Earning this merit badge helps a Scout to be prepared by learning the actions that can be helpful and needed before, during, and after an emergency.

6c. Find out who is your community's emergency management director and learn what this person does to prevent, protect, mitigate, respond to, and recover from emergency situations in your community. Discuss this information with your counselor, utilizing the information you learned from requirement 2b

7b. Prepare a written plan for mobilizing your troop when needed to do emergency service. If there is already a plan, explain it. Tell your part in making it work.

8b. Prepare a personal emergency service pack for a mobilization call. Prepare a family kit (suitcase or waterproof box) for use by your family in case an emergency evacuation is needed. Explain the needs and uses of the contents.

Do ONE of the following:

9a. Using a safety checklist approved by your counselor, inspect your home for potential hazards. Explain the hazards you find and how they can be corrected. 9b. Review or develop a plan of escape for your family in case of fire in your home.

- (c) The results of the project

They investigate thematic elements, game play elements, and game analysis. They analyze an existing game and design a new game. Finally, Scouts explore careers related to game design.

- 1. Do the following:
- (a) Analyze four games you have played, each from a different medium. Identify the medium, player format, objectives, rules, resources, and theme (if relevant). Discuss with your counselor the play experience, what you enjoy in each game, and what you dislike. Make a chart to compare and contrast the games.
- (b) Describe four types of play value and provide an example of a game built around each concept. Discuss with your counselor other reasons people play games.

#7 will hopefully be completed in session, and there may be time after to complete, otherwise it will need to be done after.

- 7. Blind test your game. Do the following:
- (a) Write an instruction sheet that includes all of the information needed to play the game. Clearly describe how to set up the game, play the game, and end the game. List the game objectives.
- (b) Share your prototype from requirement 6 with a group of players that has not played it or witnessed a previous playtest. Provide them with your instruction sheet (s) and any physical components. Watch them play the game, but do not provide them with instruction. Record their feedback in your game design notebook.
- (c) Share your game design notebook with your counselor. Discuss the player reactions to your project and what you learned about the game design process. Based on your testing, determine what you like most about your game and suggest one or more changes.

There will be time to play board games after sessions if that is a time to fulfill this requirement.

A GPS (Global Positioning System) unit is an electronic tool that shows you where to go based on information it gets from satellites in space.

In the log, also list the weather forecasts from radio or television at the same time each day and show how the weather really turned out.

10. Give a talk of at least five minutes to a group explaining the outdoor safety rules in the event of lightning, flash floods, and tornadoes. Before your talk, share your outline with your counselor for approval.
