOT bring any personal firearms, ammunition, bows, arrows or throwing implements.

Personal eye & ear protection and archery arm guards & tabs/ gloves may be used if approved by the Range Instructor.

Adult leaders must wear appropriate safety equipment when on any of the ranges.

Scouting America policy does not permit concealed carry on BDSR property.

Course of Fire

All Scouts, Venturing, and Explorers may complete in .22 Rifle, Shotgun, Archery, and Cowboy Action events. BSA policy restricts Cowboy Action Pistol to those who have completed the 8th grade or who are 14 years of age or older on the day of shoot.

Group assignment and schedules will be passed out after Friday night's mandatory safety briefing. Range specific safety briefing will be held before your scheduled event. Remember to wear your wristband. You will not be allowed to participate in the event without your wrist band! Permission forms for Cowboy Action Pistol must be on your person to participate in that part of the event.

22 RIFLE (Max 200 points)

Shooters will have a 5-10 minute coached familiarization period for the function of the rifle in question. Sight in period on the left target center bullseye.

Equipment Benched Rifle Competition

1. .22 rimfire bolt action rifle with open sights provided by the council. For practice prior to competition please consider this.
2. Open sights only.

Benched Rifle Competition

1. All shots will be from 50 feet
2. 20 record shots
 - a. 1 shot per bullseye
 - b. 10 shots per target
 - c. 20 shots total
3. Time Limit
 - a. 20 minutes for 20 shots
4. Shooting Position
 - a. Seated Bench Position.
5. Tie Breaker:
 - a. Most number of bullseyes. If no bullseyes, number of 9's, etc.

Targets

2 Separate NRA A-17



12 Gauge Shotgun (Max 200 points)

Shooters will have a 3 shot coached familiarization period for the function of the shotgun in question. All clay pigeons will be straightaway shots. Shooters will not rotate stations.

Equipment Shotgun Trap

1. 12 gauge semi-automatic shotgun provided by the council. For practice prior to competition please consider this.

Shotgun Trap

1. All shots will be from behind or equal to the thrower
2. 25 recorded shots. Each clay hit is worth 8 points.
3. Shooting Position
 - a. Standing unless other arrangements need made.
4. Tie Breaker:
 - a. Longest number of hits in a string
 - b. If a tie still exists a shoot off will be held. Scouts that hit their target moves forward in the tie breaker. Process repeats until ties are broken.

Targets

25 Clay Pigeons

Cowboy Action Shooting (Max 210 points)

Scouts will be instructed on the function of .22 revolver, .22 lever action rifle, and 12 gauge shot gun.

.22 Revolver

6 shots at designated targets

.22 Lever Action Rifle

6 shots at designated targets

12 Gauge Shot Gun

2 shots at designated targets

Score is based on hits in pistol, rifle, and shotgun. Each hit is worth 15 points. Scouts not eligible to shoot pistol, will shoot a double round of rifle. Tie breaker based on longest string of hits. Hits using pistol will have priority over hits using rifle. If a tie still exists a shoot off will be held. Cowboy Action Sheriff will designate which firearms and targets to use. Scouts that hit their target moves forward in the tie breaker. Process repeats until ties are broken.

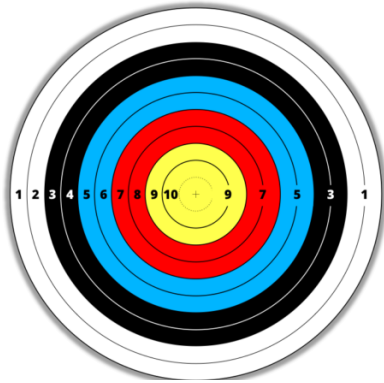
Archery (Max 200 points)

Archery will consist of 2 ends (2 rounds per flight/relay) of 5 arrows each. Points for each arrow are 2 times the points each arrow scored on the target.

Ties will be broken by the number of bullseyes. If no bullseye, the number of 10's will be compared, etc.

Targets

Standard Archery Target

**Tomahawks and Throwing Knives (Max 216 points)**

Scouts will throw 3 tomahawks in 3 rounds, and 3 throwing knives in 3 rounds for a combined total of 18 throws. Points are counted after each round for each tomahawk/knife that “sticks” in the target. There are three scoring rings, 1, 6 and 12 points.

Ties will be broken by the longest string of “sticks”.

Muzzle Loading (Max 210 points)

Scouts will be instructed on the function and loading of a muzzle loading rifle. Scouts will take three shots. Scouts will get to load the muzzle loading rifle on their third shot. Target will consist of three scoring rings, 10, 5 and 1. Total score is multiplied by 7.

Ties will be broken by shots closest to the center of the target.

Driving Directions:

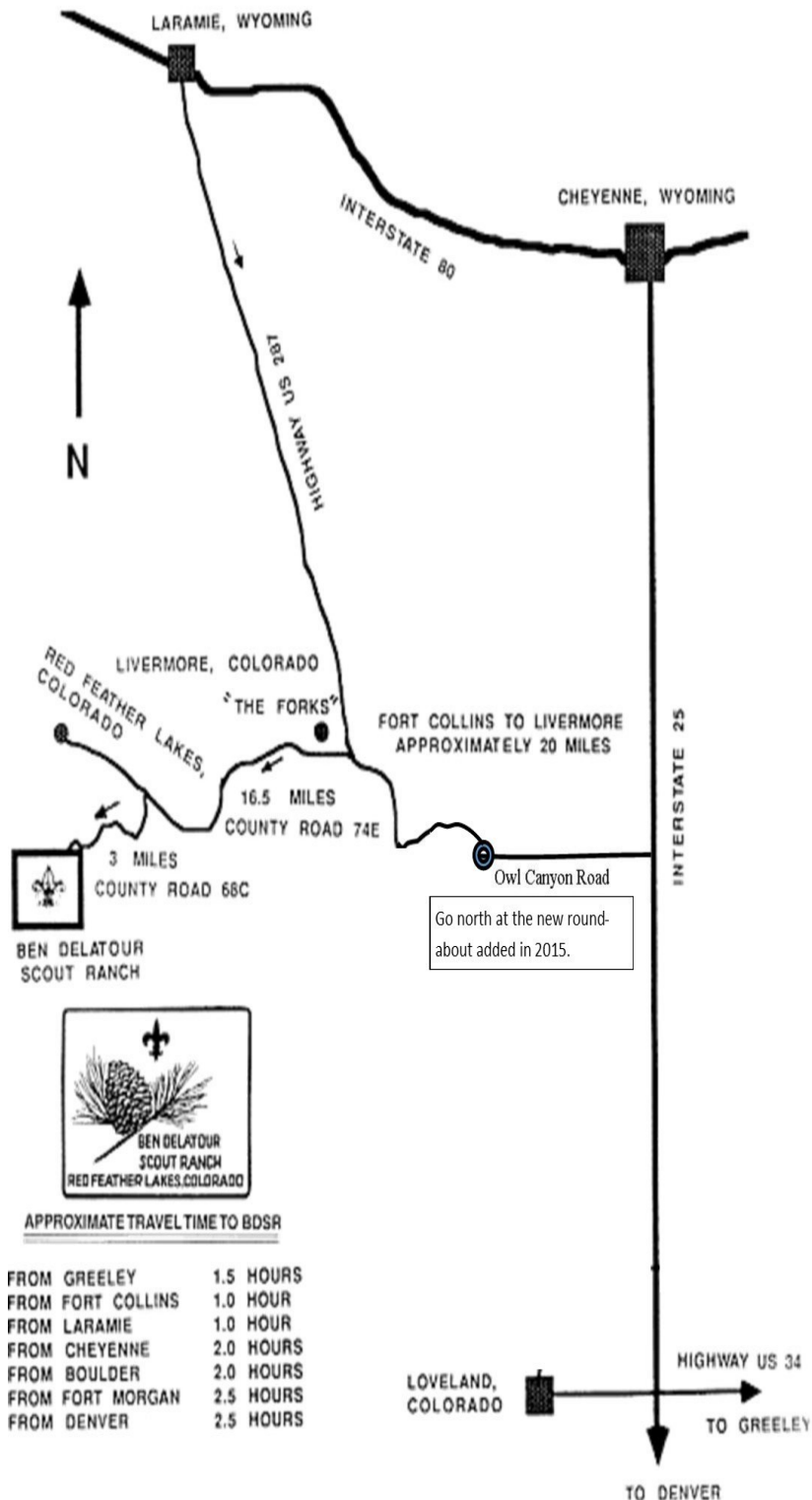
Interstate - 25 North to

on Owl Canyon. Follow
until you come to a
roundabout. Take the
first road north off the
roundabout and follow it
until it T's onto State
road 287.

Turn RIGHT onto US-287 and
follow it until you see "The
Forks" (has a very large
American flag). This is 74E

Turn SLIGHT LEFT onto CR-
74E / REDFEATHER
LAKES RD (known as the
Forks). Continue to fol-
low CR-74E / REDFEATH-
ER LAKES RD. (16.1
Miles)

Turn LEFT onto CR-68C / BOY
SCOUT RD - Portions
unpaved. (2.4 Miles) to
main gate



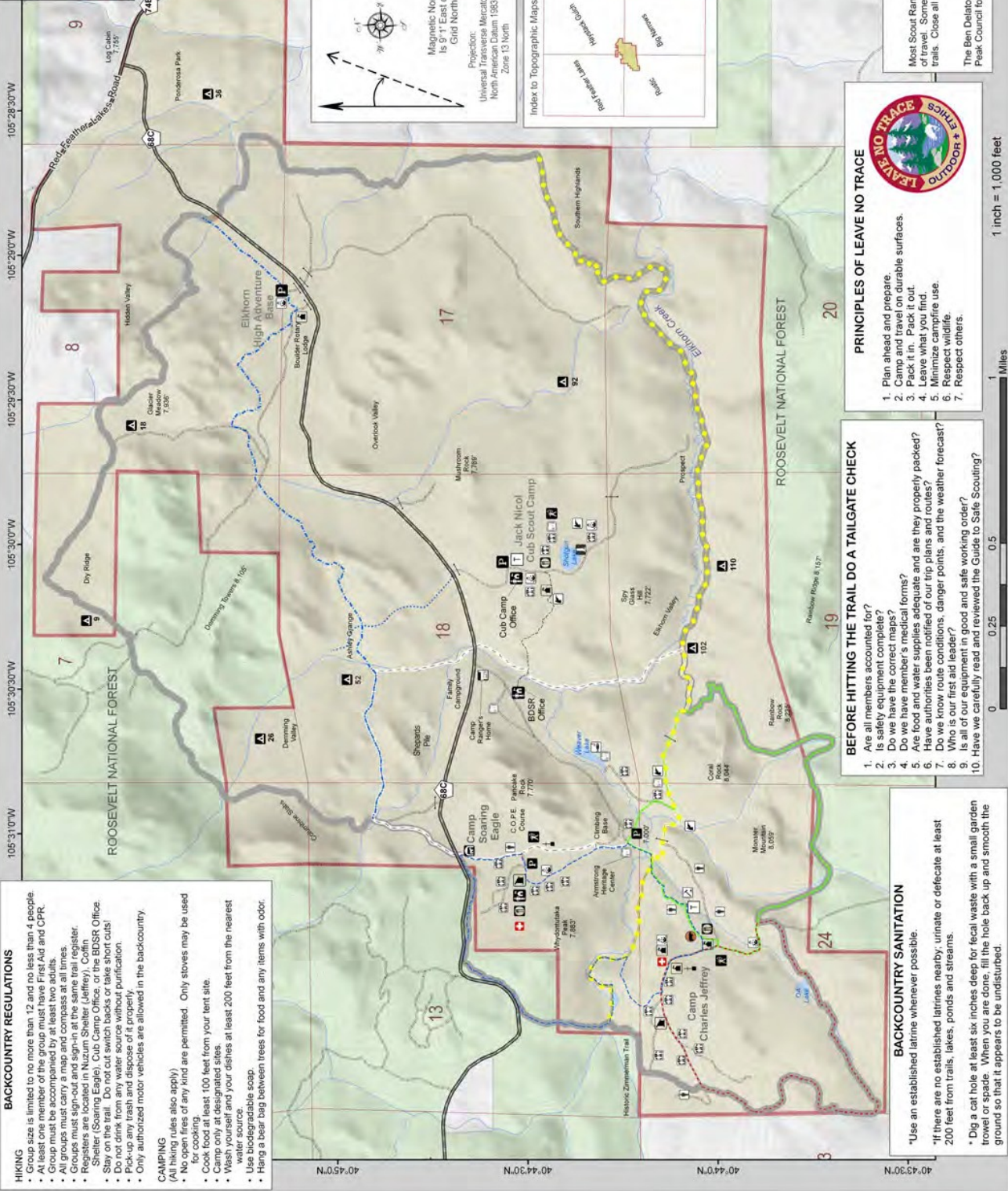

- HIKING**
- Group size is limited to no more than 12 and no less than 4 people.
 - At least one member of the group must have First Aid and CPR.
 - Groups must be accompanied by at least two adults.
 - All groups must carry a map and compass at all times.
 - Registers are located in Nuccum Shelter (Jeffrey), Coffin Shelter (Soaring Eagle), Cub Camp Office, or the BDRS Office.
 - Do not drink from any water source without purification.
 - Pick-up any trash and dispose of it properly.
 - Only authorized motor vehicles are allowed in the backcountry.
- CAMPING**
- (All hiking rules also apply)
- No open fires of any kind are permitted. Only stoves may be used.
 - Cook food at least 100 feet from your tent site.
 - Camp only at designated sites.
 - Wash yourself and your dishes at least 200 feet from the nearest water source.
 - Use biodegradable soap.
 - Hang a bear bag between trees for food and any items with odor.

- BACKCOUNTRY SANITATION**
- *Use an established latrine whenever possible.
 - *If there are no established latrines nearby, urinate or defecate at least 200 feet from trails, lakes, ponds and streams.
 - *Dig a cat hole at least six inches deep for fecal waste with a small garden trowel or spade. When you are done, fill the hole back up and smooth the ground so that it appears to be undisturbed.

- BEFORE HITTING THE TRAIL DO A TAILGATE CHECK**
- Are all members accounted for?
 - Is safety equipment complete?
 - Do we have the correct maps?
 - Do we have member's medical forms?
 - Are food and water supplies adequate and are they properly packed?
 - Have authorities been notified of our trip plans and routes?
 - Do we know route conditions, danger points, and the weather forecast?
 - Who is our first aid leader?
 - Is all of our equipment in good and safe working order?
 - Have we carefully read and reviewed the Guide to Safe Scouting?

SCOUT COWBOY ACTION SHOOTING PROGRAM PARTICIPATION AND HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

Ben Delatour Scout Ranch (Adventure West Council) will be conducting a Scout cowboy action shooting program. In this program, Scouts will shoot a rifle, pistol, and shotgun under the supervision of an NRA Range Safety Officer and NRA certified instructors. Scouts will be required to wear eye protection and hearing protection at all times while on the range. Scouts are expected to abide by all safety rules and the instructions of the Range Safety Officer(s) and rifle, pistol, and shotgun instructor(s).

I, the undersigned, give my child, _____, permission to participate in this program. I understand that participation in the activity involves a certain degree of risk. I have carefully considered the risk involved and have given consent for my child to participate in the activity. I understand that participation in the activity is entirely voluntary and requires participants to abide by the rules and standards of conduct. I release the Boy Scouts of America, the local council, the activity coordinators, and all employees, volunteers, related parties, or other organizations associated with the activity from any and all claims or liability arising out of this participation.

For safety, my child and I agree that he/she will do the following or he/ she will be removed from the program. I understand that any additional cost associated with participation in this program will not be refunded if my child is removed for not following the rules below.

1. Complete a range safety briefing.
2. Wear all safety gear at all times while on the range.
3. Follow all the safety rules provided in the briefing.
4. Follow the instructions of the Range Safety Officer(s) and rifle, pistol, and shotgun instructor(s).
5. Do not handle the firearms until instructed to do so by the instructor(s).
6. Is 14 years of age, or 13 and has completed the eighth grade, as of the start of the class and will be in full compliance with all local, state, and federal guidelines, including age restrictions and original equipment manufacturer standards.

Youth Handgun* Permission Form

The Youth Handgun Safety Act (<https://www.atf.gov/file/58806/download>) as included in the Gun Control Act of 1968 puts restrictions on the use and possession of handguns by youth under 18 years of age. Youth participating in BSA activities/disciplines where handguns are used must, at all times, follow all provisions of this Act. Therefore, BSA Shooting Sports instructors will require "prior written consent of the juvenile's parent or guardian who is not prohibited by Federal, State, or local law from possessing a firearm" in any setting where a handgun(s) is to be used. This written permission must be in possession of the youth or on file with the applicable instructor – even if a parent/guardian is present.

Please fill out the form below with the name of the youth, a parent's name, address, as well as their signature, and that of a witness and dates. Failure to have this document will require instructors/officials to disqualify the shooter from participation to avoid violation of federal law.
