***What is Webelos Woods?** Webelos Woods is an action-packed weekend where Webelos and Arrow of Lights (AOL) camp with a Scouts BSA troop, participate as a member of a troop, participate in fun activities with every troop, experience a Scouts BSA style campfire, and participate in an Inter-faith service. Parents will learn about the Scouts BSA program and watch their Webelos and Arrow of Lights learn all about the exciting adventures that await them in the next level of scouts beyond the Cub Scout pack.

***Who may attend?** In accordance with the Guide to Safe Scouting, all youth and adults attending as part of a Troop must be registered with the Troop. All youth attending with the Pack must be members of a Webelos or Arrow of Light Den/Patrol. All adults attending with a Pack must either be a registered leader of the Pack or a parent of a member of the Webelos or Arrow of Light Den/Patrol.

***Dates:** Friday, September 18 to Sunday, September 20, 2026.

*** Location:** John Nichols Scout Ranch

***Fees and Deadlines:** Early bird registration is \$15 and regular registration is \$20. The early bird registration ends Friday, September 7, and event registration closes Monday, September 14.

***Registration:** Troops and packs should register their own units individually.

Do not create joint unit registration!

Your registration will allow you to indicate the unit you will be joining at Webelos Woods. The person who opens the registration will be the only person able to make changes or additions to the existing registration.

***How to connect to a pack/troop:** All Webelos and AOLs need to be hosted by a Scouts BSA troop. A list of all packs and troops within Eagle District may be found at EagleDistrict.org. This website provides contact information, meeting time/date, and an address for each pack and troop. There are 17 troops (6 family troops, 9 boy troops, 2 girl troops). There are 12 packs (1 boy only pack and 11 family packs).

***Theme: Circus-Circus.**

***Saturday Activity:** Each troop is asked to provide a fun, Scout-appropriate, youth-led activity for Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts on Saturday. Activities should be planned and led by youth, align with the Circus-Circus theme, and comply with the Guide to Safe Scouting and age-appropriate activity guidelines. Activity rotation schedules will be finalized after registration closes and attendance numbers are known. For planning purposes, troops should prepare a 20-minute activity, understanding that the final rotation time may be adjusted as needed.

Saturday Dinner and Dietary Needs:** Dinner on Saturday evening will be provided for all registered participants. ***The menu includes pulled pork or pulled chicken sandwiches, coleslaw, potato salad, and chips. Each troop is asked to provide one Dutch oven dessert for every eight attendees from their unit to share with the camp. ***Food allergies, sensitivities, and other dietary needs must be noted during unit registration in Black Pug.*** While staff will make every effort to accommodate special dietary needs, meal service for 300 to 400 participants may limit available options. Individuals with specific dietary requirements may need to provide their own substitutes.

CAMP SCOUTMASTERS

The adult in charge of your troop must be at least 21 years old. No exceptions. In accordance with Scouting America policy, all activities must maintain two-deep leadership at all times. A minimum of two (2) registered adult leaders, both age 21 or older, must be present and current in Safeguarding Youth Training (SYT).

If female youth are attending, at least one (1) registered female adult leader must also be present. Strong adult leadership helps create a safer environment, a better program, and a more enjoyable experience for everyone.

Whenever possible, the troop should be led by its registered Scoutmaster. If the Scoutmaster cannot attend, the troop committee should appoint a Camp Scoutmaster. Working closely with the Senior Patrol Leader, the Camp Scoutmaster is responsible for coordinating the troop's program, attending leaders' meetings, and assigning responsibilities among the unit's adult leadership during camp.

SENIOR PATROL LEADERS COUNCIL

The Senior Patrol Leaders Council will meet Friday evening (see event schedule for time and location). All Senior Patrol Leaders, Scoutmasters, Cubmasters must attend this meeting to receive information regarding camp activities to report back to their units. To ensure information reaches the AOL and Webelos, it is encouraged that one (1) designated adult representing each AOL and Webelos unit attend as well.

WEBELOS DEN AND ARROW OF LIGHT LEADERSHIP

Webelos and Arrow of Lights are the reasons Webelos Woods takes place each year. The leadership you bring as parents of Webelos and AOLs in the scouting program is ultimately what brings Scouts BSA youth back to Webelos Woods each year. The Scouts that want to engage with Webelos and AOLs are the Scouts who had fun at the pack. Parents like you created that passion in young children for Scouting. You are the great leaders of the den and pack, and tomorrow you will be the great leaders of troops.

To guide you through the Webelos Woods experience, our staff is here to help you out. You are being hosted by a troop who can explain troop level leadership, what it means to be youth lead, and all the great opportunities that await your child as a member of a troop.

While at camp, you will have a Den Chief who is part of the Webelos Woods staff. See the section in this leader guide, “Den Chief” for more about Den Chiefs.

You are also encouraged to have at least one (1) representative from your den at the SPL meeting on Friday night. The details are on the schedule and in the leader guide section, “Senior Patrol Leader Council.”

REGISTRATION AND CAMPING FEES

Before you register, gather all names for youth and adults who will be attending. Each unit should have only one (1) registration. Troops and packs should register their own units individually. ***Do not create joint unit registration!***

Early Bird Cost: \$15.00 per person if registered by Monday, September 7th.

Regular Registration Cost: After Monday, September 7th, registration cost is \$20 per person.

Registration Close Date: Registration closes September 14th at 5:00 PM.

In accordance with the Guide to Safe Scouting, all youth and adults attending as part of a troop must be registered with the troop. All youth attending with the pack must be members of a Webelos or Arrow of Light Den/Patrol. All adults attending with a pack must either be a registered leader of the pack or a parent of a member of the Webelos or Arrow of Light Den/Patrol. No youth younger than Webelos may attend this event.

PREPARING FOR WEBELOS WOODS

Review the camp requirements: Before you start planning for Webelos Woods, review the camp requirements and guidelines to ensure that your troop is fully prepared. This includes reviewing the necessary gear, paperwork, and safety protocols.

Choose your activities: One of the most important aspects of Webelos Woods is the activity your troop chooses for visiting Arrow of Lights and Webelos to do while interacting with your troop. Troop leaders and Scouts should work together to brainstorm and select Scout skills which are engaging, create friendly competition, and promote teamwork. If possible, incorporate activities that gain advancement credit for your AOLs and Webelos. You will find some suggestions in the Appendix at the end of this leader guide. ***Please note that the AOL and Webelos programs were revised June 1, 2024 and AOL and Webelos no longer share rank requirements.***

Plan your activities: Once you've chosen your activities, it's time to plan the details. Consider the necessary equipment, materials, and space required for each activity, as well as the time and personnel needed to set up and run them.

Troops should plan and carry out an AOL/Webelos activity around any Scout appropriate activity of their choice. It is highly encouraged to plan an activity that incorporates the annual theme for Webelos Woods. Suggestions are available in the Appendix at the end of this leader guide. One goal for your consideration is to allow your newer Scouts to work on developing their leadership skills by letting them lead the potential Scouts in a patrol activity. Awards have been ordered for recognition.

Practice your activities: In the weeks leading up to Webelos Woods, take the time to practice your activities with your troop. This will help ensure that everyone knows their roles and responsibilities and that the activities run smoothly on the day of the camp.

DEN CHIEFS

A Webelos Woods Den Chief will be assigned to each troop who is hosting Webelos and AOLs. The Den Chief will assist the Webelos, AOLs and their parents to navigate the weekend's activities. Webelos Woods Den Chiefs will:

- Greet you when you arrive at camp.
- Visit your campsite on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.
- Guide your Webelos/AOLs through their activities on Saturday.
- Be available to you during the full time you are in camp.
- Help whenever needed; Program snags can often be solved with their help.

FRIDAY ARRIVAL, CHECKING IN AT CAMP and FRIDAY ACTIVITIES

Gates Open: The camp gates open at 4:30 PM; arrive any time after gates open.

Camp Assignment: Proceed through the staff auto check-in line and receive your campsite assignment.

Webelos Woods Den Chief: Meet your Webelos Woods Den Chief to verify the presence of each participant on your unit roster for an accurate count of participants.

Pink Bracelets: A pink bracelet will be provided for each registered youth and adult at camp. The pink bracelet is to be worn at all times. Day visitors will need to check in as well to receive a pink bracelet. The pink bracelets ensure camp staff have an accurate head count and roster for everyone on camp in case of an emergency.

Set Up: Find your campsite, check-in with the troop Scoutmaster and SPL, and set up tents only after you have permission from the Scoutmaster or SPL.

Information Packets: Den Chiefs will deliver packets to each Scoutmaster and one Webelos or AOL leader per pack unit number.

Verify Who is on Camp: Verify all participants who are present, and distribute pink bracelets to everyone on your troop and pack rosters.

Find Your Activity Location: Troops find their activity location on the ball field near Boyce Pavilion.

Set Up Camp: After unloading, move vehicles to parking lot; no roadside parking.

- Each troop may keep their trailer and towing vehicle in their campsite.
- All other vehicles must be moved to the designated parking lot after gear has been unloaded.
- All vehicles are required to be in the parking lot for the safety of campers.
- In case of an emergency, roads must be clear for first responder vehicles.
- When roads are muddy, vehicles parked in campsites and along roads will become stuck in mud and require the Ranger to bring out his tractor.

Senior Patrol Leader Council Meeting: SPL, Scoutmaster and a leader from each Webelos and AOL den attend Senior Patrol Leader Council at Boyce Pavilion. See the schedule for details,

Lights out: Be rested for Saturday!

Scouting America Annual Health and Medical Record: A designated leader from each unit (troop, Webelos den, AOL den) must have a current and completed Scouting America Annual Health and Medical Record for each youth and adult registered to attend Webelos Woods. We suggest you have all forms in one binder. The designated leader should keep the health records binder with them while at camp in case of an emergency. Please keep with you at the activity area during Saturday's events.

SATURDAY ROTATIONS AND TROOP PRESENTATIONS

* Note: The amount of time between each rotation will not be determined until registration closes. Time depends upon the number of units that register.

Rotation Activities: All participating troops will be providing a fun, youth-led activity for all Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts to enjoy as they visit each troop.

Our troops in Eagle District represent all-boy troops, all-girl troops, and family troops that unite boys and girls under a single Scoutmaster. To allow Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts to interact with troops that are similar to the type of troop they would like to join, our rotations operate in a more informal style.

There will still be an air-horn blast to encourage rotation. Webelos dens and Arrow of Light patrols will be able to travel from troop to troop, choosing the troops they want to visit. With this format, there may be times when more than one group of Webelos or Arrow of Lights will be visiting a troop.

The Eagle District Webelos Woods staff will again provide a **passport** system to encourage all Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts to visit and engage with all troops. Passports will be distributed by Webelos Woods Den Chiefs, coordinating with unit leaders and the youth Program Director.

Unit Presentations: Every troop will have a designated location on the ball field near Boyce Pavilion for their activity and presentation. The troops will have a central focus point at the flagpole. Troops may begin setting up their activity area on Friday evening or Saturday morning. Troops are encouraged to bring sunshades. Each troop is asked to provide a water Got for their Scouts, visiting AOL/Webelos, and parents/leaders.

Electronic and tech presentations, such as videos that require computers or need a generator are not allowed. Troops are encouraged to have their SPL make the presentation, and their Scouts provide the activity for their visiting AOL/Webelos.

While the youth are engaged in presentations, troop adult leaders are encouraged to engage prospective Scout parents with a friendly two-way conversation in a common “question and answer” dialogue format.

Remember! This is an opportunity for troop adults to encourage the Webelos/AOL parents to continue supporting their Scouting youth by being involved at your troop in a future leadership role. Troop adults should encourage new future adult involvement in the unit’s success.

SATURDAY DINNER and DESSERT PLANNING

Saturday evening, dinner will be provided by the Webelos Woods Quartermaster team of youth and adults.

Menu: Pulled pork or pulled chicken sandwiches, chips, and assorted salads which will include tossed greens, cabbage slaw and potato salad.

Desserts: Dutch oven potluck to be provided by attending troops (see below).

Special Dietary Needs: Please inform staff of any special dietary needs, including those related to allergies, medical conditions, religious observances, or cultural practices. ***You will need to make your dietary requests when registering on Black Pug, using the appropriate field designated for each individual's registration.*** Staff will make every effort to accommodate dietary needs of participants. It may be necessary for those with food restrictions or special diets to bring food substitutions if the provided meal cannot be adapted to your dietary requirements.

DUTCH OVEN POTLUCK DESSERTS

We are asking all our troops and packs to bring their favorite Dutch oven dessert to share with all Webelos Woods participants. You will want to provide enough Dutch oven desserts to serve the same number of people you are bringing to Webelos Woods.

Dutch Oven Dessert Competition: There will be an optional **contest** for patrols (Scout, Webelos, Arrow of Light, or adult patrols) who would like to enter their Dutch oven dessert and compete for “Best Dessert”. The patrol with the best dessert will win a prize.

CAMPFIRE ACTIVITIES, SKITS and SONGS

All units are expected to participate in the campfire on Saturday night. We encourage participation from Webelos/AOL guests as well. All skits and songs must be less than 5 minutes in length. This is to ensure that the campfire does not run too long and that everyone has a chance to participate.

Skits and songs must be approved by the youth program coordinators before Saturday's dinner time. This is to ensure that skits and songs are Scout appropriate and do not contain any vulgar or offensive content. All performers must be mindful of their audience.

- Skits and songs shall be appropriate for all ages and should not be offensive to any particular group, or they will be removed from the program line-up.
- Language and behavior should be appropriate for a family-friendly event.
- Skits and songs cannot be even remotely considered edgy or dark. This includes any content that is overly violent, scary, or disturbing.

A Scout is kind - respect should be given to all performers. No heckling, booing, or other disruptive behavior will be tolerated. Any props or costumes used in skits should be safe and appropriate. Fire and other hazardous materials should not be used.

By following these rules, everyone can enjoy a fun and safe campfire experience.

SUNDAY INTERFAITH SERVICE

An interfaith service will occur at camp on Sunday morning at the BP-Campfire ring.

SUNDAY CHECKOUT

On Sunday morning, the following procedures will be followed to check out of camp as a unit:

- Your Den Chief will report to your campsite and assist you in breaking down camp.
- Your Den Chief and SPL will determine when the campsite is clean so the unit may check out of camp.
- As your unit drives out of camp, stop at the Program Office to turn in your camp evaluation form and receive your check-out packet (health forms, patches, etc.).

II. *CAMP RULES and REGULATIONS*

All youth and adult participants are expected to live by **the Scout Oath, Scout Law, and Outdoor Code** and follow the current edition of the **Guide to Safe Scouting and Safeguarding Youth Training**.

Camp staff are responsible for enforcing camp rules and safety policies. Participants are expected to follow staff directions respectfully and without argument. Disrespectful, abusive, or belligerent behavior toward staff will not be tolerated. Concerns about rule enforcement should be directed through the Unit Leader to the Camp Director.

No participant should continue an activity if they feel unsafe. Anyone with a safety concern should immediately notify a staff member and will be excused from the activity until the issue is addressed.

Only published camp rules and policies will be enforced. Concerns regarding unofficial or unwritten rules should be brought to the Camp Director through the Unit Leader.

SAFEGUARDING YOUTH AND BARRIERS TO ABUSE

Protecting youth is Scouting America's highest priority. Any camp leader, staff member, or volunteer who suspects, witnesses, or receives a report of child abuse must immediately report it as required by Oklahoma law. While at camp, all suspected incidents of physical, emotional, or sexual abuse must also be reported to the Camp Director. All reports will be handled confidentially.

Scouting America's **Barriers to Abuse** and **Safeguarding Youth Training (SYT)** policies must be followed at all times. All registered adult leaders must maintain current SYT certification, and all youth and adults are expected to comply with these policies without exception.

Consistent with Scouting's Barriers to Abuse, adults may not tent with or shower with youth members. Violations or suspected violations may result in immediate removal from camp. The only exception is a parent or legal guardian sharing a tent with their own child; however, separate sleeping arrangements are strongly encouraged to promote youth independence and avoid misunderstandings.

Any suspected abuse or allegation of abuse must be reported directly to law enforcement or other appropriate authorities as required by law. Such matters are ***not*** to be investigated by troop leaders, volunteers, or camp staff. Leaders may notify the Camp Director that law enforcement has been contacted and may arrive on-site, but details of the report should not be shared.

Harassment, bullying, sexual comments or jokes, and racist, ethnic, religious, sexist, or sexual orientation-based slurs or remarks will not be tolerated. All participants are expected to treat one another with dignity and respect while upholding the values of Scouting America.

ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, DRUGS, and VAPING

The use of tobacco products and vaping devices is prohibited on all Scouting America properties. Alcohol, illegal substances, and marijuana are not permitted at any Scouting America event or property, regardless of state laws permitting medical or recreational use.

Anyone found in violation of this policy will be required to leave camp and may be reported to local law enforcement and the Last Frontier Council. Units must maintain leadership that complies with Scouting America Safeguarding Youth policies at all times. If adequate leadership cannot be maintained, the entire troop may be required to leave camp.

CLOTHING, UNIFORM, ATTIRE, and FOOTWARE

Uniforms: Class A uniforms are required upon arrival and for all formal activities, including flag ceremonies, campfire programs, and religious services.

Camp Attire: Class B attire may be worn in unit campsites and during designated activities. Clothing must be appropriate for a Scouting event and may not promote alcohol, tobacco, drugs, violence, sexual content, racism, sexism, or other forms of discrimination. All clothing must provide appropriate coverage, including shoulders, midriff, undergarments, and private areas. Shirts must be worn at all times, and shorts should be of modest length.

Footwear: Extensive walking is expected. **Closed-toe, closed-heel footwear** such as hiking boots or athletic shoes is required. Crocs, sandals, and other open-heel footwear are not permitted.

FACILITIES & DISTANCE TO NEARBY TOWNS

John Nichols Scout Ranch, established in 1932, is located at SW 119th and County Line Road.

Two shower and restroom facilities are in place and will be open for Webelos Woods.

- The first is located close to Boyce Pavilion along the gravel road.
- The second is located on Jamboree Hill on the East side of the hill as you approach it.

There are water hydrants located near most campsites.

FIRST AID

1. All troops should have a First Aid kit within their camp site. A First Aid shelter for more serious injuries is in the Program Building. This shelter will be monitored 24/7.
2. An Emergency Preparedness Kit will be on hand with at least the following items:
 - First Responder kit
 - Medications
 - Water-Food
 - Stretcher
 - Flashlights with extra batteries
 - Battery Operated Radios
 - Tools
 - Dressing & Bandages
 - Map of the area
 - After Hours emergency numbers
 - Routes to Hospital location
 - AED (Automated External Defibrillator) device
 - Emergency contact lists, of local fire, police, hospital, state troopers, Park Rangers & Last Frontier Council

FIRE

In the event of a fire, whether wild or accidental, all Scoutmasters responsible for their Scouts will do a head count and ensure their Scouts are all accounted for and located.

As the head count is taking place, a minimum of 2 adult leaders will keep the Scouts calm and collected. The remaining adult leaders and older Scouts ranked Star, Life and Eagle may assist in putting out any fire that is designated by an adult leader as controllable.

The First Aid station will be notified by two (2) runners that a fire is approaching or is in a campground. First Aid will call 911, Webelos Woods staff leaders, and the Park Ranger ASAP when notified. As listed previously in the leader guide, a minimum of two (2) buckets of water or sand should be in each campsite, with each fire ring, regardless of whether campfires are active.

TWO-WAY RADIO METHOD

Radio Use: Webelos Woods staff will be using 2-way radios to communicate across camp. All staff and scouting units are asked if they are using 2-way radios to follow the following guidelines for safe and effective use of the radio network. In addition, we ask that troops use a channel that is different from the channel used by staff.

- Be prepared before you make a call - know who you are calling and why.
- Identify yourself before beginning a transmission.
- Identify who you are contacting.
- Keep your communication brief and to the point.
- When you finish a message and need a reply, say, "over."
- When terminating a call, say, "out."
- Speak clearly and briefly.
- All emergencies must be directed to an adult:
 - Medical Team – Ladd Ketrin
 - Camp Director – Jesse Pelfrey
 - Asst. Camp Director – Donnie Thornton
 - Program Director – Susan Barker
 - Quartermaster – Jim Miller
- All radio traffic goes silent in an emergency.
- In case of an emergency, all adults go to channel 2.
- Remember the frequency is shared with others not in your group.
- Do not broadcast names of minor children.
- Use English - Experts advise that English is the official international radio language.

IV. HEALTH AND SAFETY

Units should be prepared for injuries, severe weather, and other emergencies.

HEALTH

The health and safety of all participants is one of our highest priorities. Participants should arrive healthy and prepared for changing weather conditions, including heat and cold.

FIRST AID

Each unit must maintain a properly stocked First Aid Kit in a visible, centrally located area within its campsite, and all Scouts and leaders must know its location.

FIRE

Each campsite must have **two (2) filled fire buckets** readily available. Campsites with a fire ring must maintain **two (2) additional fire buckets at the fire location**. Fire buckets may contain water, sand, or a combination of both; the chosen method must be used consistently throughout the campsite.

HAZARDS

Guy lines and any other tripping hazards must be clearly marked or removed.

WEATHER

In the event of inclement weather, all unit leaders must report to Program Headquarters for instructions. If **three (3) blasts of the air horn** are sounded, unit leaders should immediately report to the First Aid Station for information.

Weather conditions will be closely monitored throughout the event. During thunderstorms or lightning, participants will move to designated shelter locations, and each unit's Scoutmaster or designee will conduct a head count.

Our severe weather response is as follows:

1. **Severe storms:** Boyce Pavilion or personal vehicles will serve as the primary shelter locations.
2. **Light rain:** Activities may continue, and Scouts may remain in campsites under appropriate shelter, such as tents.
3. **Tornado threat:** Camp staff will assess conditions and direct participants to approved tornado shelters or, if necessary, cancel the event.
4. **Emergency decisions:** Camp leadership will monitor local weather reports and make relocation or shelter decisions before severe weather reaches camp.

BUDDY SYSTEM

The **buddy system** is required throughout the event. Scouts should participate in activities with at least one (1) other Scout of similar age and gender, particularly during activities that present increased risks.

SPECIAL NEEDS

Any Scout or adult with special needs or accommodation requirements should notify staff at check-in so appropriate arrangements can be made.

LOST CAMPER

Report any missing camper to the Camp Director immediately.

BATHHOUSES

Phones, cameras, and other image-capturing devices are prohibited in and around bathhouses. Adult leaders are asked to assist with bathhouse supervision during Saturday activities. During scheduled unit shower times, at least one (1) adult leader from the unit should remain outside the bathhouse to help supervise Scout behavior and ensure compliance with Safeguarding Youth policies.

VEHICLE SAFETY

Riding in truck beds, trailers, or on tailgates is prohibited. All passengers must ride in approved seating positions and wear seat belts. Drivers must be at least 18 years old and hold a valid driver's license; drivers transporting passengers must be at least 21 years old. Vehicles must have seat belts for all occupants.

CAMP SPEED LIMIT

The maximum speed limit is 15 mph on camp roads and 5 mph within camp areas. Off-road driving is prohibited.

VEHICLE STORAGE

All vehicles must be parked in designated parking areas. Vehicles are not permitted in campsites or along camp roads. Troop buses, trailers, and support vehicles must also be parked in designated locations. Vehicle owners are solely responsible for the security of their vehicles and contents. Camp staff and event organizers are not liable for loss or damage resulting from theft, vandalism, fire, weather, or other causes, nor for items left in vehicles or trailers.

MOVEMENT AROUND CAMP

Running is discouraged except during organized activities. Hiking, biking, jogging, and other recreational activities are undertaken at the participant's own risk.

CLEANLINESS – A SCOUT IS CLEAN

Help us keep camp clean, safe, and enjoyable for everyone. Each troop is responsible for maintaining a clean campsite and properly disposing of trash in designated dumpsters.

Before departing, remove all personal and troop equipment, including chairs, rugs, and other campsite items. Participants are encouraged to help keep roads, campsites, and common areas free of litter and to maintain good personal hygiene throughout the event.

Remember the Scout outdoor ethic: Take only pictures, leave only footprints. Please respect camp property and leave every area cleaner than you found it.

PETS

Pets are not permitted at camp. **Service animals are welcome** and are defined under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) as dogs individually trained to perform specific tasks for a person with a disability.

Emotional support, comfort, therapy, or companion animals do not qualify as service animals under the ADA.

Participants planning to bring a service animal must notify the **Camp Director** and **Camp Ranger** prior to arrival.

V. TRADING POST, BRANDING, and AWARDS

CAMP TRADING POST & BRANDING

A camp trading post will be available with snacks, drinks, and Scouting supplies for purchase. The post will be set up near the program activity area on Saturday. This tent will also offer water, first aid, and a help desk.

We have officially obtained a branding iron to document your items in an effort to memorialize your attendance at this event. Check the camp schedule to find out when and where the branding iron will be available.

AWARDS

Most Enthusiastic: This award recognizes the Scout or troop that best exemplifies Scout Spirit. Recipients demonstrate a positive attitude, teamwork, leadership, and a willingness to learn and grow from their experiences. They actively participate in camp activities, support others, and consistently contribute to a positive camp environment.

Safety Award: This award recognizes the troop or pack that consistently demonstrates excellence in health, safety, and youth protection. Recipients adhere to the safety policies and procedures outlined in the *Webelos Woods Leader Guide*, *Guide to Safe Scouting*, and Safeguarding Youth practices. Evaluation criteria include, but are not limited to, proper use of the buddy system, two-deep leadership, safe campfire practices, knowledge and accessibility of the unit first-aid kit, keeping vehicles in designated parking areas, and wearing appropriate footwear throughout camp. The award honors units that make safety a priority in all aspects of their camp experience.

Cleanest Campsite Award: This award goes to the troop that best maintains a clean and tidy campsite throughout the event. The winning troop should keep their area free of litter, properly dispose of waste, and leave the campsite better than they found it. This award encourages Scouts to be responsible stewards of the environment.

Outstanding Service Award: This award goes to the Scout or troop that has provided the most service to the camp or local community during the event. The winning Scout or troop should demonstrate a commitment to helping others and a willingness to go above and beyond to serve their community.

Camp Wide Game Award: This award goes to the winner of the camp wide games.

Patrol Dutch Oven Dessert Award: This award goes to the winner of the best Dutch oven dessert competition.
