Invitation

Hello Scout Leaders and Parents,

You and your units Webelos and AOL scouts are cordially invited to attend the Monitor Merrimac District Web-AOL-Ree.

The dates are September 27 – 29, 2024 to be held in the Horseshoe area at Gosnold's Hope Park, located at 901 East little Back River Road, near Langley Elementary School.

The Web-AOL-ree offers your Webelos and AOL scouts the opportunity to participate in activities designed specifically for them in a Scout camp environment. This event is organized as a two-night campout with a number of instructional sessions and events planned for Saturday.

The purpose of the Web-AOL-ree has three parts;

- 1. It is designed to give your scouts a jump-start towards obtaining their Webelos badge and their Arrow of light award.
- 2. The entire weekend is inherently designed to inspire your scouts to continue the trail to Eagle.
- 3. It allows the parents /guardians an opportunity to visit the different troops in our area and meet the Scoutmasters and scouts and to see their scouts interact with the different troops.

The staff is composed of "seasoned scouters" who are always on hand to answer questions and to supervise the training sessions. The training sessions are geared for your scouts to have the chance to complete and earn several Webelos or AOL adventures. Your scouts will be given the opportunity to participate in activities that will challenge them and encourage them to continue working on advancements on the den/patrol level and at home. They will participate in ceremonies, camp wide games, in camp cooking, and a Saturday night campfire with skits and songs. Some of the training sessions will be taught by older senior Scouts with younger Scouts assisting. These scouts are working on requirements for their next rank. Your cooperation will be appreciated.

The Web-AOL-Ree is open to all registered Webelos and AOL scouts regardless of districts or councils.

The Web-AOL-Ree will also offer an opportunity for adult leaders to complete the in-person training necessary to be qualified as fully trained Scoutmasters or Assistant Scoutmasters (SM/ASM). This is known as Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills (IOLS). Please see page ... for more information.

Unless we have severe weather (tropical storm or higher) or if the Monitor Merrimac District cancels this event, it will go on as planned. If this event is canceled, we will try to reschedule it.

Registration

Registration, Roster and Fee

Submit the registration on Black Pug and roster with your units registration. All units must submit a Web-AOL-Ree Pack Roster with their registration. Be sure to keep a copy of your receipt. The registration fee for the Web-AOL-Ree is \$15.00 per Cub Scout and \$10.00 per Adult or BSA Scout.

Den rosters allow the Webelos and AOL to choose their top three Adventure preferences. The top two will be assigned if possible, as space is available. Be sure to fill out all three preferences, just in case one of the top two is filled or unavailable.

How to Register

Registration **begins on July 5** and **ends on September 20**. Registrations after September 20 will not be accepted. Register at the Colonial Virginia Council website or at the Scout Service Center at 11834 Canon Blvd, Suite L, Newport News, VA 23606.

Roster Changes and Late Additions

Provisions for collecting money will not be available at the Web-AOL-Ree; all fees and registrations must be submitted online or at the Scout Service Center before the deadline. Roster changes are very disruptive for the volunteers who have prepared for the training sessions; please stick to the classes on the registrations.

Webelos Activity Badges

The following Webelos adventures are being offered: Webelos Walkabout, Stronger Faster Higher, My Community, My Safety, Math on the Trail, Let's Camp – Webelos, Chef's Knife, Champions for Nature – Webelos, and Pedal Away

AOL Activity Badges

The following AOL adventures are being offered: Outdoor Adventure, Personal Fitness, First Aid, Citizenship, Cycling, Engineer, Knife Safety, Outdoor Adventurer, and Champions for Nature - AOL

Scheduled Activities

Leader's Meeting

A leader's meeting will be held in front of the Headquarters tent Friday night at approximately 9:00 pm. One adult leader from each den should attend with any roster updates. This is an opportunity for unit leaders to meet and greet other leaders, meet the staff, receive their training schedules, and discuss any last minute information or concerns the staff or the unit leaders might have. Snacks and coffee will be available.

Campsite Inspection

Each campsite will be inspected in the morning and afternoon on Saturday for a Clean Campsite Award. The judging criteria are listed in the Campsite Inspection Sheet in this leader's guide. Awards will be presented in the Cub Scout category and in the Staff category, which includes Troops, Crews, Ships, and Posts.

Dessert Cooking Contest

All units are encouraged to submit an entry to the Dessert Contest. Entries will be judged on appearance and taste. Judging will be held at 7:00 pm Saturday night in the headquarters tent, so don't be late. Entries may be picked up and returned to the unit's campsite at 7:15 pm.

Campfire

A traditional campfire will be held inside the Horseshoe on Saturday night. Units are encouraged to perform a song, skit, stunt, or performance to entertain the audience. To ensure good organization and appropriate subject, the unit should send a youth representative to the Headquarters Tent to submit and explain their performance. Submissions will be accepted at 12 noon to 1 pm.

BB-Gun Shooting Range

A BB-gun shooting range will be setup on the north side of the Horseshoe. BB-gun instruction and shooting will be held on Saturday 4:00 pm to 5:30 pm. Participants should stay clear of the woods behind the shooting range.

Facilities, Safety, and Rules

Off Limits Area

The occupied RV campsites, the waterfront area, and the surrounding neighborhood are off limits to all scouts unless they are accompanied by an adult.

Parking

Except while loading and unloading, vehicles and trailers will not be allowed to park in the campsites or on the horseshoe road. Vehicles and trailers must park in the parking lot. Parking passes will be issued at check in.

Leadership Requirements

Each Pack must have at least one registered adult leader who has completed the BALOO training course (BSA requirement).

As described in the Guide to Safe Scouting (#34416):

• Two-deep leadership on all outings required. A minimum of two registered adult leaders, or one registered leader and a participating Scout's parent, or another adult are required for all trips

- and outings. One of these adults must be 21 years of age or older. NOTE: Additional rules for Venturing Crews and Sea Scout Ships also apply.
- One on-one contact between adults and youth members is prohibited. In situations requiring a personal conference, such as a Scoutmaster's conference, the meeting is to be conducted with the knowledge and in view of other adults and/or youth.

Staff personnel

All staff personnel must be treated with respect and courtesy at all times. The adult staff members stand behind and support our youth staff members. For many of our youth staff members this is a first time experience in a training environment. Do not let insignificant events deter your scouts from learning or cause a loss of confidence in their instructors.

Remember we are here for our scouts.

Manners

- 1. Any SCOUT who inflicts intentional harm to another scout, adult, or animal WILL BE SENT HOME IMMEDIATELY!
- 2. Disruptive/destructive behavior will not be tolerated. Scouts who are disruptive during a training session will be turned over to a unit leader for guidance.
- 3. If any Webelos or AOL Scout causes damage to another units' equipment or gear, or who damages the park's property (soccer goals, port-o-lets), then the scouts' unit will be financially responsible.
- 4. Scouts must ask permission prior to entering a neighboring campsite. (This allows the Leaders/adults of the visited camp to know who is in there camp at all times.)
- 5. Scouts will not "cut through" camps to get to their campsite. (Use the road or paths between campsites).
- 6. Scouts will be quiet in camp after lights out.
- 7. Scouts are not allowed to intentionally shine their flashlights into neighboring camps.

Volunteers

Many scouters have volunteered their time in developing the schedule of events for the Web-AOL-Ree. Sometimes things happen when they should not, and the program will be changed at the last minute. Have patience and be flexible, have a couple of back-up plans just in case.

Pets

No pets are allowed to "visit" or stay during the Web-AOL-Ree. This includes dropping off equipment or scouts, this applies to all visitors and staff personnel also. The only exception is licensed service animals (check in at Headquarters).

Visitors

Parents and siblings are allowed to visit Saturday during the Web-AOL-Ree between the hours of 9 am to 9 pm. Visitors are required to sign-in at the headquarters tent. Visitors may stay for the Web-AOL-Ree Campfire program, but they cannot stay overnight. Each unit's leaders are responsible for the actions of their visitors.

Water

Water is available in the RV camping area only at the designated faucet. Look for the "DRINKING WATER" sign. Be sure to bring water jugs to carry water from the faucet to the campsite. Do not wash dishes at the faucet.

DANGER:

Do not use the water at the RV dumping station located in the parking lot adjacent to the Horseshoe.

This is not potable water and may contain sewerage and bacteria.

Fires

Fires in campsites is permitted only in approved above-ground fire pits; no fires are allowed on the ground. Provision for dousing the fire is required, such as a 5-gallon bucket of water. Provision for overhauling the fire is required, such as a shovel. Fuel for fires is not readily available at the Park, so campers should bring their own. In keeping with Leave No Trace principles, pack out or disperse COLD ashes. Do not dispense in the dumpster or dump a pile in the woods.

Liquid Fuels

Each unit is responsible for keeping liquid fuel (Coleman fluid, kerosene, lamp oil, etc.) away from the cooking area, sleeping areas, and fire pit except if properly used for lighting a charcoal fire. Do not add liquid fuel to a burning fire. Suggestion is to put the fuel in a milk crate with something on top as a lid. Propane is recommended for cooking and lanterns.

Cooking

The Webelos and AOL scouts should plan, prepare, and cook the den/patrol meals.

The leaders and adults can help their scouts with lighting of stoves. However, try to let them do most of the preparation and cooking. If the unit is planning aluminum foil cooking, the charcoal has to be off the ground. Keep an eye on the weather; it may be chilly or wet, we recommend warm drinks, broths, or soup. Webelos and AOL scouts love hot chocolate and snacks while on campouts, we suggest you keep an ample supply of both. Do not forget coffee for adults.

Garbage Disposal

Each unit is responsible for disposing of their trash. The trash dumpster is located adjacent to the park ranger office. Please do not put ashes in the dumpster.

Sanitary Facilities

Port-o-lets will be available. Adults may use the park's RV/camper restroom adjacent to the park's field office. Parents attending need to be made aware of this policy.

Tobacco and Alcohol Policy

The designated tobacco smoking and vaping area is located at the boat ramp. This policy applies to all leaders, parents/guardians, and visitors. Youth participants are prohibited from smoking or vaping.

This is an alcohol free event. All alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited. This policy applies to all leaders, parents/guardians, visitors, and scouts. There is not a designated area for alcohol use. If a parent or visitor appears inebriated they will be asked to leave.

First Aid

Each unit is responsible for providing basic first aid for their scouts. Any serious injuries should be reported to the Web-AOL- Ree headquarters. For severe injuries, EMERGENCY 911 will be notified.

Scouts Leaving Early

If at any time during the Web-AOL-Ree, a registered Webelos or AOL scout and parent/guardian are leaving, the unit leader must be notified, and the Webelos/AOL scout and parent/guardian must sign out at the headquarters tent.

Uniforms

Scouts and Scouters are encouraged to wear their field (or class "A") uniforms during the flag retirement ceremony and during the religious service in Sunday. Activity (or class "B") uniforms can be worn during the training sessions, events, down time, and inside the campsites.

Proper Clothing

Unit leaders need to check the weather forecast prior to coming to the Web-AOL-Ree. Be prepared for the weekend. Bring enough and the right equipment for your scouts. This is September and the weather can change rapidly. Please ensure your scouts bring appropriate clothing and +25 Outdoor sleeping bags. The temperature can drop once the sun goes down. Ensure your scouts bring sweatshirts, light jackets, long sleeve shirt, and long pants, and make sure they wear them. The scouts will get cold quickly, we would rather see them too warm than too cold during the Web-AOL-Ree.

General rules

- 1. Firecrackers, explosives, and firearms are not permitted. Electronic games, radios (except weather alert), and televisions are not recommended.
- 2. Webelos/AOL scouts are not allowed to roam through the campsites during instruction time.
- 3. Unit leaders and parents are responsible for all Webelos/AOL scouts during the Web-AOL-Ree. If you see them doing something they should not, speak up and say something. Suggestions for unit leaders and parents is start a pick-up game of soccer/football/kickball, take your scouts on a nature hike, work on activity badges, or practice the dens/patrol skit or song for the Web-AOL-Ree campfire.
- 4. Webelos/AOL scouts should not bring knives to the Web-AOL-ree.
- 5. Webelos/AOL scouts may sleep in the same tent with their parent/legal guardian; however, Webelos/AOL scouts are encouraged to share tents with other Webelos/AOL scouts.
- 6. Scouts & adults are not allowed to go barefoot, no open toed shoes.
- 7. No open campfires, campfires must be off the ground (leave no trace).
- 8. Campfires are not to be left unattended at any time, when a campfire is being used an adult or responsible BSA Scout must be appointed as FIRE WARDEN.
- 9. Pets (dogs, cats, mice, gerbils, birds, snakes, tarantulas, llamas you get the picture) are not permitted, unless they are service animals.
- 10. Cutting of live trees are prohibited.
- 11. The buddy system and youth protection guidelines are in effect at all times.
- 12. National and council policies will be followed and adhered too.

Checkout

If a unit is going to leave before the end of the Web-AOL-Ree, they are to inform the event organizers, police their campsite area for trash, ensure campfires and ashes are out and disposed of properly. The unit leader will sign their unit out, finish camp paperwork, and get participation patches.

Patches

Web-AOL-Ree patches will be given to all participants; day guests and visitors do not receive a patch. Web-AOL-Ree patches will be handed out at the closing ceremony on Sunday. Patches will be given to the unit leader.

Frequently Asked Questions:

1. Why is there a registration fee? To cover the costs of insurance, patch, toilet facilities, and staff support.

- 2. <u>Does the pack/den need to campout?</u> Yes; this event is for Webelos/AOL dens to camp with troops.
- 3. What other activities are there for the Webelos/AOLs? Participation Award including Dessert Cooking Contest, Tug-o-War, Campfire, and Campsite Inspections.
- 4. What do we bring? You will need to bring your camping equipment and food for the weekend. The Webelos Leader Manual contains a list of equipment to get you started. See the list in the appendix for a suggestion of den equipment.
- 5. <u>Will this event be cancelled for weather?</u> Only if a tropical storm comes. Otherwise, this event will go on rain or shine.

Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills (IOLS)

A current adult registration with any position within Scouting America is required to be credited with the training within the Scouting IT system, but the actual training is open to all adults interested.

To be considered a "fully trained" SM/ASM for re-charter, you also need to complete Scoutmaster Specific Training online, and keep your YPT and Weather Hazards training current. Those items are separate from IOLS and not covered during the in-person class. There will be a separate e-mail about the online items.

It is highly preferred that participants sign-up ahead of time for this training at the black pug link provided in the council calendar. This will allow for communication regarding various patrol-forming activities, and validation of registration and training status. Since the training is happening concurrent with the Web-AOL-Ree, the cost is only \$10 for program supplies. It is expected that you will be signed up separately for the Web-AOL-Ree, and tenting and eating with your unit. IOLS participants whose units are not attending the Web-AOL-Ree will be connected with a "host unit" for tenting and eating. Participants are expected to work out their fair-share camping and food expenses with their host unit.

The IOLS training consists of approximately a total of 10-12 hours of instructional time divided between Saturday and Sunday. Full attendance at all modules is necessary for course credit. Course schedule will be de-conflicted with key elements of the Web-AOL-Ree (Flags, Meals). This is a significant commitment away from your unit's Web-AOL-Ree activities. Please ensure that sufficient and proper adult supervision will remain with your unit.

Attendees:

Wear Field Uniform with Activity shirt underneath. Bring extra BSA Activity shirts.

Bring a current Scouts BSA Handbook, either your own – or borrow one from one of your scouts.

Bring personal (or borrowed) backpack, packed for 2-day hike of five miles each day. This is for training use during the Backpacking Class only. Don't spend a bunch of money on this. You will not be actually hiking with it. You can bring camping material in addition to backpack.

Bring Personal Tent, Camp/Field Chair, Mess kit and coffee mug, Water Bottle.

Bring backpack stove/fuel if you have access to one.

Bring two 6-8 foot poles about 1 inch thick or more, appropriate for lashing. Scout Staves are OK if you have them.

Bring gloves appropriate for Axe and Saw work, handling limbs and trees.

You will receive a personal binder for you to keep with a variety of materials.


