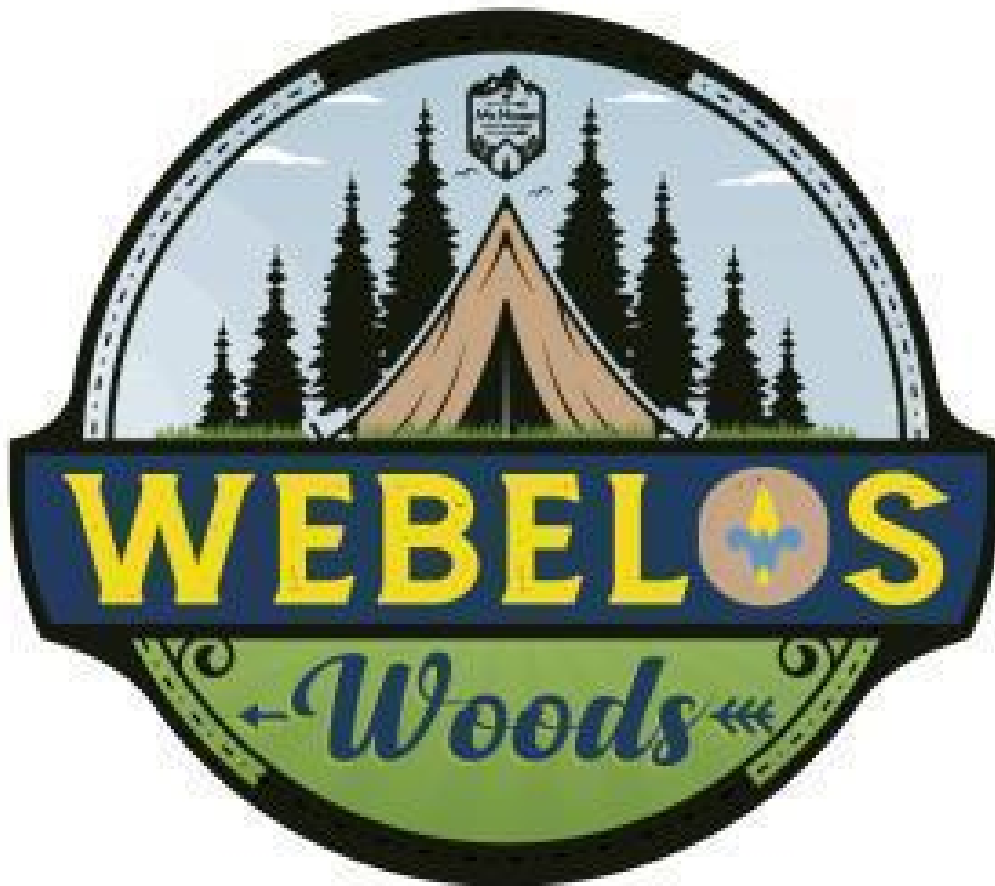

2026 Webelos Woods Onsite Guide



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Welcome to Webelos Wood, come have fun at our closest CPC camp. You will have the opportunity to come experience various events supported by our local Troops and District personnel. Bring your enthusiasm and sense of advent and come have some fun. Webelos and AOL's will have an opportunity to experience some fun activities over the course of the weekend. Adults and Parents you will have an opportunity to meet some of our local Troops and District Personnel.

Registration

All units should register online through CPC's system.

Cub Scouts and Packs:

- Camping Option: \$15/attendee or \$20 if registering starting 9/1.
- Day-Only Option: \$10/attendee or \$12 starting 9/1.

Troops:

- Camping Option: \$10/attendee
- Day-Only Option: \$5/attendee or \$7 starting 9/1

Scouts, parents and adult leaders need to follow the appropriate leadership as outlined in the BSA Guidelines to Safe Scouting.

We will not be able to accommodate or register any Units past the event cutoff. Only registered Scouts BSA members will be allowed to attend.

Required Forms

Units will need their registration, medical forms, and final rosters.

Unit leaders **must** have a copy of the BSA Annual Health and Medical Record Parts A and B for **ALL PARTICIPANTS** on site at Camporee. These will not be collected during registration but must be made available for emergency medical care.

Check-In

Check-in Friday night starts at 6pm, if you are only attending for Saturday check-in starts at 7am. Registration will be at the main shelter. We ask that all attending Packs or Troops check-in as complete as possible. If you have members joining independent of the main unit please make sure they check in with our Staff. All attendees will receive a wristband. Anyone not wearing a wristband needs to be directed to headquarters.

Arrival & Parking

Plan to arrive no earlier than 6:00 PM and no later than 9:00 PM on Friday evening. There will be signs and volunteers directing you to the unloading and parking areas. Please notify parking advisors if you have participants with mobility issues. Plan your vehicle unloading prior to arrival. Youth and adults are expected to carry personal gear between their campsite and the unloading area. A wheeled cart is encouraged for hauling troop gear to campsites across the grass field.

Drivers should be mindful of speed limits (10mph or less). Please back-into parking spaces for safe emergency evacuation, vehicles should remain in the designated parking spaces during the event. Do not park on the roads, the roads must be kept clear for emergency vehicles.

Campsites

Units will be assigned camping locations at Registration. Campsite space will be set up Jamboree Style. There is no direct vehicle access to sites. Please stay within the assigned camping area. Units should follow the Guide to Safe Scouting for camping arrangements for their Units.

Please be courteous and don't cut through other Units campsites and stay on the designated trails. **No Shortcuts.** Campfires are only allowed in established fire pits (if no burn bans are in effect). Units may use propane fire pits if they are elevated above the ground.

Camp Meals / Cooking Equipment

Units will provide their own food for the weekend, this includes lunch for Saturday. The event **is not providing Saturday lunch.** There will be an opportunity for those units camping Friday night to have their own cracker barrel.

Cooking equipment (stoves, pots/pans, etc.) are to be provided by each unit. The camp does not have equipment or items to loan out.

Equipment

This is a tent camping weekend. Packs and Troops need to bring any equipment they need to support their camping activities. Each scout should be prepared with their 10 essentials. Be sure your Scouts write their name and Troop or Pack number on all personal belongings. The big meadow does not have much shade so pop-up / canopies are encouraged. See the camping gear list for suggested items to bring. Tents with rain fly & a ground tarp are a must. Scouts will probably assign Tent Buddies in den before coming to Camp Lewis, but adults will need a separate tent. Adults are not permitted to share a tent with any scout other than their own.

Potable Water / Wastewater / KYBO's / Garbage

Potable water (water pumps) are on site by the main parking lot and on the path towards Ft. Simcoe in the Lower Meadow. Units should bring sufficient water containers to support their needs.

Units should bring buckets and screens for proper gray water disposal per Scouts BSA guidelines. Gray (dish) water should be dispersed or placed in a cathole. Food must be screened and removed before disposal. **Do not dispose of greywater in the KYBO's or wash dishes at the water pumps.**

Kybo's are located throughout the site for scout and scouter use. Please shut the lids after use to help control smells.

"Pack it in, pack it out!" Every Unit must remove ALL their own trash, garbage, and camping supplies. Scouts leave it better than we found it.

Uniforms

The regulation Scout Field uniform ("Class-A") is the official uniform and should be worn proudly for morning and evening flags. Uniforms should be clean and neat in appearance with the shirt tucked in and buttons buttoned.

Activity uniforms ("class-B") are optional during Saturday activity/event stations.

Reminders

- Wear a complete uniform. A mix of old and new is acceptable. Patches should be UpToDate.
- Wear hiking/activity footwear (skate shoes don't help keep feet dry, nor do they provide good ankle support)
- Remember to use the "Buddy system." Buddies must be single gender per the Guide to Safe Scouting.
- Think Safety! and Have Fun!

Saturday Activities

Webelos and AOL Scouts will be organized into Cohorts (Patrols). Depending on the size of the Packs; this could be a mix of various units. Cohorts' size will be dependent on the event's overall participation size. Cohorts (Patrols) will be assigned a set rotation for the day's activities. There will be a morning rotation and an afternoon rotation for the Cohorts to visit various activity stations. Similar to Scouts BSA Camporee you will be spending the day away from your campsite be sure to plan accordingly.

Saturday Lunch

Saturday lunches will be a **trail lunch provided by the individual units** for their scouts. Be sure to pack your lunch for you to carry with you in the morning. This is a change from previous years to give the Units more time to spend with the activity stations.

Shooting Sports

All scouts will need to go through a Range Safety briefing at the **Big Shelter**, to receive a wrist band, to access the ranges during your designated time.

Campwide Games

After our final activity rotation join our youth staff who will be leading various campwide games.

Skits & Saturday Campfire

Units we need your help with filling our Saturday night campfire program. If you have a skit or song your scouts would like to showcase we will have tryouts from 6-7pm in the Firebowl.

Sunday Checkout

Remember that all trash is to be packed out. Campsites should always be left better than they were found. Assistance in surveying and cleaning common areas is expected and very much appreciated. When the Unit leader is satisfied that the campsite is clean, they will contact HQ, where a member of the staff will inspect the campsite. The staff member will then give them approval to leave.

Staff / Headquarters / First Aid

We will have some OA and District personnel serving as the Staff for this event. The main activities will be supported by some of our local Troops.

Headquarters will be located in the main shelter next to the main parking lot.

First Aid will be located at headquarters. **All accidents and injuries must be reported to the first aid station.**

Lost & Found

Lost and Found will be located at Headquarters. Items will be brought out at Saturday evening Flag/ Campfire, and again Sunday morning. Items not claimed will be brought to the next District Roundtable; remaining items will be donated.

Camp Rules

- **NO ONE is allowed to be near the river.** ANYONE found near the river will be asked to leave camp and will not be allowed to return. **No REFUNDS!**
- Please respect any areas that have been flagged off-limits with caution tape or noted verbally.
- You will have to provide your own firewood since there is absolutely no brush gathering or timber cutting permitted. Do not cut down any trees. This is only if there is not a burn ban in effect.
- Fires must be attended at all times or completely extinguished before leaving your campsite. You must also haul out your ashes. Do not throw them in the woods.
- No flames in buildings, in or within 10 feet of tents.
- All gas stoves, lanterns and other such equipment are to be used only under direct adult supervision.
- No fixed blade knives or pocketknives longer than three inches are permitted, with the exception of Order of the Arrow in regalia. Webelos or Bears that have earned their Whittlin' Chip may use them in their campsite only. The scout must carry their whittlin' chip card on them any time they are using their pocket knife. If asked to show their card and they do not have it, they will be asked to give up their pocket knife and a leader can pick up the knife at the end of the event. They may NOT carry them around camp. Adults are responsible for maintaining possession of the knives during the remaining time. Knives will be confiscated and turned over to leaders if misused or used outside of scouts own camp.
- As stated in the BSA Guidelines, youth may not use tobacco in any form. Adult smoking must be done in their vehicles only at the top of the hill. Scouting is a smoke-free environment.
- **NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE ALLOWED AT BSA EVENTS!**
- NO FIREARMS (including pellet, BB and paintball guns) or FIREWORKS of any type are allowed in camp. All equipment of this type will be provided by the Camp at the appropriate stations.
- ABSOLUTELY NO PETS ARE ALLOWED.

Family Gear
