

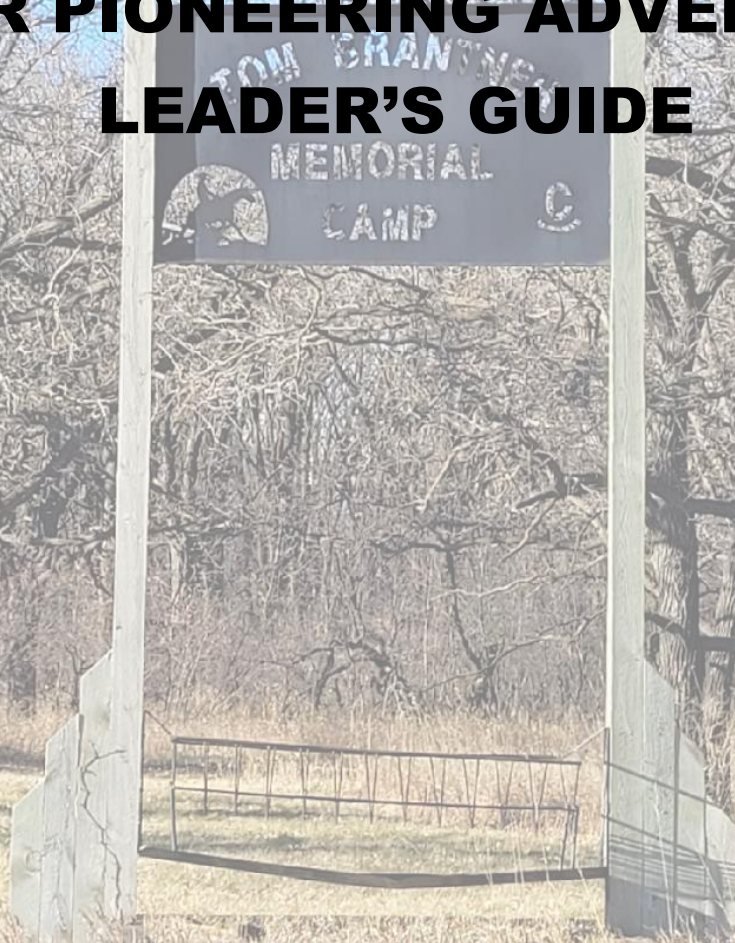

May 29 – 31, 2026

Welcome to the 2026 Oregon Trail Spring Camporee. Scouts from multiple districts will gather to test their skills in hands-on frontier challenges. Challenges are focused on teamwork and leadership while utilizing the patrol method and recognizing individualism. From fire-building to outdoor problem-solving, Scouts will experience the spirit of the pioneers while connecting with fellow Scouts from neighboring districts.

The 2026 Spring Camporee is located at Camp Brantner Memorial Camp. Camp Brantner is a Northern Lights Council owned property located 8 miles northeast of Glyndon, MN. The camp is easily reached via U.S. Highway 10 (3 miles) or MN Highway 9 (4 miles). Camp consists of two large grass activity areas, small-wooded area, small creek, and several basic, primitive camp sites. Each camp site has a fire ring and a picnic table. Camp also has one Picnic Shelter (Camporee Headquarters) and one water spigot/well (hand-pumped) with a latrine. Units will need to bring potable water and water jugs for bringing water back to the unit campsite. Besides water jugs, Units should also plan to bring their own certified, bug free, firewood to cook Patrol Style in-camp meals. Note, meal service is not provided. Units are responsible for food and food preparation in their campsites. Units should also plan on “Hosting” one staff member for Saturday Lunch and Supper. Other items to note:

Scouts BSA will camp overnight with Webelos/AOL welcome as day participants. Scouts with Friday night or Sunday conflicts are also strongly encouraged to attend.

“Camp Headquarters / Trail Head” will be near the park shelter. In case of emergency, hazardous weather, etcetera, we will meet at the park shelter. If required, the alternate gathering location is the flagpole/camp memorial sign.

Health Forms (Parts “A” and “B”) are REQUIRED and will be collected at camp check-in and returned at the conclusion of camp. There will be a Health tent at Camp Headquarters. Please let camp staff know (prior to camp) if there are campers with special needs. Camp patches will be mailed to Units after the completion of camp.

Due to the primitive nature of the access road/trail, please limit vehicles to the grass parking area, vehicles and troop trailers are not allowed past the grass parking area. Grass at Camp is not mowed, but due to the time of year, it should be relatively short. There is no electricity at camp. In keeping with the Pioneering Theme, Units can bring their gear to the campsites on foot (Backpacks) or utilize “Oregon Trail Wagons” and wagon train the gear to the campsites.

There is no garbage service. Please practice “Leave No Trace Behind” and “Pack In/Pack Out” when at camp.

Bring any old flags you may have for our Flag Retirement Ceremony

Please wear your Class A and/or Troop Class B (Activity) uniform.

Fire Building Competition

Each unit (Max group of 4) will be required to build a campfire that can burn through a string suspended 18 inches above the ground, in the least amount of time.

The distance between the string and top of constructed campfire materials shall be at least 6 inches. (A second string will be at the 12-inch height or 6-inch separation distance). Once the fire is lit, the fire/fire material shall not be touched. No additional fire materials can be added once the first match is struck. Each fire building team will be provided Five (5) matches.

No propane (torches), cigarette lighters, click type stick fire starters with fuel, bug spray, or other liquid flammable material, will be allowed. No mechanical or machine-driven devices (Fans, mechanical bellows, etc.) allowed. Manual click type fire starters are allowed. As well as electrical / electronic fire starters, flint / steel, and magnesium fire starters. Use of other fire starters in-leu of the Camp provided matches will result in a **1-minute deduction penalty**.

Maximum time to gather materials, construct the fire, and burn the string is **15 minutes**. Units/teams will be required to clean up their fire pit post competition. Teams not able to burn the string in the allotted 15-minute time span will be automatically awarded a 15-minute time score.

Use of only **NATIVE** material, acquired at camp, during the timed competition, will receive a **30-second time bonus**.

Use of only **1 match** will receive a **1-minute time bonus**.

Use of **ZERO matches** will receive a **2-minute time bonus**.

Due to time bonuses, a negative burn time is possible.

Other Bonus time allotments may be awarded at the discretion of Camp Staff. All decisions by Camp Staff are final. If teams end up with the same score, after time bonuses are awarded, the team with a/most time bonuses will win the tie.

Camp Staff reserves the right to cancel or alter the competition due to weather conditions.

Conservation Project(s)

Each unit will be required to complete a camp improvement or conservation project while at camp. Camp Improvement/Conservation projects will be determined by Camp Staff near the start of camp. Units will be notified if any equipment is needed prior to camp. Scouts should at a minimum bring "work" gloves and sturdy shoes. An example of a project would be to remove fallen branches from the campsites. If there are no camp improvement or conservation projects available, at a minimum, garbage / camp clean-up will be required of all campers at the conclusion of camp.

These are basic items suggested for camp. Brantner has one (1) water spigot for the entire park, it is located near the center of camp, by the picnic shelter. There is a two-stall outdoor latrine at the camp as well as picnic tables and fire rings at most campsites. There is no electricity.

The “roadway” into camp is grass turf. If it rains, traveling in camp, via vehicle, will be difficult. Units will be allowed to transport their Unit Trailers to the campsites, but all vehicles shall be parked in the main parking area for the duration of camp. Please plan & pack accordingly.
