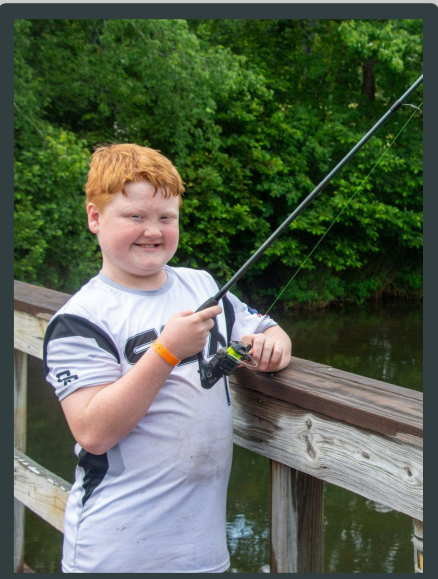

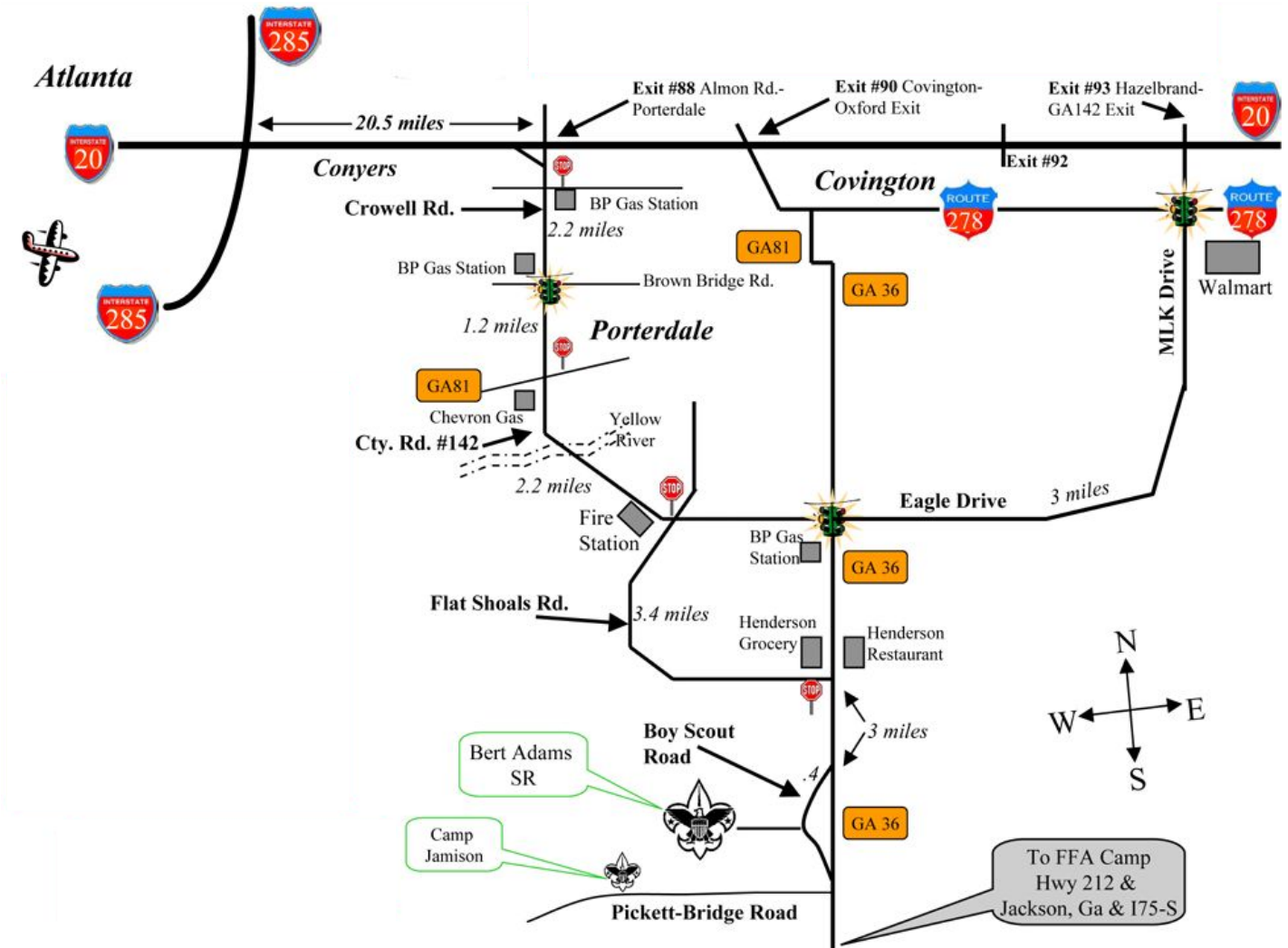

Directions:

- Take 1-20 East from Atlanta (toward Augusta).
- Take Almon Rd./Porterdale Exit #88.
- Turn Right at top of exit ramp.
- Follow Cromwell Rd. South through Porterdale. This road becomes County Road #142. Continue until you reach the Fire Station #1 just prior to Flat Shoals Rd.
- Turn Right on Flat Shoals Rd. and travel to Ga-36.
- Turn right on Route 36 and travel south for 3 miles.
- Turn right onto Boy Scout Road.
- Camp entrance will be ¼ mile on your Right.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

SPOOKY-REE FAMILY CAMP 2026

This is an outline of what we expect to offer for the program at Spooky-Ree Family Camp 2026. This overview is subject to change to accommodate staffing needs, resources, weather, and so on. Any changes that are made will be communicated at check-in and at the Friday night parent meeting.

COME AND GO FUN

Spooky-Ree is designed for open, self-paced fun, for the whole family.. There are no requirements to complete and no sign-offs needed. Scouts and their families are free to visit as many stations as they'd like, in any order, during the morning and afternoon program blocks.

Stations are staffed and ready to go, with no pre-registration or sign-up needed for any activity. Some stations, like Webelos Woods and the ranges, may ask for parent help depending on group size, so we ask all adults to be ready to jump in if needed.

Families are encouraged to explore together. Younger siblings are welcome at nearly every station, and many crafts and games are designed for the whole family to enjoy side by side, not just the Scout.

The full station list and locations can be found on the Adventures pages and the camp map in this guide, and the program schedule will also be reviewed at the Friday night parent and unit leader meeting.

CAMP FOR THE WEEKEND OR COME FOR THE DAY

Spooky-Ree is flexible for however your family wants to experience it. Families are welcome to camp the entire weekend, arriving Friday night and stay through Sunday morning, join us for just Saturday night, or simply come out for the day on Saturday to enjoy the program without camping overnight. However you choose to join us, we're glad to have you.

RAIN PLAN

The program will continue if it rains. Most of our program areas are located under shelter. Participants are encouraged to bring rain gear with them.

Range and Target Activities

Range and Target Activities will be held at multiple locations in camp – the Cub BB Range (outside dining hall), the Gorman shooting range (Volleyball Court), and the Slingshot Range. Lion Scouts will be restricted to Archery and Slingshots only.

FORT BRUMLEY

Yarn Art, Scouts make a ghost, pumpkin, or cat out of yarn and cardboard looms. Bug Robots, Scouts build a little vibrating robot from a battery, wire, and motor decorated with pipe cleaners; and the Scarecrow Relay, a relay race dressing an oversized scarecrow with donated clothes and cardboard cutouts.

ADVENTURE CAMP FIELD

Inflatables, giant games, maze, fall festival style games – ring toss, ball toss, pumpkin roll, plus face painting, temporary tattoos, and more.

HENDERSON PAVILION

Morning Halloween themed hand puppet craft. Afternoon Puppet show performances by Piccadilly Puppets at 1:30 and 2:45. Bring your lawn chair or a blanket.

MORCOCK TRAINING BUILDING

Magic Potion STEM activity. Scouts will make a chemical reaction using baking soda and vinegar with food coloring to make “magic potion”. Magic Wand Craft.

CAMPSITE HELP

Trash can be secured and placed on the side of the road Saturday between 7pm and 8pm and a team of volunteers will come by and pick it up. Or you can leave it Sunday morning as you depart camp.

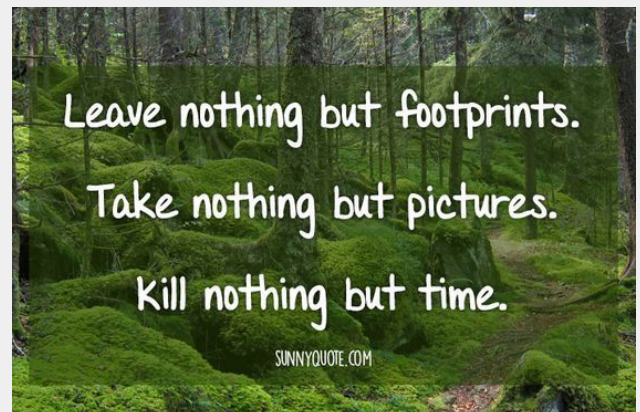
LEAVE NO TRACE PRINCIPLES

ARRIVAL IN CAMP

- Units should plan to arrive after 5 PM Friday. There will be a staffed checkpoint where each arriving car will be given the appropriate directions/instructions.

PARENT / UNIT LEADER MEETING

- There will be a parent / unit leader meeting Friday night at 9:00 PM in the Bill Loebler Room in the basement of the Love Dining Hall. It is imperative that each unit send at least one adult leader to represent them during this meeting. All updates and/or last minute program revisions will be communicated at this meeting.

EMERGENCY CONTACTS

- Emergency contacts will be provided to you at check-in and again at the parent / leader meeting. These contacts will include an on-call duty phone, Weekend Leadership contacts, and health lodge number.

SCOUT SAFETY

- **BUDDY SYSTEM:** Cub Scouts should always use the Buddy System.
- **IDENTIFICATION:** Each camper, adult and visitor must wear a camp-issue wristband. Staff are identifiable by their t-shirts and name badge.
- **BATHROOMS:** There are 3 types of bathrooms on camp; individual, Adult and youth. If you have a child that needs assistance, you must find an individual bathroom to use. Adults are not allowed in youth bathrooms and youth are not allowed in adult bathrooms due to Youth Safeguarding Guidelines.

HEALTH LODGE & MEDICATION

- **HEALTH LODGE:** While all precautions for the safety of Scouts will be taken. We do have qualified Health Officers on staff in case something out of the ordinary occurs. Please contact us immediately in an emergency.
- **MEDICATIONS:** Prescription medication must be stored in a secure place in your campsite.
- **NO YOUTH MAY HOLD THEIR OWN MEDICATION:** A responsible adult should be tasked with dispensing medication.

BSA ANNUAL HEALTH AND MEDICAL RECORD

- **PACK LEADERSHIP AND PARENTS:** All participants in all Scouting activities complete Parts A and B of the Scouting Annual Health and Medical Record. These completed forms should be collected and in the care of a designated unit leader during Spooky-Ree Family Camp.

DRIVING WITHIN CAMP

- **VEHICLES AND PACK TRAILERS:** All vehicles parked on camp property must display a camp vehicle registration card that will allow camp management to contact the owner in the event of an emergency need. These registration cards will be issued at check-in. If an improperly parked vehicle interferes with the safe operation of camp, the owner will be notified and asked to move the vehicle. The best rule to go by is keep to the rocks and parking lots. Vehicles should not be on the grass.
- **HANDICAP TRANSPORTATION:** Valid Handicap placards will be granted driving permission with an additional camp approved vehicle sign placed on the dashboard. Please check in with Administration.
- **CAMP SPEED LIMIT:** As you drive around camp, please know our speed limit is 12 and lower, if possible, when Scouts are present. Speed limits are also applicable to our cyclists.
- **PERSONAL CARTS AND ATVs:** No personal golf carts or ATVs are allowed unless necessary for the above reasons and again with prior permission for the handicap Scout or Scouter only. The safety of our campers is a top priority. Each of these situations is handled through the ranger, as National has set out specific guidelines to be able to operate these vehicles at camp.

WASTE DISPOSAL

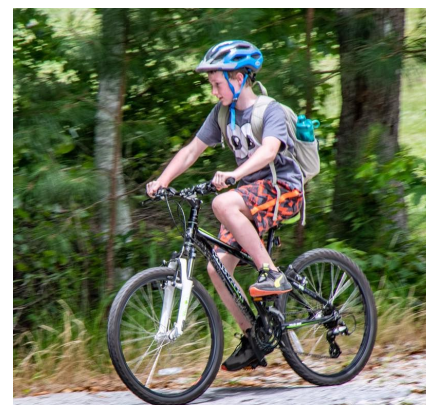
- **WASTE DISPOSAL:** A Scout is Clean. Our Volunteers will be around 7:30pm in the evenings to pick up campsite trash. Please have it tied and placed on the roadside by your campsite.

FUEL & FLAME SAFETY

- **FUELS:** The use of liquid fuels for starting any type of fire is prohibited. All fuels, including backpacking stoves, should be stored properly.
- **SMOKING:** A smoking/vaping area is provided behind the dining hall within a red fence. Please be respectful of those around you and the example we try to set for our Youth.
- **ALCOHOL AND DRUGS:** The use of alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, as well as the misuse of over the counter or prescription drugs are prohibited and will not be tolerated on BSA Property. Violators will be asked to leave; this policy is strictly enforced.
- **FIREWORKS:** Fireworks are not permitted on camp property.

OTHER

- **PETS:** No personal pets are allowed in camp unless it is a service animal. Please let us know ahead of time if you plan to bring a service animal to camp so we can prepare a program and facilities to accommodate this need.
- **FISHING:** Please catch and release all fish.



We are a bicycle friendly camp, and we encourage Scouts of all ages to bring their bikes to get around to their programs. While you should arrive with your bike in good condition, our Field Sports staff do have some minor repair items for basic needs.

BIKE RULES

- Everyone, regardless of age, must always wear a helmet.
- Bikes may not be ridden on stairs or in structures.
- Bikes must be walked across all bridges, sidewalks, on campsites or high-traffic areas.
- Please keep your bike to a safe and manageable speed for the gravel roads or terrain you may be travelling on.
- When passing walkers, please pass on the left, while saying "passing on the left". This helps prevent collisions.
- Riding a bike is a privilege and it can be revoked if complaints and/or incidents are reported multiple times.
