General Information

About 2026 Klondike

This year's theme is "Tall tales". American folk stories featuring larger-than-life heroes and wildly exaggerated, unbelievable events, often set on the American frontier, using hyperbole to entertain and explain natural landmarks, with famous characters including Paul Bunyan, Pecos Bill, and Johnny Appleseed. These humorous stories stem from frontier bragging traditions, transforming real people or fictional figures into legendary heroes performing impossible feats, like Paul Bunyan taming hurricanes or Pecos Bill riding a cyclone. The Stambaugh District Klondike Derby stations will have the Tale Tall Theme as you travel over 250 Years of American History and stories that have made this nation great. Some stories are half-truths or have a lesson behind them. Scouts will have the opportunity to relive some of the same challenges that these adventures faced, in hopes of finding their own treasure.

Scouts are organized in patrols of between 4 and 8 scouts. Each patrol appoints or elects a leader. While adults are encouraged to accompany patrols throughout their trek, they are not permitted to participate in the activities.

Each patrol should have a sled loaded with materials to lash an A-frame structure used to drag loads over land, most notably by the Plains Indians of North America. material and equipment needed to overcome the challenges at the stations. Points will be awarded to each patrol based on performance at each station. At the conclusion of the event, patrols are invited to participate in an auction.

Registration Information

Units register on-line at [Great Trail Council - Stambaugh District Klondike 2026 \(scoutingevent.com\)](https://scoutingevent.com).

Because of the size of the event, sites may not be available to all units. Notification of sites – both cabin and tent – will be made prior to arrival. Preferences made during registration will be taken into consideration.

Guidelines

The following guidelines are based on *The Sweet 16 of BSA Safety*. Please take a few moments to review the information below to help promote a safe event.

Qualified Supervision

Two registered adult leaders 21 years of age or over are required for each unit. There must be a registered female adult leader 21 years of age or over in every unit serving females. While it is not required that an adult accompany patrols during the event, unit leaders must be available in case the need arises. Notwithstanding the minimum leader requirements, age- and program-appropriate supervision must always be provided.¹

Physical Fitness

Leaders must have the Annual Health and Medical Form for each unit member participating in the Klondike. For this event, only parts A and B are necessary. The form can be downloaded at <https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/ahmr/>. Unit leaders are required to provide the health forms

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at event check-in for review. Forms will be retained and available for return at the end of the event. If forms are not retrieved after the event closes, they will be destroyed.

Buddy System

Scouts are required and adults are always recommended to have at least one other person with them while traversing camp.

Safe Area or Course

Although camp is open to all participants, certain sections of camp should be avoided. These include areas such as the pool, the lake, and in the vicinity of Indian Run. Participants should also be aware of boundary markers denoting the limits of camp. Much of the area surrounding camp is private property. Participants should also avoid proximity to roadways such as Leffingwell Road.

Equipment Selection

Equipment for the Klondike is based on the requirements of each station. Please consult the supplies needed by each patrol for the stations listed in this document. Note that the quantities recommended for equipment at each station is a minimum number.

Certain equipment is prohibited from use during the Klondike. Items such as fireworks, firearms, and ammunition are not to be in camp. The committee reserves the right to exclude other items from patrol equipment as deemed appropriate.

Personal Safety Equipment

Dress for the weather. Class A uniforms are not required at any point during the event. All clothing must be scouting appropriate. Improper dress could result in serious health or safety problems.

First Aid Resources

The Health Office will be in the Dining Hall; a health officer will be on staff during the event. In case of immediate emergency, call 911, then notify the Health Officer or a member of the committee.

Safety Procedures and Policies

Because of the large attendance at Klondike, drivers are asked to park closely together. If you do not plan to park, please follow the drop-off directions given by the parking lot attendees.

Units that are not camping are asked to park trailers in the overflow area near Baloo and Akela Cabins. A parking lot attendee can assist with directions if necessary.

Trailers can be dropped off Thursday night before the event from 5-7 PM. Contact [at](#) or [@scouting.org](#) to arrange a time for drop off.

Driving in camp is prohibited while the event is in progress².

² The event is considered to be in progress beginning Saturday at 7:30 AM until after the O.A Social at 10 PM.

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This event will review skills commonly referenced with Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class rank requirements. If a scout is unable to complete the requirements because of an impairment, please inform the stationmaster prior to the start of the activity.

Weather Check

Unless otherwise indicated by members of the committee, council, or district the Klondike will proceed as scheduled. Periods of snow, rain, and cold temperatures should be expected and accommodated accordingly. In case of inclement weather, plans may be subject to change.

Planning

The Dining Hall will serve as the headquarters for Klondike.

The Dining Hall will be open throughout the event in case of emergency. Other buildings will be open on a limited basis during the event.

Your unit will be responsible for all meals. The Dining Hall will have limited availability for seating during lunch. The Dining Hall is not available for preparing or serving meals.

It is anticipated that there will be limited firewood available. Units are encouraged to bring firewood.

Communication

Effective communication will allow staff to contact units prior to camp and while at camp about changes to the schedule, changing weather, and other information. Please provide an e-mail address at registration and at least one on-site mobile number the day of the event by check-in.

Plans and Notices

Water will be available from the frost-free fountains located around camp – but not at the Dining Hall.

Latrines with flush toilets are available at the Pool House, Dining Hall, and Rotary Building (located in the main parking lot). Latrines with vault toilets are located at each camp site.

There will be a designated smoking area behind the Dining Hall. Please refrain from smoking elsewhere in camp.

Dumpsters are located in the main parking lot. Please dispose of waste properly.

Applicable Laws

Adherence to the Scout Oath and Scout Law is expected during the event.

CPR Resource

In the event of a situation involving CPR, please immediately call 911, then contact the Health Officer.

Discipline

During the event, station masters have the final say on matters related to scoring. If there is a matter to consider outside of a station, please contact a committee member as soon as possible in order to seek guidance. The committee strongly encourages adherence to the chain of command for each unit.

Map

Map with station locations will be included in next revision. Stations to be located as close to unit sites as soon as finalized.

Event Check In

While at check in, event staff will be conducting sled inspections. Please have all material that you will be carrying for Saturday's events on the sled. Bring auction donations when you check in. Station leaders should check in Saturday morning at the registration table in the Dining Hall before reporting to the station.

³ Limited seating will be available in the Dining Hall. Units that have a site reserved are asked to avoid the Dining Hall.

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Station Format

Patrols are given the opportunity to attend eight stations out of the possible list. Four stations will be mandatory. Those stations are Fire Building, Cooking, Knots and Lashings, and First Aid. Stations will be grouped into an “upper” and “lower” area of Camp Stambaugh. Within each group will be two mandatory stations. In the “upper” section of camp, Knots and Lashings and First Aid; in the “lower” section of camp, Fire Building and Cooking.

Patrols will be placed in a traveling group. Each traveling group will have an opportunity to visit the mandatory stations. Please check the rotation at the end of the document and note the group that the patrol is assigned.

If time permits and the station master allows entry, patrols may participate in one or more stations within a given time slot. Station masters have the final say as to whether or not a patrol is permitted entry.

Vespers

The service will be held Saturday at the Parade Ground before the auction. All are welcome to attend.

Auction

The auction is the culmination of the Klondike. Patrols are invited to take the gold nuggets collected during the event and bid on items up for auction. There is no maximum number of nuggets that can be bid on any one item. Patrols within the same unit can pool available nuggets. The auction will be held Saturday evening following vespers. Each unit is expected to donate one item to the auction. A suggested value for any one auction item is no less than \$20.

Sourdough Ceremony

A time-honored tradition at the Klondike Derby. If you sleep outside on Friday evening under tent or stars, then you should attend the Sourdough ceremony in dining hall. Get a cool patch or year rocker if you're a return honoree.

Check Out

COOKING - Johnny Appleseed

Patrol will demonstrate cooking skills by attempting to cook an apple anyway. Apple must be edible/cooked in your creation.

Patrol will need to maintain a fire. Patrol can either provide kindling and fuel –according to Scouts BSA guidelines – or obtain a starter from the station master. The station master has the final say on what is permitted.

Totin' Chip and Firem'n Chit cards are required and must be presented to the station master. An axe yard will be available to patrols for preparation of kindling. During the activity, each patrol member must participate in a portion of the task.

FIRST AID

Demonstrate skills for first aid by answering questions about and treating for various afflictions.

Station master will ask members of the patrol to self-treat for various first aid scenarios.

Station master will ask the patrol how to treat for a specific injury. This could include, but is not necessarily limited to the following:

- Sprained ankle
- Ice rescue
- Shock
- Severe bleeding to the leg

Patrols will need to lash, using ropes, 3 poles together to make travois.

Items will be grouped together. Poles cannot be lashed prior to start of station. Have One member of Patrol get on travois and walk across field. Patrols may use guide ropes.

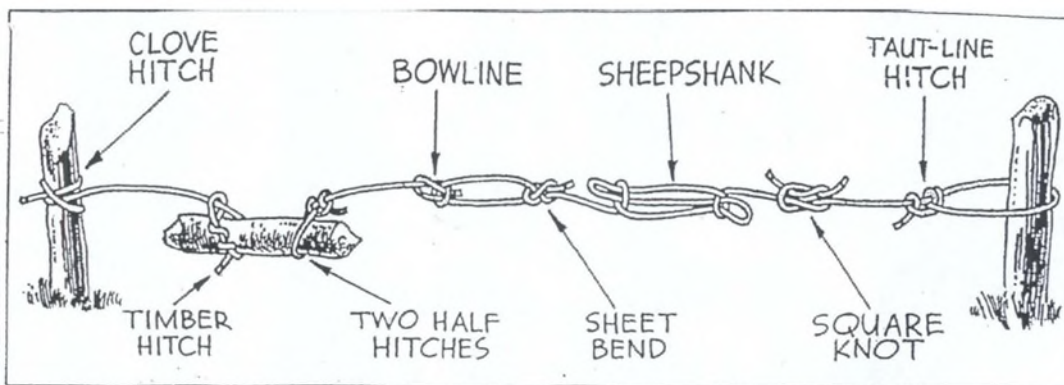

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LASHING –

The road has been blocked by an avalanche. Your patrol must lash together a ladder, put it up and ring a bell in the tree to call for help. All patrol members must work together to accomplish this task. We will furnish binder twine, poles & rungs for the ladder. We will also furnish the bell. It is recommended that a piece of rope be used as the top rung to hold the ladder safely against the tree.

Using ropes, staves, and spars, your patrol must lash together a ladder, put it up and ring a bell in the tree to call for help. All patrol members must work together to accomplish this task. All patrol members must climb ladder and ring bell. 1. Lash Ladder 2. Place ladder up against tree 3. Ring bell 4. Show patrol spirit and organization.

BONUS POINTS

Emergency Medicine Run A & B Supply depots in STAMBAUGH have antibiotics that are desperately needed for a diphtheria outbreak in school children. This medication can freeze or break if not handled properly. Patrols will come to the event, which lasts throughout the day of competitions, prepared to carry two raw eggs. These will represent the medication. The eggs must not freeze, crack, or break. The eggs will be judged at the end of the day's events when you reach end of events and check into dining hall before retreat.
