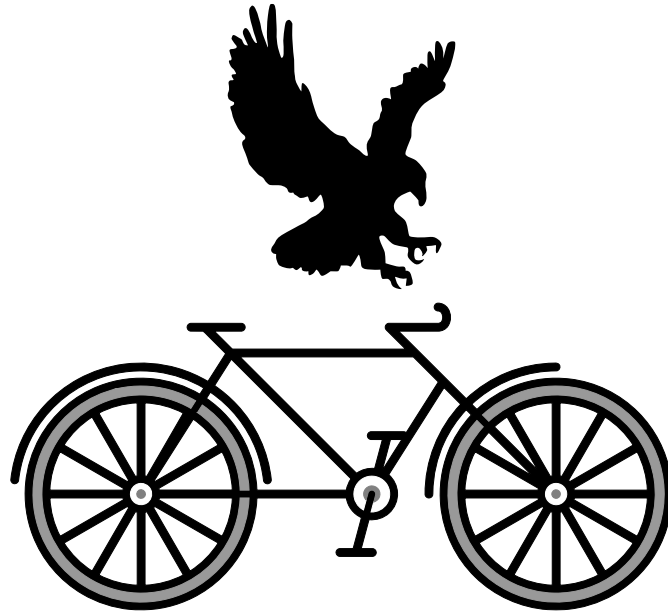

WHO CAN ATTEND?

Sunrise District welcomes all Scouts and Arrow of Light (AoL) scouts to our 2026 Spring Camporee at Camp Rotary, Wolcott Mill Metro Park. This year your patrols/dens will use bicycles to participate in fun and interesting events.

Attend the 2026 January through April Roundtables to learn how your unit can prepare for the Cycling to Eagle Event. If you have questions or wish to help run an event, call the Activities Committee Chairman, Dave Busse dbusse4@att.net.

POLICY ON AOL ATTENDANCE

Arrow of Light (AOL) can attend only by invitation of a host Troop. To strengthen the learning opportunity and promote the AOL to Scout transition, all Arrow of Light dens and their parents/leaders are only invited as part of a host troop. AoL scouts cannot register independently of a host Troop. In keeping with the BSA's Guide to Safe Scouting, Arrow of Light scouts may camp over night when accompanied by a parent (s) or a parent(s) designated (**in writing**) adult guardian (sibling, aunt/uncle, grandparent, etc.). At least one of the attending adults must have completed BALOO training. All AoL scouts should be organized into dens of five (5) to eight (8) members. AoL scouts will compete as dens against other dens in age appropriate events. Do not allow your invited AOL Scouts to mix with your patrols when competing.

NATIONAL POLICY ON AOL ATTENDANCE

*In keeping with the Scouting America's Guide to Safe Scouting, Arrow of Light cubs may camp over night when accompanied by a parent(s) or a parent(s) designated (**in writing**) adult guardian (sibling, aunt/uncle, grandparent, etc.). All AOL scouts should be organized into dens. AOL scouts will compete against other AOL scouts. Do not allow your invited AOL scouts to mix with your Scout patrols when competing.*

Arrow of Light Den Camping: Each Scout should attend with their parent(s) or guardian(s). An Arrow of Light Scout whose parent or legal guardian cannot attend a den overnight camping trip may participate under the supervision of at least two registered leaders. The leaders and a parent or legal guardian must agree to the arrangement, and all Youth Protection policies apply.

Only Arrow of Light dens may conduct den coordinated campouts with Troops. Arrow of Light den coordinated campouts are restricted to no more than two consecutive nights. Den camping only includes the Arrow of Light youth. As with pack coordinated campouts, the den must have a BALOO trained adult leader in attendance and all Youth Protection policies apply.

Arrow of Light Den Camping may participate and camp at a Scouts BSA troop unit campout. All Cub Scout camping requirements still apply, including the den must have a BALOO trained adult leader in attendance and all Youth Protection policies apply.

THE COST and REGISTRATION

The cost is a non-refundable fee of \$20.00 per person. **ARROW OF LIGHT DENS MUST REGISTER AS PART OF A HOST TROOP.** Register online at the council website. <https://michiganscouting.org/events/>, go to May 2026.

Unit Rosters/Medical Forms

At the Friday evening leaders meeting the unit leader must submit a unit roster and a copy of the Scouting America Medical Form Parts A and B for each youth and adult attending. The Medical Form Part B will be returned at checkout. Any outstanding fees must be paid at the Friday evening leaders meeting. Please bring your receipt and any required forms with you to the event. All adults and youth spending the day or weekend at camp must register and pay. Although Webelos/AoL scouts and their adult leaders will register with a host troop, they will be asked to submit a separate roster. **The Unit roster form is found in the Appendix.**

HEALTH AND SAFETY

Each unit must provide a roster and a copy of Part A and Part B of the BSA medical form for each scout and adult attending the camporee. The Part B medical forms will be returned to the unit when they checkout. The BSA medical form can be found at https://filestore.scouting.org/filestore/HealthSafety/pdf/680-001_AB.pdf

Each adult leader is responsible for the health and safety of the Scouts/Webelos within his/her unit. Each unit should bring a properly equipped first aid kit. Proper sanitation of hands, food and cooking gear should be maintained when preparing and cooking food. Garbage should be disposed of in garbage bags. Spread dirty dishwater into the woods. **NEVER WASH DISHES AT THE CAMP RESTROOM OR AT THE WATER PUMP!**

Each adult and youth attending will receive a wristband which they must wear during the Camporee. This will help identify our youth and provide a layer of protection considering we will be biking in a public area.

Incidents requiring first aid should be treated by the unit. If further assistance is required seek help from the camporee health officer. Please notify staff of any injuries, especially those requiring hospitalization. The District will have a qualified first aider in the staff area.

REMEMBER TWO DEEP LEADERSHIP MUST BE MAINTAINED AT ALL TIMES. Each Patrol or Webelos/AoL den must be accompanied by at least two adults. The Buddy System will be used at all times.

Per BSA policy, AoL dens must be accompanied by at least one adult who has completed BALOO training!

PHYSICAL CAMP ARRANGEMENTS

Metro Park Entrance Fees

Each vehicle entering Camp Rotary will be required to have a current annual pass or pay the daily fee to enter. If the vehicle leaves and re-enters on a subsequent day, another daily fee is required.

A map will be provided to showing the physical camp arrangements. Park Gates will be open from 6 AM to 10 PM.

Campsites

Remember that all Scouting America, Safeguarding Youth Protection, and Metro Park rules and regulations apply and must be followed. Vehicles and trailers can be parked near the designated campsite. Fires are only allowed in a designated fire pit or an above ground fire pit that you bring. You must bring your own firewood. We cannot guarantee that picnic tables will be available. Tent Camping only.

Camping will be located at Camp Rotary, Wolcott Mill Metro Park. Camporee staff will assign each troop a campsite prior to the camporee. Units should arrive no earlier than 6 PM on Friday to set up camp. A camp map will be provided.

Digging of any sort, including the digging of fire pits and ditches, is not permitted.

Parking

All vehicles must have a Metro Park annual or day sticker. Parking of vehicles and storage of the troop trailer will be in approved area only. A map will be provided. Parking in an unauthorized area will not be permitted and any person found parking in the wrong area will be asked to move their vehicle. There is limited space for parking. All vehicles will be parked in designated parking areas for the weekend.

Restrooms and gray water disposal

Metro Park restrooms will be available for use throughout the event. Do not wash dishes or dispose of gray water in the restroom! Garbage should be disposed of in garbage bags. Spread dirty dishwater into the woods. **NEVER WASH DISHES AT THE CAMP RESTROOM OR AT THE WATER PUMP!**

Photo Releases: The Michigan Crossroads Council and Sunrise District may use photos and videos taken during the event for posting to the District Facebook page. No names will be published when utilizing photographs for Facebook posting. Photo Release form is Part A of the BSA Health Form.

Camporee Camp Rules & Regulations

1. All Scouting America, Safeguarding Youth Protection, & Metro Park Rules must be adhered to.
2. All Scout Leaders must act in accordance with the Scout Oath and Law, and follow youth protection guidelines, at all times.
3. All rules in the "Guide to Safe Scouting" must be adhered to at all times.
4. Each unit must maintain "Two Deep Leadership" at all times.
5. Scouts must use the buddy system at all times.
6. All youth medications must be administered by the unit leader.
7. All injuries must be reported to the Camporee Health Officer, so they may be logged.
8. Only those registered with Scouting America and their parents are allowed to attend.

9. All vehicles must be parked in designated parking areas Friday night till Sunday Morning (approx. 10:00 am)
10. Shoes or Boots must be always worn outside of tents. No open toe shoes will be allowed.
11. Leave No Trace Camping rules shall be enforced. Climbing trees is prohibited. Leave all live trees alone.
12. Lights out means Quiet (Youth and Adults).
13. Use of Offensive Language is prohibited.
14. Possession or use of alcohol, fireworks, or illegal drugs is strictly prohibited. Any violations of this rule will result in notification to the proper authorities and expulsion from camp.
15. **Smoking or vaping of any substance is prohibited at the Fall Camporee.** Any violators will be asked to leave the camporee.
16. Ground Fires are not allowed outside of existing fire rings or above ground fire pits that you bring.
17. All participants are to remain in the Camp Rotary area.
18. The Metro Park does not allow drones to be flown in their parks, please leave your drone at home.
19. **Wading or going into the Clinton River is prohibited.** Any violators will be asked to leave the camporee.

THE PROGRAM

FRIDAY NIGHT:

- Upon arrival at camp go to the Camporee HQ and staff will direct you to your campsite.
- Final check-in will be at Camporee HQ at 9pm.
- Senior Patrol Leaders and Scoutmasters are invited for a leader meeting at 9:30pm. Units will submit rosters, submit BSA Medical Forms Part A&B for all youth and adults, submit campfire skit forms, conduct final registration, receive event station score cards, review Camporee rules and understand last minute changes to the program.
- LIGHTS OUT AT 11:00 p.m.

SATURDAY:

- All events are based on a patrol/den of five to eight scouts competing.
- Troops participating only on Saturday will check-in at 8:30am at the Camporee HQ.
- At 9am all patrol/den will assemble at the main flagpole for the opening ceremony.
- A bike safety session conducted by police officers will take place at Camporee HQ starting at 9:15 am.
- During the safety session bike inspection checks will take place at Camporee HQ.
- Event stations will start at 10:00 am.
- Each patrol/den will receive score cards and trail maps.
- As a courtesy and service to your unit the district health and safety team will inspect troop first aid kits. The team will recommend items to be replaced due to age and items to add to help ensure youth and adult safety.

Guide to Safe Scouting - Bicycle Safety

Follow these basic safety tips when you ride.

- **Wear a properly fitted helmet.** Protect your brain; save your life! Bicycle helmets can reduce head injuries by 85 percent, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).
- **Adjust your bicycle to fit.** Make sure you can stand over the top tube of your bicycle.
- **Assure bicycle readiness.** Make sure all parts are secure and working well. Assure that tires are fully inflated and brakes are working properly.
- **See and be seen.** Wear clothing that makes you more visible, such as bright neon or fluorescent colors. Wear reflective clothing or tape. Avoid riding at night.
- **Watch for and avoid road hazards.** Stay alert at all times. Be on the lookout for hazards, such as potholes, broken glass, gravel, puddles, leaves, animals, or anything that could cause you to crash. If you are riding with friends and you are in the lead, call out and point to the hazard to alert the riders behind you.
- **Follow the rules of the road.** Check and obey all local traffic laws. Always ride on the right side of the road in the same direction as other vehicles. Go with the flow—not against it! Yield to traffic and watch for parked cars.

Camporee Highlights:

LAW ENFORCEMENT BIKE SAFETY LECTURE

A law enforcement officer will discuss bike riding safety with all scouts Saturday morning.

BIKE RAFFLE

A new girl's bicycle and a new boy's bicycle each with a new helmet will be raffled. Each registered scout will receive a raffle ticket at the Friday night leaders meeting.

CAMPSITE JUDGING

Staff members will inspect and judge each unit's campsite on Saturday. An award for the best campsite will be presented Sunday morning. The campsite inspection score sheet is found in the Appendix.

CAMP WIDE FEAST

Each troop is asked to prepare an entrée to share for Saturday dinner. All will eat at the picnic pavilion, sharing a meal in friendship and fellowship.

WARREN ASTRONOMICAL SOCIETY OBSERVATORY

The Warren Astronomical Society will have its observatory open after the Saturday evening fellowship campfire. All scouts and adults are invited to learn more about astronomy.

Summary of Camporee Events

Patrols/dens will participate in the following events. Extra points are given for patrol/den flag and yell or cheer. Note: Every Troop is expected to help with the judging of the stations. Event descriptions, rules and scoring instructions will be supplied. A Troop may run more than one event based on adult participation. Adults and judges may ride bicycles (with helmets of course) but no adult patrols will compete. Each patrol must register by 9:00pm Friday night. **Patrol/Den equipment list is found in the Appendix.**

Awards:

Awards will be given and determined as follows:

- First, Second, Third award Best Overall ----- total → 3 awards
- Best Decorated (Determined by Judges)-----total → 1 award
- Patrol Spirit Award – determined by judges -----total → 1 award

Attendees:

Participants are classified into two categories:

- 1) Riders
- 2) Non-Riders

Rides are those who have a bicycle and helmet and will travel throughout the events by cycling. Scouts who don't own a bike may use another scout's bike/helmet for the events. Non-Riders are those who do not have either a bicycle or helmet who must travel on foot from one event to another. A distinct visible wristband will identify all participants.

Equipment:

Besides the "normal" camping equipment / food used by a Troop and/or Patrol during a campout, a Scout should bring his/her bicycle and helmet to participate fully in the camporee events. Refer to the

attached *National BSA Guidelines* pertaining to bicycle activities. Please pay particular attention to the helmet standards. Under NO EXCEPTIONS Scouts will not be allowed to ride without the proper helmet. It is recommended that the attached flier is duplicated and distributed among your Scouts as a reminder of the helmet certification policy.

RIDER CATEGORY EVENTS (*Personal Bicycle and Helmet Required*)

All riders will be required to undergo a helmet and bicycle inspection. Scoutmasters should ensure their scouts are wearing ANSI certified, well fitted helmets prior to the camporee. The scout's bike will receive a safety inspection at the Bike Inspection Station. (Refer to the Bike Inspection Sheet in the Appendix for details.)

1. Bike Inspection

- All bikes will be inspected based on inspection criteria derived from the Cycling Merit Badge Book.
- Each participant will start with 100 total points when something is found wrong with the bike points will be subtracted from the total. 1st, 2nd, & 3rd places will be determined by averaging individual patrol member scores to determine a patrol score.

Procedure:

A bicycle inspector will review each bike with the scout present and have a recorder note the results

2. Top of the Hill

- Scouts will test their stamina by racing their bikes individually up a steep hill to determine the "Top of the Hill". Scouts unable to ride the complete length/height of the hill will run or walk to the finish line with the bike. Total time from start line to finish line will be recorded. The winning patrol will be determined by lowest averaging time.

Procedure:

At a determined signal, the scout will attempt to ride to the finish line at the top of the hill. Judges will record the individual times and calculate an average time for each patrol.

3. Fix a Flat

- Bicyclists will be required to:
 - remove the front tire from a bike, provided by staff
 - remove the tire and tube from the rim
 - determine where the leak is
 - fix the leak
 - reassemble the tire and wheel
 - inflate the fixed tire
 - travel 50 feet on the fixed bike
- The patrol with the lowest elapsed time wins.

Procedure:

Scouts will be given a bicycle with a flat tire and timed following the requirements defined above. Judges will ensure all steps are followed and the tire is properly inflated.

4. Slalom Course

- Scouts will ride a slalom course in a timed event.
- The winner will be determined by lowest average patrol time.

Note:

There are TWO Safety related designated “MUST WALK ZONES” on this course. Participants observed attempting to ride in these designated areas will cause the patrol to be disqualified!

Procedure:

Patrols will ride a marked course against the clock. Judges will record the start time and the time the last patrol rider crosses the finish line.

5. 100-foot Dash

- Scouts will travel a 100-foot straight course in a timed event.
- The winner will be determined by lowest average patrol time.

Procedure:

Patrols will pick their best rider to ride a marked straight course against the clock. Judges will record the time the rider crosses the finish line.

NON-RIDER CATEGORY EVENTS (NO Personal Bicycle Required)

6. Cycling First Aid

- Travelling on a bicycle, what would you do if one of your patrol members had an accident?
- Patrols will be scored on how effectively they handle an emergency situation.
- Note: This event will be opened to AoL and scout patrols. The situation will be different for the two groups.

Procedure:

Judges will introduce the patrol to an emergency situation and rate their performance based on an established rating system. Patrols should carry a first aid kit (a list of required equipment is found in the Appendix). Example first aid problem is found in the Appendix.

7. Name that Part

- Do you know all the parts of a bicycle? Check out the Cycling MB book.
- Patrols will be asked to identify (by the correct name) random bicycle parts. The patrol with the most correct answers wins.

Procedure:

Judges will point to different parts of a bike for scouts to identify. (Ten minutes maximum time allowed)

8. Rules of the Road

- Which side of the street does a cyclist travel on? What are the differences between cyclists and motor vehicle laws? Who has the right-of-way... motor vehicles or cycles? These are just a few of the rules you need to know for this event.
- Patrols will be given a questionnaire pertaining to current bicycle rules of the road. The Patrol with the most correct answers wins.

Procedure:

Judges will hand out worksheets to the patrol to fill out. (Ten minutes maximum time allowed)

9. Geocaching

- The patrol will follow waypoints to complete find a geocache.
- The patrol with the lowest overall time wins.
- **Note: This event will be opened to AoL and scout patrols.**

Procedure:

Patrols will be given waypoints on a GPS receiver to find a cache. The event will be timed from the start signal of the judges until a designated patrol rider crosses the finish line.

SECURITY:

An unfortunate reality of today's environment is that the camporee staff cannot be responsible for the security of your bikes. PLEASE --- PLEASE --- bring a bike lock and lock your bikes together at night.

SAFETY NOTICE

Please be aware!!!! During the Camporee, bicycles will be used by the Scouts while participating in the various events. All Scouts riding a bicycle are REQUIRED to wear a helmet while operating a bicycle. NO EXCEPTIONS.

If a Scout fails to abide in this safety guideline, his bicycle will be confiscated, returned to his Scoutmaster and the Scout will not be allowed to participate in the Rider category of events. He will be able, however, to continue to participate in the Civilian category.

The following is the *National BSA Guidelines* regarding events using bicycles. Please make note of the helmet certifications. If your helmet is not LABELED with one of the two certifications, the helmet will NOT be allowed to be used, and the Scout will not be able to participate in the Rider category.

Helmets and Clothing

All cyclists must wear a properly sized and fitted helmet approved by either the Snell Memorial Foundation or the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) standards. Layer your clothing for warmth on cool days so you can avoid chilling or overheating. Cover up for sun protection on clear days.

A SCOUT IS REVERENT

A Scouts' Own service will occur Saturday evening. All scouts and adult leaders are encouraged to come and practice their duty to God and the twelfth point of the Scout Law.

FELLOWSHIP CAMPFIRE AND RAFFLE, OH MY!

On Saturday night a Fellowship campfire will take place. The winning raffle tickets for the bicycle and helmet will be drawn. All units are encouraged to participate in the fellowship by performing a skit or song. Skit/song entry form is found in the Appendix. Please turn in the entry form at the Friday night leaders meeting.

AWARDS

Awards will be presented at the Sunday morning closing ceremony. Awards for the top three patrols, the best decorated bike, best campsite, best Halloween campsite and best scout spirit will be presented.

SCOUT CAMP BEHAVIOR

It is the duty of every Senior Patrol Leader and Scoutmaster to maintain discipline, with these guidelines

1. You will be **TRUSTWORTHY** and not enter another camp without permission.
2. You will be **LOYAL** to your Troop and Patrol and do your best.
3. You will be **HELPFUL** and we will make this a great Camporee.
4. You will be **FRIENDLY** and applaud, never boo a fellow Scout's effort at the campfire.
5. You will be **COURTEOUS** and **KIND** and maintain lights out from 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
6. You will be **OBEDIENT** and follow directions. This will help you win events and the staff will appreciate it.
7. You will be **THRIFTY** with our resources and keep a **CLEAN** camp.
8. You will be **BRAVE** and **CHEERFUL**, if it rains/snows.
9. You will be **REVERENT** and pray for good weather.

APPENDIX

REQUIRED PATROL EQUIPMENT

PATROL EQUIPMENT

Each patrol must carry the following equipment with them on the events:

- 2-Compasses
- 1-blanket
- 2-pencils or pens
- 1-clipboard
- 1-notebook
- 1-patrol flag on mast
- 1-Scout Handbook
- 10-6ft lengths of rope
- 1-first aid kit
- 1-Scout Neckerchief (or equivalent) per scout

AoL EQUIPMENT

Each den must carry the following equipment with them on the events:

- 2-Compasses
- 2-pencils or pens
- 1-notebook
- 1-den flag on mast
- 1-Scout Handbook
- 1-first aid kit
- 1-Scout Neckerchief (or equivalent) per AoL scout

PERSONAL EQUIPMENT

Each Scout and AoL scout must carry (or wear) the following equipment with them on the events:

- hat
- boots
- poncho
- water bottle

SAMPLE TROOP FIRST AID PROBLEM

This problem will not be used in our First Aid event; similar problems will be presented to the patrol.

It has been extremely hot afternoon in Portsville, following a morning downpour. Joe Pecks has been working hard in his Electric Shop all day. Near closing time he collapses to the floor. Hasty examination reveals his face and body are covered with cold, clammy sweat; he is bleeding for his left elbow and right thigh. When he tries to raise his body using his left wrist, it will not support his weight. Treat injuries

- ANALYSIS:** Heat exhaustion.
Wounds on left elbow and right thigh.
A sprained wrist.
- TREATMENT:** Wrap in blanket.
Offer hot tea or coffee with sugar.
Have someone call the police/EMS department.
Compresses and bandages to elbow and thigh.
Place arm in sling.
- Cold application to wrist.
Folded Newspapers to wrist for possible fracture.

Judging criteria: accurate identification of situation and properly applied first aid treatment. Judges will score patrol/den on basis of 1 to 10. Scoring will be done using the score sheets only and will not vary. This is to keep the competition equitable. Any questions about scoring may be addressed to the judge at the time of the event. The Chief Judge will resolve any disputed score.

SAMPLE AOL PROBLEM

This problem will not be used in our First Aid event; similar problems will be presented to the den.

A man stumbles over a keg of nails in front of Smith's Hardware Store on Cedar Avenue. He receives a deep scratch on his right leg, causing a steady flow of dark red blood. The man claims he feels faint. He suddenly falls unconscious. His face is pale. Treat injuries

- ANALYSIS:** Deep scratch on right leg
Venous bleeding
Fainting
- TREATMENT:** Call 911
Treat for shock
Apply bandage to leg wound

Judging criteria: accurate identification of situation and properly applied first aid treatment. Judges will score patrol/den on basis of 1 to 10. Scoring will be done using the score sheets only and will not vary.

This is to keep the competition equitable. Any questions about scoring may be addressed to the judge at the time of the event. The Chief Judge will resolve any disputed score.

The following equipment is recommended for the patrol first aid kit.

6 triangular bandages	wooden matches
1-1 inch roller bandage	1-scissor
Antiseptic swabs	baking soda
Tongue depressor	compress bandage
Calamine lotion	2-blankets
Soap	1-box of band aids
2 staves (for stretcher)	sterile cotton
Vent-1-breather or equivalent	latex gloves

For Arrow of Light dens an individual first aid kit or normal first aid materials from home may be used.

In lieu of certain drugs and equipment, Scouts may dramatize such as saying, "I am now boiling water to make it sterile, etc. The team leader should explain where and how he obtained the imaginary equipment, and the dramatization should be logical in keeping with the problem.

Bicycle Safety Checklist (Taken from the Cycling MB book)

Use this list to be sure your bike is ready for inspection—and the road or trail.

■ ■ Frame (1)—Clean and not bent out of shape. No cracks at frame joints (2).

■ ■ Front fork (3)—Clean and not bent out of shape. No cracks at fork joints (4).

■ ■ Headset bearing (5)—Well lubricated; turns freely with no binding. No perceptible play in the assembly.

■ ■ Bottom-bracket bearing (6)—Turns freely with no more than barely perceptible play in the bearing.

■ ■ Crank arms (7)—Clean and not bent out of shape. Tightened securely on the crankset axle (8).

■ ■ Chainrings (9)—Clean, not worn, and not bent out of shape. Chainring bolts (10) tightened securely to hold chainrings to crank arms.

■ ■ Pedals (11)—Tightly screwed into crank arm. Flat bearings well-lubricated; turn freely with no perceptible play in the bearing. (12) or clipless pedals functional.

■ ■ Wheels (13)—Run true and round. Centered in fork or frame/dropouts. Wheel securely attached by either nuts, quick releases, or thru axles. (14).

■ ■ Wheel bearings (15) in hubs—Well lubricated and properly adjusted to move freely with no more than barely perceptible play.

■ ■ Spokes (16)—None broken or bent. Tightened to a uniform tension.

■ ■ Tires—Good tread (17). Valves (18) completely airtight. Properly inflated to recommended pressure.

■ ■ Rims (19)—Clean of oil and grime. Free of dents or kinks.

■ ■ Chain (20)—Proper tension, allowing 1/2 inch of play. No stiff links. Clean, lubricated, and wiped of excess lubrication.

■ ■ Gearing (21)—Clean and oiled. Three-speed gears adjusted to eliminate all slipping. Front (22a) and rear (22b) derailleurs adjusted for proper shifting with shifters (22c).

■ Brakes (23)

— Coaster: even braking. Operate within a 20-degree back-pedaling motion.

— Hand: even braking. All nuts, screws and bolts tight. Front and rear brakes work without binding. Minimum of 3/16 inch of rub on rim brake pads (24) or 3 millimeters of thickness on disc brake pads. Brake pads properly aligned with rims or discs and contact with a minimum movement of brake levers (25). No squeal when brakes are used.

■ Cables (26)—No frayed ends. No broken strands. All taut.

■ Handlebars (27)—Tightened securely. Grips (28) not worn; fit snugly. Adjusted to comfort of rider. Ends (29) plugged.

■ Saddle (30)—Height, tilt, and fore/aft position adjusted to rider. All adjustments securely tightened. Seatpost (31) not extended beyond maximum mark on post.

■ Rear red reflectors/lights (32)—Visible for 300 feet. Lights/blinkers functional with generator or batteries.

■ Bike registration—If required by local law, must be displayed on frame.

■ Lights (optional)—Front light visible for 500 feet. Generator or battery in good operating condition.

■ Bell or horn (optional)—In good operating condition. All accessories well-tightened and securely fastened. No broken frames or fasteners
