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Welcome to our annual Eagle Valley Merit Badge University held at Penn West University, California Campus. Thank you for showing interest in our event. Please visit: www.eaglevalleymbu.org for all the current information and forms. As you look over the following pages, please keep in mind a few things:

Class size is limited to 12 Scouts unless otherwise noted.

- Some badges are for a full day while others are scheduled for the morning or afternoon.
 Your Scouts can register for either one full day class or two half day classes (one in the morning and one in the afternoon)
- 2. The cost is \$20.
- 3. Scouts must bring a signed "Blue Card" from their unit leader.
- 4. All Scouts must bring paper and something to write with.
- 5. All participants must fill out and bring a signed permission form, parts a and b of the current BSA medical form, and any prerequisite required for their chosen badge.
- 6. All documents will be returned to the Scout at dismissal. Any unclaimed paperwork will be shredded at the end of the event.
- 7. If you plan on spending the day at the University with your Scout, please bring a current copy of your state clearances with you. You WILL be asked to leave if you do not have all your clearances. These are: PENNSYLVANIA CHILD ABUSE HISTORY CLEARANCE, PENNSYLVANIA STATE POLICE CRIMINAL RECORD CHECK, FBI BACKGROUND CHECK OR RESIDENT VERIFICATION FORM IF YOU HAVE LIVED IN PENNSYLVANIA OVER 10 YEARS, and BSA YOUTH PROTECTION.
- 8. We will supply a boxed lunch. This consists of a sandwich, cookie, chips, fruit, and water.

 Our ability to meet all dietary restrictions is limited. Please contact us directly before
 the event with questions.
- If you plan to pick up your Scout before the end of the event, you must fill out the required form and let us know in advance. Please check out with us before you pick up your Scout.

- 10.Registration takes place at Natali Student Center on the 3rd floor. This is a change from years past. Scouts will be dismissed from there to their classroom building. We will also dismiss from there at the end of the event.
- 11. Scouts are to wear a class "A" uniform. If this is not possible, then a Scout related t shirt will work. Scouts should also bring a water bottle.
- 12. Preregistration is highly recommended as classes fill up fast. We cannot guarantee class choice if you wait to register at the event. We also cannot guarantee lunch.

Requirement #12: Find out about three career opportunities in the automotive industry. Pick one and find out about the education, training and experience required for this profession.

REQUIREMENT #4--Collect & bring with you to the March 9 Merit Badge class, the coins listed in:

- d. First sentence [7 quarters, as described].
- e. [1 half dollar, as described].
- f. [3 one-dollar coins, as described].

Bring 16 different coins all together.

REQUIREMENT #7--DO: a., b., c. [first sentence of each], OR d. (1., 2., 3., or 4.). If doing 7.d., 1-3, supply the date, location, purpose, & sponsor of the show, meeting, or facility attended. If doing 7.d., get counselor approval first.

For 7.a., b., or c., bring your collection to the Merit Badge class.

Collections should be organized/preserved/stored using a method in REQUIREMENT #3.

Reptile and Amphibian

- 1. **Requirement 8 (Observation or Care):** Scouts should observe a reptile or amphibian (at home, zoo, or other facility) or arrange to care for one at least one month prior to the session. They must document observations or care details, including food, behavior, and habitat conditions.
- 2. Requirement 9 (Field Work):
 - If choosing option 9a, Scouts should identify three kinds of toads or frogs by their voices and practice imitating their songs before the session.
 - If choosing option 9b, Scouts should familiarize themselves with local species to identify them by sight.
- 3. **Requirement 10 (Superstitions and Facts):** Scouts should research five superstitions and seven true facts about reptiles and amphibians to discuss during the session.




