LINCOLN PILGRIMAGE HISTORY

The first Boy Scout Lincoln Pilgrimage was held in Fort Wayne, Indiana at the encouragement of the Lincoln Life Insurance Corporation in 1934. The first Abraham Lincoln Council Pilgrimage was held in 1946.

At its start, the Lincoln Pilgrimage consisted of a march from the Old Illinois State Capitol and ended at Lincoln's Tomb in Oak Ridge Cemetery, where a commemorative program was held. Today's Lincoln Pilgrimage Route has been reversed, with Scouts leaving Oak Ridge Cemetery and marching with flags flying through Springfield to the Old State Capitol. The weekend itself has grown to include many activities and adventures.



The Lincoln Trail hike was started in 1926 and is the first historic trail to be recognized by the National Council. R. Allan Stephens, a local attorney and past Council President, is credited with starting the trail, which follows the very footsteps of Abraham Lincoln and his regular journey from New Salem to Springfield. The modern Lincoln Trail starts at Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site and travels through the roughly 19 miles of countryside reaching its official end at Stuart Park.

Stuart Park is also closely connected to Lincoln and Scouting. Robert A. Stuart Sr., for whom the park is named, is the great-grandson of John Stuart who loaned law books to a young Abraham Lincoln which he read while walking to and from Springfield. John Stuart, who was also a cousin of Mary Todd, later hired Lincoln to work at his practice. This practice still exists today, and Past Council President and Distinguished Eagle Scout Robert A. Stuart Jr. continues the close ties between the Abraham Lincoln Council, the Stuart Family, and President Lincoln Himself.



Since its creation, many hundreds of thousands of miles have been hiked on the Lincoln Trail, and endless memories made in Springfield. The Abraham Lincoln Council Invites YOU to join us as we continue to honor our 16th President!

THE LINCOLN PILGRIMAGE

For more than 75 years, Scouts have been gathering at the final resting place of our 16th President, and making the march between his Tomb and the Old State Capitol. All the events of the Lincoln Pilgrimage Weekend culminate with this grand showcase of citizenship. All participants in the weekend are asked to join us for these programs.

WAR MEMORIAL PROGRAM

Join us at the south west corner of the cemetery as Scouts honor those who served. This brief memorial highlights the connection between President Lincoln and honoring Veterans as Scouts place wreaths of honor and enjoy a reading of the Gettysburg Address.

CEREMONIES AT LINCOLN'S TOMB

The pinnacle of the Pilgrimage weekend, the formal ceremonies at Lincoln's Tomb start with a ceremonial wreath laying by Scouts inside the Tomb. Immediately following is an inspiring program put on by our local Scouts, and a message of tribute to Mr. Lincoln by distinguished guests.

THE SCOUTS MARCH TO THE OLD STATE CAPITOL

A visually stunning experience as a column of Scouts, led by the Eagle Honor Guard, parade through the city on a route very similar to the first pilgrimage in 1946.

PARKING AND TRANSPORTATION TIPS

Units can stage their vehicles downtown on Sunday. Parking is typically available in the Horace Mann parking lot directly behind the Presidential Museum. If you drop your Scouts off with adult supervision at Oak Ridge Cemetery and then stage your vehicles downtown, you will be able to leave for home at the conclusion of the march.

Guests are asked to remember that Oak Ridge is an active cemetery, and the Abraham Lincoln Council does not have control over the facility. As such, Scouts are asked to avoid certain parking areas to allow the general public access. Please refer to volunteer staff when arriving. Parking is not permitted in the parking lot behind the Tomb.



THE LINCOLN TRAIL

Walk where Lincoln walked on the Lincoln Trail, the first historical trail recognized by the National Council of Scouting America.

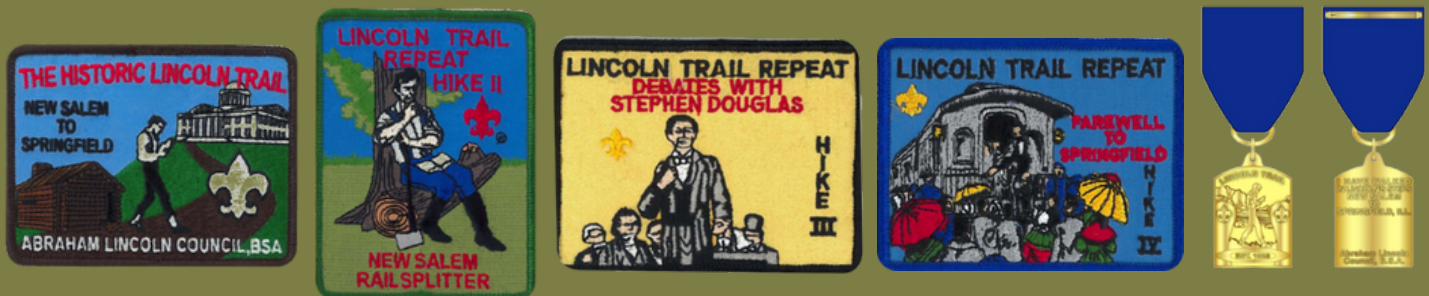
The Lincoln Trail is a strenuous 19-mile hike and hikers under the age of 11 are not allowed.

All hikers can start on the trail as early as 6 a.m. and must be on the trail by 9:15 a.m. on Saturday. Completion time varies depending on start time and speed. Ideally, all hikers will be at Station 4 by 3:00 PM, and off the trail no later than 4:00 p.m.

The Lincoln Trail is a full-day event for hikers, however, parents, siblings, and Scouts who will not be hiking have ample time to visit some of the other sites and activities while hikers are on the trail.

All hikers receive their choice of Trail Patch 1-4 with their hike voucher.

A Lincoln Trail Medal can be purchased for \$7 in the trading post online or at the end of the trail.



In 2015, the Abraham Lincoln Council commemorated the 90th anniversary of the Lincoln Trail by issuing a series of commemorative patches.

The “black’ boarder recognizes the 90th year of the trail, and the bronze, gold, and silver borders are available to recognize those who have hiked the trail 5, 10, or 15+ times.

Limited quantities of these \$6 patches remain available for purchase.

LINCOLN TRAIL HIKING GUIDELINES

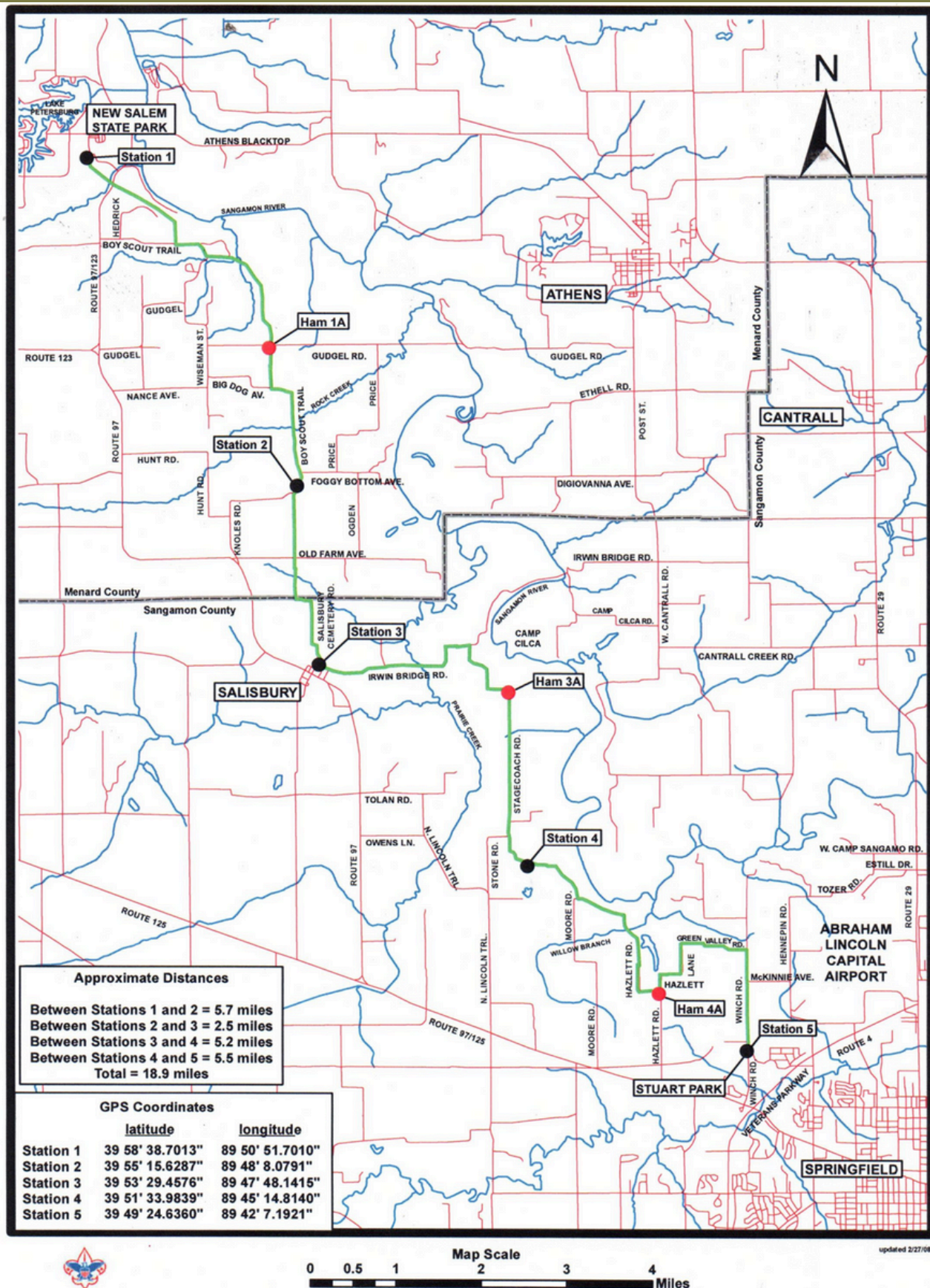
- Scouting America Youth Protection policies require at least two adult leaders for each group hiking.
- For hiker safety, support vehicles must use alternate roads to reach the rest stations.
- Groups must stay together as a group when hiking.
- All unit leaders must register at the beginning of the trail.
- All leaders must check in at the different stations along the way. Scouts without adult supervision will not be allowed to continue.
- Observe safe-hiking rules at all times. Groups must walk facing traffic and allow traffic to pass. Be alert to traffic at all times.
- Leave the animals alone along the trail.
- Leave No Trace, and pack your trash.
- Respect private property.
- All units must provide their own transportation back to where they are camping.
- Bicycles, rollerblades, and runners are not allowed on the trail.
- Abraham Lincoln Council personnel will be monitoring the trail to ensure that the safety guidelines are being followed. Patches may not be awarded to hikers who blatantly disobey these guidelines.
- Port-a-pots are at each check-in station

WHAT TO PACK FOR THE TRAIL

- Sturdy Shoes
- Hiking socks (bring extra for the hike)
- Liner socks
- Lunch/Snacks
- Sufficient Water
- Sun and/or Rain protection
- Trash bag
- First Aid kit w/moleskin

There may be concessions available for purchase at the end of the trail in Stuart Park. Parking is limited at Stuart Park, so please be courteous when planning return transportation.

OAK RIDGE CEMETERY TRAILS

Oak Ridge Cemetery has the distinction of being the second most visited cemetery in the nation, second only to Arlington National Cemetery. In addition to being the site of the Lincoln Pilgrimage, The Oak Ridge Cemetery has three Trails that Scouts can complete during their visit.

Virtually every participant in the Pilgrimage will complete the Introductory Trail by visiting Mr. Lincoln's Tomb. The Intermediate Trail involves visiting the War Memorials in Oak Ridge. The Advanced Trail provides an in depth look at the cemetery, including visits to the graves of governors, poets, pioneers and other notable characters in history.

THE INTRODUCTORY TRAIL

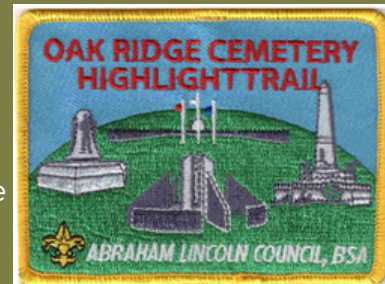
The Introductory Trail is a shorter trail and is ideal for those only visiting the Tomb. In about a half hour you will experience Mr. Lincoln's Tomb and the history surrounding it.

This Trail was designed for all ages, but with particular emphasis on the younger visitor. For those participating in the Lincoln Pilgrimage, this Trail is something the Scouts are encouraged to do while they are waiting for the program to begin on Sunday.



THE HIGHLIGHT TRAIL

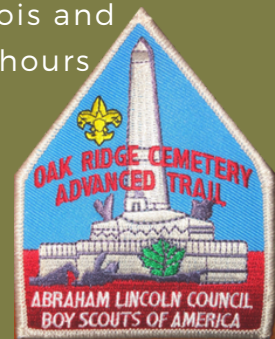
The Highlights Trail visits the war memorials in Oak Ridge Cemetery. It takes about 1½ hours to complete the mile long trail. The trail also familiarizes the hikers with Illinois' contribution to freedom and the memorials are lasting tributes to those who gave their lives in service to our country safeguarding the liberties we enjoy today.



This Trail was designed for older youth and adults. For those participating in the Annual Lincoln Pilgrimage, this trail can be done before the program begins with an early start.

THE ADVANCED TRAIL

The Advanced Trail takes hikers on an in-depth look at the pioneers of Illinois and Springfield who lie buried in Oak Ridge Cemetery. Allow approximately 1½ hours as you visit the "old section" of the cemetery that houses governors, poets, orphans, historical figures, Springfield notables, and Mr. Lincoln's friends and relatives. Compass headings and GPS points are included for those wishing to improve their skills or just have more fun.



For those participating in the Annual Lincoln Pilgrimage, this would be a Saturday activity or most of Sunday morning prior to the start of the Pilgrimage Program.

Each trail features a workbook, answer sheet, and map to earn the patch. To complete all three trails in one visit, allow approximately three hours.

THE HERITAGE TRAIL

A trip to Springfield is hardly complete without a tour of the many historic sites in the city. The Heritage Trail visits numerous sites in the area with strong connections to Mr. Lincoln.

To complete the trail, hikers must visit the 5 sites each year and we have recognition for up to 4 years. The trail is designed to be fully walkable with the exception of getting to the Lincoln Tomb and New Salem.

NEW SALEM EXPERIENCE



Experience Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site and the recreated frontier town. An ideal trek for Cub Scouts, a scavenger hunt guides Scouts through the site and to many of the key features. By completing the hunt, Scouts will have earned their patch.

THE TRAILS OF NEW SALEM

Not quite ready for the Lincoln Trail? Then the Trails of New Salem are for you. Several miles of trails on the east side of Lincoln's New Salem can be paired with the New Salem Experience or done separately. These trails can be used to meet many advancement requirements for all Scouts.



THE MUSEUM QUEST



Experience Lincoln's life, from triumph to tragedy through a mix of immersive displays and shows. The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum boasts one of a kind artifacts, and the Museum Quest takes Scouts on a fifty question journey through the exhibits.

The Museum is open daily from 9:00 am - 5:00 pm. Last entry is 4:00 pm.

THE MUSEUM TRAIL

Springfield is home to countless museums and the Museum Trail challenges you to visit at least five. In a true build-your-own adventure style you have full control over your trail experience. Hikers must get their passports authenticated at a minimum of five museums and submit an essay on a topic covered at one of the museums to their Unit Leader to complete the Museum Trail Patch.

The Museum Trail is available year-round. Weekend hikers are encouraged to contact participating museums to confirm hours.

The Museum Trail does not include admission to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum or any applicable admission charges at other museums. Admission for the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum may be purchased at a discounted rate during registration as a class option, or at the museum door at FULL price.

THE LINCOLN BICYCLE TRAIL

Following an abandoned segment of the St. Louis, Peoria, and North Western Railway, the Sangamon Valley Trail runs from Centennial Park in Springfield to Irwin Bridge Road in Cantrall. The Lincoln Bicycle Trail offers Scouts and leaders an opportunity to complete biking trips of varying lengths to fit their Pilgrimage weekend schedule.

The Lincoln Bicycle Trail is a self-guided program but you will need to check in and out with event personnel. Your unit can be structured to fit your schedule. Starting and ending at Stuart Park (The endpoint for the Lincoln Trail). From Stuart Park to Irwin Bridge Road is another 6.5 miles. The distance from Centennial Park to Irwin Bridge Road bypassing Stuart Park is approximately 11.7 miles. Stuart to Centennial Park is 6.3 Miles

TRAIL GUIDELINES

- All groups must abide by Scouting America Youth Protection Guidelines.
- Groups should stay together, or consider dividing into groups with similar abilities.
- All bikers must wear a properly fitted helmet.
- Follow the guidelines set by the Springfield Park District.
- Practice proper outdoor ethics for a cycling event.
- Parking is limited along the trail. Please limit the number of vehicles.
- Bathrooms are available at Centennial Park and Stuart Park.

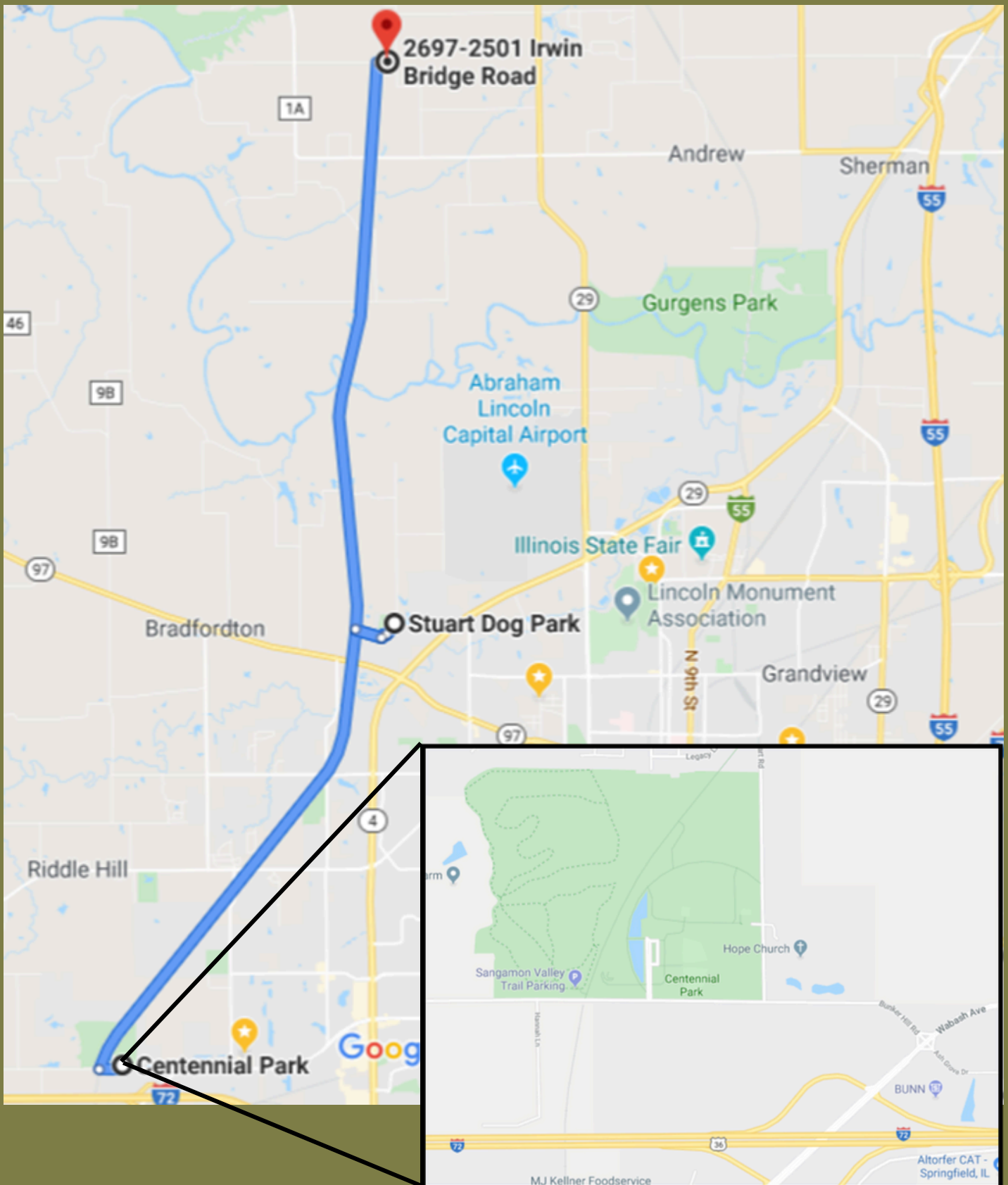

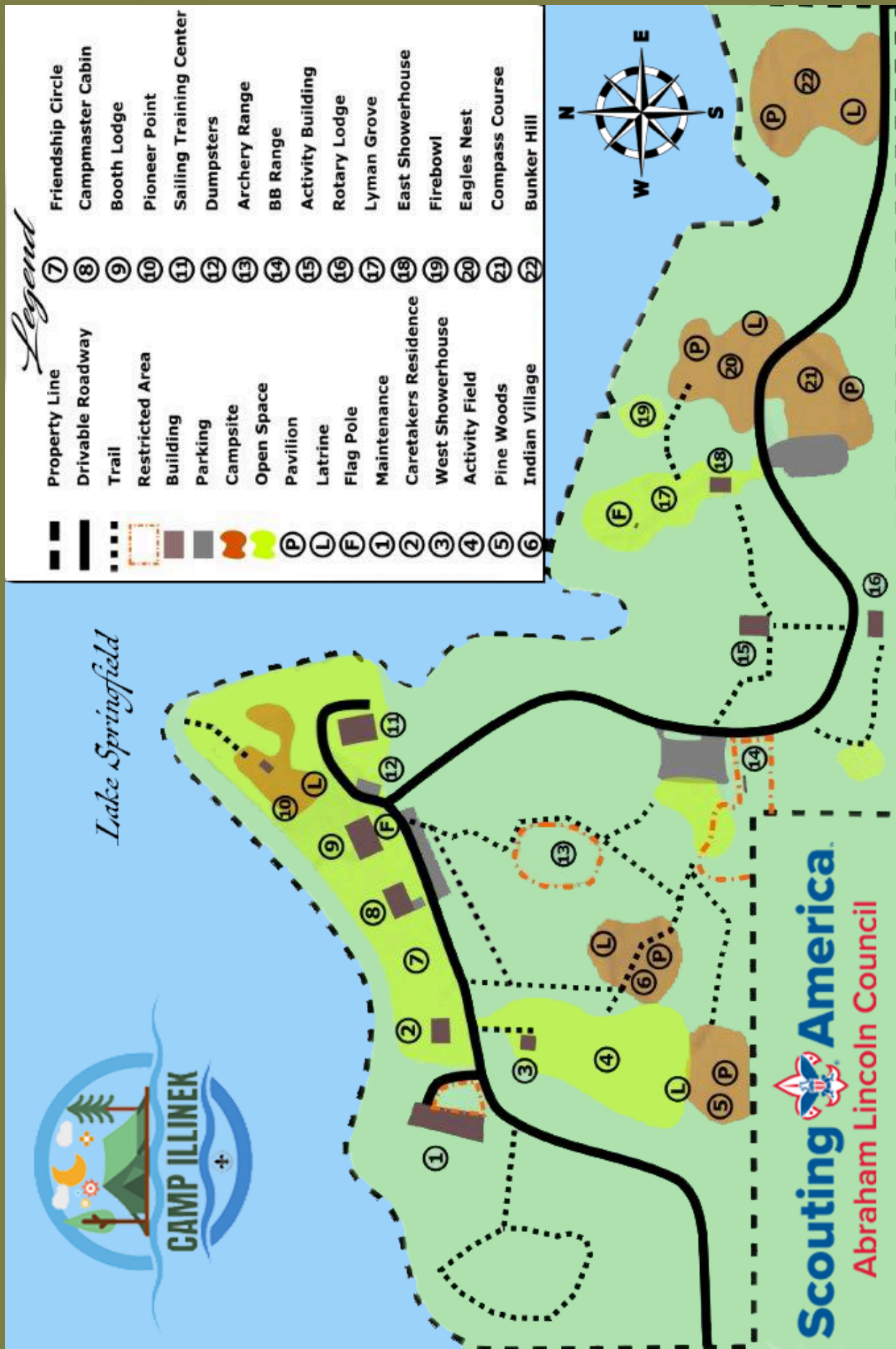

CAMP ILLINEK RULES AND REGULATIONS

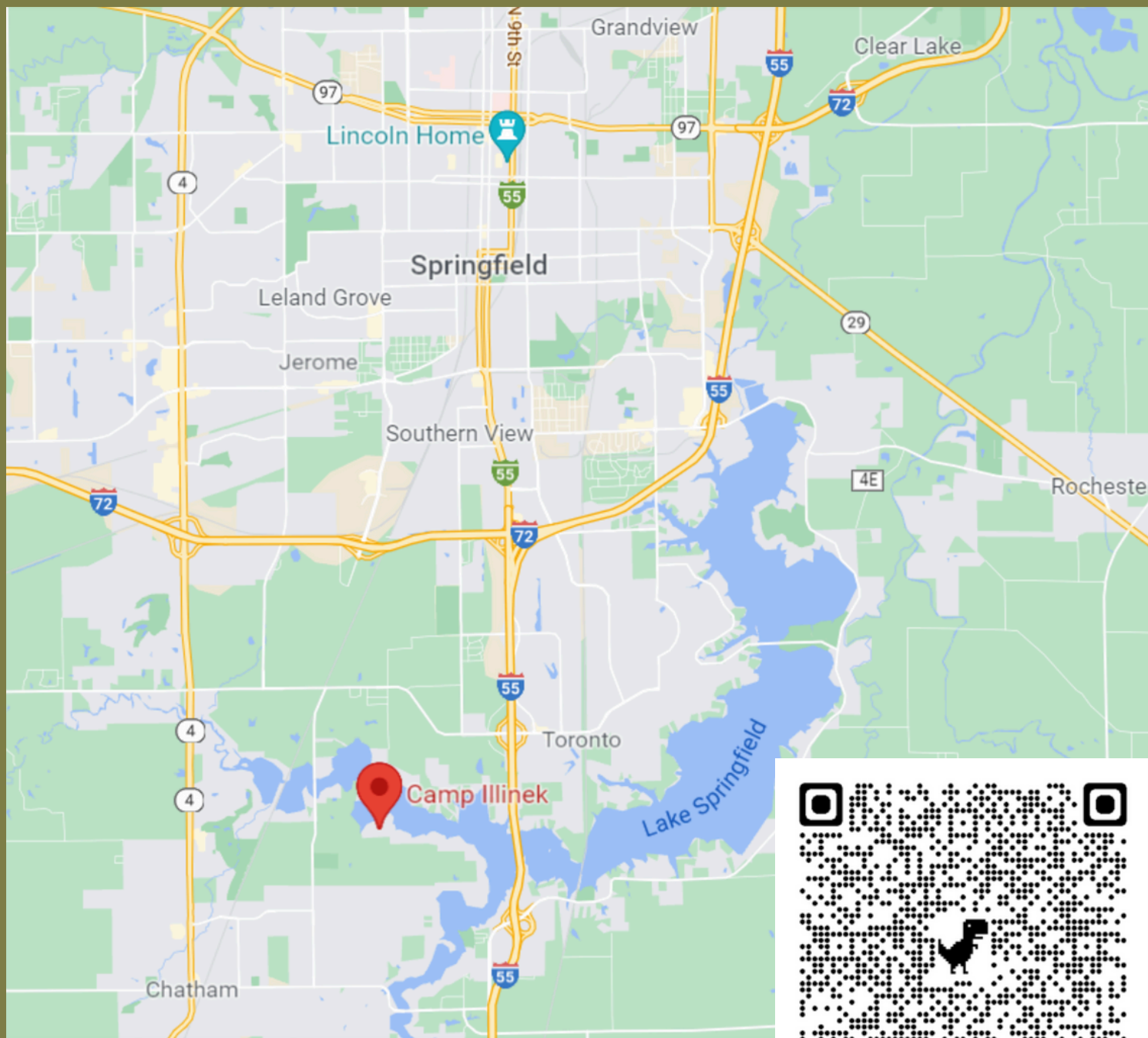
- Check-in at Camp Illinek begins at 4:00 PM on Friday
- All campers should check in at the Campmaster Lodge as you enter camp. This includes late arrivals.
- Campfires are only permitted in pre-existing fire rings or raised fire pits. **All fires must be fully extinguished before leaving the site.**
- Firewood is not available for purchase.
- Trailers and cars must remain on roads and in designated parking areas.
- Dumpsters are available for trash. Bring your own trash bags.
- No access to campsites for trailers
- Limit 300 campers
- Portable fire pits may be needed for some areas. No fires without a firepit.

CAMPING AT NEW SALEM

Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site

15588 History Lane

Hang your hat just off the trail head for the Lincoln Trail and set up camp in the group camping area at the Historic Site. This location is ideal for those looking at an early start on the trail or a leisurely stroll into the site itself. Limited to 1000 campers.

ARRIVAL AT NEW SALEM

- Check in begins at 4:00 PM on Friday at the Visitor's Center
- Upon arrival, an adult from your group will be asked to go check in your unit
 - **All vehicles must first go to parking lot with their trailer while leader is checking the unit in.**
 - Please bring the following when checking in:
 - License plate information for trailer and vehicle pulling the trailer
 - Cell phone number for all adult leaders
- **To help with congestion in the campsite area: Only the vehicle pulling the Troop trailer will be allowed in the one-way loop. Please load any additional equipment into the pulling vehicle or trailer in the main parking lot before entering the road into the one-way loop.**

GENERAL INFORMATION

- The Scout Oath and Law are the primary rules for any Scout outing, but particularly here in the historic site. Cooperation and a good Scouting spirit will make everyone's experience a good one and assure that we are welcomed back in the future.
- Please respect the property. Scouts may not visit the Historic Village after 4:00 PM, nor should they trespass on private property bordering the site.
- We do not have access to the Kelso Hollow (outdoor theatre) and ask that your scouts do not enter it.
- Trenching, ground fires, driving off the roads and other potentially property damaging activities are not allowed. Bring your own firewood, use raised pits (bring your own and clean up after yourself) or existing rings, and of course, do not cut live trees. Also, do not leave the firewood you bring at the site.
- Roads through the campground are narrow. For everyone's benefit, including that of emergency vehicles, **roads are one way.**

CAMPING AT NEW SALEM

Trailers must be parked in the designated parking area after unloading. Cars must be placed in the designated parking lot immediately upon arrival. ONLY ONE VEHICLE PER UNIT IS ALLOWED IN CAMPING AREA AT A TIME.

RULES, REGULATIONS, AND MORE GENERAL INFORMATION

- Restrooms are open 24 hours a day at the campground.
- Campground shower facilities may only be used under adult supervision.
- The pavilion in the campground area is common property and can be used by all campers.
- Due to the limited number of picnic tables, please only have one per site.
- No hammocks.
- Emergency First Aid can be found at the Visitor's Center or the Staff campsite.
- Lost and Found will be at the Visitor's Center.
- Trash: there will be dumpsters centrally located at the campground. Please bring your own bags.
- Tornado Shelter: Kelso Hollow Amphitheater and the Visitor's Center; Evacuation procedures will be under the direction of the Site Coordinators, if necessary.

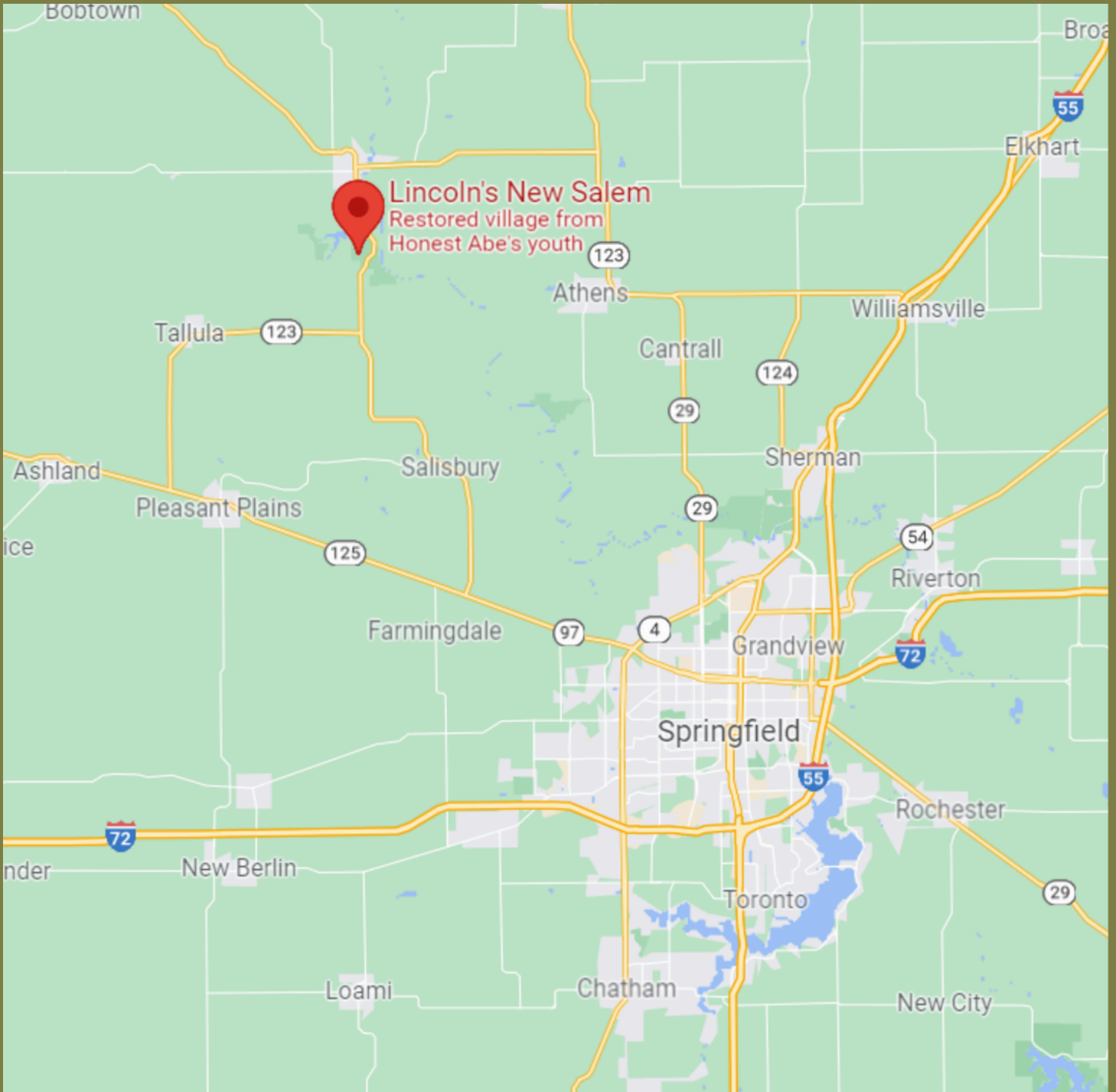
