FIRST AID MEET

DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE

The First Aid Meet is an opportunity for scout teams to demonstrate first aid expertise in a competitive situation. Contest problems will test scouts' knowledge of First Aid and the team's ability to handle emergency situations. Each team will be judged on its evaluation of victims, determination of appropriate treatments, and cooperation in providing effective care. The event provides scouts with opportunities to strengthen first-aid skills, to learn new techniques, and to demonstrate leadership and teamwork.

WHERE



St. Joseph School 1740 Lake Avenue Wilmette, IL 60091

The school is on the northeast corner of Lake Street and Ridge Road. Entrance to parking is from Ridge Road. Exit from parking is to Forest Avenue, north of the school.

REGISTRATION

Teams must be registered online.
Team registration ends Sunday, March 8, 2026.
Units are encouraged to enter multiple teams.
There is a limit of 15 teams.
>> Registration is open to all units in NEIC. <<

TEAMS

- A team is composed of 6-9 scouts.
 - A Troop may choose to use intact patrols for teams.
- Troops are encouraged to have more than one team.

- Each team will provide its own victims. Most problems require two victims.
 - Victims may be scouts or adults. Victims should be associated with the Unit rather than Cub Scouts or non-affiliated siblings.
 - Younger scouts or adults serving as victims may play that role for all problems
 OR team members may take turns as victims for different problems.
 - While serving as a victim, a scout may not provide advice about treatments to the team.
- Team members take turns acting as problem leaders; no one who has been a leader can be a leader for a second time unless all other members have served as a problem leader.
- Team needs one Patrol First Aid Kit. Recommended items for the kit are listed at the end of this document. *Please do not bring scout staves to the competition.*
- Team should have pads or blankets for victims to lie on during treatments.
- Note: the minimum size team of 6 allows two members to be victims, one member to report to First Responder or CPR, and three to perform treatment on the victims.

JUDGES

- Each team must provide and register an adult who will serve as a Problem Judge.
- A Judge will be responsible for scoring one of the four scenario problems.
- Judges will score a different team each of the four time periods. Judges may not score a team that is from their unit.
- Judges will be provided with copies of scoring materials by March 9. If needed, additional training for the Judges of each problem will be offered by Zoom between March 10 and 13.
- The Judge will read the problem to a team. The Judge will score the team's skills during its performance of first aid techniques against a check list of appropriate care. After scoring a problem, the Judge will discuss with the Team its quality of care. Steps are shown in the document Administering a Scenario Problem on the registration web site.

PROBLEMS

- <u>Four</u> problems consist of a short scenario which will be read to the team. The Judge will score the team performance against a standard rubric.
- Problems require first-aid skills described in the Scouts BSA Handbook 14th Ed. and the
 First Aid Merit Badge booklet. In addition, teams are expected to be familiar with safety
 precautions (swimming, camping, cooking, hiking, etc.) and emergency procedures
 (water rescue, camping, hiking, home) that are in the Handbook.
- Teams are not allowed to use printed or electronic resources during the administration of the problems.
- Some problems will require a team member calling for first responder. The first responder will rate the scout's report on presence of essential information. (See *Scouts BSA Handbook*, p151.)
- One problem may involve testing of CPR knowledge.



- Overall team score will be based on
 - Contents of Patrol First Aid Kit
 - Judge ratings on each of 4 problems.
 - First responder scores on designated problems.
 - CPR score on one problem.
- A Special Event may be offered before Awards are presented. Scoring on this event will not affect the overall team score.
 - The use of the Handbook and Merit Badge pamphlet is encouraged during the special event.
