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Pilgrimage and Encampment Committee Mission and Purpose:

An annual scouting event to experience the historical significance of the American Revolution and honor General George Washington and his Continental Army winter encampments.

Letter from the Chair

Welcome to the Pilgrimage and Encampment, our commemoration of the Continental Army's original encampment here during the Revolutionary War. The Pilgrimage portion provides learning opportunities of that era as well as modern times via a round-robin course. This Leader's Guide should provide you with all the information needed to have an enjoyable, safe outing. Please review it carefully and share it with your leadership, parents, and youth.

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania website tells us that Fort Washington State Park and the community of Fort Washington take their name from the temporary fort built here by soldiers of the American Revolution in the fall of 1777. Whitemarsh, as the area was called then, was the scene of the encampment of 12,000 soldiers of General Washington's army from November 2 until December 11, 1777. Following the unsuccessful battle of Germantown, Washington chose the heights of the Whitemarsh Valley as an easily defensible position. From here, he pondered the possibility of launching an attack against General Howe's British army in Philadelphia. Although Washington decided against an attack, the British marched out from Philadelphia on December 5 to try to engage the Americans in battle. Because of Washington's strong position, only local skirmishes took place. After much marching back and forth, Howe led his army back to Philadelphia on December 8. Knowing his poorly clad men needed better quarters, and also to protect the iron forges and foundries in the Schuylkill Valley, Washington left Whitemarsh on December 11, 1777, and marched the Continental Army to Valley Forge.

Our Encampment is both similar to and different from Washington's encampments. We come fully supplied with modern equipment and plenty of rations. However, we still face the uncertainty of weather conditions – anywhere from very cold to downright warm; and dry, snowing or raining. Day visitors to the Pilgrimage need to take weather conditions into consideration, too. Although you will only be here for the day, improper dress or inadequate food or water can make your day miserable.

Please also study our activity policies and procedures. Some come from our host facility, others are local municipal ordinances as well as the principles of the Scout Oath and Law and are meant to ensure that the Pilgrimage and Encampment operates safely, effectively, and enjoyably for everyone.

If you have any questions concerning the Pilgrimage and Encampment, please do not hesitate to contact us. The P&E Committee is made up of volunteers who are willing to assist you. Thanks, and see you there!

Prior to Traveling


1. Be Prepared! Weather is an uncertainty. We’ve had warm/dry January and February, followed by a cold and wet/snowy March. Dress in light loose layers, synthetic materials, wool, or silk and a waterproof outer layer. It is easier to correct over dressing than it is under dressing.
2. Ensure all participants are wearing appropriate footwear and attire. Refer to General Expectations section of this document for further details.
3. Fill one patrol list including the unit number, patrol name, number of scouts, and leaders in each patrol. This should be turned in at the registration/checkin station upon arriving at the program area before the opening begins.
4. Items needed to make the Pilgrimage more enjoyable
 - a. Pack a lunch
 - b. Plenty of water
 - c. Bring a camp cup for hot liquids – we will offer hot chocolate at a station!
 - d. Bring a basic kit for eating (bowl and spoon) – the cooking station is interactive and will produce samples!
 - e. A pocket knife may be helpful depending on your program choices

Program:

All Scouts are invited to join us to participate in hands-on activities during the day. These activities are designed to help connect Scouts with life of the 1700's, and what it was like to be a Continental soldier during the winter of 1777-78. The period reflecting our quest for independence from Britain. Program areas are organized to run as 45 minute sessions. This gives Scouts the opportunity to have a direct **interactive** experience. We have a few program areas bundled together in 90 minute sessions as well.

Each unit will be provided a google form link to submit prior to the event. This will allow the staff to create a unique program for each unit based upon their interests. Each unit's schedule will be provided at check-in.

Your patrol will be assigned an initial numbered program area, after opening ceremonies, proceed to that program. When the program completes, you and your group will proceed to the next sequential program area. Please remember that you will only participate in four program areas. Please come back in future years to attend others!

We will continue to run similar programs in future years, we look forward to seeing you back next year!



General Expectations

Leadership:

Per Scouts BSA policy –

Two registered adult leaders 21 years of age or over are required at all Scouting activities. There must be a registered female adult leader 21 years of age or over in every unit serving females. A registered female adult leader 21 years of age or over must be present for any activity involving female youth or female adult program participants. All adults staying overnight in connection with a Scouting activity must be currently registered as an adult volunteer or an adult program participant. Adult volunteers must register in the position(s) they are serving in.

Behavior:

We are guests using the facilities provided. We must follow specific rules, as well as those of the local government. In addition, as scouts we should always be following our Oath and Law.

Cooking and Fuels:

Only elevated charcoal (not on the ground) and propane camp stoves may be used for cooking meals. NO INDIVIDUAL CAMPFIRES! Charcoal ashes MUST be disposed into the designated concrete ash pits throughout the campground. Please pack out empty propane canisters.

Accidents:

Fires, accidents, security issues, property damage and injuries (no matter how minor) must be reported to the P&E staff. We have on-site Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel to assist with injuries and transport, if needed, to local hospitals. Please see them for any medical concerns.

Cold Weather Preparedness:

Dress for the weather. In particular, dress in layers that include an outer layer for the elements. If you are unfamiliar with cold-weather outings, you should attend training sessions at the Council's ScoutingU. Be Prepared! According to The Guide to Safe Scouting Section XII on Winter Activities, it is the responsibility of the parents, leaders, and scouts to ensure that all youth are properly dressed for the cold weather. Participant's health and safety is critical.

Improperly dressed participants may be asked to leave for their own safety. Please take caution to footwear and attire and ensure each scout is dressed appropriately prior to departing from their home. **Tip bring extra socks to allow scouts and scouters to change as needed.**


Facilities:

Porta-potties will be strategically placed throughout the event. Flushable toilets are available near the road leading to the Encampment site. Please plan on bringing water to the Pilgrimage due to limited resources there is NO POTABLE WATER available. Water can be obtained from the Encampment site near the Headquarters area. Please plan on packing out your trash from the Pilgrimage, a dumpster will be available for the Encampment participants.

Prohibited:

The following are absolutely prohibited by the host facility, BSA, and/or local government:

- Wood fires – Fort Washington State Park has permitted two exceptions. One shared fire across from the Headquarters area and one fire for the Saturday evening campfire. All are welcome to sit and enjoy the shared fire.
- Ground fires
- The use of any heating device inside of a tent, shelter, kitchen, or dining fly
- Use of skates, skateboards, rollerblades
- Parking anywhere other than specifically designated areas
- Disposing of propane cylinders or used charcoal in dumpsters
- Use of alcoholic beverages and other specific items designated by Scouting America standards and local regulations.



ENCAMPMENT LOGISTICS

(weekend camping and activities)

Advance Preparation

1. Read through this entire Leader's Guide to make sure you have a full understanding of this activity's requirements – and review with your leadership and youth.
2. Be Prepared! Weather is an uncertainty. We've had warm/dry January and February, and very cold and snowy March. Dress in light loose layers of synthetic materials, wool, or silk. A windproof / waterproof shell may also be appropriate. It is easier to correct over dressing than it is under dressing.
3. Ensure all participants are wearing appropriate footwear and attire. Refer to General Expectations section of this document for further details.

Prior to traveling

- 1) Just prior to packing and traveling, review weather conditions and adjust accordingly
- 2) Fill out TWO rosters and one patrol list including the patrol name, number of scouts, and leaders in each patrol. The rosters must include the names and contact info for each participant – youth and adult.
- 3) Bring your troop binder / folder of medical forms for each participant that will be held by a designated unit leader.
- 4) Include current Drug Administration and Emergency Action Plan forms in the same binder / folder.
- 5) Have each driver fill out BOTH halves of the Vehicle Registration form (located in this guide).

TOP: submitted to shuttle van driver at parking lot.

BOTTOM: to be placed on the dash of the vehicle.

- 6) Make sure all drivers have directions to get to check-in and parking maps. There are two different parking lots, your unit will be assigned a lot upon arrival.
- 7) Please take your time to arrive safely, once all vehicles have arrived, the unit will be permitted to check in.
- 8) When packing vehicles, please place a tarp within easy reach and deployment upon arrival. When unloading, all equipment will be placed on a tarp near the unloading zone. Once vehicles are empty and moved, then campsite setup may occur.

Check-in is located at Fort Washington State Park entrance off of Militia Hill Rd. Follow staff directions just after entering the park.

Encampment specific rules and information

Campsites:

The large group camping areas have been divided into subsections and will be assigned upon arrival. Your unit will be assigned one or more sections based on attendance, please ensure your unit stays within the established boundaries. Please check with staff upon arrival if there are any questions or concerns about your campsite. The number of units attending will exceed the number of picnic tables in the camping area, please provide your own tables.

Tenting:

Please use the minimum number of tents. No trenching is permitted. No portable heaters or flames are permitted in tents. Straw or hay for bedding is allowed **ONLY IF SEED FREE**. All straw and hay must be removed before checkout and can be disposed of in the dumpster.

Cooking and Fuels:

Only elevated charcoal (not on the ground) and propane camp stoves may be used for cooking meals. **NO INDIVIDUAL CAMPFIRES!** Charcoal ashes **MUST** be disposed into the designated concrete ash pits throughout the campground. Please pack out empty propane canisters.

Parking:

Parking is offsite as listed on the directions page. Shuttle vans are available throughout the duration of the event if you need to return to your vehicle or trailer. Rides can be coordinated from the Headquarters tent.

Unloading & Loading

To keep things flowing, we ask that you unload all troop and personal gear onto a tarp near the vehicles (it would be helpful to have the tarp easily accessible), give your youth leadership guidance on how to arrange the site, and leave them in charge to oversee the setup while all the vehicles move to remote parking. Upon departure, we ask that your site be taken down completely and placed in one pile on a tarp before retrieving your vehicles. If you have vehicles assisting with travel only and not staying for the weekend, please have them meet at the parking lot and not the campsite. Vehicles will only be permitted in the campground for loading/unloading as an entire group, staging lots for regrouping will be available as needed.

Fellowship Fire

There will be a fellowship campfire burning for the duration of the event. The fire is located across from Headquarters area. This is a great place to warm the fingers and toes, socialize, and find information.

Warming

If your scouts or leaders start to get a chill, have them stop by the fellowship fire for some warmth. Please make sure they have changed their socks prior to heading over to the fire. If additional warming is necessary, medical staff are available in this area too.

Washington's Surveyor and Mapmaker Stew Cook-Off:

Before Washington fought in the wars, he was a surveyor. When he arrived in camp, he was cold; tired; and hungry. The camp cooks wanted to prepare a hardy stew to satisfy him with a taste of home. Using locally procured food items as the main ingredients, the cooks prepared a satisfying meal called Hunter's Stew. Around camp this meal became affectionately known as Washington's Stew.

This year's cooking challenge will be for your camp cooks to prepare a stew to feed **your** cold, tired and hungry troop. You can use your own favorite recipe, but it must include at least one protein, one vegetable and a starch. Bring a sample of your unit's stew to the Headquarters tent Saturday evening at 7:00 for judging. Judging will be based upon taste, appearance, and originality. The troop creating the winning stew will enjoy fresh, delicious pizzas, delivered directly to your campsite for your troop's Saturday night snack.

Survival Scavenger Hunt:

This scavenger hunt will separate the real scouts from the tenderfeet! This is a patrol event and not a race. The patrol that finishes with the most items will be awarded with a prize at the Heritage Campfire. Patrols can pick up their scavenger hunt list in the Headquarters area anytime on Saturday. Bring your completed sheet and items back to the Headquarters tent to be checked no later than 7:00 p.m. Participants must stay within the encampment limits. Good hunting and may luck be with you! The team with the most items found will win two pizzas delivered to your campsite for your troop's Saturday night snack.

Gateway Contest:

We realize that troops arriving at the encampment must travel light; therefore, the contest rules will be simple. The entire gateway structure must be free standing with all poles and guy ropes within your campsite borders. The gateway must be constructed utilizing two types of lashings, supporting a sign with your troop's name, number, town, and state proudly displayed.


Gateway judging will take place Saturday at 7:00 pm. The troop with the winning entry will be awarded two pizzas for their Saturday night snack.
