WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

Wood Badge is designed to meet the advanced leadership needs of all Scouters, particularly unit level Scouters, such as Cub leaders, Scoutmasters and assistants, Venturing Crew Advisors, Committee Chairs and members. Additionally Scouters serving at the district and council levels can achieve greater effectiveness through Wood Badge.

To attend a Wood Badge course, individuals must:

- 1. Be registered members of Scouting America. (Youth 18 and older may attend as long as the appropriate Youth Protection guidelines are followed. They do not need to be registered in an adult leadership role.)
- 2. Have completed the basic training courses for their Scouting position.
- 3. Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment.
- 4. Have completed the Annual Health and Medical Record form.
- Have completed pre-course orientation on my.scouting and supplied a certificate of completion prior to attending the course.
