CITIZENSHIP IN THE COMMUNITY

Requirement #3 – Attend a town/city meeting, be ready to discuss in class.

Requirement #7 – Complete eight hours of community service, bring documentation.

<u>Requirement #8</u> - Presentation about your community – Complete and be ready to present in class.

These requirements can be completed before or after class, bring documentation if completed.

CITIZENSHIP IN THE NATION

Requirement #2 - Do TWO of the following:

- a. Visit a place that is listed as a National Historic Landmark or that is on the National Register of Historic Places. Tell your counselor what you learned about the landmark or site and what you found interesting about it.
- b. Tour your state capitol building or the U.S. Capitol. Tell your counselor what you learned about the capitol, its function, and its history.

- c. Tour a federal facility. Explain to your counselor what you saw there and what you learned about its function in the local community and how it serves this nation.
- d. Choose a national monument that interests you. Using books, brochures, the Internet (with your parent's permission), and other resources, find out more about the monument. Tell your counselor what you learned, and explain why the monument is important to this country's citizens.

<u>Requirement #3 -</u> Watch the national evening news five days in a row OR read the front page of a major daily newspaper five days in a row. Discuss the national issues with counselor. Choose one of the issues and explain how it affects you and your family.

CITIZENSHIP IN THE WORLD

<u>Requirement #7</u> - Do TWO of the following (with your parent's permission) and share with your counselor what you have learned:

- a. Visit the website of the U.S. State Department. Learn more about an issue you find interesting that is discussed on this website.
- b. Visit the website of an international news organization or foreign government, OR examine a foreign newspaper available at your local library, bookstore, or newsstand. Find a news story about a human right realized in the United States that is not recognized in another country.
- c. Visit with a student or Scout from another country and discuss the typical values, holidays, ethnic foods, and traditions practiced or enjoyed there.
- d. Attend a world Scout jamboree.
 - e. Participate in or attend an international event in your area, such as an ethnic festival, concert, or play.

COMMUNICATION

Requirement #3 – Write a 5 minute speech and be prepared to give speech to class

<u>Requirement # 4</u> - Interview someone that you know well. Be prepared to give an introduction of this person to the class.

<u>Requirement #5</u> - Attend a public meeting. (Town, city council, school board, etc.) Be prepared to share your findings in class.

<u>Requirement #7</u> - Do ONE of the following:

- a. Write to the editor of a magazine or your local newspaper
- b. Create a Web page for your scout troop, school, or other organization.
- c. Use desktop publishing to produce a newsletter, brochure, or flyer

<u>Requirement #8</u> - Plan a troop court of honor or campfire program and serve as master of ceremonies. Bring note from Scoutmaster.

ELECTRICITY

Requirement #2 – Complete a home electrical safety inspection using form in worksheet.

<u>Requirement #8</u> – Make a floor plan wiring diagram of the lights, switches, and outlets for a room in your home. Show which fuse or circuit breaker protects each one.

Requirement #9 - Do the following:

- a. Read an electric meter and, using your family's electric bill, determine the energy cost from the meter readings.
- b. Be prepared to discuss with your counselor five ways in which your family can conserve energy.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Requirement #1: Earn First Aid Merit Badge (proof of completion is required-bring completed blue card, a photo of completed blue card, a signed note from the Scoutmaster, or the printed report generated from Internet Advancement/Scoutbook that shows the merit badge and scout's name)

Requirement #2c: Meet with and teach your family how to get or build a kit, make a plan, and be informed.

Requirement #6c: Find out who is your community's emergency management director and learn what this person does to prepare for, respond to, recover from, prevent and mitigate emergency situations in your community. Bring findings to class.

Requirement #8b: Prepare a personal emergency service pack for a mobilization call. Prepare a family emergency kit (suitcase or waterproof box) for use by your family in case an emergency evacuation is needed. Explain the needs and uses of the contents. (It is not necessary to bring this kit with you as long as you bring a photo of the kit and the contents, and can explain the needs and uses of the contents)

Requirement #9a: Home Inspection, be prepared to discuss in class.

<u>Requirements #1, 2, and 9</u>: Scouts need to be prepared with some research completed to support completion of these requirements.

FIRE SAFETY

Bring completed and signed permission slip for offsite field trip

Requirement #6 - Conduct a home safety survey with the help of an adult. Then do the following:

- a. Draw a home fire-escape plan, create a home fire-drill schedule, and conduct a home fire drill.
- b. Test a smoke alarm and demonstrate regular maintenance of a smoke alarm.
- c. Explain what to do when you smell gas and when you smell smoke.
- d. Explain how you would report a fire alarm.
- e. Explain what fire safety equipment can be found in public buildings.
- f. Explain who should use fire extinguishers and when these devices can be used.
- g. Explain how to extinguish a grease pan fire.
- h. Explain what fire safety precautions you should take when you are in a public building.

Requirement #1 - Scout must be First Class rank.

Requirement #2.d. – Make a home first aid kit and bring with you.

INDIAN LORE

<u>Requirement #3.c.</u> – Make an authentic model of a dwelling used by an Indian tribe, group, or nation. Bring to class.

LAW

<u>Requirement # 4 -</u> Ask five people (not more than one from your immediate family) about the role of law enforcement officers in our society. Discuss their answers with them. Go to a law enforcement officer in your neighborhood and ask about his or her responsibilities and duties. Report your findings to the class.

STAMP COLLECTING

All stamps, supplies, and support items for the Merit Badge will be provided.

Requirement # 7a - Design a Stamp. Scouts design a stamp for a country (U.S. or other country).

The correct currency must be shown and the design must highlight some aspect of the history, culture, or geography of that country. This should also be brought to the program, where the Scout will be asked to explain the design and share some information about the country.

For a U.S. Stamp, the design should include: USA or United States; a denomination of .58 cents or the word "Forever" which is predominantly used for U.S. Stamps covering the first-class rate; and the year (2024). Highly recommend that the Scout design a U.S. Stamp.

<u>Requirement # 4a.</u> Demonstrate the use of one standard catalog for several different stamp issues. During our inperson session, we will use catalogs to determine the value of some stamps.
