# Leaders & Participant Guide

**Campsites** – Campsites will be assigned based on pre-registration of unit size. We will make every effort to keep district units together. You will likely share a campsite with other units. Please be mindful when you begin setting up your tents.

**Arrival of Scouts** – Registrations/Check-in opens at 6:00 pm on Friday at Headquarters. A map of the campgrounds showing the camping and activity locations will be provided at registration. Check-in will close at 9:00 p.m. If your unit will arrive later than 8:00 p.m., please contact Tanya Hill prior to Friday at hill.tanya21@gmail.com.

Only participants actually arriving with your group can be checked in with your unit. Late or early arrivals/those arriving the following day must check in individually.

**Parking** – No vehicles are allowed in campsites. Upon arrival Friday evening, you will be allowed to drop your gear at your campsite, but then all vehicles must be returned to the parking lot.

The entry gate will close at 9:00 p.m. on Friday evening. Roads will be closed to camp Saturday morning at 8:00 a.m. and remain closed throughout the day on Saturday. Campers arriving on Saturday will be able to drop gear and set up camp after 4:00 p.m. on Saturday.

If you have a trailer that is needed in your campsite, the event staff and ranger *may* grant permission for the towing vehicle to remain in the campsite depending on weather and attendance at camp. Please ask upon check-in.

If you have a mobility issue and are seeking special accommodation, you must confer with the Staff Advisor and receive permission from the ranger.

**Uniform** – A field uniform is appropriate for flag ceremonies, campfires, and religious ceremonies. If you have a field uniform (sometimes referred to as a Class A), please plan to wear it for these activities. For all other activities an activity t-shirt (sometimes referred to as Class B) or other Scouting appropriate shirt is appropriate.

Please do not hesitate to attend any part of camp if you do not yet own a field uniform! All are welcome.

**Break-Down of Camp** – The gate will be open at 7:30 a.m. on Sunday to allow vehicles to go to campsites to load gear. Please help us to limit traffic at campsites and do not bring your vehicle down until you are all packed and ready to load your vehicle.

**Checkout/Departure from Camp** – Once your campsite has been inspected, you must check out at headquarters before departure. You should not check out until you are actually leaving the camp property.

**Garbage Disposal** – Please take all trash to the dumpster beside the dining hall or pack your trash out with you.

## Safety & Conduct

1. Safety is our primary goal. All participants are asked to be mindful that excessive roughhousing and careless behavior can lead to an accident and even injury. Please have fun but take care of yourselves and others. Prevent mishaps before they occur. Each leader and participant are asked to be observant for safety issues in the activity area surrounding them, and report or correct any concerns.
2. Participants are reminded to use the Scout Oath, the Scout Law, and the Outdoor Code to guide behavior at all times.
3. The buddy system will be in place and enforced at all times. Scouts should be supervised by adults at all times.
4. Youth Protection guidelines must be followed at all times. If you have a question or concern about these policies, please see the Staff Advisor.
5. NO Alcoholic beverages are allowed at Scouting America camps.
6. Pets are not allowed at Circle Ten Council camps.
7. Smoking is permitted by adults only in designated areas (e-cigs are included). No cigarette butts are to be left on the ground. There shall be no smoking or vaping in front of the scouts.
8. First Aid will be located at HQ. Any first aid required beyond scout level first aid must be reported to the medic. Emergency Contact information will be included in your packets at check-in.

## Crafting Table

Visit the crafting table to build your very own treasure chest. Older cub scouts can practice their woodworking skills by building their chest and then decorate it with paint. Younger scouts and siblings can paint a premade chest or decorate it with markers.

## Horseback Riding/Horse Interactive Experience

Sign up for a horseback ride (weather permitting) or a horse interactive experience! Meet the hayride for a trip to the upper corral where our wranglers will be there to guide you in a horseback ride and/or introduce you to some of our equine friends.

Spaces are limited for each time slot but there are plenty of opportunities for all scouts to participate.

## Beekeeping Exhibit

Learn about bees from a beekeeper and get to see a real hive! Don't worry- the hive is completely enclosed.

## Fishing

Wet a line in one of our lakes with a friendly fisherman. Everyone who catches a fish will receive a packaged fishing lure- careful parents! These are real lures with sharp hooks!

## Mine for Resources

Use your mining tools and look for treasures at our mining station. Scouts keep whatever treasures they discover!

## Map & Compass

Scouts of all ages will enjoy this simple map and compass exercise. Watch out for creepers! Scouts will receive their very own compass to be their guide.

## Shooting Sports

Scouts will have a chance to practice shooting sports skills and earn an authentic arrowhead at the shooting sports ranges.

All protective gear and equipment will be provided by camp. No outside equipment is allowed. Please follow age restrictions for shooting sports. These guidelines are set by Scouting America. Our staff do not have authority to make any exceptions to these guidelines.

Please help us to maintain safe ranges by following the safety rules as explained by staff. Participants who cannot follow safety rules may be asked to leave the range to ensure the safety of all.

- BB Guns
  - Available to youth in 1<sup>st</sup> grade and older. No lions or younger siblings please. Tigers must be accompanied by an adult to shoot BB Guns.
- Archery
  - All youth in Kindergarten and up may participate in archery.

All ranges will be staffed with NRA or Scouting America certified Instructors and Range Safety Officers.

## Petting Zoo

Visit the petting zoo and meet some mini farm friends! The petting zoo will only be open for a portion of the day- exact times will be determined based on weather conditions.

## LAST MINUTE TIPS FOR HAVING A GREAT EXPERIENCE AT CAMP

- A Scout is Helpful, Friendly, and Kind

Remember that some of our families may be new to Scouting. They may not be familiar with Scouting rules, policies, and procedures. If you see someone who could use a hand, please give them a hand! If you are concerned that additional intervention is required, please find an Event Lead or the Staff Advisor.

- A Scout is Courteous

Activities can get crowded! If there is a longer than anticipated wait, please come back at a later time. This is especially important at our shooting sports activities. Please take only one turn at each discipline to allow all our participants to have a turn.

- A Scout is Clean

There are restroom facilities and latrines across camp. We make every effort to ensure that all facilities are clean, well-stocked, and well maintained. Please help us to keep them that way. If you find a problem, please let a staff member know.

- A Scout is Flexible??

Maybe that is not in the Scout Law, but it is an important part of Scouting. As we work to provide the best experience possible for participants, sometimes we need to make adjustments in real time to accommodate weather conditions, facility needs, or other opportunities that arise.
