Intro to Wilderness First Aid - Do I really need Wilderness First Aid Training?



Stop the Bleed! Essential Skills for Scouters

We never want to imagine it, but accidents can happen-a Scout mountain biking or running down a trail could fall and suffer a deep puncture wound, or a knife mishap could lead to a serious cut. Would you know what to do? In this class, you'll learn essential techniques to control severe bleeding and potentially save a life.
