Participants will strengthen their leadership, communication, and organizational skills while learning how to run effective meetings, guide the Patrol Leaders' Council, and build teamwork within their troop. The course provides practical tools and confidence to lead peers successfully and support the Scoutmaster in delivering a quality program.
	Hot Dutch Oven Cooking		2s	3s		Come hungry - for knowledge of Dutch oven cooking AND for samples! This class will provide a brief history of Dutch ovens before we look at how to use them for cooking. We'll explore different options for outdoor Dutch oven cooking and discuss how a full meal may be made in Dutch ovens. This class provides demonstrations of several different dishes that are camping friendly, including a vegetarian dish. Take these recipes back to your troop and try them out. This is an outside class - dress for the weather.
	Foil Packet Cooking				4s 5s	Learn the basics of foil packet cooking and discover how to create delicious, easy-to-prepare meals over a campfire. Participants will learn simple techniques for selecting ingredients, assembling and sealing foil packets, and cooking them safely to perfection.
	Food Allergies and/or Restrictions: Now What?	1				Meal planning and cross-contamination, resources, long-term camps and Treks. This will be an open discussion
	Knots-Basic		2			This is a basic knot class to teach leaders how to teach their youth. The basic knots covered include, but are not limited to: square knot, sheet bend, bow line, basic whipping techniques, figure eight knot, and possibly a few others.
	Knots-Intermediate			3		This intermediate class teaches some of the more elegant knots a Scout will need to learn. This is for teaching leaders how to teach youth. Knots covered in this class are: the clove hitch, basic lashings, splicing, and a few others as time permits.
	How to Run an Effective Committee/Meeting	1				Learn the secrets of running successful meetings. This class is great for Committee Chairs, Committee Members, and anyone in your unit who needs to work with a committee.
	Fun With Fire			3		Ignite your program by attending this OUTSIDE class. (Dress according to the weather.) Learn about various aspects of fire safety, fire science, fire lays, fire starting methods, fire extinguishing, etc. There will also be demonstrations on some of the various ways one can start a fire (only a couple involve the use of matches.)
	Paracord 101 - Max 15				4 5	New to paracord? No problem! This workshop will teach you that learning a few simple knots will unlock countless paracord craft possibilities! We'll use the EDGE method to equip scouting leaders with accessible and inclusive paracord projects that are easily adjustable to meet the needs and abilities of all scouts, whether you're looking for patrol activities or Cubs recruiting. In addition to hands-on practice, we will also discuss the benefits of utilizing paracord activities for sensory regulation within a pack or troop setting.

	Hands On - 2L water rockets and things that fly for Cubs and Webelos - 20 Max			3		Learn about 2L water rockets, stomp rockets, micro kites, FPG-9 gliders and more, great for dens and packs. Raffle for launchers to take home and use. Note: a portion of this class will be held outside. Dress appropriate for the weather.
	Hands on -Simple Cub Scout Projects - 15 MAX				5	Learn to work with cub scouts on simple, fun projects they can use at home or give as gifts, completing several in class.
	Hands on - Building and Racing Recycled Raingutter Regatta Boats				4	Learn how to hold a raingutter regatta from recycled materials or kits, and hold a pack-wide race.
	Hands On - Basic Leatherworking	1				Learn the basics of beginning leatherwork. Participants will learn about choosing the correct leather and tools for their projects, how to prepare for transferring a pattern or picture, and the processes of creating impressions in the leather by stamping or carving and tooling. After creating impressions, participants will color or dye their leather pieces as well as put on a final finish and leave with a fully completed piece.
	Hands On - Advanced Leatherworking - Saddle Stitch		2			Participants will learn to saddle stitch and practice using the stitch to create a small project. Saddle stitching is not just for use in making saddles; it is a sturdy lock stitch for sewing leather.
	Hands On - Leather Passport Holder or Can Koozie			3		Create your own passport holder using tooling and stitching skills. This class is for anyone, whether you have or have not had experience working with leather. Interested beginners, intermediate or advanced, all are welcome.

	Introduction to MESH (Mental Emotional and Social Health (Training)	1					Mental, Emotional, and Social Health (MESH) training is a proactive initiative by Scouting America designed to equip staff and adult leaders with the tools to support the holistic well-being of Scouts. Recognizing that the rigors of scouting can create unique stressors, the MESH curriculum focuses on identifying behavioral changes that may indicate a Scout is struggling. By integrating these practices into leader development, councils aim to move beyond physical safety alone, fostering an environment where mental and emotional needs are prioritized with the same urgency as a physical injury. The training utilizes the U-S-A Model—Understand the behaviors, Speak and Support, and Act and Advocate—to provide a clear, actionable framework for intervention. Participants are trained to recognize signs of mental health challenges and more serious crises, while also learning how to create mentally healthy environments including essential self-care techniques. Ultimately, MESH training serves to reduce the stigma surrounding mental health in Scouting, ensuring that every participant has access to a supportive, empathetic community that is "Prepared" for the complexities of modern youth development.
	Leader's Guide: Parent Engagement in MESH				3		A Scout's success on the trail starts long before packing a backpack. This practical workshop equips adult leaders with the tools to build strong, collaborative relationships with families around Mental, Emotional, and Social Health (MESH). Learn how to demystify MESH terminology, normalize emotional safety alongside physical first aid, and frame sensitive conversations around shared goals. You will leave with actionable communication strategies, pre-event intake tools, and protocols for handling challenging situations in partnership with parents—ensuring every Scout feels supported, safe, and ready for adventure.
	Understanding Bullying and Bullying Prevention		2				Physical safety and emotional safety go hand in hand. Learn how to spot early signs of bullying, intervene effectively, and build an inclusive troop culture where every Scout feels valued. Leaders will leave with practical communication tools and clear protocols to support youth and engage parents constructively.
	Understanding and Supporting Neurodiversity					4	While Autism is not a mental health condition, studies show that at least 70% of individuals on the spectrum experience a comorbid mental health condition. This can include anxiety, depression, and suicidality among others. Because of communicative and sensory differences that these individuals experience, they may not receive supports in traditional ways. This discussion will help individuals understand how to establish an individual's baseline, notice any differences in behavior, and how to support them in a variety of ways to best meet their needs.
	Scouting With Youth With Special Needs					5	Hear from several youth in our Council who have had an amazing experience Scouting despite having unique abilities. Scouts will give an overview of what they love about the program and things that helped them succeed...or were specifically not helpful.

This session will give you ideas on how to make this ceremony an effective and meaningful experience for them. Topics include ceremony options, props, how to involve the Eagle Scout and his/her family, etc. Bring ideas to share!
Religious Chaplain/Chaplain Aid Training			2			Duty to God is an important part of the Scouting program. Two positions at the unit and district level can help ensure that Duty to God is incorporated into your unit's program. Leaders will walk away with a bridging timeline and practical tools to boost their troop's crossover retention rate.
