**Camp Rotary (Monarch) Jan 30<sup>th</sup> - Feb 1<sup>st</sup>**

Registration Fee: \$25 per participant

Early Registration Fee: \$20 per participant (if unit registers by end of day on Monday, Jan 26<sup>th</sup> )

If units register before the early bird deadline, all Scouts and adults get the early bird registration, even if they're added later.

## **OTHER REGISTRATION INFORMATION:**

Please have one representative from each unit register the entire unit.

**All Scouting America policies apply. Each unit must have at least two Scouting America registered adult leaders aged 21 or older. Any unit with female youth must have at least one unit-registered female leader aged 21 or older in attendance.**

**No Dogs are allowed at Scouting America events.**

**Scouting America Health Form Part A and B must be shown for all youth and adults upon arrival at the event and kept on site by the unit.**

**A copy of your participant roster must be given to the Camping Committee upon arrival (includes youth and adults)**

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## **ARRIVAL, CHECK-IN AND CHECK-OUT**

There are toilets and potable water within the campground.

Check-in for the event will begin inside the lodge from 6-9pm. All troops need to check in with the Camping Committee Prior to setting up camp. **Make sure to bring copies of the following:**

- **Health forms for those participating (youth and adults)**
- **A unit roster of those participating (youth and adults) – Camp. Com. will keep a copy**

There will be a travelers' feast (Beef Stew) from 5:30-9pm inside the lodge to help ease stress of making dinner on Friday.

Cracker Barrel will be at 9pm on Friday night inside the lodge. Only Senior Patrol Leaders (SPLs) and Scoutmasters (SMs) and designees are allowed.

All units will need to check-out with the camping committee before they leave camp. **We will need members from each unit to help clean the bathrooms before your troop is dismissed.**

**OTHER MISC. INFORMATION:**

Units should try their best to carpool and minimize their vehicles as parking is at a premium at rotary, if don't have to bring a troop trailer please don't. Units are responsible for their own food and cooking supplies.

Units will be able to stay in the smaller heated cabins around the exterior of Camp Rotary.

Scouts are only allowed in the lodge with permission.

Campsite inspections will be done on Saturday afternoon by the Camping Committee. **We will need members from each unit to help clean the bathrooms before the troop is dismissed.**

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**LODGING AND YOUTH PROTECTION**

The smaller cabins around the exterior of the property will be open for use to units.

Please note units are responsible for cleaning any cabins that they use and making sure the heat is off before departure. (Cabins will be inspected by camping committee as part of the unit's checkout process.)

### **Lodging/Cabin Accommodations (Youth Protection – Guide to Safe Scouting)**

Whenever possible, separate cabins or lodging should be provided for male and female adults as well as for male and female youth.

Where separate accommodations cannot be provided due to group size or limited availability, modifications may be made.

Where completely separate accommodations are not available, additional supervision is required.

- If adults and youth of the same gender occupy single-room accommodations, there must be a minimum of two adults and four youth, with all adults being Youth Protection trained.
- Physical separation by other means, including temporary barriers or space, should be used only when no other arrangements are possible.

## Stations

From feedback from the district all activates will be optional but any or all of them could be what gets your unit the travel trophy

9:15 patrol volleyball

10:00 fire building contest: scouts using flint and steel or ferro rods must start and maintain a small fire enough to boil some water, cups and water will be provided to boil water, tinder and kindling will also be provided but any unit may bring along their own tinder as long as it is scout appropriate and camping committee approves it first. Hot coco will be offered here to anyone who wants it.

1:30 human curling: saucer sleds + scouts = human curling. Details will be provided at cracker barrel. All scout rules apply.

3:00 sled races: classic Lewis and Clark district sled races

4:30 scoutmaster eating contest: any adult leader may partake, leaders with their hands behind there back must eat a plate of fried spam fries

5:00 snow castle judging: units will be given from the time they arrive till 5pm on Saturday to build their best snow castle. see below for guidelines

- Castel turret 1 pt.
- Gate 1pt.
- Sleeping spot 2pts.
- Walls 1-4 pts.
- Flags 1pt.

#### **CLOSING CAMPFIRE:**

Awards will be presented at closing campfire. Patrols are encouraged to provide a skit or song with a beach theme. Skits/Songs should be no longer than 3-5 minutes and need to be preapproved by the Camping Committee by 6:30pm on Saturday.

#### **HONOR TROOP AND CAMPSITE INSPECTION:**

The Camping Committee will inspect campsites for units on Saturday afternoon. Campsites should include the following:

1. Axe Yard (Properly Installed)
2. Designated Scout Tent Area
3. Designated Adult Tent Area
4. Dining Area
5. Food Preparation Area **with Duty Rosters Posted**
6. Gateway
7. Dish Wash Area (following Scouting guidelines)
8. Flag (unit and/or patrol)
9. If able, Firepit (following Scouting guidelines)
10. Waste Disposal Area

The campsite will be graded with each above area having a possible 10 points for a maximum total of 100 points. Units that earn 80% or higher will be recognized as an Honor Unit.
