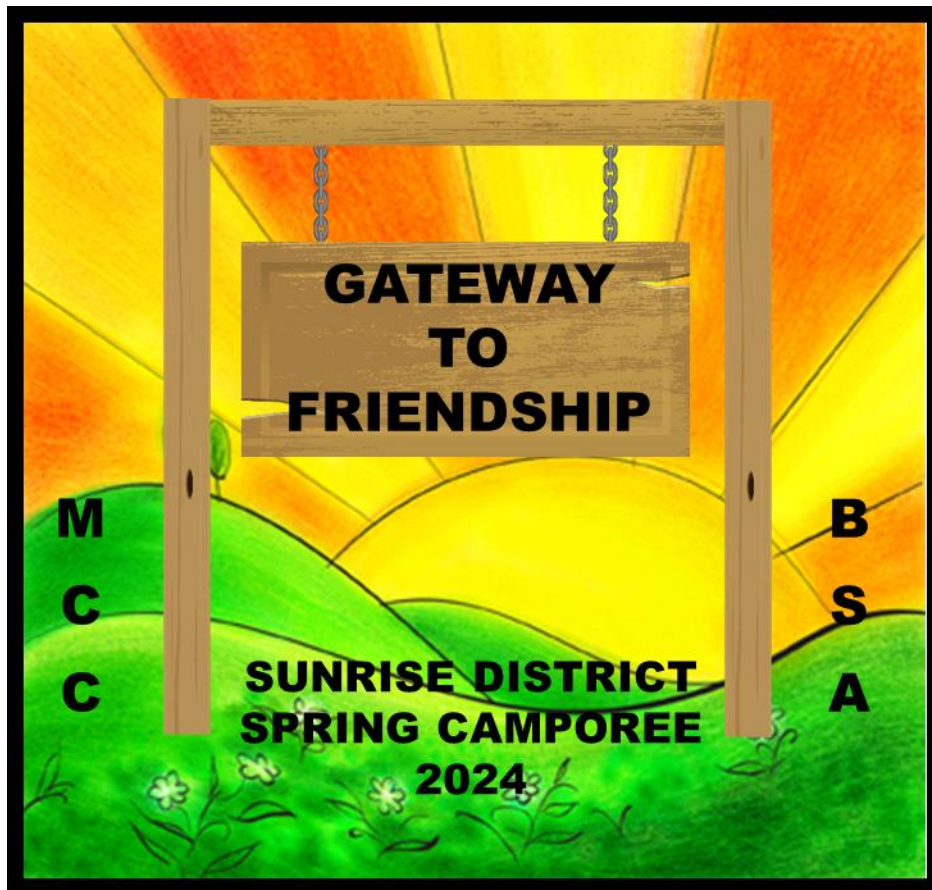




**Sunrise “A First Class District!”

WHO CAN ATTEND?

The 2024 Sunrise District Spring Fellowship Camporee is open to all Sunrise Scouts BSA Troops. To strengthen the learning opportunity and promote the Webelos to Scout transition, Troops can invite Webelos and Arrow of Light (AoL) scouts to the camporee. Webelos and AoL scouts can only register as part of a host Troop. Sunrise Venturing Crew and Sea Scouts can also attend the camporee. These scouts will compete in the same events as troop members. All attending scouts should be organized into patrols/dens of five (5) to eight (8) members.

Attend the Sunrise Scouts BSA Roundtable to learn how your unit can prepare for the Camporee. Each troop will be asked to run one of the Saturday events. The Camporee Chairman, Dave Busse will contact each troop to provide instructions. If you have questions contact Dave Busse at dbusse4@att.net.

POLICY ON WEBELOS ATTENDANCE

Webelos can attend only by invitation of a host Troop. To strengthen the learning opportunity and promote the Webelos to Scout transition, all Webelos and Arrow of Light dens and their parents/leaders are only invited as part of a host troop. Webelos/AoL scouts cannot register independently of a host Troop. In keeping with the BSA's Guide to Safe Scouting, Arrow of Light and Webelos scouts may camp over night when accompanied by a parent (s) or a parent(s) designated (**in writing**) adult guardian (sibling, aunt/uncle, grandparent, etc.). At least one of the attending adults must have completed BALOO training. All Webelos/AoL should be organized into dens of five (5) to eight (8) members. Webelos/AoL will compete as dens against other dens in age appropriate events. Do not allow your invited Webelos to mix with your patrols when competing.

NATIONAL POLICY ON WEBELOS ATTENDANCE

*In keeping with the BSA's Guide to Safe Scouting, Webelos and Arrow of Light cubs may camp over night when accompanied by a parent(s) or a parent(s) designated (**in writing**) adult guardian (sibling, aunt/uncle, grandparent, etc.). All Webelos should be organized into dens. Webelos will compete against other Webelos. Do not allow your invited Webelos to mix with your Boy Scout patrols when competing.*

Webelos and Arrow of Light Den Camping: Each Scout should attend with their parent(s) or guardian(s). A Webelos or Arrow of Light Scout whose parent or legal guardian cannot attend a den overnight camping trip may participate under the supervision of at least two registered leaders. The leaders and a parent or legal guardian must agree to the arrangement, and all Youth Protection policies apply.

Only Webelos and Arrow of Light dens may conduct den coordinated campouts. Webelos and Arrow of Light den coordinated campouts are restricted to no more than two consecutive nights. Den camping only includes the Webelos or Arrow of Light youth. As with pack coordinated campouts, the den must have a BALOO trained adult leader in attendance and all Youth Protection policies apply.

Webelos/Arrow of Light Den Camping may participate and camp at a Scouts BSA troop unit campout. All Cub Scout camping requirements still apply, including the den must have a BALOO trained adult leader in attendance and all Youth Protection policies apply.

All Webelos should be organized into dens. Webelos will compete against other Webelos. Do not allow your invited Webelos to mix with your ScoutBSA patrols when competing.

THE COST and REGISTRATION

The cost is a non-refundable fee of \$15.00 per person. **WEBELOS AND ARROW OF LIGHT DENS MUST REGISTER AS PART OF A HOST TROOP.** Register online at council website. <https://michiganscouting.org/events/>, go to May 2024.

Unit Rosters/Medical Forms

At the Friday evening leaders meeting the unit leader must submit a unit roster and a copy of the BSA Medical Form Parts A and B for each youth and adult attending. The Medical Form Part B will be returned at checkout. Any outstanding fees must be paid at the Friday evening leaders meeting. Please bring your receipt and any required forms with you to the event. All adults and youth spending the day or weekend at camp must register and pay. Although Webelos/AoL scouts and their adult leaders will register with a host troop, they will be asked to submit a separate roster. **The Unit roster form is found in the Appendix.**

HEALTH AND SAFETY

Each unit must provide a roster and a copy of Part A and Part B of the BSA medical form for each scout and adult attending the camporee. The Part B medical forms will be returned to the unit when they checkout. The BSA medical form can be found at https://filestore.scouting.org/filestore/HealthSafety/pdf/680-001_AB.pdf

Each adult leader is responsible for the health and safety of the Scouts/Webelos within his/her unit. Each unit should bring a properly equipped first aid kit. Proper sanitation of hands, food and cooking gear should be maintained when preparing and cooking food. Garbage should be disposed of in garbage bags. Spread dirty dishwater into the woods. **NEVER WASH DISHES AT THE CAMP RESTROOM OR AT THE WATER PUMP!**

Incidents requiring first aid should be treated by the unit. If further assistance is required seek help from the camporee health officer. Please notify staff of any injuries, especially those requiring hospitalization. The District will have a qualified first aider in the staff area.

REMEMBER TWO DEEP LEADERSHIP MUST BE MAINTAINED AT ALL TIMES. Each Patrol or Webelos/AoL den must be accompanied by at least two adults. The Buddy System will be used at all times.

Per BSA policy, Webelos/AoL dens must be accompanied by at least one adult who has completed BALOO training!

PHYSICAL CAMP ARRANGEMENTS

Metro Park Entrance Fees

Each vehicle entering Camp Rotary will be required to have a current annual pass or pay the daily fee to enter. If the vehicle leaves and re-enters on a subsequent day, another daily fee is required. A map will be provided to showing the physical camp arrangements. Park Gates will be open from 6 AM to 10 PM.

Campsites

Remember that all BSA, Youth Protection, and Metro Park rules and regulations apply and must be followed. Vehicles and trailers can be parked near the designated campsite. Fires are only allowed in a designated fire pit or an above ground fire pit that you bring. You must bring your own firewood. We cannot guarantee that picnic tables will be available. Tent Camping only.

Camping will be located at Camp Rotary, Wolcott Mill Metro Park. Camporee staff will assign each troop a campsite prior to the camporee. Units should arrive no earlier than 6 PM on Friday to set up camp. A camp map will be provided.

Digging of any sort, including the digging of fire pits and ditches, is not permitted.

Parking

All vehicles must have a Metro park annual or day sticker. Parking of vehicles and storage of the troop trailer will be in approved area only. A map will be provided. Parking in an unauthorized area will not be permitted and any person found parking in the wrong area will be asked to move their vehicle. There is limited space for parking. All vehicles will be parked in designated parking areas for the weekend.

Restrooms and gray water disposal

Metro Park restrooms will be available for use throughout the event. Do not wash dishes or dispose of gray water in the restroom! Garbage should be disposed of in garbage bags. Spread dirty dishwater into the woods. **NEVER WASH DISHES AT THE CAMP RESTROOM OR AT THE WATER PUMP!**

Photo Releases: The Michigan Crossroads Council and Sunrise District may use photos and videos taken during the event for posting to the District Facebook page. No names will be published when utilizing photographs for Facebook posting. Photo Release form is Part A of the BSA Health Form.

Camporee Camp Rules & Regulations

1. All BSA, Youth Protection, & Metro Park Rules must be adhered to.
2. All Scout Leaders must act in accordance with the Scout Oath and Law, and follow youth protection guidelines, at all times.
3. All rules in the “Guide to Safe Scouting” must be adhered to at all times.
4. Each unit must maintain “Two Deep Leadership” at all times.
5. Scouts must use the buddy system at all times.
6. All youth medications must be administered by the unit leader.
7. All injuries must be reported to the Camporee Health Officer, so they may be logged.
8. Only those registered with the Boy Scouts of America and their parents are allowed to attend.
9. All vehicles must be parked in designated parking areas Friday night till Sunday Morning (approx. 10:00 am)
10. Shoes or Boots must be worn at all times outside of tents. No open toe shoes will be allowed.
11. Leave No Trace Camping rules shall be enforced. Climbing of trees is prohibited. Leave all live trees alone.
12. Lights out means Quiet (Youth and Adults).
13. Use of Offensive Language is prohibited.

14. Possession or use of alcohol, fireworks, or illegal drugs is strictly prohibited. Any violations of this rule will result in notification to the proper authorities and expulsion from camp.
15. **Smoking or vaping of any substance is prohibited at the Spring Camporee.** Any violators will be asked to leave the camporee.
16. Ground Fires are not allowed outside of existing fire rings or above ground fire pits that you bring.
17. All participants are to remain in the Camp Rotary area.
18. The Metro Park does not allow drones to be flown in their parks, please leave your drone at home.
19. **Wading or going into the Clinton River is prohibited.** Any violators will be asked to leave the camporee.

THE PROGRAM

FRIDAY NIGHT:

- Upon arrival at camp go to the Camporee HQ. Staff will direct your unit to its campsite.
- Senior Patrol Leaders and Scoutmasters are invited for a leaders meeting at 9pm. Units will submit rosters, submit BSA Medical Forms Part A&B for all youth and adults, submit campfire skit forms, register for the chili cooking contest, conduct final registration, receive wide game instruction, receive event station score cards, review Camporee rules and understand last minute changes to the program.
- **LIGHTS OUT AT 11:00 p.m.**

SATURDAY:

- All events are based on a patrol/den of five to eight scouts competing.
- After the opening ceremony a camp wide game will be played in order to meet and make new friends. Event stations will start at 10am.
- Each patrol/den will receive score cards and trail maps.

ALL SKILL EVENTS – SATURDAY

Patrols/dens will participate in the following events. Extra points are given for patrol/den flag and yell or cheer. Note: Every Troop is expected to help with the judging of the stations. **Patrol/Den equipment list is found in the Appendix.**

Camp Wide Game – A great way to meet new scout friends!

Nature Scavenger Hunt-Collect and identify native plants! Webelos/AoL will participate! Points for each correctly identified plant.

Catch the Snapper-Use team work to lash a pole long enough to catch the snapper! Scouts will provide scout staves and lashing ropes! Points for time to complete and correct lashings! Webelos/AoL only have to catch the snapper, no lashings involved!

MAY THE 4TH BE WITH YOU!-Han and Chewy need help from the scouts to transport fuel to the Millennium Falcon! Team work is key! Judges will provide the transport device and protective clothing! Points for time to complete. Webelos/AoL will participate!

First Aid-Scenario based situation to analyze and treat! (A sample problem and required equipment is found in the Appendix). Scouts will provide all first aid equipment! Points for correct analysis and treatment! Webelos/AoL will have their own first aid scenario based on First Responder requirements!

Water Boiling-Using no more than two matches, build and light a fire because your Scoutmaster wants a cup of coffee! BYO Wood! Judges will provide matches, fire grate, pot and water! Points for time to complete. Webelos/AoL will learn how to build and light a fire!

Navigator's Nightmare!-Use teamwork to try and not get lost! Scouts will provide compasses! Scouts must know their pace to feet conversion! Points for compass accuracy! Webelos/AoL will learn how to use a compass to navigate!

Chariot Race-The Pythagorean Theorem may come in handy when lashing your chariot to transport a scout on the chariot race course! Scouts will provide staves and lashing rope! Points for time to complete and correct lashings! Webelos/AoL will only have to participate on the race course, no lashing involved!

Fire Brigade Relay! - Scouts and Webelos/AoL will race against time running in a relay race to fill a water container! Points for time to complete! Be prepared to get wet!

"Rescue Me"- Your patrol has to rescue a scout trapped on a "raft". Unfortunately, you don't have one piece of rope long enough to reach the raft. Using first class scout knots, your patrol must tie several ropes together to throw to the raft. The scout on the "raft" must tie a bowline around his/her waist to be pulled to safety. Ropes are supplied by the patrol. Raft is supplied by staff. Score based on time to complete and accuracy of knots tied. Webelos will be give and rope long enough to reach the raft.

Camping Kim's Game - Scouts and Webelos/AoL will be given 20 seconds to review a display of camping items. They will then have 1 minute to remember as many items as the can. Points for each correct item identified.

Iron Chef BSA Chili Cooking Contest (sorry scouts, adults only!)-Instructions in the Appendix

Note: Every Troop is expected to help with the judging of the stations. If we do not have enough volunteers then we will not be able to run all of the stations. Meals are not provided. All judges are to provide their own meals.

CAMPSITE JUDGING

Staff members will inspect and judge each unit's campsite on Saturday. An award for the best campsite will be presented Sunday morning. Campsite inspection score sheet is found in the Appendix.

CAMPOREE WIDE FEAST

For Saturday dinner, we will have a Camporee wide feast. Each unit will cook a dinner entrée or dessert of their choice. Scouts will walk from unit to unit, sampling each other's dinners. Each unit needs to make enough food to share with the other units.

SUNRISE “A FIRST CLASS DISTRICT!”

FELLOWSHIP CAMPFIRE

On Saturday night a Fellowship campfire will take place. All units are encouraged to participate in the fellowship by performing a skit or song. Skit/song entry form is found in the Appendix. Please turn in the entry form at the Friday night leaders meeting.

A SCOUT IS REVERENT

A Scouts’ Own service will occur Saturday evening. All scouts and adult leaders are encouraged to come and practice their duty to God and the twelfth point of the Scout Law.

AWARDS

At the Sunday morning opening ceremony awards for the best patrol, best den, best campsite and best chili will be presented.

APPENDIX

REQUIRED PATROL EQUIPMENT

PATROL EQUIPMENT

Each patrol must carry the following equipment with them on the events:

- 2-Compasses
- 5-6ft Staves
- 1-blanket
- 2-pencils or pens
- 1-clipboard
- 1-notebook
- 1-patrol flag on mast
- 1-Scout Handbook
- 2-20ft lengths of rope
- 10-6ft length of rope for lashing
- 1-first aid kit
- 1-tinder, kindling and fuel to build a fire suitable to boil 4 cups of water
- 1-Scout Neckerchief (or equivalent) per scout

WEBELOS/AoL EQUIPMENT

Each den must carry the following equipment with them on the events:

- 2-Compasses
- 2-pencils or pens
- 1-notebook
- 1-den flag on mast
- 1-Scout Handbook
- 1-first aid kit
- 1-Scout Neckerchief (or equivalent) per Webelos

PERSONAL EQUIPMENT

Each Scout and Webelos must carry (or wear) the following equipment with them on the events:

- hat
- gloves
- boots
- poncho
- water bottle

SAMPLE TROOP PROBLEM

This problem will not be used in our First Aid event; similar problems will be presented to the patrol.

It has been extremely hot afternoon in Portsville, following a morning downpour. Joe Pecks has been working hard in his Electric Shop all day. Near closing time he collapses to the floor. Hasty examination reveals his face and body are covered with cold, clammy sweat; he is bleeding for his left elbow and right thigh. When he tries to raise his body using his left wrist, it will not support his weight. Treat injuries

ANALYSIS: Heat exhaustion.
Wounds on left elbow and right thigh.
A sprained wrist.

TREATMENT: Wrap in blanket.
Offer hot tea or coffee with sugar.
Have someone call the police/EMS department.
Compresses and bandages to elbow and thigh.
Place arm in sling.
Cold application to wrist.
Folded Newspapers to wrist for possible fracture.

Judging criteria: accurate identification of situation and properly applied first aid treatment. Judges will score patrol/den on basis of 1 to 10. Scoring will be done using the score sheets only and will not vary. This is to keep the competition equitable. Any questions about scoring may be addressed to the judge at the time of the event. The Chief Judge will resolve any disputed score.

SAMPLE WEBLOS/AoL PROBLEM

This problem will not be used in our First Aid event; similar problems will be presented to the den.

A man stumbles over a keg of nails in front of Smith's Hardware Store on Cedar Avenue. He receives a deep scratch on his right leg, causing a steady flow of dark red blood. The man claims he feels faint. He suddenly falls unconscious. His face is pale. Treat injuries

ANALYSIS: Deep scratch on right leg
Venous bleeding
Fainting

TREATMENT: Call 911
Treat for shock
Apply bandage to leg wound

Judging criteria: accurate identification of situation and properly applied first aid treatment. Judges will score patrol/den on basis of 1 to 10. Scoring will be done using the score sheets only and will not vary. This is to keep the competition equitable. Any questions about scoring may be addressed to the judge at the time of the event. The Chief Judge will resolve any disputed score.

The following equipment is recommended for the patrol first aid kit.

6 triangular bandages	wooden matches
1-1inch roller bandage	1-scissor
Antiseptic swabs	baking soda
Tongue depressor	compress bandage
Calamine lotion	2-blankets
Soap	1-box of band aids
2 staves (for stretcher)	sterile cotton
Vent-1-breather or equivalent	latex gloves

For Webelos/Arrow of Light dens an individual first aid kit or normal first aid materials from home may be used.

In lieu of certain drugs and equipment, Scouts may dramatize such as saying, "I am now boiling water to make it sterile, etc. The team leader should explain where and how he obtained the imaginary equipment, and the dramatization should be logical in keeping with the problem.

Adult Iron Chef BSA Chili Cooking Contest

Adult Chili Cooking Competition. Adults wishing to compete will register at the Friday night leaders meeting. Each adult will prepare a dish and turn in three serving size portion to be judged. All entrées must have a recipe turned in with dish. Each recipe shall list all the ingredients and complete instructions for preparation. All dishes and recipes must have a name that is clearly displayed at time of judging. Dishes will be prepared during the camporee. Dishes that are not prepared on site will not get full points. The choice of the recipe and seasoning is the adult's decision. Usage of pre-packaged, store-bought foods should be avoided. It is permitted that all seasonings and ingredients can be pre-measured. Each adult will be judged on originality, texture, flavor, smell, appearance, creativity, and use of theme. Each adult will provide its own food, cooking tools and any supplies they need to prepare their dishes. All entries will be taken to the Camporee HQ. Judging will take place at 4:30 pm. The decision of the judges is final.
