



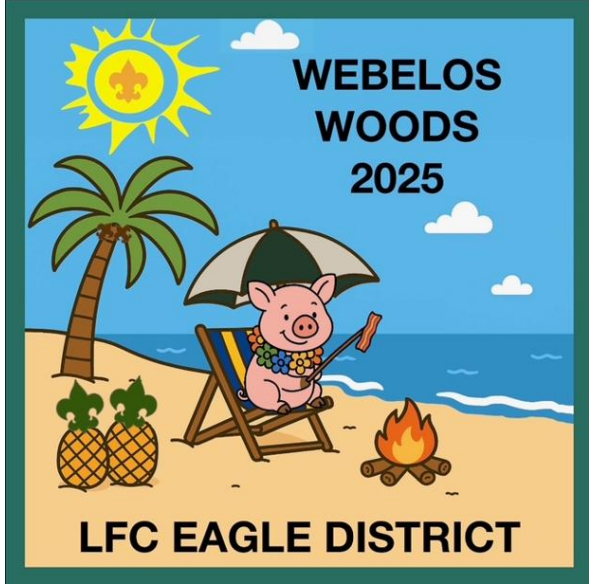

Who: Eagle District Arrow of Lights, Webelos Dens and Scouts BSA Troops. Arrow of Lights and Webelos may camp with troops Friday and Saturday nights for this Eagle District event. Younger siblings, whether registered in Cub Scouts or not, may not attend this event.

Theme: Hawaiian Luau

What is Webelos Woods: Webelos Woods is designed to give Arrow of Light (AOL) and Webelos and their parents a preview of Scouts BSA experiences. The program reinforces Scouting values, procedures, methods, and skills.

Troops will provide opportunities for fun activities to engage participation of Arrow of Lights and Webelos with Scouts. There will also be information provided by Troop leadership about their Troop for Arrow of Light and Webelos parents to gain more knowledge about how the Troop operates.

This entails:

- **TROOP PRESENTATIONS:** a SHORT 3–5-minute presentation with all pertinent information on a handout sheet for AOL and Webelos parents.
- **ENGAGEMENT:** Engage in open dialogue with parents and answer their questions.
- **INVOLVEMENT:** Gear your Scout's Patrol activity around activities that benefit AOL and Webelos requirements.
- **ENCOURAGEMENT:** Encourage parents to observe their young Scouts work with the Patrol activity.
- **LEADERSHIP:** Allow your first year Scouts to learn and experience leadership roles coaching the AOLs and Webelos.

This is an opportunity for each Troop to show AOL and Webelos what they do and let the youth encourage membership with your Troop. The more engaged youth Scouts are, the more committed they will be to finish the program. We had over 330 Scouts and Scouters camp at Webelos Woods in 2022 and 450 in 2023 and 360 in 2024. We hope to bring more youth to Webelos Woods this year with your participation.

I. PRE-CAMP PLANNING

OUR MISSION

Our mission at Webelos Woods is to provide a fun, safe, and educational experience for all Arrow of Light (AOL) Scouts and their families. We believe in fostering a love for the outdoors and promoting teamwork, leadership, and character development through various activities and events.

Our camp is specifically designed as an information gathering event for prospective Scouts BSA youth, set in the outdoors. We strive to create a fun environment that is welcoming, engaging, and memorable for all attendees. Each troop will have the opportunity to showcase their teamwork and leadership skills through a teamwork activity, which will challenge and inspire Scouts to work together towards a common goal. We encourage the Senior Patrol Leader (SPL) and adult leadership team to engage with parents in a conversational format rather than a long presentation that creates boredom amongst your guests. All pertinent information regarding your specific unit should be contained within your handout, i.e., meeting location, time and dates for meetings, troop leadership, and opportunities for parent involvement within the Troop. A sample troop handout has been provided in the appendix.

We believe that Scouts BSA provides an unparalleled experience for young people to learn valuable life skills, build self-confidence, and develop strong moral character. Through our camp, we aim to introduce and inspire the next generation of Scouts to join us on this journey of personal growth and adventure.

At Webelos Woods, we are committed to providing a positive and inclusive environment that encourages respect, integrity, and a spirit of service. Our dedicated staff work tirelessly to ensure that every Scout has an unforgettable experience and leaves with a greater appreciation for the natural world and their potential as leaders. Our most important goal is for every AOL/Webelos to join Scouts BSA and seek a continued journey through their high school years in the scouting program.

Theme: Hawaiian Luau

Troops should plan and carry out an AOL/Webelos activity around any Scout appropriate activity of their choice. It is highly encouraged that the activity will go along with the theme of “Hawaiian Luau.” One goal for your consideration is to allow your newer Scouts to work on developing their leadership skills by letting them lead the potential Scouts in a Patrol activity. Awards have been ordered for recognition.

PREPARING FOR WEBELOS WOODS

Review the camp requirements: Before you start planning for Webelos Woods, review the camp requirements and guidelines to ensure that your Troop is fully prepared. This includes reviewing the necessary gear, paperwork, and safety protocols.

Choose your activities: One of the most important aspects of Webelos Woods is the activity your Troop chooses for visiting Arrow of Lights and Webelos to do while interacting with your Troop. Troop leaders and Scouts should work together to brainstorm and select Scout skills which are engaging, create friendly competition, and promote teamwork. If possible, incorporate activities that gain advancement credit for your AOLs and Webelos. You will find some suggestions in the Appendix at the end of this leader guide. Please note that the AOL and Webelos programs were revised June 1, 2024 and AOL and Webelos no longer share rank requirements.

Plan your activities: Once you've chosen your activities, it's time to plan the details. Consider the necessary equipment, materials, and space required for each activity, as well as the time and personnel needed to set up and run them.

Practice your activities: In the weeks leading up to Webelos Woods, take the time to practice your activities with your Troop. This will help ensure that everyone knows their roles and responsibilities and that the activities run smoothly on the day of the camp.

Registration Close Date: Registration closes September 16th at 5:00 PM.

To minimize the transaction fee applied to payment of registration fees, AOL Patrols and Webelos Dens and Scouts BSA Troops are encouraged to register together. Any unit adding a Scout or leader after September 16th must give the Camp Director a specific name for the late reservation. This policy is intended to assist us in planning our food, supplies, and equipment orders in advance of your arrival.

All youth and adults must be registered members of Scouting America. Adults must be current on Youth Protection Training or Safeguarding Youth Training and be a member of a Troop or a Pack. Youth must be members of a Troop, or a member of a Pack with the rank of Arrow of Light or Webelos. No youth younger than Webelos may attend this event.

CHECKING IN AT CAMP

Arrive no earlier than 4:30 PM. The camp gate will be locked until that time. Obtain your unit's campsite assignment from the staff auto-check-in line in front of the program office and proceed to your designated campsite. Webelos Woods Den Chiefs will be available to assist with check-in procedures.

Meet your Webelos Woods Den Chief to verify the presence of each participant on your unit roster for an accurate count of participants. A pink wristband will be provided for each registered participant, to be worn at all times while on camp. Day visitors will need to check-in as well to receive a pink bracelet. The pink bracelets ensure camp staff has an accurate head count and roster for everyone on camp in case of emergency.

At check-in, each unit must turn over a binder containing Scouting America Annual Health and Medical Record for all youth and adult participants, including AOL & Webelos. According to National BSA accreditation camp policy, the Camp Medical Director is required to have all medical forms in the medical office/lodge while camp is open. Units are encouraged to have a second copy retained within their campsite. The binders will be returned at checkout.

Unload equipment. Set up camp. All vehicles must be moved to camp entrance parking lot after gear has been unloaded.

One adult leader and the SPL must attend the Senior Patrol Leader's Council Meeting (aka, Cracker Barrel). We highly recommend an adult leader from each AOL and Webelos group also attend. This meeting is held at Boyce Pavilion, which starts at 9:00 pm. Light refreshments will be available.

CHECKING OUT OF CAMP

On Sunday morning, the following procedures will be followed to check out of camp as a unit:

- Your Webelos Woods Den Chief will report to the campsite at the designated time after morning activities on the last day of the camp.
- Please have all gear moved out of the campsite so that your Webelos Woods Den Chief and SPL can inspect the campsite to make sure it is clean.
- If your unit is not ready or plans to check out later, please schedule a time with your Webelos Woods Den Chief to come back to inspect the campsite.
- As your unit drives out of camp, stop at the Program Office to turn in your camp evaluation form and receive your check-out packet (health forms, patches, etc.).
- Health form binders will not be returned to the unit until all participants in the unit are leaving the camp.

SCOUTING'S BARRIERS TO ABUSE

Our nation's greatest asset is our youth, and Scouting is pledged to protecting and nurturing our children. Any camp leader or staff member who suspects, knows of, or witnesses a child being abused at camp, or at a unit meeting or activity, is mandated by the State of Oklahoma to notify proper officials. While at camp, all suspected child abuse incidents (i.e., physical, emotional, and sexual) must be reported to the Camp Director immediately. All reports are kept confidential.

Also, consistent with Scouting's Barriers to Abuse, adults must not stay in tents or shower with youth members. Anyone caught or suspected of doing so will be asked to leave camp immediately. The only exception to these policies is the right of a parent to share a tent with his or her child. However, though allowed, it is recommended that parents do not exercise this right at camp. Separate sleeping arrangements helps to ensure that their child receives the maximum benefit possible from his or her camp experience and prevents any unnecessary misunderstandings or awkward situations.

II. CAMP LEADERSHIP

SCOUTMASTERS

The person in charge of your troop must be at least 21 years of age. There are no exceptions. In addition, it is the policy of Scouting America that all Scout outings have at least two-deep leaders in place for each unit at all times. At least two registered adult leaders, one of whom must be 21 years of age or older and certified in Youth Protection Training (YPT) or the new Safeguarding Youth Training (SYT), are required for all outings. One of these adults must be female if there are girls attending the activity. The result is more fun for the adults and a better program for the Scouts.

Preferably, the Troop should be under the leadership of its registered Scoutmaster. If the Scoutmaster is unable to attend full-time, the unit's Troop Committee should name a Camp Scoutmaster. The Camp Scoutmaster works with the Senior Patrol Leader, and together they develop and schedule the Troop's program. The Camp Scoutmaster should participate in the leaders' meeting and assign and coordinate the responsibilities for all the adult leadership at camp for your unit.

SENIOR PATROL LEADER COUNCIL

The Senior Patrol Leaders' Council will meet Friday at 9:00 pm inside the Boyce Pavilion located on the east side of camp. All Senior Patrol Leaders must attend this meeting to receive information regarding camp activities to report back to their units. To ensure information reaches the AOL and Webelos, it is encouraged that one designated adult representing each AOL and Webelos unit attend as well.

A Webelos Woods Den Chief will be assigned to the Webelos / AOLs who are camping with your unit to help develop and carry out a full and balanced camping program. The degree of assistance rendered by the Webelos Woods Den Chief will depend upon the needs, desires, and experiences of each unit. The primary purpose of their work is to assist and guide your guests and help you help your unit. They will visit your campsite to help you with our camp program.

The Webelos Woods Den Chief will be available to you during the full time you are in camp. Call upon them for help whenever needed. Program snags can

often be quickly solved with their help, or perhaps you need something “special” for your Scouts that just does not appear to be available. Ask your Webelos Woods Den Chief about it - chances are he or she will know right where to go.

III. HEALTH AND SAFETY

The health and safety of participants during an event is of utmost importance. Each unit must have a properly stocked First Aid Kit centrally located in plain sight in the campsite.

Every unit member must know the location of the First Aid Kit.

Two filled fire buckets must be in place in the camp area. Two fire buckets must be at each fire. Fire buckets can contain water or sand, or a combination of the two per placement. The use of water and/or sand must be consistent throughout the campsite.

Guy ropes and other physical hazards must be marked or removed.

Planning ahead for weather disasters and personal injuries is of the utmost concern during this camping event. All Unit Leaders will report to the program headquarters in the Program Building (located near the main/east entrance) in the event of inclement weather.

If three loud blasts from the Air Horn are heard, leaders please come to the First Aid station for information.

Inclement weather conditions will be monitored at the command center in the Program Building. In the event of thunderstorms and lightning, we will move to a designated shelter area. A head count will be performed by each unit's Scoutmaster and Assistant Scout Master.

1. Boyce Pavilion or personal vehicles will be our first response to a severe storm related weather incident.
2. Light rain conditions will be monitored, and Scouts may remain in the camp area under cover. i.e., tents.
3. In the event of possible tornado activity, staff will monitor the situation and decide to cancel the event or find a safe alternative spot, i.e., approved tornado shelter.
4. When necessary, a Camp Leadership group-based decision will be made by monitoring local radio and television weather stations. The situation to move or stay will be made well in advance of the storm reaching John Nichols Scout Ranch.

We expect all Scouts and adults to ensure that they are feeling 100% before coming to Webelos Woods and to be aware of the possibilities of high heat or low temperatures. As an attendee you will be walking a lot. We expect **close-toed shoes** like boots or tennis shoes. Crocs and other open-heel shoes are not permitted.

All programs stress the use of the buddy system, whereby campers engage in activities with at least one other person of similar age and gender so that they can monitor and help each other. Using a formalized buddy system is mandated in certain adventurous or potentially dangerous activities.

Any Scout or adult with special needs that require staff attention to ensure they have just as positive of an experience as everyone else must report it to staff upon check-in so accommodations can be met. All Scouts attending must turn in a copy of their Annual Health and Medical Record upon check-in.

Bathhouses: Phones and cameras are not allowed around the bathhouses. Adult leaders are asked to help supervise bathrooms at Jamboree Hill during Saturday activities. During unit shower times, at least one adult leader from the unit should be on-hand outside of the bathhouses to supervise scout behavior.

IV. CAMP RULES and REGULATIONS

All youth and adult participants are expected to act in accordance with the Scout Oath, Scout Law, Outdoor Code and follow the current edition of the Guide to Safe Scouting.

We ask our staff to uniformly enforce these rules. There is never a case where a youth or adult should argue with the staff about camp rules. Belligerence and abuse of staff will not be tolerated. We ask that youth and adults cheerfully follow the direction of staff for everyone's safety and enjoyment. If you feel that a rule is not being enforced or not being enforced fairly, you should comply with the direction of the staff and then ask your Unit Leader to discuss the issue with the Camp Director.

Likewise, we would never ask anyone to continue participation if they do not feel safe. If you feel unsafe, please report to a staff member immediately and they will excuse you from the program area.

We are aware there is a possibility that pre-conceived camp rules might arise and we do not condone them. If you feel we are enforcing an "unwritten" rule, please follow the procedure noted above to speak with the Camp Director.

SAFEGUARDING YOUTH

Scouting's Barriers to Abuse and Safeguarding Youth Training must always be followed. All adult Scouters must have a current Youth Protection Certificate or the new Safeguarding Youth Certificate. All Scouts are expected to follow all Scouting's Barriers to Abuse guidelines at all times – NO EXCEPTIONS.

You may be a mandatory reporter of violations of State child abuse laws. As such, you are required to report any incident or report of an incident directly to Law Enforcement. Child abuse incidents involving State Law are not to be investigated by Troops or staff. You may as a courtesy inform the Camp Director that local law enforcement is likely to arrive in camp, but no details should be shared. Sexual conversations of any nature including "jokes" are prohibited. Racial, ethnic, religious, sexist, and sexual orientation comments, jokes, and slurs are prohibited. All youth and adults must follow Safeguarding Youth Training and Scouting's Barriers to Abuse at all times.

SMOKING, ALCOHOL, MARIJUANA, AND ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES

The use of tobacco products and vaping is not permitted on Scouting America properties. There is no place in Scouting for the possession or use of alcohol or illegal substances. Anyone found in violation of this policy will be required to leave camp and may be reported to local Law Enforcement and the Last Frontier Council. If the unit is unable to provide proper leadership to satisfy Scouting America Youth Protection standards, the entire Troop will be required to leave camp. While Oklahoma does have provisions for medical use of marijuana, it is still illegal at the federal level and is not allowed on any Scouting America property.

CLOTHING, UNIFORM, ATTIRE

Uniform: All participants are expected to arrive in Class A. Class A is also required for formal flag-raising, flag-lowering, Campfire, and religious services.

Camp Attire: While in unit campsites, participants may wear Class B. Clothing worn by participants must not promote illegal drugs, alcohol, violence, sexual activity, racism, sexism, or bigotry. Clothing must cover all private parts and undergarments completely. For our female participants, shirts must provide adequate coverage over shoulders and stomach. Males must also always wear a shirt. Length of shorts must be modest.

FACILITIES & DISTANCE TO NEARBY TOWNS

John Nichols Scout Ranch, established in 1932, is located at SW 119th and County Line Road.

Two shower and restroom facilities are in place and will be open for Webelos Woods. The first is located close to Boyce Pavilion along the gravel road. The second is located on Jamboree Hill on the East side of the hill as you approach it. There are water hydrants located near most campsites.

FIRST AID

1. As stated previously, all Troops should have a First Aid kit within their camp site. A First Aid shelter for more serious injuries is located in the Program Building. This shelter will be monitored 24/7.
2. An Emergency Preparedness Kit will be on-hand with at least the following items:
 - First Responder kit
 - Medications
 - Water-Food
 - Stretcher
 - Flashlights with extra batteries
 - Battery Operated Radios
 - Tools
 - Dressing & Bandages
 - Map of the area
 - Emergency contact lists, of local fire, police, hospital, state troopers, Park Rangers & Last Frontier Council
 - After Hours emergency numbers
 - Routes to Hospital location
 - AED (Automated External Defibrillator) device

FIRE

In the event of a fire, whether wild or accidental, all Scoutmasters responsible for their Scouts will do a head count and ensure their Scouts are all accounted for and located.

As the head count is taking place, a minimum of 2 adult leaders will keep the Scouts calm and collected.

The remaining adult leaders and older Scouts ranked Star, Life and Eagle may assist in putting out any fire that is designated by an adult leader as controllable.

The First Aid station will be notified by two runners that a fire is approaching or is in a campground. First Aid will call 911, Webelos Woods staff leaders, and the Park Ranger ASAP when notified. As listed previously in the leader guide, a minimum of two buckets of water or sand should be in each campsite, with each fire ring, regardless of whether or not campfires are active.

In the event of an emergency, each unit leader should account for their youth and adults (keep a roster with you), reporting any missing persons to their Webelos Woods Den Chief or Camp Director immediately. All youth and adults must follow the direction of the camp staff during emergencies.

Lost Camper: Report a lost camper to the Camp Director immediately.

Severe Weather: In case of a severe weather warning (wailing siren), please go to the nearest storm shelter.

Vehicle Safety: Do not ride in truck beds or tailgates – NO EXCEPTIONS. Scouting America regulations prohibit using the cargo area of trucks (including pick-ups with camper shells) and trailers for transportation of passengers, or persons riding on the tailgate of station wagons. Each occupant should have and use a seat belt. Drivers of vehicles must be at least 18 years of age with a current driver's license. Anyone driving with passengers must be at least 21 years of age with a current driver's license. All vehicles must have seat belts for the number of occupants. This is a state law.

Camp Speed Limit: The maximum speed limit for all vehicles at camp is 15 miles per hour (5 miles per hour inside the camp). Driving off-road is not permitted.

Running and Walking in Camp: We do not run in camp for safety reasons. Biking, hiking, jogging, etc. are at your own risk on this road.

CLEANLINESS – A SCOUT IS CLEAN!

Please keep yourself and your campsites clean and help us keep the camp looking nice. Your Troop is responsible for keeping your campsite clean. Trash should be taken to the dumpster when leaving your campsite. Do not leave chairs, rugs, etc., when you depart. Your Troop can help keep trash picked up along the roads. All participants should maintain a high level of personal cleanliness. Please remind everyone that a good Scout takes only pictures and leaves only footprints. Please do not litter.

VEHICLE STORAGE

All vehicles must be parked in designated parking areas close to the program office and entrance to camp. No cars/vehicles of any kind will be allowed at campsites. All Troop buses and trucks must be parked in designated areas. The owner of each vehicle is the person solely responsible for its security. Camp staff are not responsible for loss or damage caused by fire, storm, theft, or vandalism to any person, vehicle, and trailer or for any loss or damage to articles left in vehicles.

**No vehicles in campsites
except unit trailers.**

PETS

Pets are not allowed. However, Service Animals are allowed. Service Animals are defined as dogs that are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for people with disabilities. Dogs whose sole function is to provide comfort or emotional support do not qualify as service animals under the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act). To bring a service dog to camp you must contact the Camp Director and the Camp Ranger .

TWO WAY RADIO METHODS

Webelos Woods staff will be using 2-way radios to communicate across camp. All staff and scouting units are asked if they are using 2-way radios to follow the following guidelines for safe and effective use of the radio network. In addition, we ask that troops use a different channel than the one used by staff.

- Be prepared before you make a call – know who you are calling and why.
- Identify yourself before beginning a transmission.
- Identify who you are contacting.
- Keep your communication brief and to the point.
- When you finish a message and need a reply, say, “over.”
- When terminating a call, say, “out.”
- Speak clearly and briefly.
- All emergencies must be directed to an adult:
 - Medical Team – Roger Smith and Rebecca Smith
 - Camp Director – Mr. Pelfrey
 - Program Director – Mrs. Barker
 - Quartermaster – Mr. Seretean

- All radio traffic goes silent in an emergency.
- In case of an emergency, all adults go to channel 2.
- Remember the frequency is shared with others not in your group.
- Do not broadcast names of minor children.
- Use English – Experts advise that English is the official international radio language.

ROTATION ACTIVITIES

All participating Troops will be providing a fun, youth-led activity for all Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts to enjoy as they visit each Troop. Last year, we introduced a new rotations system for Webelos Woods.

Our Troops in Eagle District represent all-boy Troops, all-girl Troops, and linked units that operate more collaboratively. To allow Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts to interact with Troops that are similar to the type of Troop they would like to join, our rotations operate in a more informal style. There will still be an air-horn blast to encourage rotations. Webelos Dens and Arrow of Light Patrols will be able to travel from Troop to Troop, choosing the Troops they want to visit. With this format, there may be times when more than one group of Webelos or Arrow of Lights will be visiting a Troop.

The Eagle District Webelos Woods staff will again provide a passport system to encourage all Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts to visit and engage with all Troops. Passports will be distributed by Webelos Woods Den Chiefs, coordinating with unit leaders and the youth Program Director. Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts will be given a remembrance token if they visit all Troops and participate in each Troop's activity.

UNIT PRESENTATIONS

Every Troop will have a designated location on Jamboree Hill for their activity and presentation. The Troops will have a central focus point as the flagpole. Troops may begin setting up their activity area on Friday evening or Saturday morning. Troops are encouraged to bring a sunshade. Each Troop is asked to provide a water Got for their Scouts and visiting AOL/Webelos and their parents/leaders.

Electronic and tech presentations, such as videos that require computers or need a generator are not allowed. Troops are encouraged to have their SPL make the presentation, and their Scouts provide the activity for their visiting AOL/Webelos.

While the youth are engaged in presentations, Troop adult leaders are encouraged to engage prospective Scout parents with a friendly two-way conversation in a common “question and answer” dialogue format. Remember! This is an opportunity for Troop adults to encourage the Webelos/AOL parents to continue supporting their Scouting youth by being involved at your Troop in a leadership role. Troop adults should encourage new future adult involvement in the unit’s success.

CAMP TRADING POST & BRANDING

We are excited to offer all units the opportunity to enjoy the benefits of a camp trading post. Various snacks, drinks, and Scouting supplies will be available for purchase. The post will be set up on Jamboree Hill on Saturday. This tent will also offer water, first aid, and a help desk.

We have officially obtained a branding iron to document your items in an effort to memorialize your attendance at this event. Check the camp schedule to find out when and where the branding iron will be available.

CAMPFIRE / SKITS / SONGS

All units are expected to participate in the campfire on Saturday night. We encourage the use of your guests as well. All skits and songs must be less than 5 minutes in length. This is to ensure that the campfire does not run too long and that everyone has a chance to participate.

Skits and songs must be approved by the youth program coordinators before Saturday's dinner time. This is to ensure that skits and songs are Scout appropriate for all ages and do not contain any vulgar or offensive content. All performers must be mindful of their audience. Skits and songs shall be appropriate for all ages and should not be offensive to any particular group, or they will be removed from the program line-up. Language and behavior should be appropriate for a family-friendly event. Skits and songs cannot be even remotely considered edgy or dark. This includes any content that is overly violent, scary, or disturbing.

A Scout is kind - respect should be given to all performers. No heckling, booing, or other disruptive behavior will be tolerated. Any props or costumes used in skits should be safe and appropriate. Fire and other hazardous materials should not be used. By following these rules, everyone can enjoy a fun and safe campfire experience.

AWARDS

Patrol Spirit Award: This award recognizes the Patrol that best embodies the values and spirit of Scouting. The winning Patrol should demonstrate a positive attitude, teamwork, and leadership skills. They should also be enthusiastic about participating in camp activities and show a commitment to helping others.

Cleanest Campsite Award: This award goes to the Troop that best maintains a clean and tidy campsite throughout the event. The winning Troop should keep their area free of litter, properly dispose of waste, and leave the campsite better than they found it. This award encourages Scouts to be responsible stewards of the environment.

Outstanding Service Award: This award goes to the Scout or Troop that has provided the most service to the camp or local community during the event. The winning Scout or Troop should demonstrate a commitment to helping others and a willingness to go above and beyond to serve their community.

Enthusiasm Award: This award recognizes the Scout or Troop that best demonstrates good sportsmanship throughout the event, while maintaining a neat Scout appearance. The winning Scout or Troop should show respect for their fellow Scouts, competitors, and event organizers. They should also demonstrate a positive attitude, teamwork, and a willingness to learn and grow from their experiences.
