Astronomy

In learning about astronomy, Scouts study how activities in space affect our own planet and bear witness to the wonders of the night sky: the nebulae, or giant clouds of gas and dust where new stars are born; old stars dying and exploding; meteor showers and shooting stars; the moon, planets, and a dazzling array of stars.

Maximum number of participants: 15

Prerequisites: Prerequisites: 4. Do the following (if instruction is done in a planetarium, Scouts must still identify the required stars and constellations outside under the natural night sky):

- (a) Identify in the sky 10 constellations, at least four of which are in the zodiac.
- (b) Identify in the sky eight conspicuous stars, five of which are of magnitude 1 or brighter.
- (c) Make two sketches of the Big Dipper or Cassiopeia from direct observation. In one sketch, show the Big Dipper's or Cassiopeia's orientation in the early evening sky. Make another sketch, showing its position several hours later. In both sketches, show the North Star and the horizon. Record the date and time each sketch was made.
- (d) Explain what we see when we look at the Milky Way.
- 5(b) Using the Internet (with your parent or guardian's permission) and other resources, find out when each of the five most visible planets that you identified in requirement 5a will be observable in the evening sky during the next 12 months, then compile this information in the form of a chart or table.
- 6(b) Sketch the phase and position of the Moon, at the same hour and place, for four nights (or days) within a one-week period by direct observation. Include landmarks on the horizon such as hills, trees, and buildings. Explain the changes you observe. 9. Do ONE of the following:
- (a) Identify three career opportunities that would use skills and knowledge in astronomy. Pick one and research the training, education, certification requirements, experience, and expenses associated with entering the field. Research the prospects for employment, starting salary, advancement opportunities and career goals associated with this career. Discuss what you learned with your counselor and whether you might be interested in this career.
- (b) Identify how you might use the skills and knowledge in astronomy to pursue a personal hobby. Research the additional training required, expenses, and affiliation with organizations that would help you maximize the enjoyment and benefit you might gain from it. Discuss what you learned with your counselor and share what short-term and long-term goals you might have if you pursued this."

What is the Test Lab?

The Scouts BSA Test Lab is an exciting way to help in the development of fun and





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interesting new topics unique to the Scouts BSA program. The requirements for each badge have the look and feel of merit badges, but instead of a printed pamphlet, you will find links to digital resources to help you complete the requirements. What to do:

You must work with a registered adult volunteer of your choosing. After completion of all requirements, you must take a short survey which will lead you to a certificate of completion.

If enough surveys show Scouts enjoyed these potential new badges, we hope to introduce them as official merit badges in the future. If you complete a Test Lab badge and it becomes an official merit badge, you will be credited with having earned that badge!

Keep logging in to this page to see what new topics are added as each badge will have a test lab expiration date.

Test Lab Rules:

- 1. Any registered adult can work with Scouts on these potential new badges.
- 2. Badges will have a clearly stated time period by which all requirements must be completed.
- 3. After the expiration date, the badge will be removed from the Test Lab and the National Council will evaluate if the subject should be added as a new merit badge.
- 4. When all requirements are finished successfully, a survey will be available to gather opinions on the badge. Scouts will then be able to access the certificate of completion which must be signed and dated by the registered adult they have worked with.
- 5. Should the badge be approved as a new merit badge, Scouts can be credited as having earned that badge if they present their signed and dated certificate to their unit.
- 6. Scouts completing the requirements after the expired time period will not be recognized as having earned the badge.

Now on the matter of tracking miles... there are a few methods but the preferred way I recommend is to use Strava, a free app. Yes, this requires use of (carry on rides) a smart phone but most individuals, including youth, have one and would carry it on a ride anyway. Strava keeps a good record of mileage, routes, and ride stats and also allows them to avoid having to purchase and use a handlebar mounted computer, which is the second preferred method of tracking, but only for those that don't have a smart phone (although some cyclists prefer to use a computer anyway).

Using Strava will allow unit Scoutmasters to easily view the rides and routes that cyclists do for the merit badge.

Drafting is a highly refined form of drawing used to communicate ideas to engineers, architects, and craftspeople. In earning this badge, Scouts learn the importance of accuracy and simplicity in developing a drawing that shows precise details in a simple format





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Prerequisites: Prerequisites: 3. Produce a computer-aided design (CAD) drawing as it would be used in manufacturing. Fill in all title block information. The CAD drawing may be any one of the following drawing types:

- (a) Architectural: Make a scale drawing of an architectural project. The architectural drawing may be a floor plan; electrical, plumbing, or mechanical service plan; elevation plan; or landscaping plan. Use an architect's scale and show dimensions to communicate the actual size of features. Include any important sectional drawings, notes, and considerations necessary for construction.
- (b) Mechanical: Make a scale drawing of some mechanical device or interesting object. The mechanical drawing may be of the orthographic or isometric style. Use an engineer's scale and show dimensions to communicate the actual size of features. Include any important sectional drawings, notes, and manufacturing considerations.
- (c) Electrical: Draw a simple schematic of a radio or electronic circuit. Properly print a bill of materials including all of the major electrical components used in the circuit. Use standard drawing symbols for the electronic components.

- (a) Visit a facility or industry workplace where drafting is part of the business. Ask to see an example of the work that is done there, the different drafting facilities, and the tools used
- (1) Find out how much of the drafting done there is manual and how much is done using CAD. If CAD is used, find out what software is used and how and why it was chosen.
- (2) Ask about the drafting services provided. Ask who uses the designs produced in the drafting area and how those designs are used. Discuss how the professionals who perform drafting cooperate with other individuals in the drafting area and other areas of the business.
- (3) Ask how important the role of drafting is to producing the end product or service that this business supplies. Find out how drafting contributes to the company's end product or service.
- (b) Using resources you find on your own such as at the library and on the Internet (with your parent or guardian's permission), learn more about the drafting trade and discuss the following with your counselor.
- (1) The drafting tools used in the past why and how they were used. Explain which tools are still used today and how their use has changed with the advent of new tools. Discuss which tools are being made obsolete by newer tools in the industry.
- (2) Tell what media types were used in the past and how drawings were used, stored, and reproduced. Tell how the advent of CAD has changed the media used, and discuss how these changes affect the storage or reproduction of drawings.
- (3) Discuss whether the types of media have changed such that there are new uses the drawings, or other outputs, produced by designers. Briefly discuss how new media types are used in the industry today."

Now on the matter of tracking miles... there are a few methods but the preferred way I recommend is to use Strava, a free app. Yes, this requires use of (carry on rides) a smart phone but most individuals, including youth, have one and would carry it on a ride anyway. Strava keeps a good record of mileage, routes, and ride stats and also allows them to avoid having to purchase and use a handlebar mounted computer, which is the second preferred method of tracking, but only for those that don't have a smart phone (although some cyclists prefer to use a computer anyway).

Using Strava will allow unit Scoutmasters to easily view the rides and routes that cyclists do for the merit badge.
