Since 1950, Camp La-No-Che has proudly served as Florida's premier Scout camp and one of the finest Scouting destinations in the Southeast. For more than 75 years, Scouts and their families have returned year after year to enjoy unforgettable adventures, exceptional programs, and a camp staff dedicated to creating outstanding experiences for every visitor. Today, the camp features 27 fully developed campsites, a spacious Dining Hall, a well-stocked Trading Post, and a modern Aquatics Center complete with a zero-entry pool and exciting water slide. Our expansive waterfront offers stunning views of Lake Norris and some of the most beautiful sunrises and sunsets in Central Florida. Throughout camp, Scouts can challenge themselves, discover new interests, and build confidence while exploring a wide variety of activities.



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TYPES OF CUB SCOUT WEEKEND CAMPING

Short-term CFC Council Camping/Day Events @ Camp La-No-Che

Throughout the year, Central Florida Council hosts a variety of short-term camping and day events at Camp La-No-Che that bring Scouts and families together for adventure, fellowship, and fun. These themed weekends allow participants to enjoy many of camp's premier program areas—including aquatics, target sports, climbing, crafts, nature programs, and outdoor skills—while supporting Scouting's mission of character development, leadership, and outdoor education.

These events are planned by our full-time camp professionals with support from seasonal staff and volunteers. Rich in tradition, they require year-round planning and serve thousands of families annually. Because they offer expanded programming, these events have an additional registration fee beyond the annual Council Program Fee. Signature events include:

Short-term District Camping/Day Events In Your Community

District camping and day events provide many of the same opportunities for adventure and fellowship on a more local level. Planned and operated entirely by district volunteers, these events are tailored to local units and often feature creative themes and unique activities that make them memorable for Scouts and families.

Unlike council-operated events, district events (Spring/Fall Cub Family Campouts) are fully funded through participant registration fees and receive no support from the Council Program Fee. From camp-outs and fun days to advancement weekends and outdoor adventures, these volunteer-led programs offer Scouts an accessible way to enjoy Scouting close to home while building connections within their local district.

Unit Camping/Day Events

Unit camping and day events provide Packs, Troops, Crews, and Ships with the flexibility to create their own outdoor experience. Units can reserve campsites, facilities, and program areas at Camp La-No-Che for camp-outs, family weekends, leadership retreats, service projects, advancement activities, and more.

Unlike council or district events, unit activities are planned and led entirely by unit leadership. This allows units to customize schedules, meals, and programming to meet their Scouts' needs while taking advantage of camp amenities such as aquatics, climbing, shooting sports, and adventure programs. Whether visiting for a day or a weekend, unit camping offers an ideal setting for outdoor adventure, leadership development, and lasting Scouting memories.

GENERAL CAMP INFORMATION



GUEST SERVICES

Guest Service Representatives are located at the camp office to assist with your visit. If you have any questions, campsite problems or other needs, please look for a Guest Service Representative or a Campmaster for assistance. Our Camp Rangers are always available to fix maintenance issues in your campsite or latrine. We are here to make sure you have a great outdoor experience.

CAMPMASTER

Each event will have one or more Campmasters available to assist both participants and camp operations. Please know that they are here to help you with issues you may have with things like campsite set up, communication or problem solving an issue within your campsite and/or with other participants. Campmasters are equipped with a radio and can be reached by someone in the camp office, trading post, health lodge or the Program Director. Please do not hesitate to ask for their assistance.

Wi-Fi INTERNET

Our Wi-Fi service was expanded in 2018 and access is available to all participants at the W.T. Bland Dining Hall and throughout Dr. Philips Park. Please select the “guest” Wi-Fi channel using the password Trustworthy1.

TRADING POST

Camp La-No-Che is home to the Jack Jennings Trading Post which offers both a store and a concession stand. The store features a complete stock of camping supplies, uniforms, T-shirts, and souvenirs (both camp and scouting branded), patches, awards plus those personal hygiene items you may have left at home.

The concession stand offers an assortment of refreshments such as pizza, hot dogs, drinks, ice cream, popcorn, candy, cookies, snow cones, etc. Bags of ice are also available here. Hours of operation for each will be posted at the Trading Post, Passport and Camp La-No-Che App.



GENERAL CAMP PARKING & FOOD SERVICE



PARKING

Camping in and/or around the campsites, activity shelters and bathhouses is both a fire hazard and a safety issue. By order of the Lake County Fire Marshall and due to the access needed during emergencies, parking is NOT permitted at the campsites. Parking passes are issued at check-in and identify your assigned parking area. Assigned areas are the Main Parking lot located at the Camp Gateway; the Sports Field adjacent to campsite 3, and the ATV field.

After Check-in, you will be permitted to drive to the campsite ONLY for the purpose to drop all your gear. Once you have dropped your gear, please immediately park your vehicle in your assigned parking area and return to set up your gear. Once you've unloaded and parked, driving is not permitted unless it is to leave camp.

Equipment trailers ARE permitted in the campsites and must be detached from the vehicle with the hitch properly flagged. Vehicles with a state issued HANDICAP placard may also park at the campsite in a manner that is not blocking First Responders from accessing the site.

Riding in the backs of vehicles/tailgates/truck beds or on trailers is strictly prohibited. During your stay, please limit the use of your vehicle to ensure the safety of pedestrians and emergency traffic. The speed limit in the camp is 10 m.p.h. Please Note: The roads to/from all campsites are now ONE WAY. Please follow the posted signs. Thank you!

CAMP FOOD SERVICE

The W.T. Bland Dining hall offers meals Friday night, Saturday breakfast, lunch and dinner, and Sunday breakfast at each CFC Short-Term Camping event at Camp La-No-Che. You may purchase a 3, 4 or 5 meal plan during the registration process (single meals are also available for purchase).

The Jack Jennings Trading Post also offers food, snacks, candy, donuts and drinks to include coffee & hot chocolate. If you have pre-purchased Dining Hall Meals, you will be given your meal ticket/wristband at check in. Please be sure to come to the W.T. Bland Dining Hall with your meal ticket/wristband at the assigned time.



GENERAL CAMP PACKING LIST



CAMPING GEAR

- Tent & ground cover — Tent with waterproof tarp or plastic sheeting cut to the size of your tent floor
- Sleeping setup — Sleeping bag, sleeping pad, blankets, pillow
- Lighting — Flashlight/headlamp with extra batteries
- Toiletries — Soap, shampoo, toothbrush/toothpaste, toilet paper, etc.
- Towels — Bath towel and washcloth

COOKING

- Food — If you plan to cook
- Utensils — Knives, forks, spoons, spatula
- Dinnerware — Plates, bowls, cups
- Trash bags
- Cookware — Pot and/or pan
- Camp stove or grill
- Fuel — Propane, charcoal, or wood
- Fire starters — Lighter and/or waterproof matches
- Dish cleaning supplies — Dish liquid, cloth, towel or paper towels
- Cooler with ice — Ice available at the Trading Post
- Dry food storage — Plastic tub with lid

- Clothing — Weather-appropriate clothing, including bathing suit

CAMPING PROGRAMS AT CAMP LA-NO-CHE CFC SHORT TERM

CFC Short Term Camping programs offered at Camp La-No-Che—have been developed by full-time camp professionals with support from seasonal staff and volunteers. Each event page provides an easy overview of program features, dates, schedules, fees, and meal options to help families and units plan their visit. Most event registrations open 6–9 months in advance, giving plenty of time to prepare. Additional details—such as event guides, packing lists, and important updates are available through the event’s registration link and its attachments.

All programs are operated by the Central Florida Council and Camp La-No-Che staff. Because these are council-run events, units do not need a BALOO-trained leader to attend, and families are welcome to participate for the full duration of the weekend. Camp La-No-Che events make it easy for Cub Scouts and their families to enjoy the outdoors, make new friends, and experience the best of Scouting together.

REGISTERING

Registering for an event is often as simple as following a hyperlink, but a helpful first step is coordinating with your Cub Scout Pack leadership. Many Packs organize joint registrations for their families, which streamlines the process and supports unit planning. Some units may also choose a specific event or weekend to attend together.

In other cases, families may be asked to register themselves and their Scouts individually. It’s important to note that all La-No-Che events are open to individual families, regardless of what their Pack decides. If your family wants to camp more often—or attend on a different weekend—you are welcome to do so. La-No-Che has options for everyone. CAMPSITE ASSIGNMENTS

Preparing for a visit often starts with a simple question: Where will we be camping, and what facilities are available? Whether it’s your first time at Camp La-No-Che or you’re a seasoned camp veteran, you can explore everything the camp has to offer, including real photos of each campsite and major facilities. From camp maps to amenities across camp, you’ll find all the details you need to plan a comfortable and enjoyable stay. Camp La-No-Che has you covered by visiting: CAMPLANOCHE.COM/UNIT-CAMPING/.

Families and Cub Scout Packs are assigned their campsite assignment the Wednesday/Thursday before their camping event. Cub Scout Pack Families are all placed in the same site unless special arrangements are made. Campsite requests are permitted but not guaranteed, as many factors determine placements of our families attending camp. Adirondack Sites for example won’t necessarily have you camping in the same campsite as your Cub Scout Pack (screened in building with electricity, fans, and bunk bed with mattresses are available for a fee).

MEAL OPTIONS AT CAMP LA-NO-CHE

Meal planning is easy at Camp La-No-Che, with flexible options for every family and Pack. You can enjoy full-service dining in the Dining Hall, cook meals together at your campsite, bring a picnic lunch from home, or stop by the camp concession stand for snacks and treats. Many families choose a combination of these options throughout the weekend. See the event registration page for details on Dining Hall Service availability and pricing.

NEXT STEPS... COMMUNICATION... PREPARATION

Once you begin the registration process, you’ll start receiving reminders, updates, and important information sent directly to the email address you registered with (the registration contact). These messages often include details about schedules, check-in procedures, packing tips, meal options, and information to help you prepare for an enjoyable weekend. Be sure to check your email regularly leading up to the event. Following the reminders and instructions provided will ensure your family has everything needed for an eventful and well-organized stay at camp.

CHECK-IN OVERVIEW

Before arriving at Camp La-No-Che, the registration contact listed in your event registration will receive an email confirming your assigned campsite and providing final instructions for a smooth check-in. This message will also include any updated program details and information about the planned check-in process.

- Drop-off your gear at site (15min unload only)
- Move vehicle and park in designated parking area.
- Return to Main Camp Road after 7:30 AM to **check-in on Saturday morning** and record your arrival

Saturday Check-in (7:30 AM- All Day)

- Check-in on Main Camp Road
- Follow Camp Staff instructions
- Drop off your gear at site (15min unload only)
- Move vehicle and park in designated parking area

CHECK-OUT

We ask you completed the following steps before leaving camp:

- Ensure your campsite & activity shelter is cleared of all gear
- Clean out the activity shelter, bear boxes & restrooms
- Ensure all toilets are flushed and all lights are off doors are closed
- Turn in any items you checked out from the Quartermaster
- Perform a trash sweep through your site with your unit

DISTRICT CAMPING PROGRAMS (D-ST)

OVERVIEW

District Camping Programs are local outdoor experiences designed for Scouting families to enjoy adventure, fellowship, and learning close to home. These events bring together Cub Scout Packs from the same geographical area, creating opportunities for Scouts to meet peers, share skills, and strengthen community ties.

TIMING

District camping events typically occur 1-2 times per year, organized within the county or district where Scouts live. While many are held at nearby parks or local campgrounds, some are located at Camp La-No-Che or Camp Rybolt when local options are not available.

LEADERSHIP & ORGANIZATION

Each event is coordinated and operated by volunteer leaders from the local district. These volunteers plan activities, manage logistics, and ensure a safe, fun environment for all participants. Their dedication helps make district camping accessible and enjoyable for every family.

PROGRAM & FEES

District camping programs are included with the Council Program Fee, meaning there is no additional cost for participation in the event itself. However, food arrangements are handled individually by each unit or family. Units may choose to cook together or plan meals independently, depending on their preferences and resources.

DAY & EVENTS

In addition to overnight camping, districts may also host day-only programs such as Target Sport Days, Water Activity Days, or other themed events. These shorter experiences provide families with flexible opportunities to participate in Scouting activities without overnight camping, while still enjoying outdoor fun and skill development.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

CAMP WIDE EMERGENCY ALARM PROCEDURES

If a constant wailing siren (air-raid style) sounds, a camp-wide emergency has been declared. Immediately proceed to the Seneff Family Flag Pole, line up with your unit, take roll, and have the unit leader report attendance to Camp Staff stationed at the Seneff Flag Plaza. Everyone—all youth and adults—must report to the flag pole unless Camp Staff instruct otherwise. This ensures every individual is accounted for, and for additional information and instructions to be shared if required.

CAMP LIGHTNING ALERT PROCEDURES

Florida is the lightning capital of the world, and lightning safety is essential. During forecasted inclement weather, the Camp Admin Team monitors approaching storms and notifies Program Staff to guide campers to appropriate shelter. Camp vehicles may be dispatched to campsites to alert units of impending storms. When lightning is imminent:

- Seek shelter in any fully enclosed building with four walls (restrooms preferred when available).
- Campsite activity shelters & W.T. Bland Dining Hall are safe shelters (Program pavilions are NOT)
- Remain in shelter until the all-clear is given. via camp staff runner or siren.

HEALTH LODGE & FIRST AID PROCEDURES

The AdventHealth Lodge (located in Dr. Phillips Park) is staffed by a qualified Resident Health Officer trained to treat basic first aid and illnesses. They may not be a medical doctor. For any serious emergency, call 911 first, then notify Camp La-No-Che Management and the Health Officer. When visiting the Health Lodge:

- Enter through the front door or use the radio/intercom for assistance.
- Youth under 18 must be accompanied by an adult.
- Have Health and Medical Form with you.

EVENING/OVERNIGHT ACTIVITIES

For emergencies after office hours, report directly to the Health Lodge. If you believe 911 is necessary, call immediately, then send someone to inform the Health Officer so they can open the gate for First Responders and assist. Camp's physical address is:

LOST CHILD

If you become separated from your child(ren), report to the Main Office, Trading Post, or Health Lodge and remain there. Staff will gather information and conduct the search. Staying in one location ensures your child(ren) can be quickly reunited with you.

BUDDY SYSTEM

All campers must use the buddy system at all times while at camp.

SCOUTING'S BARRIERS TO ABUSE INFORMATION

Scouting America maintains strict policies to ensure the safety and well-being of all members. These guidelines protect youth and adult leaders and apply both inside and outside Scouting activities. More information can be found [HERE](#).



SAFETY

YOUTH PROTECTION & SAFETY GUIDELINES

Youth Protection Policies — La-No-Che strictly follows Scouting America's Youth Protection standards. If you suspect any form of abuse, immediately alert Camp Admin. Failure to report concerns allows potential abuse to continue.

- Wristbands Required — All Scouts and Scouters staying at camp must wear a wristband at all times. Lost wristbands must be replaced at the Camp Office.
- Two-Deep Leadership — In Cub Scouts, all youth must be accompanied by their parent, legal guardian, or two-deep leadership.
- Respect of Privacy — Adult leaders must respect youth privacy in areas such as changing and showering. Adults may only enter these areas when health or safety requires it and must protect their own privacy as well.

WILDLIFE & OUTDOOR SAFETY

Wildlife Awareness — Camp is home to bears, raccoons, armadillos, squirrels, and other wildlife. Enjoy observing from a distance and store food properly in vehicles, trailers, or bear boxes (located in your campsite),

Be Bear Aware — Bears are frequent foragers. Help keep Scouts and wildlife safe. All food and waste must be handled properly! Do not dump leftover food, waste, or trash in the woods; never keep food, candy, drinks, or trash inside tents; keep your campsite clean and free of debris; and store all food securely in the bear box provided in each campsite, keeping in mind that space is limited.

Be Bug Aware — Ticks, chiggers, and mosquitoes are common. Stay out of tall grass and peat moss, wear long pants in wooded areas, use non-aerosol bug spray when possible, and check for ticks daily.

TRASH & LEAVE NO TRACE

Scouting America teaches Leave No Trace principles, reminding all campers to respect the outdoors and prevent wildlife attraction by properly managing trash. Trash should never be left in campsites, as even bagged garbage draws animals; instead, all waste must be taken to the designated dumpsters—behind the Trading Post for campsites 1–16 and behind the Camp Offices for campsites 17–25.

HYDRATION & HEALTH

Hydrate Constantly — Staying hydrated is essential, even on cooler days. Drink plenty of water throughout your stay.

Water Access — Water is available at each pavilion, and bottle-filling stations are located inside the dining hall near both restrooms.



RULES

RULES - *FOR a SAFE and FUN stay at Camp, please remember:*

Campfires — One fire per campsite, in the fire ring, under adult supervision. No pine cones, pine needles, Spanish moss, kerosene, or gasoline. Fires must be attended at all times and fully extinguished with water until ashes are cool.

Fire Bans — During Lake County Fire Bans, campfires are not permitted; updates provided at check-in.

Cooking Safety — No cooking in tents or activity shelters. Personal grills/stoves allowed only with adult supervision and must be used at least 20 feet from tents and buildings.

Fuel Safety — Propane and liquid fuels allowed with adult supervision; gasoline prohibited. Store fuel away from tents and buildings.

Food Disposal — Do not throw leftover food or grease around campsites; this attracts wildlife. Trash should be placed in dumpsters located behind Trading Post and adjacent to Camp Office.

Food Storage — Store all food in the bear box. No food, candy, or drinks in tents. Wildlife can open simple latches.

Insect Protection — Use stick, roll-on, or pump insect repellent. Avoid aerosol; if used, it must be outside tents and under adult supervision.

Footwear — Closed-toe shoes required at all times. Flip-flops, aqua socks, or sandals allowed only when heading to showers or arriving at the lakefront or pool.

No Flames in Tents — No fires, flames, or heat sources of any kind inside tents.

Vehicle Safety — No riding on tailgates or in pickup beds.

Parking — All vehicles must be parked in your assigned parking area.

Extension Cords — Allowed only inside buildings. Exception: medical needs (e.g., CPAP). Must be placed safely to avoid tripping hazards.

Camouflage — Highly discouraged at Camp La-No-Che.

Alcohol & Drugs — Not permitted. Violators must leave camp.

Smoking/Vaping — Only allowed in the designated smoking area behind the Trading Post.

Firearms & Fireworks — Not permitted on council property.

Pets — Not permitted, unless an approved service animal.

Bicycles — Helmets required. Electronic bikes prohibited.

Wildlife Safety — Do not approach, harass, feed, pet, or attempt to capture wildlife. Report concerns to the Main Office, Camp Management, or a Camp Ranger.

Quiet Hours — Respect quiet times listed in the event schedule/passport.



POLICIES

LOST & FOUND/VALUABLES POLICY

The Leonard and Marjorie Williams Family Scout Reservation/Camp La-No-Che is not responsible for camper or unit valuables. Please take steps to prevent loss by bringing as few valuables as possible, using locked storage, avoiding large amounts of money, and keeping a unit lock box. Never leave Scouts alone at the campsite, and avoid walking through other units' sites. Lost and Found items are placed on the dining hall hearth, while high-value items such as phones are kept at the Camp Office.

VEHICLE POLICY

All vehicles must be parked in the Main Parking Lot unless otherwise assigned. Vehicles may transport gear during arrival and departure only. Units may keep one vehicle and an equipment trailer in their campsite; trailers must be disconnected and the hitch flagged for safety.

GOLF CART/UTV/ATV POLICY

Camp La-No-Che golf carts and UTVs are operated only by trained Camp Staff. Personal carts/UTVs require prior approval, completion of the mandatory ROHVA online course, and a signed policy form on file. Scouting America prohibits ATVs unless council-owned and used for the official ATV Safety Program. (ROHVA.ORG/).

UNIFORM POLICY

During the day, Scouts and Scouters should wear their unit T-shirt or Scouting t-shirts. Non-Scouting shirts must not contain inappropriate or non-mission-aligned content. Closed-toe shoes are required at all times; flip-flops, aqua socks, or sandals are allowed only in campsites when heading to showers or arriving at the lakefront/pool. Preference for participants in opening/closing flag ceremonies is given to those in field uniform (Class A).

SCOUTING AMERICA SMOKE FREE POLICY

Scouting America provides a smoke-free environment for all participants. Smoking is prohibited in buildings and around youth. The only smoking area is the adult break area behind the Trading Post.

HAMMOCK POLICY

We encourage Scouts to bring their hammocks to Camp, but we ask that all follow the Scouting America Safe Hammocking Guidelines! Camp La-No-Che also requires the use of "tree straps".

1. Hammocks must be hung in secure locations (no buildings or shelters)
2. Never stack hammocks above each other.
3. The lowest point of a hammock must not be more than 3 feet above the ground.

FISHING POLICY

Fishing is permitted only at the Cheney Waterfront near Campsite 20. Fishing is not allowed at the Phillip Starr Waterfront due to safety concerns. Bring your own gear/bait, and youth under 18 must be supervised by two-deep leadership or a parent.

REFUND POLICY

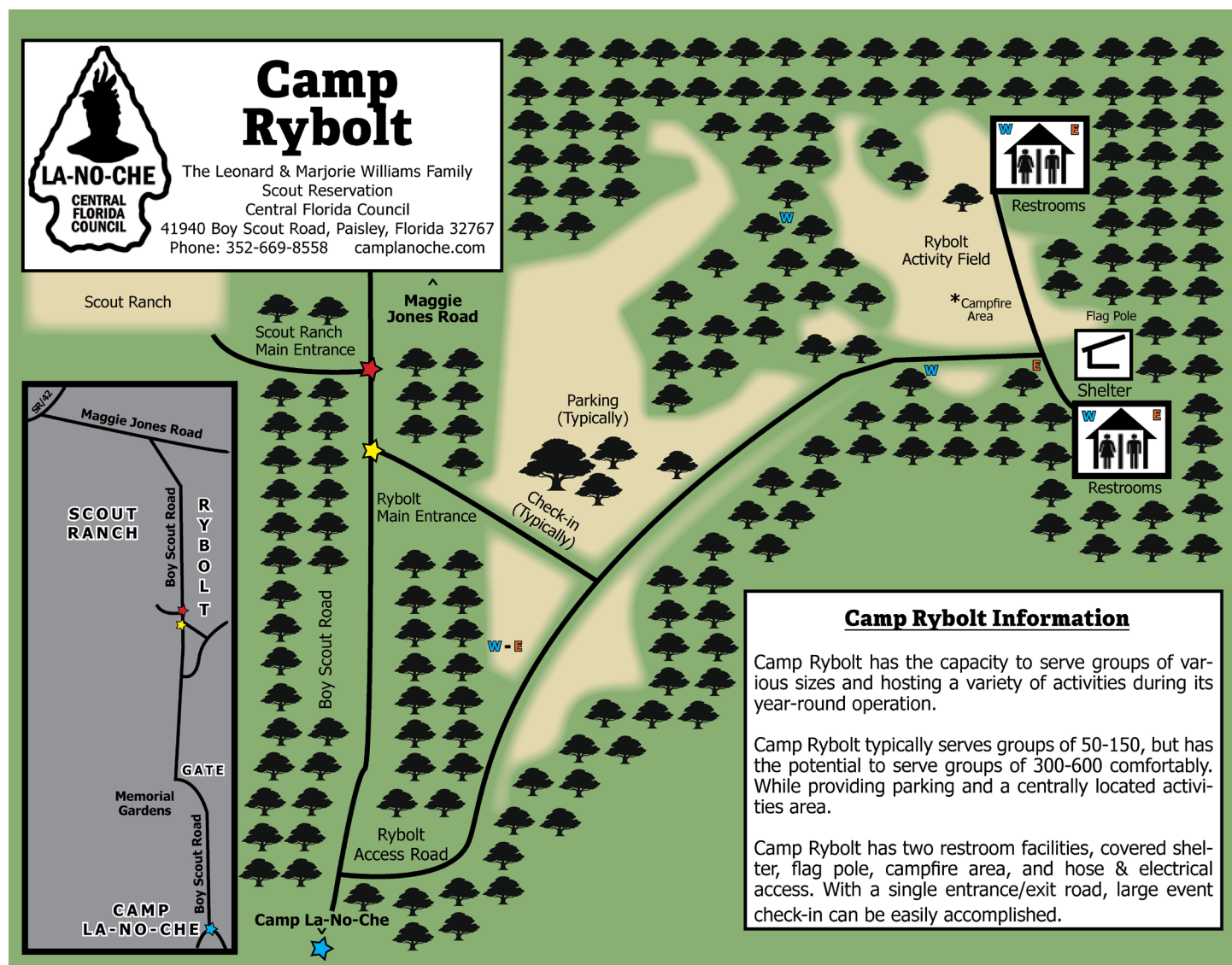

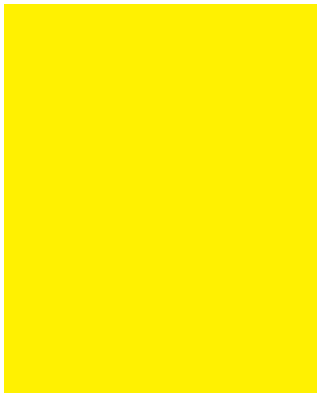
