- Tent

4. Arrival and Check-In

Check-in Procedures:

1. Arrive at camp gateway during designated check-in times (Friday 5-8 PM, Saturday 7:45-9 AM Miller Cabin)

- 2. Check with event staff
- 3. Turn in completed unit roster and all required forms (med forms A & B)
- 4. Receive campsite assignment and event materials
- 5. Proceed to assigned campsite
- 6. Set up camp
- 7. Attend opening ceremony
- **Parking Information:**
- One trailer maximum per unit
- Only Unit trailer and tow vehicles are permitted to be parked in camp sites
- -Cars can drop gear at camp sites then they must be moved to designated parking areas
- All vehicles must park in the designated parking area
- Carpooling is strongly encouraged due to limited parking space
- **Campsite Assignments:**
- Campsites are arranged around the Miller cabin as the center point
- Multiple units may share a campsite
- Assignments will be given at check-in based on unit size and arrival time, You should not change campsites

- 12:00 PM: Camp closes, all units must be checked out

6. Program Activities

Webelos 1 Activities:**

1. Champions of Nature (2 time slots)

- Description: In-depth exploration of nature and conservation
- 2. Chefs Knife (2 time slots)
 - Description: Introduction to outdoor cooking and nutrition
- 3. Let's Camp (1 time slot)
 - Description: Basic camping skills and outdoor living
 - Location: Campsite area

Arrow of Light (AOL) Activities:

- 4. First Aid (2 time slots)
 - Description: Comprehensive first aid skills and emergency preparedness
- 5. Into the Woods (1 time slot)
 - Description: Forestry and woodland ecology
- 6. Knife Safety (2 time slots)
 - Description: Proper use and care of knives and other cutting tools

7. Meals and Food Safety

- Units are responsible for their own meals except for Saturday lunch (provided)
- Prepare and eat meals in designated campsite areas
- Practice safe food handling and storage
- Use camp stoves or designated fire rings for cooking
- Properly store food to prevent wildlife attraction
- Follow Leave No Trace principles for all meal preparation and cleanup
- Potable water available at marked locations (see camp map)

8. Camping Information

Campsite Details:

- Campsites are arranged around Miller Cabin
- Each site equipped with picnic table and fire ring
- Multiple units may share a campsite

Facilities Information:

- Restroom locations marked on camp map (provided at check-in)
- Potable water available at marked spigots

Campfire and Fire Safety Rules:

- Fires allowed only in designated fire rings
- Adult supervision required for all fires
- Firewood can be bought locally, Lumber is prohibited from being burned in camp. Fire wood availability is limited in camp, wood found on the ground can be burned if it is appropriate size
- Completely extinguish all fires before leaving them unattended

9. Health and Safety

First Aid Information:

- Main First Aid station located at Miller Cabin
- Units should bring their own First Aid kits for minor injuries
- Report all injuries beyond minor scratches to event staff

Emergency Procedures:

- For major emergencies, call 911 immediately, then notify event staff

- Emergency contact numbers will be provided at check-in

General Safety Guidelines:

- Always use the buddy system
- Wear closed-toe shoes at all times
- Stay on designated trails
- Drink plenty of water to stay hydrated
- Use sunscreen and insect repellent as needed

10. Camp Rules and Policies

General Rules:

- 1. Follow the Scout Oath and Law at all times
- 2. Respect quiet hours (10:00 PM 6:00 AM)
- 3. Use the buddy system
- 4. Wear appropriate attire, including closed-toe shoes
- 5. Respect other units and their campsites
- 6. Follow Leave No Trace principles

Prohibited Items and Behaviors:

- Firearms, ammunition, and fireworks
- Alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs
- Tobacco products (including e-cigarettes)
- Pets
- Harassment or bullying of any kind
- Leaving camp without proper check-out

Youth Protection Reminders:

- Maintain two-deep leadership at all times
- Ensure proper adult-to-youth ratios
- Adhere to all BSA Youth Protection policies

11. Check-Out Procedures

- 1. Pack all personal and unit gear
- 2. Clean up campsite, leaving it better than you found it
- 3. Dispose of all trash in designated dumpsters
- 4. Complete site inspection with staff member
- 5. Return to Miller Caabin to complete check-out process
- 6. Turn in evaluation forms
- 7. Depart camp by 12:00 PM on Sunday
