# CAMP-O-REE INFORMATION PACKET

## GENERAL INFORMATION:

**Dates:** September 26, 2025 (4:00 PM)  
September 28, 2025 (10:00 AM)

**Location:** Scouting America Camp Pupukea, Haleiwa, Hawaii

**Theme:** National Parks No Ka Oi

**Main Event:** Challenges in land navigation, communications, knot tying, fire building, hiking preparedness, and Leave No Trace with NPS guest volunteers! Six stations, Round-robin competition.

**Participation:** All youth participants are required to be a registered member of Scouting America before arriving at the Camp-O-Ree.

## Leadership:

**Adult:** Each unit attending the Camp-O-Ree is responsible for its own leadership. Scouting America policy requires a minimum of two leaders be with the unit at all times. They must be available and present in camp 24 hours a day, **NO EXCEPTIONS!** The unit leader must be a registered adult leader, at least 21 years of age, and preferably should be the year-round leader. If the year-round unit leader cannot attend, leadership can be recruited from assistant unit leaders. Troops that cannot find two adults for the entire event, should contact other Troops to make arrangements to attend amid shared leadership.

**Youth:** Youth leaders are expected to set the pace by their own examples of living the Scout Oath and adhering to the Scout Law.

## Camp Uniform:

**Field:** The official Scouting America “Field” uniform will be worn during check-in, flag ceremonies, campfire, and during check-out.

**Activity:** The Scouting America activity uniform (green pants or shorts, BSA polo shirt, or any troop shirt with BSA socks and athletic shoes) is preferred for daytime activities. Civilian attire is strongly discouraged since this is a Council scouting event.

**Footwear:** Covered or closed-toe shoes must be worn at all times while in Camp Pupukea. Only exceptions are while inside shower facilities.

## REGISTRATION PROCEDURES AND FEES:

Advanced registration for this event is required. Registration is open to all troops from Oahu and the Neighbor Islands. Troops may enter as many patrols as desired, however the minimum size of a patrol must be five (5) scouts. In order to ensure all Scouts are allowed to participate, patrol will also be limited to a maximum number of nine to ten (9-10 ) Scouts per patrol.

**Registration:** To register, visit Aloha Council events and complete the online registration. At check in, bring Scouter Code of Conduct, and Medical Forms A & B for all registered persons.

**Cost: \$50.00 per Scout (non-refundable).** Fees include participation ribbon, awards and patches for all participants. **\$10.00 per Adult (non-refundable) .**

**How to Register:** Register online: <https://scoutingevent.com/104-NationalParksfallcamporee2025> and have payment submitted to Aloha Council office.

## PERSONAL HEALTH AND MEDICAL RECORDS:

For all Scouts and Adult Leaders registered to attend this event, each person must have a current, 'Annual Health and Medical Record' form. The forms can be found on the Scouting America website at: <http://www.scouting.org/scoutsourc/HealthandSafety/ahmr.aspx>. This page contains the most current health forms required for scouting activities. Please bring a photocopy of your completed Parts A and B upon check-in. Camp-o-ree. Camp-O-Ree Staff will safeguard these forms, but each Troop is responsible to collect them at the end of the event. The Camp-O-Ree staff is not responsible for the loss of your medical forms in the case they are left behind. All medical forms left behind will be destroyed/shredded. **DIGITAL SUBMISSION OF THIS FORM WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**

## CONDUCT:

All Scouts are expected to follow at all times the Scout Oath & Law. Scout and safety rules must be adhered to. Scouts are expected to maintain positive attitudes and spirit of friendly competition (*A Scout is Trustworthy, Loyal, Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, Kind and Cheerful*). The use of profane language, malicious or damaging pranks, and improper use of knives, axes, or flammables may result at minimum the disqualification of any Scout from any or all of the events. Severe offenses may result in a request to leave the Camp-O-Ree. (*A Scout is Obedient*)

There is no smoking allowed in any part of the camp except, with limitations, the parking area adjacent to Troop campsite. Smoking is not allowed by persons under 21. Smoking is not allowed in any camp buildings or tents. **If you need to smoke, please be very conscious of other people, and of the example you are setting.** We do not smoke around Scouts or at any time when Scouts can see you smoking!

No electronics are allowed . There is an exception for Scoutmasters and Camp-O-Ree Staff who may require their phones, laptops and or iPads to do their work.

There will be **NO ALCOHOL** at this event, per Scouting America policy.

## CHECK-IN PROCEDURES:

**Time/Location:** Check-in times for each Troop will be assigned.

Friday, September 26, from 4:00pm – 6:00pm in the Parking Lot.

**On Arrival:** Scoutmaster, or designated leader, should bring the following to check-in:

1. Patrol Intake form: The Scoutmaster or identified troop leader should update the unit roster, if needed.
2. Personal Health and Medical Forms: One for each participant. Health forms will be maintained by the Camp-O-Ree Staff Medic. ***No Exceptions!***
3. Early Departure: If you must depart early, plan ahead and **inform the Camp-O-Ree Staff** at the Camp Headquarters, complete and submit your unit campsite self-inspection form, and pack your equipment out to your vehicle(s).

**Questions:** The Camp-O-Ree Staff will greet you & answer any questions.

**Campsites:** Campsites for the Camp-O-Ree will be assigned by the Staff prior to your arrival. Units are responsible for keeping and maintaining their campsites (i.e. fire hazard, proper food storage, neatness, proper tent arrangement, etc.) in accordance with the Camp-O-Ree campsite self-inspection guidelines. Campsite self-inspection forms must be completed and submitted at the registration table, **prior to departing camp.**

**Scout Check-In:** Scouts are to check-in as a Troop. The Scoutmaster and SPL or acting SPL **must** be present during check-in. All Scouts should stand-by near the check-in station, by patrols, carrying their own personal gear from the designated parking area.

**Scout Gear:** All Scouts should carry in their own personal gear from the parking area. Troop gears can be transported to the campsite by vehicle.

**Vehicles:** Vehicles are authorized to travel to and from the campsites to drop off gear as required. Each troop will be allowed to have only **one vehicle** in camp at one time. Once off-loading has been completed, drivers are instructed to return to the parking lot, where their vehicles will remain overnight. No long-term parking in the campsite! No vehicles are permitted to drive to campsites after 6:30pm on Friday, September 26th.

**Uniform:** All Scouts are required to wear full Field Uniforms (**includes close-toed shoes to protect your feet**) during Check-in, the opening & closing ceremonies, and at Saturday night's campfire. For all other Camp-O-Ree activities and events, the Scouts will have the option of wearing their Activity Uniform, (Troop or a Scouting type T-shirt, Scout pants and socks.) or Field Uniform.

## CHECK-OUT PROCEDURES:

### Check-Out Times:

- Saturday:** Troops desiring to check out early (before Sunday morning), may do so on Saturday evening from 9:00pm – 10:00pm. Troops are asked to break camp & complete inspections prior to the 7:00pm campfire. Campsite inspections will be held before the campfire begins. Scout leaders must report that the Troop is leaving the event to the Camp Staff **IMMEDIATELY PRIOR** to departing.
- Sunday:** Troops remaining overnight on Saturday may check out on Sunday, from 9:00am – 11:00am. The final check out will be getting medical forms and letting the staff know you are leaving.

### How to Check-Out (for All Units)

- Campfire:** All units are encouraged to stay through the official conclusion of the Camp-O-Ree following Saturday evening's campfire program.
- Trash:** Troops are responsible for their own trash. Trash disposal is the responsibility of each unit. All trash must be packed out by the Troops and a thorough trash pick-up should be conducted throughout the campsite area. Trash is to be placed in the large dumpster in the parking lot. There will be **NO** trash pick-up by the Camp-O-Ree staff.
- Inspection:** Camp-O-Ree Staff members will be available to inspect your campsite prior to your Troop checking out. Once the campsite is inspected, the inspectors will initial the troop campsite checklist and you are required to submit this form to the Staff during the final check-out.
- Vehicles:** One (1) vehicle at a time from your Troop will be allowed to drive to the campsite. Vehicles will be authorized to travel to and from the campsites by a Camp-O-Ree Staff member only and will only be allowed access to the gate if they are in possession of an approved vehicle pass. Vehicles are allowed to park at the entrance of the campsite, but will **NOT** be allowed to drive into the campsite. After unloading, vehicles must return to the parking area and back into their parking spot, where they are to remain until they depart. All vehicles must be in the parking lot by 6:00pm on Friday, September 26th. For troops arriving on Saturday morning, all vehicles must be in the parking lot by 8:00am.
- Check-Out Packet:** After the campsite has been inspected and the inspections sheet turned in, the Scoutmaster or Leaders should report to the Lodge admin area to pick up their check-out packet. The packet will contain all medical forms, participation ribbons, and patches for all registered participants.



## TROOP RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Parking:** All vehicles should be parked in designated parking areas at the entrance of camp. Vehicles must be parked 'tail in', so that they may easily depart in case of an emergency. Overnight parking in the campsite areas is not permitted.
- Food:** Each unit is responsible for making sure it provides enough food for all of its participants for the entire event. Patrol cooking at the campsite is encouraged for all troops. We also **STRONGLY** encourage a "brown bag" for Dinner on Friday night. No formal meals will be provided by the Camp-O-Ree Staff at this event.
- Tents:** Units must provide their own tents.
- Water:** Potable water will be available at the camp, or if preferred, troops may bring their own supply of water (at least 1 to 2 gallons per person per day).

## CAMPGROUNDS:

We are proud to offer this Camp-O-Ree at **Camp Pupukea**. As Scouts, we are responsible for our conduct while we are at camp. It is up to each individual to respect the privilege of using **Camp Pupukea** by keeping it clean. Your cooperation is needed in the following as well:

- Fires:** Open fires are not permitted in campsites. Charcoal fires are authorized for cooking only and must be in an above ground container (i.e. 55 gallon drum, etc.). If you have any questions as to what is an approved container please contact the Camp-O-Ree staff.
- Trash:** Trash disposal is the responsibility of each unit. All trash will be packed out by the Troops.

## VISITORS:

**NO VISITORS** permitted beyond the parking lot. All attendees must be registered for Camp-O-Ree and on the roster to enter camp property. Non-authorized persons will be escorted off camp property immediately.

## ACCIDENT INSURANCE:

Accidents and medical emergencies can and will happen. We must be prepared for them when they take place. An accident insurance program is available through the Boy Scouts of America. Some units have an insurance program through their Chartered Organization. These programs are acceptable. Remember, Aloha Council is not responsible for medical bills derived from an accident on the way to or from the Camp-O-Ree.

## **LATRINE FACILITIES:**

Shower facilities will be available and hours posted separating access for Youths and Adults & Male and Female. Only Staff will have access to the Lodge restrooms and the pool showers are reserved for Staff only.

## **FIRST AID & EMERGENCY PROCEDURES:**

- First Aid:** Every unit must have its own first aid equipment at each campsite, in plain view and easily accessible. Emergencies and serious first aid incidents must immediately be reported to the Camp-O-Ree First Aid Officer and the Camp-O-Ree Program Director. If calling 911 is necessary, they will be the ones to make the call. The First Aid Officer will have a clearly visible area to treat minor ailments. Daytime and overnight locations will be briefed at Friday's Opening Campfire.
- Other concerns:** Please employ caution. If anyone in your unit has any allergies, please inform the Camp-O-Ree First Aid Officer at the time of your arrival. Individuals, who require the use of an Epipen, should carry it with them at all times.
- Emergency Procedures:** The **Buddy System** will be in effect for all the Scouts, at all times, to prevent any lost or missing persons.
- Lost Camper:** In the event that a camper cannot be found, please alert the Camp-O-Ree Staff and Director immediately. Everyone in Camp will report to the A-Field and assemble by Troop. All Scoutmasters will take a head count and report to the Camp-O-Ree Director. The Staff will then be split up in pairs to search the Camp-O-Ree area for the missing Scout(s). Once the Scout(s) has (have) been found, the Lost Camper Search will be called off and all activities will resume as normal.
- Severe Weather:** In the event that severe weather is to occur at the Camp-O-Ree site, all persons will report back to their campsites and get in their tents until the all clear or other instruction is given by the Camp-O-Ree Director.

## CEREMONIES AND SATURDAY CAMPFIRE:

**Scout Spirit:** All patrols are encouraged to create a National Park themed patrol name, cheer, and **flag** to go along with the theme of the camp-o-ree. Points will be awarded towards scout spirit for creativity!

**Opening/Closing Flag Ceremony:** All Units are required to attend Saturday morning Opening Flag Ceremony. Two members of each Scout Troop are invited to bring their unit flags and participate in Saturday's morning and evening Closing Flag Ceremony. Patrols should likewise have their patrol flags available and be prepared to show Scout Spirit!

**Saturday Evening Campfire:** Each unit is expected to prepare one skit, song, or cheer, and perform it at Saturday night's campfire. The Camp-O-Ree SPL will be available throughout the day on Saturday so that each Troop/Patrol can provide the name of the song, or the name and general synopsis of the skit. Remember, all skits must be approved by the Scoutmaster and the Camp SPL.

**Awards, Unit Ribbons:** All awards will be distributed at the closing ceremony on Sunday, September 28th. Awards include: Overall 1st, 2nd, 3rd place, Scout Spirit award, Cleanest Campsite and Iron Chef! Unit Ribbons will be awarded to each participating unit as soon as they arrive at Council.

## LEAVE NO TRACE:

This is a **Leave No Trace** event and we ask that everyone follow the seven **LNT Principles** to the fullest. They consist of the following:

- Plan ahead & prepare.
- Travel & camp on durable surfaces.
- Dispose of waste properly.
- Leave what you find in a better condition.
- Minimize campfire impacts.
- Respect wildlife.
- Respect other visitors.

All campsites must be left cleaner than they were found. More on Leave No Trace can be found at [www.lnt.org](http://www.lnt.org).

## OA SOCIAL:

The Order of the Arrow will hold a Social following the Saturday night campfire. All Arrowmen are welcome to join in the fellowship and celebration of a great Camp-O-Ree. The event will be held at the Weinberg Lodge and Scouts should have permission of their Troop's adult leadership.

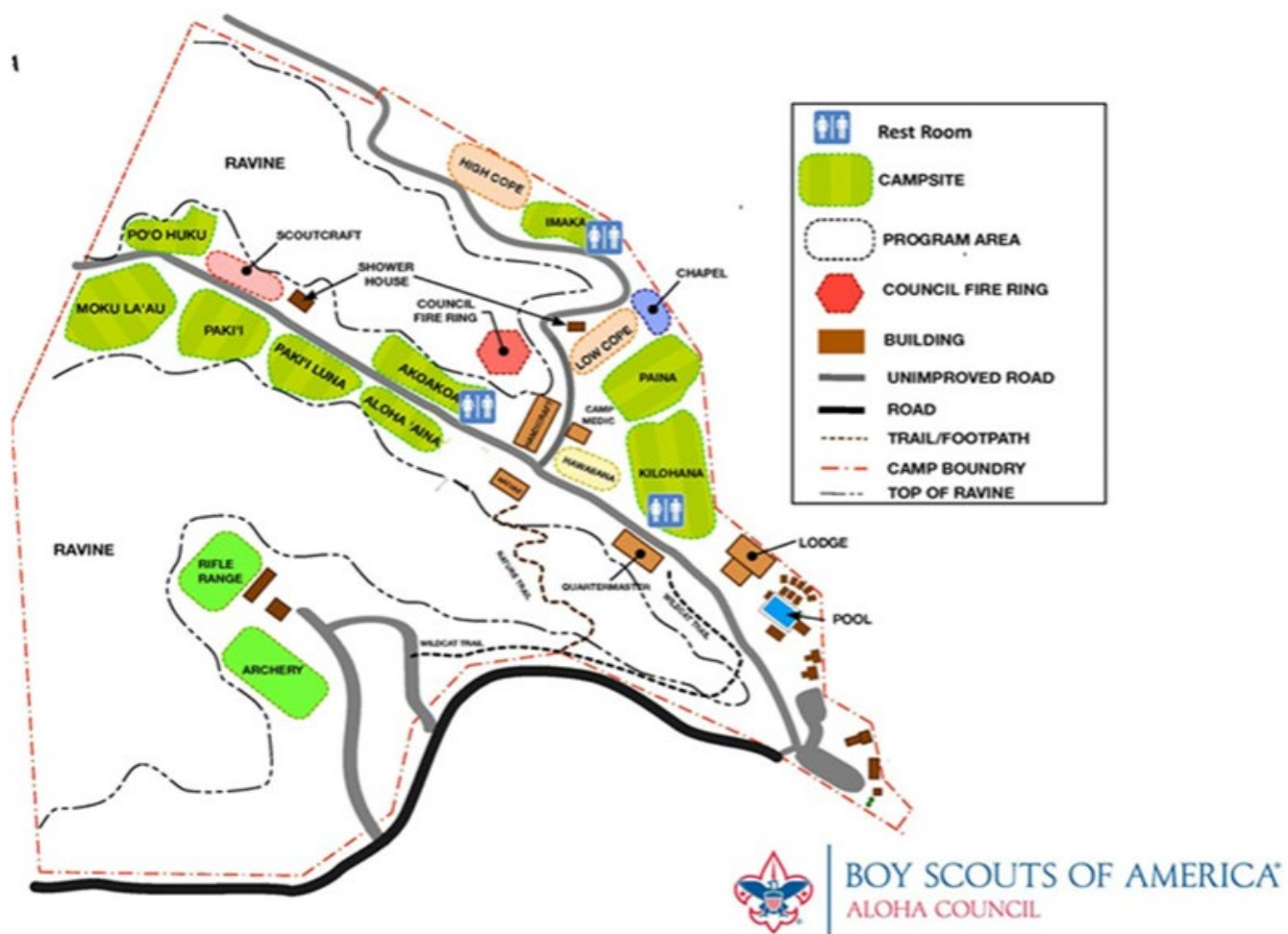

# ***IRON CHEF***

### **CAMPOREE COOKOFF CHALLENGE**

#### NATIONAL PARKS EDITION

If my memory serves me right, United States Presidents played a pivotal role in what our National Parks are today.

In 1872, President Ulysses S. Grant approved the establishment of our first National Park: Yellowstone. Famous for its wildlife and geothermal activity, Yellowstone National Park was recognized as a public park for the benefit and enjoyment of the people.

President Theodore Roosevelt saw in conservation a means of keeping the natural wealth of the United States for the public, signing the Antiquities Act of 1906 into law, introducing federal protections for natural resources and historic sites.

And of course, who could forget President Woodrow Wilson, who created the National Park Service in 1916, to promote and regulate the use of the Federal areas known as National Parks, Monuments, and Reservations for the enjoyment of future generations.

Since 1872 the United States National Park System has grown from a single, public reservation to include 430 natural, historical, recreational, and cultural areas throughout the United States, its territories, and island possessions.

Each of these Presidents are notable for their deeds that contributed to our National Parks. Great men from a simpler time, with simple tastes. Incredibly, Presidents Grant, Roosevelt, and Wilson had little use for exotic foods. Rather, they had a fondness for plain cooking and the simplicity in hearty helpings.

To honor the US Presidents who had a hand in founding our National Parks, the *IRON CHEF* theme is a simple dish, often considered a comfort food, made of ground meat that can be combined with other ingredients, formed into a loaf, then baked.

Yes, your challenge is **MEATLOAF!**

# ***IRON CHEF***

## **CAMPOREE COOKOFF CHALLENGE**

### THE RULES ARE SIMPLE:

One entry per Troop.

Meatloaf must use no less than one pound of ground meat.

Meatloaf must be cooked in a Dutch oven at camp; and,

Because this is an *IRON CHEF* challenge, meatloaf must incorporate the mystery ingredient!

\*The mystery ingredient will be revealed and available during Lunch (Noon to 1:00 p.m.) at the Lodge. Please Note: mystery ingredient will not be released to any scout who does not have a buddy.

Finished dish shall be dropped off at the Lodge following Closing Flag Ceremony at 5:00 p.m., and no later than 6:00 p.m.

Meatloaf dish shall be plated and submitted in three servings for judging.

### JUDGING CATEGORIES/CRITERIA:

**TASTE** – The ideal meatloaf is seasoned just right with a well-balanced flavor profile. Each bite is deliciously balanced yet has complexity and character, not overwhelmingly spiced.

**TEXTURE** – The ideal meatloaf holds its shape while staying moist, resulting in a tender and juicy meatloaf, not mushy. Ingredients are well incorporated into the meatloaf and not left in large chunks.

**AROMA** – The ideal meatloaf has a pleasant smell. It draws people in and entices them to try it, making their mouth water. It should have a savory, rich scent with no unwelcoming odors.

**PRESENTATION** - A well-presented dish should look appetizing and well put together, which is an indication of proper cooking. It should be served in a clean and attractive manner, and any garnishes or toppings should be thoughtful and complimentary to the dish. The ideal presentation should make you want to dig in as soon as you see it.

**SCOUT SPIRIT** – The Spirit of Scouting is always important! The *IRON CHEF* challenge should culminate in teamwork. Were you prepared? Did you do your best? Help others at all times? Remember, scouts are friendly, courteous, kind, and cheerful.

*IRON CHEF* challengers who triumph will gain the people's ovation and fame forever!
