ADULT LEADERS

In accordance with Youth Protection Policies, each unit MUST provide a minimum of two-deep leadership for the event. Girl troops must have at least wone female registered leader present

REFUND POLICY

Fees for most district and council activities are transferable to other Scouts within the unit. Partial refunds may be approved for all activities/events/camping programs including Cub Scout Family Weekends, Cub Scout Day Camps, Summer Resident Camps, MAC High Adventure Contingents, National Youth Leadership Training, Wood Badge, Powder Horn, and Exploring Programs. If approved, the refundable amount will be returned using the original method of payment, if possible. Refunds will not be considered for requests made more than two weeks from the conclusion of the activity/event/camp. There will be no refunds under \$10.00. Refunds will only be considered if one of the following circumstances applies and will not exceed 80% of the fees paid.

Sickness or Injury (requires a physicians note)

Death in immediate family (requires copy of obituary)

Relocation outside of Mid-America Council borders (requires copy of new BSA registration or military orders)

ACTIVITIES

Pancake Toss Mix pancake batter, pour enough batter for one pancake into the pan, flip the pancake over a rope without the use of utensils, finish cooking, and then eat the pancake. This will be repeated by 4 different participants. Items needed: Cast iron skillet, spatula, measuring cup, water, insulated gloves, and boy scout handbook (Pancake batter will be provided for this event)

Boil Water Patrol will build a fire without the use of matches or lighters large enough to boil two cups of water until it boils over the pot. While some scouts are building the fire, the rest of the patrol will lash together a tripod and hang a pot of water to boil. Items needed: metal feed pan, tinder, kindling, firewood, dish soap measuring cup, pot, water, flint and steel, insulated gloves, 3 sturdy poles.

Log Drag The patrol will drag a heavy log around a course, untie the not, and hand the rope to the next scout, who will repeat the task. The log must be drug around the course 5 times. Items needed: 1 rope at least 10 feet long and the Boy Scout Handbook. (The log will be provided for this event)

^{*}All Patrol items must be on/in/attached to a patrol sled that will be inspected upon check-in. No rules apply to the patrol sled other than it must be transportable from station to station.

First Aid A scout has had a scrape with a Yeti. Patrol must render first aid to a scout with the following injuries: Puncture wound from a bite on the lower leg, a claw scratch on his torso, and a dislocated right shoulder. A stretcher must be built to carry the scout several hundred feet and back without injury. Items Needed: two warm blankets, 2 sturdy poles, sling, bandages, first aid kit, Boy Scout handbook.

Orienteering The patrol has found a gold vein. Build a flagpole to post your patrol flag and stake your claim.

Patrol Puzzle The patrol must outsmart the Yeti. The patrol will attempt to solve two puzzles using intellect and teamwork. Items needed: 16' x 8' tarp.

Pioneering Your patrol has found a gold vein. Build a flagpole and post your patrol flag to stake your claim.

Bear bag You will be provided a weighted bear bag. The bag must be suspended from a tree so Bears cannot steal it during the night. For maximum points the bag must be at least 4m above the ground, 3m away from tree, 2m below any branches, and rope must be against tree trunk until at least 3m above the ground.
