# **EAGLE TRAIL WEBELOS WOODS 2022**

OCTOBER 7-9, 2022

## **Event Overview**

Calling all WEBELOS! Come and spend the weekend with more than 400 other Scouts and Scouters from Eagle Trail District up at beautiful Camp James Ray. The adventure will start at 6:00pm on Friday, October 7<sup>th</sup> and continue non-stop until 10:00am on Sunday, October 9<sup>th</sup>.

Camp James Ray Scout Reservation is located on the shores of Lake Texoma, only about 60 miles from Allen. You should be able to simply type "Camp James Ray" into your smart phone to find it. The official address is at Camp James Ray Scout Reservation, 71 Camp James Ray Road, Pottsboro, Texas.

Webelos Outdoor Weekend (WOW) is an awesome opportunity for Webelos (and their parents) to experience some of the fun that they can look forward to once they become Boy Scouts.

Simply camping with a boy scout troop will demonstrate how it really is the Scouts, not the adults, who run things. You and your scouts will have the opportunity to set up tents, enjoy a boy-scout cracker-barrel, and help cook breakfast in the morning. The best part of this is that the boy scouts from the troop will be helping your Webelos to learn how to do these tasks and you should be able just stand back and just watch.

On Saturday after breakfast and cleanup (yes, you will be amazed as the boys will actually clean up after themselves), the activities will start. The troops will be setting up stations where your Webelos can go and learn about some of the various Boy Scout activities, and just have fun. These activities are expected to include making fire, shooting things, throwing things, eating donuts, playing games, hiking and exploring.

And, as if all that is not enough, when the day's activities are done, everyone will return to their campsite where the Webelos will get to help cook dinner and then the night will be topped of with a real Boy Scout campfire program where the Webelos will get to do a fun skit.

It is strongly encouraged that you find a troop who is attending WOW and make arrangements to camp with them. They will be able to assist you in planning for this event, and they will be there ready to help you at any time during WOW. WOW is also great opportunity to see the various boy scout troops in action and should make the process of choosing which troop to join easier. You will find that each troop has a different and unique personality.

If you need assistance in finding a troop to camp with for WOW, please contact us and we will make every effort to help pair you up with a troop ahead of the event. If you have already made prior arrangements with a troop please let us know. Otherwise, any Webelos / Packs who have not made prior arrangements will be paired with a troop upon arrival. Multiple Packs may be camping with each troop.

# The Concept and Purpose

Keeping with the meaning of WEBELOS (WE will BE Loyal Scouts); Webelos Outdoor Weekend is an outdoor program activity designed to be fun first and aid in the Webelos to Scout transition. As a Boy Scout



level camping event, Webelos are invited to spend the weekend in a Boy Scout led environment. This camping weekend will showcase the Boy Scout tenants of a "boy-led troop" and the "patrol method" of scouting. It will also help the Webelos work towards their Arrow of Light as they camp overnight and participate in the various Boys Scout activities.

These activities will include BB guns, Fire building, Tomahawks, Sharp Instruments, knot tying and games, religious services, campfire program and more. By the end of the weekend the goal is for the Webelos to be very excited that they are about to become a Boy Scout.

The 2022 Eagle Trail Webelos Woods will be held at the beautiful Camp James Ray on the shores of Lake Texoma. The address for Camp James Ray is 2026 Mill Creek Rd, Pottsboro, TX 75076.

# Membership / Participants

All Eagle Trail Cub Scout Packs, Scouts BSA Troops and Venturing Crews are invited and encouraged to attend. BSA members from other districts may attend with special permission from the Fall Campout Camp Director or Fall Campout Program Director.

Cub Scout participants who elect to camp for the weekend must follow all BSA guidelines for Cub Scout camping as outlined in the <u>Camping section of the *Guide to Safe Scouting*</u>. Specifically, Cub Scouts may only camp with a parent or legal guardian present.

# Registration

Registration will be available online at the <u>Circle Ten Scouting Event Reservation system</u> through October 2, 2022. The cost to register for this event is \$20.00 per person. Units will want to be sure to register early to hold their spot and ensure they receive an event patch.

The registration fee covers all activities during the course of this event. There is no additional fee for camping.

Last minute additions to your attendee counts may result in over-crowding of campsites and inadequate food supplies for meals and should be avoided. *Unit leaders must finalize their unit attendee list prior to the registration deadline of October 2, 2022.* Only pre-registered attendees will be admitted to this event. Walk-up registration will not be permitted.



# Health & Safety

## Water cooler / bottle refilling

Special care should be used when refilling water bottles to avoid touching the mouth of the individual water bottle to the spout of the cooler. It is highly recommended units provide additional instruction on how to refill a bottle in a no-contact manner. Adults should assist with bottle refills to ensure a sanitary process is followed. Should a bottle come into contact with a cooler spout, the spout should be properly cleaned before further use.

# Youth protection

All units are responsible for ensuring they are meeting all BSA Youth Protection Requirements.

# Two-deep leadership

All units attending the event must comply with the BSA policy requiring that "two registered adult leaders or adults and a parent of a participating Scout, one of whom must be at least 21 years of age or older, are required for all trips and outings."

#### Wrist bands

All event attendees, including staff, will be issued a wrist band during check in which must be worn throughout the weekend. Wrist bands will be used to enable staff and unit leaders to easily identify participants who have been properly screened and are registered attendees. Those without a wrist band will not be permitted to participate in activities or enter the dining hall for meals and will be asked to depart camp.

#### Health and medical records

Each unit leader or designee must bring a copy of the Annual Health and Medical Record, Parts A & B for each attendee (Scouts and Adults). These forms must be kept accessible to the unit leader or designee in the unit area throughout the event. Medical records will not be turned in or held by camp staff.

# Health / First Aid

General first aid issues will be the unit responsibility. In the case of a significant injury where an emergency response is needed, call 9-1-1 and then notify the event first aid staff. Escalated first aid issues can be handled by our first aid staff, 24 hours per day. Please be sure to advise your patrol members of its location, near the Fry center, adjacent to the main parking lot and Sanford Aquatics Center.

# **Camping Information**

#### Location / directions

This event will be held at Camp James Ray on the shores of Lake Texoma. The address for camp is 2626 Old Mill Road, Pottsboro, TX 75076. (Map / Directions). Directions from Allen:

- Take US-75 N to US-82
- Left onto E. Hwy 82
- Exit 636 to merge onto TX-289 N toward Pottsboro
- Left onto FM 120 W
- Left on Locust road
- Right on Mill Creek Road

#### **Check-in procedures**

Camping check-in will begin at 6:00 p.m. on Friday, April 22, 2022, at the Fry Pavilion adjacent to the parking lot. Scouts BSA Troop Scoutmasters and Senior Patrol Leaders should be present at the time of check-in. The remaining members of the troop should remain in the parking lot.

- It is highly recommended Cub Scout packs check in as a unit and then consolidate camping gear into a few vehicles for transporting to their camp sites. Cubmasters may check in the unit as a group.
- Camp sites will be assigned at the time of check in.
- Saturday morning check-ins can be accommodated but must be pre-arranged with the camp director.

## **Webelos Camping**

Webelos may plan to camp with their family in the campsite assigned to their Cub Scout pack or may also choose to camp with a Scouts BSA Troop. Please select the Webelos option during registration if you want to camp with a troop. Webelos and their parents will also be able to interact with other Scouts BSA troops as part of the program on Saturday.



# Camp site maintenance

We are responsible for damage to the camp so please follow all rules and leave it in **better** condition than when we arrived. All participants should follow the *Leave No Trace* principles and *The Outdoor Code*.

# Vehicles in camp

All vehicles must be parked in the parking lot. Unit trailers may be parked in campsites with a vehicle attached but all other vehicles must remain in the parking lot. Units without a trailer should consolidate gear into as few vehicles as possible and *immediately* return them to the parking lot after unloading. Scouts will walk to their campsites. No vehicles other than staff or those with a disability permit will be allowed to drive around camp on Saturday.

## **Campsites**

Each unit will be assigned a campsite adequate for the number of attendees indicated in your unit registration. Participants are encouraged to spread out within the campsite in an order to maintain appropriate distancing. Be reminded to have a first aid kit, trash bags, fire extinguisher, patrol duty roster and other necessary items on hand and easily accessible.

#### Water

Abundant fresh water is available at Camp James Ray. All units should bring their own containers to transport water to their campsites as needed. Unit leaders should remind all participants to avoid placing water bottles directly on water cooler spouts or other sources and to frequently clean water coolers with disinfectant wipes to mitigate any potential spread of germs.

# **Electricity**

Most campsites at Camp James Ray do not have electricity.

#### Latrines

Most latrines at Camp James Ray are of the "non-flushing" type although they do have running water. Latrines are spread throughout camp and should be kept clean. Latrines will be checked as part of the check-out procedure. Units camping near latrines are responsible for cleaning prior to check-out.

#### Garbage

Units should bring their own trash bags and are responsible for leaving campsites better than they found them. All trash must be picked up and removed before units may check out of camp. Trash may be deposited in the dumpster behind the dining hall before departing or may be taken out of camp with the unit



# Fire safety

Campfires in campsites are permitted, subject to any burn bans and the no campsite cooking restriction listed above. Fires must be supervised at all times by an adult or Scout who has earned the <u>Firem'n chit</u> and in accordance with those requirements.

#### **Tents**

Units must furnish their own tents and all camping gear / equipment. Platforms in campsites may be used but should not be moved or altered in any way. Larger tents may not fit on the platforms. Scouts should be permitted to tent or hammock on their own or with a family member. Unrelated scouts tenting together should sleep head to toe.

#### Hammocks

Hammocks are permitted at Camp James Ray provided appropriate tree protection measures are followed. Hammocks may not be hung from canopies, pavilions or tent platform poles.

Campers who plan to use a hammock should review the <u>BSA Safety moment on hammock camping</u> for general information on hammock safety.

People who truly know how to hammock camp follow these three steps:

- 1. Pick the right place to set your hammock up: Think Leave No Trace principles like setting up well away from a water source and using an established site that has no vegetation to damage. Also check under and around the hammock for any object that might injure you if you fall out.
- 2. <u>Pick the right trees and use wide straps</u>: that means healthy (no dead branches), robust (thick trunk) and not harboring creatures you might disturb.
- 3. <u>Pick the right strap angle and height to hang your hammock</u>: Your goal is about a 30-degree angle between the strap and the ground, and having the bottom of your hammock about 18 inches off the ground.

# Staff Opportunities (Volunteers)

#### Overview

# **Eligibility**

Staff members meet must meet at least one of the following eligibility criteria:

#### Adults:

Registered with BSA and current Youth Protection Training

#### Youth:

- Registered member of Venturing Crew
- Current OA member who has completed their Ordeal
- Registered member of Scouts BSA Troop who is at least 13 years old and has earned the rank of First Class

#### Staff needs

Volunteering as a staff member means you'll have the opportunity to do a variety of jobs and still have fun participating in the planned activities. We need people to help with the following tasks:

- Greeting / screening attendees upon arrival
- Check-in
- Campfire Program
- Shooting sports (archery, BB-Gun, certification needed)
- Service crew
- Check out

#### How to volunteer

If you would like to sign up as a staff member, contact Mr. Brad Bollinger as numbers will be limited. Upon confirmation, please select the "Staff" option during the registration process. There is a no fee for Staff members for this event.

## Meal Service Procedures

Both Packs and Troops will be responsible for their own meals. Please be sure to plan for Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner on Saturday. For Sunday you should only need to plan for Breakfast.

Packs- If you are camping with a Troop, please ensure you are a=connecting with the troop to make the proper arrangements for meals (be sure to include any special food requests or allegories in your discussions).



# Fall Campout Program

# **Program overview**

The program offering for this event is different than a typical Webelos Woods (WOW) or Camporee event which has been presented in prior years. Elements of each of those events are included in addition to time for units to spend on their own. This has been done purposefully to allow units to focus on rank advancement, badge requirements or other outdoor skills which they may choose to provide.

Although district sponsored activities are available, units may choose not to participate if they would prefer to hold their own program for the weekend.

## **Broadcast text messaging: Remind**

Adults registered for this event will automatically be added to this group but may opt out if they do not want to receive updates.

## **Shooting sports**

Archery and BB-guns are planned for this event. Units will be permitted to shoot only during their assigned time (see detailed schedule) and should not visit the shooting range at any time other than their designated time slot on the schedule.

# Webelos & Scouts BSA Troop Fair

Webelo Scouts and parents will have an opportunity to meet and visit with Scouts BSA troops on Saturday afternoon. Troops will set up stations in the Sports Field area which are physically distanced. Webelos dens will be able to visit with each troop to learn about each unit and ask questions to help inform their cross-over decisions.

Webelos dens and parents should come prepared with thoughts and questions to discuss with troop members.

Troops may want to consider b ringing the following items to their area to present to prospective Scouts:

- Pop-up canopy with table, camp chairs
- Fact sheet or other printed materials about the troop
- Historian board with photos and information
- Yearbook, photo album or other collateral
- 2-4 Scouts to teach scout skills to Webelos or host some other activity

Additionally, troops are asked to provide scouts who can provide instruction (qualifies for Communication merit badge requirement 6) to Webelos scouts with the following requirements and/or supervise and facilitate games or activities:

  - Scouting Adventure Regs. 1, 2, 3a, 4, 5, 6
  - Outdoor Adventure Regs. 4, 5





- Building A Better World Adventure Reqs. 1, 4
- Adventure into the Woods Regs. 1-4, 6

  - Gaga Ball free play / tournament
  - Kickball free play / tournament
  - Tether ball free play / tournament



# Camp Rules

ALL units MUST CHECKIN with the registrar upon arrival where you will receive information concerning areas available for camping.

- 1. No personal vehicles in Camp.
- 2. ALL vehicles must be parked in parking space for safe emergency evacuation and must remain in DESIGNATED parking areas during the weekend program. Roads must be kept clear for emergency vehicles.
- 3. If you need to leave the campgrounds for any reason you must notify the Staff.
- 4. This is a tent camping weekend. No RV's, campers, or tent trailers.
- 5. No younger siblings are allowed in camp for program participation or the overnight stay.
- 6. No electronics such as video games, CD, mp3 or tape players, laser pointers, radios [non-communications], etc. Enjoy nature and let others enjoy it too.
- 7. ALL fires will be in established fire circles only and must be attended and thoroughly extinguished before leaving camp.
- 8. No brush gathering or timber cutting will be allowed.
- 9. All units MUST have their campsites inspected prior to check out by the before leaving.
- 10. Deposit all camp garbage in the dumpsters located by Dining Hall and near the camp office in regular garbage bags and tie off the openings.
- 11. No dishwashing in outdoor pumps, bathrooms, or spigots.
- 12. NO ONE is allowed in or near the lake. Fishing is allowed during free time with adult supervision only. Poles, hooks, and bait must be provided by participants. ANYONE in the lake will be escorted from camp and will not be allowed to return. NO REFUNDS!
- 13. ALL ACCIDENTS AND INJURIES MUST BE REPORTED TO THE FIRST AID STATION AND/OR RANGER IMMEDIATELY!
- 14. ALL spare propane tanks must be stored and locked in your vehicles. National Policy on the use of fuels must be followed.
- 15. Scouting is a smoke free environment. Youth may not use tobacco in any form. No Smoking in the vicinity of any youth or inside of any structure is allowed; adult smoking must be done away from all participants. All evidence must be removed by the adult and kept off of the campgrounds.
- 16. NO FIREARMS [including pellet, BB and paintball guns] or FIREWORKS of any type are allowed in camp.
- 17. NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE ALLOWED AT BSA EVENTS!
- 18. ABSOLUTELY NO PETS ARE ALLOWED! other the appropriately licensed service animals
- 19. Please Be Courteous. Don't cut through other people's campsites and stay on designated trails. NO SHORTCUTS!
- 20. "Do A Good Turn" by doing a service for the camp. For example, pick up garbage that you may see.
- 21. Scouts must use the buddy system while in camp when not accompanied by the guardian.
- 22. If a scout and an adult are sharing one tent, then the adult must be a parent or guardian of the boy. Adults sharing tents with youth is discouraged.
- 23. NO ONE IS TO RIDE IN THE BACK OF A PICKUP. You must have seatbelts for each person in the vehicle.
- 24. The MAXIMUM speed in camp is about 10 miles per hour. If there are youth around then one must drive NO faster than walking speed (about 3 MPH).
- 25. Instructors on the BB and Archery range have a heavy responsibility for your child's safety. They can and will ask anyone that is not serious to leave the area. Please help them to keep the ranges safe.
