THIS IS PROCTORED EVENT ASSESSING A SCOUT'S FIRST AID KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS
The top 3 scoring teams in each track will receive an award

A team of 3-4 Scouts from your unit will visit four stations where they'll be presented with various scenarios requiring them to assess the situation and deliver appropriate first aid.

The Scene: “Patients” appear in realistic scenarios using first aid training aids, CPR mannequins, and make-up.

A first responder / trained Scout leader will evaluate the team's first aid skills and provide feedback/ coaching.

Who Should Attend: Registered youth in Scouts BSA, Venturing, Exploring or Arrow of Light Cub Scouts.

- **Use** the link or QR code below to register.
- **Enter** the # of Scouts and the # of Teams participating.
- **Choose** a skill track: **Basic, Advanced or Arrow Of Light**.
- **Apply for a preferred start time:** You will receive an email within 1-2 days following registration to apply for your preferred **90-minute** time slot between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. **Preference offered to early registrants.**

SCOUTS WILL BE ASSESSED ON SKILLS EXPECTED FOR ONE OF THREE TRACKS:

Basic track - focus on first aid skills learned for Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class ranks.

Advanced track - focus on First Aid merit badge required skills, and at least one scenario with multiple patients and multiple challenges.

NEW! **Arrow of Light** First Aid Cub Scout Adventure - focus on skills for first aid skills in requirements 2-6.

BE PREPARED TO TREAT PATIENTS WITH...

Burns, sprains, cuts, bruises, broken bones, snake bites, hypothermia, dehydration, not breathing, choking, stroke, heart attack and signs of shock.

ADULT AND YOUTH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Patients • Proctors • 911 Dispatchers • Support staff

Volunteers receive training before and on the day of the event. Proctors must be certified first aid providers.



FAQ First Aid Rally



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Q: Will this be a safe event?

A: Yes, safety is the top priority for this event. Multiple personnel from the Troy Fire Department will be monitoring the event for safety.

Q: What should I bring?

A: Each youth team should bring their own first aid kit and be prepared to administer first aid appropriate to the Track they sign up for. "Training" tourniquets will be provided.

Q: Is there any special equipment I should be prepared to use?

A: Advanced Track Participants: Be prepared to use a fire extinguisher (provided by event staff).

Q: What should I wear?

A: Youth participants should wear their Scout uniform. For those in the Advanced Track, you will be outside for your last station, so dress warmly. You will be outside for about 20 minutes.

Q: Does each team need to be supervised by 2 registered adult leaders?

A: No — however, each unit should have at least 2 adults at the event.

Q: How long will it take to complete the stations?

A: Each team should plan on being at the event for 90 - 120 minutes. Each team will spend a maximum of 20 minutes at each of the four stations. Youth will provide first aid care at each station and then receive coaching / feedback from the adult proctor. Before or after the team completes their stations, there may be other learning opportunities available.

Q: How will the first aid care be evaluated?

A: The Scouts BSA Handbook and First Aid merit badge pamphlet will be the basis for evaluation.

Q: Who will evaluate the first aid care delivered by the youth?

A: Evaluation / coaching / feedback will be provided by a combination of adult first responders and Scout leaders trained in first aid / CPR.



Q: Who can volunteer?

A: Any youth or adult associated with Scouting or a first responder agency may volunteer. If the youth is in kindergarten-6th grade, a parent/guardian must attend with the youth. In fact, both the youth(s) and parent/guardian can volunteer at the same first aid station.

Q: How long are volunteers needed?

A: Volunteers may sign up to attend the morning block (8:15 a.m. – 12:00 p.m.), the afternoon block (11:15 a.m. – 4:15 p.m.), or both. Food and drinks will be provided for volunteers.

Q: What will volunteers do?

A: Volunteers will serve in one of three different roles, depending on your age and training:

- **Patient** – anyone, any age, can be a patient. We may ask you to arrive early so we can put make-up on you.
- **"911 Dispatcher"** – any adult or youth age 16 or older can serve as a 911 dispatcher. We will provide training and a script to follow on the day of the event.
- **Proctor** – any trained adult can serve as proctor who will monitor the first aid care and provide feedback to youth participants.

Training for Proctors and 911 dispatchers will be held 1-2 weeks before the event (approximately 1 hour, either in-person or via Zoom).

All volunteers will participate in a safety briefing / program overview the morning of the event.



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
