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PROGRAMS AT A GLANCE



PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Camp La-No-Che's Eagle Week is an intensive learning program conducted two weeks during the summer. Scouts working towards the rank of Eagle are instructed by community experts brought to camp to conduct rigorous, valuable and impactful education. Courses are conducted in air-conditioned environments, and air-conditioned housing options are available!

Eagle Week is held at Camp La-No-Che during Summer Camp and is its own stand-alone program. Scouts attend as individuals and Troops are formed from all participants. Adult Staff members fill the roles of Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmaster during the week and provide supervision. Participants take Eagle Merit Badge programs of their choosing in the morning and afternoon, and in the evening are invited to engage in special Troop Time Activities arranged through various camp program areas including: Adventure Camp, Aquatics, & Shooting Sports.

Scouts who select certain Eagle Merit Badge will have the opportunity to go on a Field Trip during the week to complete necessary requirements in seeing a government meeting conducted, and the visiting and touring of a federal building. Scouts not completing the field trip will be able to stay back at camp, and begin additional Eagle Merit Badges they may need.

During the Eagle Week Program, participants also are joined by the CFC Advancement Committee, and a Life To Eagle Workshop is conducted. During this workshop participants are led through the Eagle Application Process, Eagle Project Approval Process, and Eagle Scout Board of Review Process.

At the conclusion of the Eagle Week a closing breakfast is held with all participants. Awards and recognitions are shared and a Special Guest Speaker attends to share their words on the Journey to the Eagle Scout Award. We look forward to serving 150-200 Scouts this year on their journey to Eagle Awards at Camp La-No-Che!

RESERVE YOUR PLACE AT EAGLE WEEK: DECEMBER 1ST

Starting on December 1st participants can reserve their place among the Eagle Week participants in 2025! Scouts will need to register through the event link and pay a \$50 non-refundable deposit. This fee goes towards the total cost of the Eagle Week Program. After paying the deposit Scouts can then start planning for their week of merit badges by utilizing the Merit Badge Program Matrix. Limited space available due to air-conditioned housing for those participating in this program. As a result early registration is important.

ACCOMMODATIONS/MEALS

All Participants are housed in air-conditioned accommodations throughout their stay, with appropriate supervision. All courses are also held in an air-conditioned environment. All meals (Sunday Dinner through Saturday Lunch) are included and prepared in the Dining Hall. This includes 2 cracker-barrels and closing breakfast on Saturday. Space permitting parents can elect to attend closing breakfast on Saturday for an additional \$10.00 per attendee, which can be paid during registration.

UNIT LEADERSHIP/SUPERVISION

Scout safety and Youth Protection while attending events at Camp La-No-Che remains the highest priority amongst staff and adult participants. The Camp Admin team carefully selects all Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmasters serving at Eagle Week. All leaders must be registered Adult Leaders in the BSA, undergo all BSA National Background checks, complete Youth Protection Training and additional Camp Staff training.

MERIT BADGE PROGRAM REGISTRATION BEGINS- MARCH 1ST

After a Scouts \$50 non-refundable deposit has been paid, merit programs can be added to the schedule starting on March 1st. *Each participant is required to fill their schedule completely with those programs offered.* Most sessions each day offer at least 2 merit badge options, so Scouts if needed can select an alternate badge if one has already been earned. Merit Badge Counselors will be on hand to ensure Scouts are productive.

PRE-REQUISITES/SUPPLIES/MATERIALS POSTED- STARTING MARCH 1ST

Scouts beginning on March 1st can access all Eagle Required Merit Badge Pre-requisites, Supplies and Materials for their Eagle Week Program through the event registration landing page. Scouts can then prepare over the remaining 4 months the necessary material, research, and projects to share with their counselor on arrival to Camp La-No-Che. Scouts who complete these requirements, as well as the necessary course work during the week have the best opportunity to leave camp with completed Eagle Merit Badges.

EAGLE WEEK MERIT BADGES



CAMPING

Camping is one of the best-known methods of the Scouting movement. When he founded the Scouting movement in the early 1900s, Robert Baden-Powell encouraged every Scout to learn the art of living out-of-doors. He believed a young person able to take care of himself while camping would have the confidence to meet life's other challenges, too.

CITIZENSHIP IN SOCIETY

Realize the benefits of diversity, equity, inclusion, and ethical leadership with the Citizenship in Society Merit Badge. Scouts will research any individual who has demonstrated positive leadership while making an ethical decision, explain what options the leader had when faced with a problem, why they believe they chose their final course of action, and the outcome of the leader's decision.

CITIZENSHIP IN THE COMMUNITY

A nation is a patchwork of communities that differ from each other and may be governed differently. But regardless of how local communities differ, they all have one point in common: In the United States, local government means self-government. Good citizens help to make decisions about their community through their elected local officials.

CITIZENSHIP IN THE NATION

As Scouts fulfill the requirements for this merit badge, they will learn how to become active citizens are aware of and grateful for their liberties and rights, to participate in their governments and protect their freedom, helping to defend their country and standing up for individual rights on behalf of all its citizens.

CITIZENSHIP IN THE WORLD

Scouts who earn the Citizenship in the World merit badge will discover that they are already a citizen of the world. How good a citizen each person is depends on his willingness to understand and appreciate the values, traditions, and concerns of people in other countries.

COMMUNICATION

This clear and concise definition comes from the U.S. Department of Education: "Communication focuses on how people use messages to generate meanings within and across various contexts, cultures, channels, and media. The field of communication promotes the effective and ethical practice of human communication."

COOKING

The Cooking merit badge introduces principles of cooking that can be used both at home or in the outdoors. Scouts who earn this badge will learn about food safety, nutritional guidelines, meal planning, and methods of food preparation, and will review the variety of culinary (or cooking) careers available.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Scouts are often called upon to help because they know first aid and they know about the discipline and planning needed to react to an emergency situation. Earning this merit badge helps a Scout to be prepared by learning the actions that can be helpful and needed before, during, and after an emergency.





EAGLE WEEK MERIT BADGES



ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE

While earning the Environmental Science merit badge, Scouts will get a taste of what it is like to be an environmental scientist, making observations and carrying out experiments to investigate the natural world.

FAMILY LIFE

The family is the basic unit of society and is important to both individuals and communities. The world is rapidly changing, making today's society much more complex than ever before. As Scouts earn this merit badge, they will realize why it is important to know more about family life and how to strengthen their families.

FIRST AID

First aid—caring for injured or ill persons until they can receive professional medical care—is an important skill for every Scout. With some knowledge of first aid, a Scout can provide immediate care and help to someone who is hurt or who becomes ill. First aid can help prevent infection and serious loss of blood. It could even save a limb or a life.

LIFESAVING

No Boy Scout will ignore a plea for help. However, the desire to help is of little use unless one knows how to give the proper aid. The main purpose of the Lifesaving merit badge is to prepare Scouts to assist those involved in water accidents, teaching them the basic knowledge of rescue techniques, the skills to perform them, and the judgment to know when and how to act so that they can be prepared for emergencies.

PERSONAL FITNESS

Personal fitness is an individual effort and desire to be the best one can be. Regardless of their current levels of personal fitness, in the twelve weeks it will take Scouts to complete the athletic requirements for this merit badge, they will be in better shape, feel better about themselves, have more energy, and gain self-confidence in their overall abilities.

PERSONAL MANAGEMENT

Personal management is about mapping a plan for your life that will involve setting short-range and long-range goals and investigating different ways to reach those goals. Education, training, and experience all help make your goals become a reality. To achieve your goals, you will choose the best path and make a commitment to it, while remaining flexible enough to deal with changes and new opportunities.

SUSTAINABILITY

Learn to reduce waste and teach sustainable practices to others so you can help conserve Earth's resources with the Sustainability Merit Badge. Scouts will develop and implement a plan to reduce their water usage, household food waste, and learn about the sustainability of different energy sources, including fossil fuels, solar, wind, nuclear, hydro power, and geothermal.

SWIMMING

Swimming is a leisure activity, a competitive sport, and a basic survival skill. Scouts who earn this badge will learn about safety when swimming and diving, how swimming can contribute to overall fitness and health, and gain some basic competitive swimming skills.

COMMUNICATION MB*

The Communications Merit Badge requires several presentations in order to complete. Time will be available during the week's "free-time" to complete if Scouts do not complete prior to camp. Scouts should plan accordingly and take advantage of these opportunities when made available to them by the Merit Badge Instructors.

FIELD TRIP*

The Wedenesday Field Trip is a required component of everyone taking the Citizenship in the Community and/or Citizenship in the Nation Merit Badge (regardless if req's are completed prior to camp). This is for transportation and planning purposes. Scouts will complete the field trip option for each badge during their off-camp excursion.

ALTERNATE MBS (WEDNESDAY)*

Participants not taking Citizenship in the Community and/or Citizenship in the Nation Merit Badge will stay at camp on Wednesday and have the opportunity to begin other Eagle Required Merit Badges of their choosing. Scouts are not guaranteed the ability to finish, but will have ability to work on them throughout the day.

ALTERNATE MBS (MON/TUES/THUR/FRI)*

Participants will have a list of alternate merit badges being offered as "Pop-Ups" provided to them at the start of camp week from our staff. Scouts who are driven may have the chance to accomplish 2-3 non-Eagle required merit badges depending on the number of free periods they have available. This will be based on the Eagle Merit Badges that they sign up for during the week at Camp La-No-Che.

EVENING ACTIVITIES



Eagle Week participants will have structured Troop Time Activities most evenings while at camp. Participants will engage in these activities along with members of their troop and other Eagle Week participants. Below is a sample schedule of the types of activities that are planned for the session. The schedule is subject to change, in the lead up to summer. Activities may be added/deleted and days changes depending on weather and outside influences.

MONDAY/TUESDAY/WEDNESDAY: SHOOTING SPORTS

On M/T/W following dinner Eagle Week participants will have the ability to visit Camp La-No-Che's Shooting Sports Program Area. While visiting Scouts can choose to shoot both Archery and Rifle. Special competitions will be held to see who is the best shot of all Eagle Scout participants.

MONDAY/TUESDAY/WEDNESDAY: AQUATICS (POOL/LAKE)

On M/T/W following dinner Eagle Week participants will have the ability to visit Camp La-No-Che's Aquatics Program Area. While visiting Scouts can choose to visit the Slide Pool and Dive Pool and relax from a day of merit badges. This evening is all about fun, fellowship and cooling off after a hard days work.

MONDAY/TUESDAY/WEDNESDAY: SPORTS/FREE-TIME

On M/T/W following dinner Eagle Week participants will have the ability to visit Camp La-No-Che's Sports Areas. While visiting Scouts can choose to visit the sand pit volleyball court, basketball court, bouldering wall and trading post. Several more programs areas will also be open throughout main camp for Scouts to enjoy.

THURSDAY: LIFE TO EAGLE WORKSHOP

On Thursday following dinner Eagle Week participants will have be led in a Life to Eagle Workshop

FRIDAY: ADVENTURE CAMP (ZIP/MOVIE/PATCH TRADING)

On Friday following dinner Eagle Week participants will have the ability to visit Camp La-No-Che's Adventure Camp Program Area. While visiting Scouts can elect to take a leap of faith an journey across the Adventure Tower's 1300ft Zip-Line. After this program concludes everyone will return to the campsite for a Eagle Week Movie and closing cracker-barrell. Scout may choose to bring patches for trading if they choose to do so.













UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS



Camp La-No-Che Eagle Week participants will receive (1) Eagle Week T-Shirt as a part of their registration fee. This shirt must be worn on Wednesday while at camp. On this day Troop Pictures will be taken, and Scouts will be leaving for their Field Trip to Orlando. Participants wishing to order additional shirts and swag may choose to do so through the online registration link. Make sure to purchase your shirt before the deadline. Each participant who attends will receive (1) T-shirt as a part of their registration fee. This shirt must be worn on Wednesday while at camp. On this day Troop Pictures will be taken, and Scouts will be leaving for their Field Trip to Orlando. Participants wishing to order additional shirts may through the registration link (see page 10).

Each participant who attends will receive (1) certificate commemorating their completion of the Eagle Week Program. This certificate will be signed by the Council President, Council Scout Executive, Council Advancement Chair and Eagle Week Coordinator.




