CAMPSITE RESERVATON

Campsites will be assigned depending on the size and needs of the troop. Most campsites have a shelter with electricity, lights, fans, a fire ring, and picnic tables. Troops must bring their tents, cots, and sleeping gear. Each tent must have a sign attached to the tent that says **"NO FLAMES IN TENT"**, to comply with the NCAP Standards.

UNIT LEADERS

REMEMBER THE FOLLOWING

If an adult leader needs electricity for a medical device, make sure that you let the camp staff know in your registration. All youth and adults must be registered Boy Scouts of America members. All adults must have current Youth Protection Training. Youth members sharing a tent must be at most two years apart in age. Scouts BSA youth members cannot share a tent with their parents. Male and female adults must have separate tenting arrangements provided unless they are married.

LINKED TROOPS

Let us know as soon as possible for **"linked" troops** who need to share a campsite and leadership. Your charter partner will need to provide approval for the units to share a campsite.

НАММОСК

For the safety of the participants that use hammocks, we ask that hang them at height no more than the waist height of the user at the center point while empty. Hammocks cannot be tied to the metal tent frames or shelters. Hammocks will be secured to stable trees in and around the campsite area, but out of main paths and walkways.

UNIT LEADER INFORMATION

UNIT LEADER EXPECTATIONS

The camp staff and volunteers at Hood Scout Reservation want to ensure that your Scouts and adult leaders receive the promise of Scouting, which is fun and adventure. We can only do this if you communicate with the camp leadership. There will be times when you can speak daily with the camp director and key camp leaders. We also have an open-door policy where you can talk to any camp leadership about anything you need to share. We ask that you complete the camp surveys on paper and electronically. These opportunities make the Hood Scout Reservation Winter Camp Program better for you and other Scouts. We also ask the unit leaders to be **"ACTIVELY"** engaged and supervising their Scouts throughout the day and when their Scouts are at the central showers.

UNIT LEADER REQUIREMENTS

The Andrew Jackson Council and the Hood Scout Reservation follow the Boy Scouts of America policies concerning adult leadership requirements.

FOR SCOUTS BSA TROOPS

Two adult leaders at least twenty-one years old and currently registered with the Boy Scouts of America must always be present. The adult leaders must have current Youth Protection Training. Scouts BSA Girl Troop must have at least one twenty-one-year-old female registered with the Boy Scouts of America. If a unit needs help in meeting these requirements, we will work with you to place another qualified adult leader.

FOR WEBELOS & ARROW OF LIGHT DENS

Webelos and Arrow of Light Den Leaders must meet the requirement above.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Scouts, adult leaders, staff, volunteers, and visitors will be expected to exemplify the Scout Oath and Law and the <u>Scouter's Code of Conduct</u> while at Hood Scout Reservation.

ТОВАССО

Our Scout Oath reminds us to keep ourselves physically strong, and our Scout Law reminds us to be clean. The use of tobacco products adversely affects our bodies and may cause cancer. Smoking, chewing tobacco, Vaping, and electronic cigarettes are not permitted at Hood Scout Reservation.

FIREARMS & FIREWORKS

No fireworks should used at Hood Scout Reservation. If you have a registered firearm, we ask that you leave them locked in your vehicle or check them in at the Shooting Sports Area.

VEHICLES

Only vehicles pulling trailers or trucks carrying troop equipment will be allowed past the main gate. All other vehicles will need to be parked in the parking lot. Trucks pulling trailers can drop and secure them in front of the campsite. Please remember to lock your vehicles and pocket your keys.

ALCOHOL & DRUGS

Possession or use of any alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, or the misuse of any prescribed drugs is expressly prohibited. Groups or participants violating this policy will be asked to leave Hood Scout Reservation immediately.

FUELS & OUTSIDE FIREWOOD

Propane & liquid fuels are allowed at camp; an adult leader must supervise their use. Please dispose of empty propane containers properly. Hood Scout Reservation's Conservation and Forestry Plan does not permit out-side firewood from being brought to Hood Scout Reservation. You can gather fallen limbs and wood from around your campsite. If you need additional firewood, please inform the camp commissioner. Fires are permitted, but only in a fire ring. Before building a fire, confirm that Hood Scout Reservation is not under a fire ban.

PET POLICY

Participants and visitors are not permitted to bring dogs or other animals to Hood Scout Reservation except verifiable service animals for those requiring it.

The owner must provide proof of training from a recognized service animal training

provider. The owner must also provide documentation that the animal is of temperament to be unaffected in its abilities to do its trained tasks when exposed to the camp environment, which at times can subject the animal to visual and auditory input such as large crowds, bike riders, gunshots, and other non-typical stimuli.

The animal must wear the proper service animal harness, etc.

HEALTH & SAFETY

The Hood Scout Reservation Health Lodge is staffed twenty-four hours a day by two qualified healthcare professionals under the direct supervision of a licensed doctor. Please note that our health lodge staff cannot offer physical exams.

ANNUAL HEALTH AND MEDICAL FORMS

Anyone staying at Hood Scout Reservation must have a current Annual Health and Medical Form (Parts A, B, C) on file at Health Lodge. Any Annual Health and Medical forms left after winter camp will disposed of immediately. Participants cannot stay at camp without a current Annual Health and Medical Form.

TRANSPORTATION

The unit leader will transport Scouts and adult leaders needing transportation for non-emergency medical services. In cases of serious medical emergencies, a vehicle via ambulance is available. The closest hospital is Copiah County Medical Center in Hazlehurst, MS.

If a unit leader or Scout needs special transportation while on camp, they must inform the camp director or staff adviser as soon as possible. The camp ranger must approve using golf carts or UTVs before the unit arrives at Hood Scout Reservation. The golf cart or UTV driver will need to complete the required training as required by the NCAP standards. Only the Scout and his buddy can ride on the golf cart or UTV if transporting a Scout.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

MEDICATIONS

During the medical recheck, adult Leaders will turn in all Scouts' medications to the health officer. Parents should send all medications in the original packaging and provide instructions on dispensing the medication. Parents should label all medicines with the Scout's name and troop number. Scouts can keep medication, such as an inhaler or Epi-pen. Adults may keep all of their medications.

SPECIAL DIETARY NEEDS

Any Scout or adult leader with a particular dietary need must email the winter camp staff advisor at least two weeks before the person arrives at camp. Our food service committee will work with the parent or guardian to ensure that we meet the Scout's or adult leader's dietary needs. During the medical recheck, the health officer will identify the Scout or adult leader with any allergies and inform the dining hall manager. Scouts and adult leaders must identify themselves to the dining hall manager when going through the line to ensure they get the correct meal.

Our staff and volunteers have undergone training so that they are prepared to respond to assist during an emergency. We have written agreements with the sheriff's department, emergency management, and the local hospital.

During an emergency, an Adult leaders' first responsiblity is to their unit. Listen to and follow the direction given by the staff. In your campsite guide there is a list of procedures during an emergrency.

WILDLIFE

Be mindful of local wildlife. Around Hood Scout Reservation, snakes, spi- ders, raccoons, and other wildlife are commonplace. We have deer, turkey, and wild hogs on the property. Ensure not to leave food or trash unat- tended in your tent or campsite. There is a trash can with a lid at each camp- site. Let the camp commissioner know if your trash can needs a cover. Please check your campsite guide for more information about the local wild- life around Hood Scout Reservation.

BUDDY SYSTEM

The BUDDY SYSTEM calls Scouts to pair up with a friend or two for all activities. It ensures safety and accountability and teaches Scouts to have responsibil- ity for others. The buddy system is a vi- tal part of Scouting's Barriers to Abuse. Follow these guidelines for using the Buddy System during winter camp. \cdot It's recommended that buddies know and be comfortable with each other. No youth should be forced into or un-comfortable by a buddy assignment. • It is strongly encouraged to pair Scouts of similar abilities, ages, and maturity. Buddy pairs should be no more than two years apart in age and should be single-gender. There are no boy-girl buddy pairs in any programs. • A buddy team may consist of three Scouts when necessary. like an odd number in a group.

CAMPER SAFETY

Hood Scout Reservation wants to ensure that your Scouts and adult leaders are safe and have a great time at camp. If you have any questions or concerns about an individual Scout or adult leader's well-being, an adult leader or Scout should contact the camp director or a member of the camp management team. Hood Scout Reservation has a zero-tolerance policy for bullying and harassment.

ARMBANDS

Each participant is issued a specific color armband as part of the youth protection policies and guidelines and for security for this event. Participants are required to wear their armbands at all times and that it is visible.

Participants can replace an armband if lost or broken at the Trading Post or the Administration Building.


CAMPER RELEASE PROCEDURES

All participants must check in and out at the administration building. Scouts leaving camp must have their parent or guardian along with their unit leader to checkout. The parent or guardian must complete a camper release form and submit a copy of their driver's license. Only the camp director, program director, camp commissioner, camp ranger, or camp clerk can approve a Scout's release form. Adult leaders are encouraged to learn from the parent/guardian if a Scout leaves camp early. If they are, the adult leader should know who is picking up the Scout and what day the Scout leaves.

PARENTS' INFORMATION

Review the weather before Winter Camp to determine what to pack. Winter Camps in the past have been in the mid-70s and dry to the mid-30s and raining.

WHAT TO BRING TO CAMP



Firearms, ammunition, and bows are not allowed in camp; Scout will only use those supplied by the Shooting Sports area. Scouts cannot have Sheath knives at camp. Any such equipment mistakenly brought to camp must be turned over to the unit leader and the Camp Director notified.

ELECTRONICS- CELL PHONES

Winter Camp is an outdoor experience with a full schedule of classes and activities. We understand the need for and ability to communicate with your Scout immediately. We also know today's Scouts need to connect with the larger world. However, we leave the issue of cell phones at camp to the individual units. If your Scout does bring their mobile device, there are several places around camp where they can charge their device. We recommend not bringing items such as tablets, electronic games, and other electron- ic devices to camp. *HSR IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR LOST OR STOLEN ITEMS.*

FOLLOW US ON FACEBOOK

We want to ensure that every parent, guardian, or grandparent has the opportunity to "check in" on their Scout. We do live streams of opening and closing assemblies and some other activities. Like and follow us on Facebook for notifications when we are live, or look at some of our past live streams.

CHECK-IN PROCESS

Check-in will start Friday at 5:00 PM. Since it will get dark by then, we want to move your troop through the process as quickly as possible. One way to ensure this is to pay your fees before you arrive, have copies of the Annual Health and Medical Forms for everyone, and have a list of everyone who is supposed to be at winter camp. When you park in the parking lot, The unit leader, Senior Patrol Leader, and the chaplain's Aide will come to the Snack Shack area to check-in.

The unit leader will go to the Administration Table. They will confirm the number of Scouts and Adults that are supposed to be at Winter Camp, pay any outstanding balances, and receive a campsite guidebook. After meeting with the administration, the unit leader will move to the medical recheck table. The camp health officers will review the health forms and take in medications.

Senior Patrol Leaders will meet with the Activites Director to learn about duties of the Senior Patrol Leader while at camp. The Chaplin's Aide will meet with the Camp Champin and he will receive the needed chapel materials from the Camp Chaplin.

After this your unit will give a troop guide and you can move your troop and gear to your campsite.



CHECK-OUT PROCESS

Beginning at 3:00 PM on Tuesday, units can start pulling their vehicles into camp to hook up their trailers and load up gear.

Before checking out the campsite be must

clear of all trash, the camp fires be must cold out, and trash/trash can brought to road.

Once your unit is ready to leave, You must schedule a time with the Camp Commissioner to check out of your campsite.

Once you have checked out of the campsite, your unit will stop by the administration building to pick up your troop program records and patches. As you leave, you must stop by the health lodge and pick up your unit's health forms and medications.

TRADING POST

The trading post/ snack shack provides a wide selection of souvenirs, Scouting items, limited selection of personal care item, and snacks.

DINING HALL

The dining hall staff provides great meals under the direction of the Hood Scout Reservation Food Service Committee. Professional cooks prepare all meals. A certified dietician and the Food Service Committee approve the menus. Menus are posted at the front entrance to the dining hall and are subject to change.

SPECIAL DIETARY NEEDS

Any participant that has a special dietary need Hood Scout Reservation will make the needed accommodations within reason. Special nutritional needs include but are not limited to those participants with food-based allergies or religious requirements. The parent or the unit leader must contact the HSR Food Service Chair at least two weeks before camp starts so that we can make the appropriate accommodations. Once at camp, participants must stop by the dining hall and introduce themselves to the kitchen manager. The kitchen manager will ensure we give the correct meals to the right participants.

Our food service chair must approve any outside food products a participant brings to store in the dining hall. They will give you instructions for storing the food in the dining hall.

DINING HALL PROCEDURES

We serve meals in cafeteria styles. Due to the size of the winter camp, we eat in shifts—the shift alternates each meal so everyone can eat first. Your first meal will be Saturday Morning. There are no assigned seats in the dining hall.

TABLE WAITERS

Each unit must provide at least one to two table waiters per meal. These Scouts need to arrive ten minutes early before food service begins. Not all table waiters will be selected to serve. Your table waiter will stay until the end of their service to help clean up. When done eating, the participants or unit are encouraged to clean up before they leave. Cleaning included wiping down the table and sweeping under the table.

There will be staff members available to help if it is needed.

BIKES ON CAMP

Hood Scout Reservation is over 1.200 acres and has around 15 miles of hiking, biking, and ATV trails. Participants can bring their bikes to camp to get around or to take the Cycling Merit Badge. Hood Scout Reservation is not responsible for lost helmets or broken bikes.






SENIOR PATROL LEADERS

Starting with check-in on Friday Night, your troop's Senior Patrol Leader will be one of the main ways we communicate with your troop.

The SPL will have daily meetings following lunch about general information and camp programs; they will help develop some of the games and activities and plan the closing campfire program on Monday night.



In the opening line of our oath, "duty to God" and last point of our law..." A Scout is Reverent," we want to encourage your troop while you are at HSR. Your troop's chaplain's aide, working with our camp chaplain, we help deliver daily devotionals and encouragement.

Your troop should ask a blessing at each meal, and be a part of one of the Vespers service on Sunday night. The camp chaplain will give a book of devotionals to the chaplain's aide. The chaplain's aide will work with the Senior Patrol Leader to determine the best time to do the devotionals. The devotionals are set up for an "interfaith" worship. completes the daily devotions, every participant receives ceremonies in the morning a special duty to God patch.

FLAG CEREMONY

If the unit The will assemble for flag evenings. At the evening ceremonies. Scouts and unit leaders are asked to be in their field uniform. There will not a evening ceremony on Tuesday.

PROGRAM INFORMATION

MERIT BADGES AND OTHER PROGRAMS

Our camp staff and merit badge counselors are all volunteers committed to delivering a great program where Scouts have a good time during camp and provides the opportunity to advance. Winter Camp tentatively offers over 40 merit badges and other special programs for the 2024 schedule. The merit badge schedule for Winter Camp will be available on October 1st and will be available to download online in the Winter Camp Merit Badge Guide. During winter camp, Scouts can camp outdoors and work on merit badges and programs not generally offered at summer camp. Merit Badge sessions will be limited to twenty (20) Scouts. The session numbers could be lower depending on the Merit Badge Counselor and safety concerns. Scouts can complete many of the merit badges offered at Winter Camp; however, because of time constraints and requirements, special projects, or other considerations, some merit badges have prerequisites, require unique skill levels, or may need a Scout to complete the remaining requirements back home with a merit badge counselor. Weather is also a significant factor in how much can be accomplished during camp.

MERIT BADGE AND MERIT BADGE COUNSELORS

Below is a list of merit badges we plan to offer if we can locate qualified merit badge counselors. We should have a complete list of merit badges and times posted by October 1st, 2024. Merit Badge registration opens on October 1st. If you see a badge you would like to present or know of someone who can present a merit badge, contact us to let us know. 

DAVY CROCKETT/ FIRST YEAR CAMPER



Davy Crockett can be fascinating for first-year Scouts. The Davy Crockett program is Hood Scout Reservation's premier first-year camp program. The program allows Scouts to work on many of the early requirements. They'll practice knots, build fires, go hiking, and learn to use an ax or pocketknife.

At winter camp, the Davy Crockett program is only a day long. On the other days, the Scout must select age-appropriate merit badges.





During the course, Scouts will start working on the skills neces-

sary to earn the rank of Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class while building teamwork, leadership, and Scouting skills However the main goal is for the Scouts to have fun and to leave camp with a positive experience and enthusiasm for the Scouting program.

DAVY CROCKETT/ WEBELOS & ARROW OF LIGHT-

This two day program for Webelos and Arrow of Lights will give the opportunity to work on the following outdoor activitiy awards.

Cast Iron Chef First Responder Webelos Walkabout Outdoor Adventurer

Scouts will have the opportunity to learn basic fire building, cooking, first-aid, camping and hiking skills. Scouts will learn about how the patrol and EDGE methods works.

ATV EXPEREINCE



ATV islimited to Scouts that are 14 years and older. Class size is limited to 8 Scouts per class. Scout must have a signed Hold Harmless Agreement, Long Sleeve shirt, long, pant, over the ankle boots or shoes.

OTHER TRAINING OPPORUNTIES (FOR ADULTS ONLY)

RED CROSS WILDERNESS FIRST-AID

The Red Cross Wilderness First-Aid training course is required for all leaders taking their Unit on High Adventures. This is a two day training course.


