### A Message from The Captain

The captains and crew of the Retriever are really looking forward to sailing with you. During your time on the water, you will actually gain the knowledge and skills to sail a 52 ft. ketch (two-masted sailboat). As part of the crew, you will learn to respect others and work as an efficient team to meet the many challenges of sailing on our Great Lakes. The Great Lakes Sailing Adventure Program will provide scouts with experiences and memories that last a lifetime.

There are many things that your unit can do in the weeks before arriving at Mackinaw City and the Retriever. We can't stress enough that leaders and scouts should carefully read and follow all the requirements in the <u>Leader's Guide</u>. We encourage scouts to watch YouTube videos on the fundamental skills needed to sail a boat the size of the Retriever.

One such video is: Learn How to Sail: A Step-by-Step Guide to SAILING by Josh Post

YouTube Videos are great ways to learn the fundamentals of using winches, raising sails, tacking, and steering a boat to maintain a plotted course. The captain assigned to your sailing adventure will reach out to your unit several weeks before your trip begins. 
## **Points of Sail**

### **Rules of the Road - Simplified**

- ★ Post a lookout Sight and hearing
- ★ Maintain safe speed consider the visibility, vessel traffic, your ability to maneuver, and weather conditions
- ★ Avoid a collision
