Campsite Assignment: At check-in

Campsites – Campsites will be assigned based on pre-registration of unit size. We will make every effort to keep district units together. You will likely share a campsite with other units. Please be mindful when you begin setting up your tents. We will share campsite assignments as soon as possible.

Arrival of Scouts – Registrations/Check-in opens at 6:00 pm on Friday at Headquarters. A map of the campgrounds showing the camping and activity locations will be provided at registration. Checkin will close at 8:00 p.m. If your unit will arrive later than 8:00 p.m., please contact Kathy Davis via email prior to November 7.

Only participants actually arriving with your group can be checked in with your unit. Late or early arrivals/those arriving the following day must check in individually.

Unit Leader/SPL Meeting – There will be a brief informational meeting at 9:00 pm on Friday evening in the dining hall. All units should be represented at the meeting. Please send your Cubmaster or other responsible leader to the meeting. For troops that are assisting with staffing, the SPL, Acting SPL, and Scoutmaster should plan to attend. We will share any updates to the activity schedule, share any current information regarding camp facilities, and answer any questions you may have during this meeting.

Parking – No vehicles are allowed in campsites. Upon arrival Friday evening, you will be allowed to drop your gear at your campsite, but then all vehicles must be returned to the main parking lot. The parking lot by the activity center will be closed as we will be using that area for program logistics.

The entry gate will close at 9:00 p.m. on Friday evening and remain closed throughout the day on Saturday. Campers arriving on Saturday will be able to drop gear and set up camp after 3:30 p.m. on Saturday.

If you have a trailer that is needed in your campsite, the event staff and ranger *may* grant permission for the towing vehicle to remain in the campsite depending on weather and attendance at camp. Please ask upon check-in.

If you have a mobility issue and are seeking special accommodation, you must confer with the Staff Advisor and receive permission from the ranger.

Uniform – A field uniform is appropriate for flag ceremonies, campfires, and religious ceremonies. If you have a field uniform (sometimes referred to as a Class A), please plan to wear it for these activities. For all other activities an activity t-shirt (sometimes referred to as Class B) or other Scouting appropriate shirt is appropriate.

Please do not hesitate to attend any part of camp if you do not yet own a field uniform! All are welcome.

Interfaith/Scout's Own service – All Scouts and Scouters are encouraged to host an Interfaith Worship Service for your unit. There will be no scheduled service on Sunday morning. Please be respectful of those around you and limit your camp breakdown or activities during service being held in other parts of your campsite.

Break-Down of Camp – The gate will be open at 7:30 a.m. on Sunday to allow vehicles to go to campsites to load gear. Please help us to limit traffic at campsites and do not bring your vehicle down until you are all packed and ready to load your vehicle.

Campsite Inspection – Before your unit departs camp, a staff member will come by to inspect your campsite. This will include ensuring that all trash is picked up, that all personal items have been removed from the campsite and latrines, and that all camp property is still in place at camp.

Checkout/Departure from Camp – Once your campsite has been inspected, you must check out at headquarters before departure. You should not check out until you are actually leaving the camp property.

Garbage Disposal – Please take all trash to the dumpster beside the dining hall or pack your trash out with you.

Safety & Conduct

- 1. Safety is our primary goal. All participants are asked to be mindful that excessive roughhousing and careless behavior can lead to an accident and even injury. Please have fun but take care of yourselves and others. Prevent mishaps before they occur. Each leader and participant are asked to be observant for safety issues in the activity area surrounding them, and report or correct any concerns.
- 2. Participants are reminded to use the Scout Oath, the Scout Law, and the Outdoor Code to guide behavior at all times.
- 3. The buddy system will be in place and enforced at all times. Scouts should be supervised by adults at all times.
- 4. Youth Protection guidelines must be followed at all times. If you have a question or concern about these policies, please see the Staff Advisor.
- 5. NO Alcoholic beverages are allowed at Scouting America camps.
- 6. Smoking is permitted by adults only in designated areas (e-cigs are included). No cigarette butts are to be left on the ground. There shall be no smoking or vaping in front of the scouts.
- 7. First Aid will be located at HQ. Any first aid required beyond scout level first aid must be reported to the medic. Emergency Contact information will be included in your packets at check-in.
- 8. Wrist Bands- All youth in Kindergarten and younger will receive a wrist band in your packet. Please help us to be able to identify these children easily to help abide with our age appropriate guidelines.

Firewood! While there is some available at camp, it may not be located within your campsite. Please bring firewood with you.

S'mores Supplies- if you plan to participate in the evening smores opportunity.

Your Friendly Scouting Spirit! We are planning on a VERY FULL camp this event. You will likely be sharing space with other units. Be considerate when helping your families set up tents.

Warm sleeping gear and appropriate clothing for chilly weather! Temperatures will be falling over the weekend and it may be arriving on Saturday evening. Be Prepared!

Ladder Golf

Ladder golf, also known as ladder toss, ladder ball, or ball and ladder, is a lawn game that involves players throwing bolas (two balls or golf balls connected by a string) onto a ladder to earn points. The game can be played with two or more people or in teams, and the objective is to be the first to score 21 points. The number of points earned depends on which rung of the ladder the bola lands on, with the top rung typically worth 3 points, the middle worth 2, and the bottom worth 1. Ladder golf combines fun and fitness.

Hula Hoops

- Start by standing with your feet shoulder-width apart. Place the hoop around your waist. Push the hoop forward and slightly upward with your hips to start the motion. Use a rhythmic motion to keep the hoop spinning by shifting your weight from one foot to the other.
- This is a fun, low-impact workout that strengthens your core, eases lower back discomfort, boosts cardiovascular health, and even supports better mood and flexibility.

Sack Races

 Participants hop in burlap sacks and race to a designated finish line. Health benefits of the sack race include improved cardiovascular health, coordination, muscle tone, and more.

Tug of War

 This game pits at least two players on either side trying to pull the other past a mid-point using a rope in between. Tug of War is a versatile activity that promotes physical fitness, teamwork, and mental engagement.

Frisbee

Playing frisbee offers various physical, mental, and social benefits.

Corn Hole

 Playing cornhole offers a wide range of health benefits, including physical improvements, mental stimulation, and opportunities for social connection.
 This accessible and low-impact game is suitable for people of all ages and fitness levels.

• Tic Tac Toe

 Playing tic-tac-toe provides several health benefits, primarily focusing on cognitive, social, and emotional development. It improves cognitive skills like strategic thinking, problem-solving, and memory. Socially, it encourages turn-taking, fair decision-making, and sportsmanship. Emotionally, it helps players learn to handle the outcomes of winning and losing gracefully.

Hopscotch

- Playing hopscotch provides numerous physical, mental, and social health benefits, including improved balance, coordination, and gross motor skills from jumping and hopping. It also strengthens leg and core muscles, boosts confidence, enhances cardiovascular health, and develops social skills like turn-taking and patience. Mentally, it can help with focus, problem-solving, and cognitive skills like understanding number sequences.
- Hungry Hungry Hippo (Hungry Human Hippos)- Gaga Pit
 - A player is controlled by their team to the center of an area and attempts to grab as many balls as possible and return them to his or her team's basket.

Playing Hungry Hungry Hippo offers social interaction, cognitive development, motor skills, and emotional benefits.

• Tent Challenge

- Can you set up a tent with no instructions? Do you know how to construct a shelter with only a tarp and some poles and rope?
- Scouts and Scouters try their hand at various tent set up. Great practice for new scouts!

Creation Station- CWAC

- Art and craft supplies abound at the creation station! Activities include:
 - Jewelry Making
 - Leather Working
 - Create a Holiday Card for our soldiers on deployment
 - Complete a woodworking project
 - o Create a medal to wear to celebrate your accomplishments at camp

Maze, Chess & Checkers- Castle

 Explore the castle, play a game of chess or checkers, and find your way through the maze.

Chutes & Ladders - Cave

 Practice your spelunking skills in the cave, climb some ladders and crawl through tunnels. Flashlights provided.

Mouse Trap Obstacle Course- Pirate Ships

 Board the pirate ships and prepare to set sail for a grand voyage, but watch out for obstacles along the way! Bring your own imagination. No lifejackets required for these ships!

Creature Teacher- Trading Post Pavilion

• Visit the Creature Teacher station for an animal encounter with expert answers!

Participants will get to see and learn about fascinating creatures from around the world — reptiles, mammals, and more! Presenters make science come alive with hands-on learning about adaptations, habitats, and animal behaviors.

Shooting Sports

All protective gear and equipment will be provided by camp. No outside equipment is allowed. Please follow age restrictions for shooting sports. These guidelines are set by Scouting America. Our staff do not have authority to make any exceptions to these guidelines.

Please help us to maintain safe ranges by following the safety rules as explained by staff. Participants who cannot follow safety rules may be asked to leave the range to ensure the safety of all.

- BB Guns
 - Available to youth in 1st grade and older. No lions or younger siblings please.
 Tigers must be accompanied by an adult to shoot BB Guns.
- Archery
 - All youth in Kindergarten and up may participate in archery.
- Wrist Rockets
 - All youth in Kindergarten and up may participate in wrist rockets.

All ranges will be staffed with NRA or Scouting America certified Instructors and Range Safety Officers.

A Scout is Helpful, Friendly, and Kind

Remember that many of our families attending are brand new to Scouting. They may not be familiar with Scouting rules, policies, and procedures. Activities can get crowded! If there is a longer than anticipated wait, please come back at a later time. This is especially important at our shooting sports activities. Please take only one turn at each discipline to allow all our participants to have a turn.

A Scout is Clean

There are restroom facilities, latrines, and portapotties across camp. We make every effort to ensure that all facilities are clean, well-stocked, and well maintained. Please help us to keep them that way. If you find a problem, please let a staff member know.
