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Event Registration Procedures:

Early registration is highly encouraged for all participants since many classes fill up quickly and class sizes are limited, especially for merit badges. Adult leaders and Cub Scouts that are taking classes must register as well.

Scout and Cub Scout Registration will be available from 1/9/2025 through 2/15/25 for \$25. Lunch is included for Scouts and Cub Scouts as a part of their registration.

There is an opportunity for adults/leaders to purchase a lunch ticket for \$10.

Adults are welcome to sign up for the Dutch Oven Cooking Class for \$10 as well and that includes their lunch.

Scouts can register themselves or the Unit can register them. If you have registration issues, please contact Elizabeth.Douglass@Scouting.org or by calling the Hingst Service Center at 765-452-8253. No day of registrations will be accepted. There is an option in Black Pug to import you roster so that the finer details of each participant is easier to input. We suggest doing that so you don't have to reference/remember the following items for each Scout that will be required for registration:

Information needed for each participant:

Scout Name, Gender, Rank, Birth Date, and Email Address (their own email or a parent's email address is preferred so that we can send class schedules. Please do not use the same email address or just the leader's email address for all Scouts). If you use the roster feature, the Scouts' information will autopopulate.

How to register:

- 1. Go to: https://scoutingevent.com/162-2025_UofSIUK
- 2. Click Register and then click "Continue as Guest" or "Login" (For people who have previously used this system)
 - 3. Enter quantity of participants (youth or adult) and then submit
- 4. Under the registrant tab and each participant tab, click Update Information to enter all the required information to complete the registration.
 - 5. After all required information is entered, click on the "Check Out" tab to continue to the payment screen.
- 6. Enter all payment information and then click "Book Registration" to complete your registration. We will do our very best to keep our schedule as printed in this catalog; however, due to instructor availability, class limitations, and circumstances beyond our control, we may find it necessary to reschedule or cancel a class. We will post notification of such changes on the day of the event and communicate prior if possible.



Why is the University of Scouting so important? The story of Justin Cline...





At the University of Scouting in December of 2022 Justin completed the Veterinary Medicine Merit Badge. In January of 2024, Justin Cline received his offer of admission to the Animal Science program in the College of Agriculture at Purdue University. He has always like being around animals and wants to eventually be a Veterinarian. In February, Justin had his Eagle Board of Review and is now officially an Eagle Scout. Tying to his love of animals, Justin's Eagle project benefitted the Black Pine Animal Sanctuary in Albion, IN. After he accepted his offer to Purdue, he applied for Purdue's Veterinary Scholars Program. (Typically 100+ students apply, about 20 are interviewed and around 10 offered a position in the program.) Being accepted in the program means he would be pre-accepted in the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine program at Purdue. The Dean of Purdue's College of Veterinary Medicine recently called to offer him a position as a Veterinary Scholar. This all started with the University of Scouting two years ago and now Justin is on his way to a career in vet med!!

Class Coding Guide

AM = 9 AM-12 PM Class

PM = 1 PM-4 PM Class

FULL DAY = 9 AM-4 PM Class

PRE-REQUISITES = Requirements on merit badges that have to be completed before coming to the event. Scouts should bring proof of their completion to class to show their counselor so they get credit for its completion. Some classes will have post requisites that will need to be completed after the event. Those counselors will work with the Scouts via email to ensure they get credit for the completed requirements.

Blue Cards

We do not use blue cards for advancements at this event. Scout progress will be recorded by their counselor on their class roster and then input into Black Pug (where you will register for the event) after the event by our Council Staff. Please allow 2-3 weeks for that data to be input in the system. Once we have that data input you will be notified and will then be able to print your own blue card after the event data has been input.

Note, Cub Scouts do not register for Merit Badge classes, just these adventures.

Communication

This clear and concise definition comes from the U.S. Department of Education: "Communication focuses on how people use messages to generate meanings within and across various contexts, cultures, channels, and media. The field of communication promotes the effective and ethical practice of human communication."

Pre-requisites: 2A or 2B, plus Requirements 5 and 8 must be done in advance. -Half of Requirement 3, which requires them to write a five-minute speech then
deliver it in a meeting of the group. They'll need to write the speech in advance, then
they can deliver it during the class.-- Half of Requirement 4, which requires them to
interview someone then prepare and deliver an introduction of the person as if they
were going to be a guest speaker. These interviews also would need to be done in
advance, then they can do the introductions during the class; Scouts BSA Personal

Citizenship in the Nation

Scouts will learn how to become active citizens are aware of and grateful for their liberties and rights, to participate in their governments and protect their freedom, helping to defend their country and standing up for individual rights on behalf of all its citizens.

Family Life

The family is the basic unit of society and is important to both individuals and communities. The world is rapidly changing, making today's society much more complex than ever before. As Scouts earn this merit badge, they will realize why it is important to know more about family life and how to strengthen their families.

Main KO 105, AM and PM, Class Size: 10 (we will have 2 AM sessions, the 2nd one will be in Main KO 202

Pre-requisites: 3-5, 6B 1-7



Signs, Signals, and Codes/Fingerprinting (DOUBLE CLASS)

The Signs, Signals and Codes merit badge covers a number of the nonverbal ways we communicate: emergency signaling, Morse code, American Sign Language, braille, trail signs, sports officiating hand signals, traffic signs, secret codes and more.

In earning the Fingerprinting merit badge, Scouts will learn about and use an important technique that is used by law enforcement officers, along with other materials like matching dental records and DNA sampling, to help identify amnesia victims, missing persons, abducted children, and others.





Disabilities Awareness

Understand various disabilities and how they affect your friends, family, and community members. Scouts will learn about the experiences of someone with a disability, explain the significance of disability etiquette, and how it may differ depending on the specific disability.

Genealogy

Exploring your roots—where your family name came from, why your family lives where it does, what your parents and grandparents did for fun when they were your age—can be fascinating. Discovering your ancestors back through history is what genealogy is all about.

Theater

While earning the Theater merit badge, Scouts will learn to appreciate live performances as members of the audience as well as go behind the footlights to see the view from the other side. Much more goes on in theater than ever meets the audience's eye.

Public Health

The field of public health deals with maintaining and monitoring the health of communities, and with the detection, cure, and prevention of health risks and diseases. Although public health is generally seen as a community-oriented service, it actually starts with the individual. From a single individual to the family unit to the smallest isolated rural town to the worldwide global community, one person can influence the health of many.

Nuclear Science

Nuclear science gives us a simple explanation of the natural world. The ultimate goal of nuclear science is to find out if there is one fundamental rule that explains how matter and forces interact. Earning the Nuclear Science merit badge is a chance for Scouts to learn about this exciting field at the cutting edge of science today.

Astronomy

Scouts study how activities in space affect our own planet and bear witness to the wonders of the night sky: the nebulae, or giant clouds of gas and dust where new stars are born; old stars dying and exploding; meteor showers and shooting stars; the moon, planets, and a dazzling array of stars.

Soil and Water Conservation

Conservation isn't just the responsibility of soil and plant scientists, hydrologists, wildlife managers, landowners, and the forest or mine owner alone. It is the duty of every person to learn more about the natural resources on which our lives depend so that we can help make sure that these resources are used intelligently and cared for properly.

Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops

The purpose of the ILST course is to teach Scouts with leadership positions about their new roles and how to most effectively reach success in that role. It is intended to help Scouts in leadership positions within their troop understand their responsibilities and to equip them with organizational and leadership skills to fulfill those responsibilities. ILST is the first course in the series of leadership training offered to Scouts and is a replacement for Troop Leadership Training. Completion of ILST is a prerequisite for Scouts to participate in the more advanced leadership courses National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) and the National Advanced Youth Leadership Experience (NAYLE). It is also required to participate in a Kodiak Challenge Trek.

Citizenship in the Community

A nation is a patchwork of communities that differ from each other and may be governed differently. But regardless of how local communities differ, they all have one point in common: In the United States, local government means self-government. Good citizens help to make decisions about their community through their elected local officials.

Pre-requisites: 2A, 2B, 3A, 4, 7 and 8 (present in class)

Citizenship in the World

Scouts who earn the Citizenship in the World merit badge will discover that they are already a citizen of the world. How good a citizen each person is depends on his willingness to understand and appreciate the values, traditions, and concerns of people in other countries.

Main KO 206, FULL DAY, Class Size: 10

Pre-requisite: 4b, 7a, 7b

Scout must be 13 years old and/or First Class

Note from the Counselor:

I am writing this note to help you be prepared. There are three pre-requisites (requirements 4b, 7a, and 7b). It is best if you complete these ahead of time, but it is acceptable to do them afterwards if necessary.

Here is the text of the requirements for your reference:

4b. Using resources such as major daily newspapers, the Internet (with your parent's permission), and news magazines, observe a current issue that involves international trade, foreign exchange, balance of payments, tariffs, and free trade. Explain what you have learned. Include in your discussion an explanation of why countries must cooperate in order for world trade and global competition to thrive.

7a. Visit the website of the U.S. State Department. Learn more about an issue you find interesting that is discussed on this website.

7b. Visit the website of an international news organization or foreign government, OR examine a foreign newspaper available at your local library, bookstore, or newsstand. Find a news story about a human right realized in the United States that is not recognized in another country.

Notes:

- ·Each of these requirements involve using resources. Be prepared to site your reference. Bringing a printed copy is acceptable, but not required.
- ·Be prepared to explain what you have learned to the group.
- ·For 4b, the focus is on world trade. Make sure that your source addresses one or more of the listed topics.
- ·For 4b, note the portion of the requirement starting with "Include in your discussion..."
- ·For 7a, you are to use the website of the U.S. State Department [https://www.state.gov]. This is a website of the federal government, not one of the 50 states.
- ·For 7b, you are to research human rights using a website of an international news organization or foreign government, OR examine a foreign newspaper. Domestic news organizations [ABC, CBS, NBC, CNN, NPR, FOX, NY Times, Wall Street Journal, etc.] may discuss foreign news topics, but do not satisfy this requirement. Typically made of enameled cast iron or stainless steel, dutch ovens heat quickly and maintain temperature effectively, making it an ideal vessel for searing and browning. Meanwhile, the tight-fitting lid traps moisture within the pot, enabling Dutch ovens to cook braises and stews evenly over several hours. Suitable for ovens and stovetops, the Dutch oven is capable, durable, and flexible to your cooking needs. Come learn some tips and tricks on using your dutch oven and enjoy an amazing lunch!
