Colonial Virginia Council University of Scouting

University of Scouting is an adult training day for all levels of scouters. It is open to any registered member of Scouting America. The training recognition is set up as a college degree program. For every training you attend (except medical and OA), you will earn hours of study just as you would if you were in college. Each instructional block consists of 50 minutes of instruction and is limited to 20 participants. Classes scheduled for multiple periods count as multiple hours of study. Please register early, classes may fill up fast.

<u>Degrees:</u> – The University offers recognition in the form of three degrees and continuing education. The patch and rockers are temporary patches and can be worn on the right uniform shirt pocket.

Bachelors Degree

- Must complete six (6) hours of study.
- > The graduate will receive a diploma, the CVC University of Scouting patch, and a Bachelor's rocker.

Masters Degree

- Must hold a Bachelor's Degree from this or any other University of Scouting.
- Must complete six (6) additional hours of study.
- > The graduate will receive a diploma and a Master's rocker.

Doctorate Degree

- Must hold a Master's Degree from this or any other University of Scouting.
- ➤ The process to obtain a Doctoral Degree normally spans two years. It includes participation in doctorate orientation courses, development and completion of a research topic and/or project, preparing the research paper or project closeout report, and then presenting and defending your work to an evaluation panel. See details in Class Catalog.
- > The graduate will receive a diploma and a Doctorate rocker

Continuing Education

- Must hold a Degree from any University of Scouting.
- > Must complete six (6) additional hours of study.
- > The graduate will receive a certificate and a Continuing Education rocker.

Note on Medical Readiness Courses: Medical readiness courses are provided at a discount and convenience to registered Scouting America volunteers and appropriate age youth. Medical course hours do not credit to degree requirements described above. Separate certifications are received.

Note on Order of the Arrow Polestar Course: Polestar course hours do not credit to degree requirements described above. Separate certifications are received.

Registration - The anticipated attendance requires advance scheduling. To ensure the best possibility of attending your desired courses, early registration is essential. All registrations received at the Scout Service Center or through the online registration on or before Saturday, January 3, 2026 will be included in the master schedule of courses, and you will receive a personal schedule upon arrival at the University of Scouting. We request you wear your full field uniform. Students should bring a writing instrument and paper, or a note-taking device. Members of the same unit should avoid everyone taking the same classes and attend different sessions to enhance the experience and to bring as much knowledge as possible back to their unit.

\$25.00 Registration Fee by December 27, 2025, \$35.00 Registration Fee from December 28, 2025 to January 3, 2026. \$50.00 Walk-in Fee to register on or after January 4, 2026. Save Money, register early. The registration fee includes attendance at six University of Scouting courses, a patch, lunch, certificate of attendance and/or other forms of recognition as appropriate, liability insurance recovery, facility charges, and administrative costs.

Late Registrations/Walk-ins — The council office will not accept registrations after January 4, 2026. Participants wishing to sign up between December 28, 2025 and COB January 4, 2026 will be charged a fee of \$35.00. On or after January 5, 2026 any unregistered participants must register in person as a "walk-in" at the University of Scouting, prior to 8:30 am as the opening ceremony begins promptly at 8:45 am. Those registering at the door will receive course assignments based on availability of space and instructors. In addition, there may not be sufficient handouts for any walk-in participant. Walk-ins will be assigned on a first-come, first served basis and will be charged a \$50.00 registration fee. Due to time constraints, walk-ins may be unable to complete registration in time to attend a course scheduled for the first period. WALK-INS ARE DISCOURAGED, BUT NOT PROHIBITED.

Opening Ceremony – There will be a short opening ceremony for all participants. Degrees certificates and patches will be available at day's end.

<u>Class Changes</u> – If you change classes during the day you may find that the instructor may not have enough handouts for you. It is highly recommended that you ensure you schedule those courses you want to take and then stick to your assigned schedule. In addition, if you decide to change classes after the start of the first session you may not receive credit for the class.

Event Cancellation/Refund Policy – In event of inclement weather, the decision to cancel the University of Scouting program will be made prior to 8:00 p.m. on Friday, January 9th by the Scout Executive. This information will be communicated by CVC e-mail blast to all registered participants and posted on CVC web site front page. If the University program is cancelled, you may choose to obtain a partial refund by sending a request for refund to e-mail <u>Joshua.JonesStClair@scouting.org</u> prior to February 2, 2026. The amount of the refund will be determined after administrative costs and encumbered expenses are paid. Refunds are intended to be mailed by the end of February.

Patch Replacement. Anyone desiring a replacement or duplicate University patch may purchase one for \$5.00 and degree rockers for \$1.00, subject to availability. Replacement patches will only be made available at the University event. Replacement patch and/or rockers must be verified by the Registrar or by the individual providing proof of completion (certificate or some other documentation).

<u>Refreshments</u> – The Colonial Virginia Council Wood Badge Association (WBA) will be providing lunch (included in the registration fee) and offer refreshments for sale in the main lobby during the University. Lunch benefits the WBA Training Scholarship fund to support Wood Badge and NYLT. Concessions will be cash only. If you bring your own coffee cup, the price will be \$3.00 for the first cup and refills throughout the day will be free.

Static Displays – The lobby/registration area provides space for setting up static displays of Scouting-themed materials at no cost to the exhibitors. In the past, these have included Wood Badge, National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT), Venturing, Sea Scouting, High Adventure, and other promotional materials for Scouting programs and upcoming events. Your display must be **self-contained** (i.e., require no electricity or other services. Tables (6 foot fold-outs) are available. Only one display per subject, please. Please contact Mike Murawski (mamurawski@verizon.net) to reserve space.

<u>Instructors</u> – All instructors must fill out a registration form or register online and pay any required fees. Please check the Instructor block and list the course(s) you will be teaching in the appropriate period under Primary Choices. Upon arrival please check in with the Registrar before proceeding to your room. Bring either a hard copy or a soft copy of your outline, syllabus, and all handouts for the College President's master copies. Instructors teaching and attending six hours of classes will receive credit for the appropriate degree.



Pack Management Skills. What information do you need to gather and what to do with it. Keeping good financial records. Informed Consent/Medical Information forms. Managing Scout/Leader information. Pack Annual Planning. Pack Recharter. Recruiting new scouts. Recruiting new committee members. Fundraising. Scrounging. BeAScout. On-Line Youth registration.

301 9:00-9:50 am Scout Leadership Training Opportunities & Implementing ILST/C/S

One of the Aims of Scouting is Leadership Development. BSA provides several formal training courses to achieve this aim. They are ILST/C—Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops and Crews (conducted at the unit level), NYLT--National Youth Leadership Training (conducted at the council level), and NAYLE National Advanced Youth Leadership Experience (conducted at the national level). The class will also review the ILST/C syllabus so you can implement it in your unit. The purpose of the ILST/C is to teach Scouts with leadership positions about their new roles and how to most effectively reach success in that role. ILST/C is a pre-requisite

for attending NYLT.

302 10:00-10:50 pm Developing a More Welcoming Environment for Diverse Youth and Leaders

This course is to help leaders develop approaches and strategies to welcome more diverse youth and leaders into your unit. We will be discussing Scouting America's Diversity Equity Inclusion program, and also looking at the Order of the Arrow's DEI groups. These groups include: Scouts of Color, (Scouts with Diverse Racial and Ethnic Backgrounds), Scouts with Disabilities, Women in Scouting, and LGBTQ+ Scouts. This training also works as an "intro" of sorts to the Citizenship in Society

Merit Badge.

303 11:00-11:50 am Girl Troop Forum

Managing a successfully run Scouts BSA Troop is a challenge for both new and experienced Scouters. This session will be a forum discussion on what is working for the girl troops in the Colonial Virginia Council and how these units can continue to grow. This class will be facilitated by both male and female Scouters currently working with girl troops. Participants will be encouraged to share their Starts, Stops

and Continues during the session, and may ask questions to the panel.

The goal of this awards program is to encourage and recognize truly outstanding efforts undertaken by Scouting units, Scouts and Venturers, adult Scouters, and other individuals, corporations, and institutions that have contributed significantly to natural resource conservation and environmental protection.

Recruiting & Retaining Scouts

Bringing in new Scouts and keeping them through the years is a tricky task, but readily doable. Come learn the methods to keep all ages interested and growing in your troop. Discover some untapped places to look for youth including sports leagues and church youth ministry.

Take a complete tour of Scouts BSA with a focus on a year-round program. Topics include advancement, the patrol method, training, discipline, parental involvement,

		charge of their troop, crew, or ship. This class provides ongoing resources, practical ideas, and guided discussions to help adult leaders support youth in planning, decision-making, and running successful Scouting activities.
313	11:00-11:50 am	Mentoring Mentoring is an opportunity for a person to grow through discovery. This session will address various mentoring models and way to be a mentor to Scouts and Scouters. Perfect course for Scoutmasters and Committee Chairs.
314	1:00-1:50 pm	Boards of Review – Tenderfoot to Life The course will discuss the purposes of the board of review, offering suggestions for the types of questions that can or should be asked.
315	2:00-2:50 pm	Board of Review – Eagle Scout The course will also discuss the purposes of the board of review, offering suggestions for the types of questions that can or should be asked.
316	3:00-3:50 pm	Life-to-Eagle Mentoring This course will help Scout Leaders mentor Life Scouts through the Eagle Leadership Service Project. Review the process for the Life Scout to select, plan, and execute his project. Discuss how conservation projects should be considered. Provides insight to leaders on how to guide the youth in meeting this challenging requirement for earning the Eagle Scout rank. Course will cover the "top ten" stumbling blocks a Scout may encounter on this leg of the "Road to Eagle".
321	9:00-9:50 am	Troop Ceremonies Provide immediate and meaningful recognition to your scouts by including ceremonies into your presentations. Ceremonies include new scout recognition, rank advancement, new leader inductions and several historic/patriotic ceremonies for opening/closings. Participants will receive a resource book of ceremonies to use in their troop.
322	10:00-10:50 am	Troop Administration From the time a youth joins the Troop along his entire trail to Eagle, it's important to have accurate records. This course discusses the hows, whats, and whens of troop paperwork. This course will give the Scoutmaster, Assistant Scoutmaster, and Committee members the roots and tools for effective troop record keeping. It focuses on the organizing and recording the information using BSA forms. It will also cover the use of BeAScout, Troopmaster, Scoutbook, and on-line youth registration.
323	11:00-11:50 am	The Scout Experience A discussion of the goals and methods of Scouts BSA with an emphasis on ways a troop can implement a Scouting program to more effectively achieve scouting goals. We will examine the first 18 months of a Scout with a critical eye to determine how the troop can best grow our Scouts into leaders whom can make ethical decision over one's lifetime.
324	1:00-2:50 pm	Hiking & Backpacking [2 Hours] The need for regular hiking trips will be discussed as well as the requirements for

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Scout planning and evaluation of the event in this advanced session covering the requirements for a successful backpacking trip. Discussions will focus on equipment, clothing, physical requirements, planning and evaluating the event, special foods, foot care and shoes, ins and outs of cold weather camping, and special places to

hike.

326 3:00-3:50 pm

Merit Badge Counselor Orientation (BSA Course Code D-76)

This one-time training is required to become a registered Merit Badge Counselor. It provides new and prospective counselors with the basic knowledge and skills needed to get started, and can serve as a refresher to veterans. It involves a step-by-step overview of the registration and approval process, discusses helpful methods and resources, and the requirement for Youth Protection Training. Participants will learn about their unique role, the process of counseling, and related national policies and procedures.

331 9:00-9:50 am

Somewhere Different and High Adventure

The troop's been to the local scout camp, national and state parks that are nearby, but itching for someplace new — maybe some different activities, more challenging hikes, trying backpacking, or taking in some really awesome programs offered somewhere they've never been. This course covers some locations you may not have discovered, resources to help find out about them, and most of all, some testimonials to help plan your next new outing. We will look at the various high adventure camps around the United States. Learn what Florida Sea Base, Northern Tier, Philmont Scout Ranch, and the Summit Bechtel Family National Scout Reserve have to offer and what it takes to participate in a chosen program.

332 10:00-11:50 am

Outdoor Ethics Orientation (BSA Training Code S111)

This course introduces the concept of Outdoor Ethics in a fun and engaging way. It should help leaders at all program levels understand the general principles behind Scouting's outdoor ethics program. By the end of the class the participants should know: Outdoor Code and Outdoor Ethics, how Leave No Trace, Tread Lightly, and the land ethic / stewardship support the Outdoor Code; Outdoor Ethics Awareness and Action Awards program, how to locate additional resources and what opportunities are available for further training.

After this course and completion of the on-line online Leave No Trace 101 course and online Tread Lightly 101 Awareness course, participants should have enough knowledge to conduct workshops within their respective units/district/organizations and help youth earn their Outdoor Ethics Awareness Awards.

334 1:00-1:50 pm

Service Projects

What makes a good troop service project? How do you find ideas and who should you contact to follow up on these ideas? After you completed the project, where do you record your work? How do service projects affect your troop? We'll answer as many of your questions as we can!

335 2:00-2:50 pm

Patrol Leader Council (PLC): The Key to a Youth-Led Troop

The PLC - what is it, and how should it be used in the troop? The vision of this session is to understand the role of the Monthly PLC in the operation of the troop, enhance youth-planned and youth-led meetings in the troop, provide resources and knowledge to improve PLCs in their troop and provide for youth leadership development in your unit.

336 3:00-3:50 pm

Scoutmaster Conference

Required for every rank along the trail to Eagle, the SM Conference is the final check of a Scout's readiness for their next rank. This course will teach Scoutmasters, ASMs and other troop leaders about the purposes of the Scoutmaster's Conference and offer suggestions for questions that could be asked.

9:00-9:50 am Intro to Venturing and Sea Scouts

Scouts can belong to Crews and Ships, at the same time they belong to Troops. Do you have Scouts (14+) interested in new adventures and different kinds of Scouting? Come learn about local Venturing Crews and Sea Ships available to respark their Scouting spirit and sense of adventure.

602 10:00-10:50 am Unit Budget Training

No one gets into Scouting to do budgeting or plan how to fund a unit, but taking these steps are a key component to running a successful unit. Creating a budget is an essential part of every well-managed, well-financed unit. This class will help you understand how to complete this essential process.

603 11:00-11:50 am **Fundraising**

The Girl Scouts are well known for their cookie sales. Scouting America troops, packs, ships, and crews have no national fundraising item. Each unit makes their own fundraising decisions. Many councils participate in popcorn and peanut sales, but the strong competition in many areas causes troops to look for alternative ways to raise funds. To help with your efforts, this class will offer some fundraising ideas you might consider.

604 1:00-1:50 pm **Map and Compass**

This training will give you the knowledge and skills to help Wolf Cub Scouts fulfill the map and compass requirements for the Finding Your Way Elective. In addition, this training will progress to the skills needed for the Second Class and First Class Navigation requirements. Compasses will be provided, but bring your own if you (or your unit) have one.

605 2:00-2:50 pm **Event Planning**

What does it take to put together a District or Council event? What are the details of scheduling, budgeting, facilities and materials, staffing, advertising, registration, coordination, reporting, and risk management to make something happen? These events could be focused on training, recruiting, activity, high adventure, and more.

606 3:00-3:50 pm Unit Level Risk Management and Scouting Insurance

There is an element of risk in many things we do in Scouting. Scouting America has developed procedures over the years to help you assess the risk of various activities and propose strategies to safely accomplish the event. These vary from the Guide to Safe Scouting to safety training programs. Additionally, there is the Scouting America Insurance to consider. Leaders should be aware of what is and is not covered by Scouting America insurance and how it works with your personal insurance policies.

611 9:00-9:50 am *A Scout is Reverent*

Every Scout is encouraged to practice their religion according to their faith. Scouts and Scouters of all ages and faiths have an opportunity to participate in the Religious Emblems Program. This course provides an overview of the Religious Emblems Program and includes information and how to train/use the Pack Religious Emblems Coordinator or Troop Chaplain and Chaplin Aide in your unit program. This course also teaches Scout leaders how teach or conduct a simple Interfaith worship service at camp, on the trail, or during other outings. When we conduct Scouting activities, it is important that we call attention to a Scout's "Duty to God" through prayer at meal times and at other appropriate occasions.

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612	10:00-10:50 am	International Scouting Opportunities Scouting is happening all around the world – there are National Scout Organizations representing their home countries and delivering the promise of Scouting in virtually all areas and regions globally. - ➢ First Year Doctoral Candidates: Complete Doctorate courses 904 and 905. You will have time during the University to select an additional four elective sessions. Doctoral Candidates must demonstrate at least 1 hour in each Scouting program area offered by the University (Cub, Scouts BSA, and General Scouting). You may serve on staff during the periods that courses 904 and 905 are not scheduled. Ensure you schedule your attendance.
- > After completing the first-year requirements. complete an individual Scouting-related project (as approved by the Doctorate review committee) and submit a final report of your project for approval of the review committee. Four copies of the final reports are due to the Dean of the Doctorate programs at least 2 weeks prior to the date/time presentations will be made.
- > To receive a Doctoral award, candidates must submit their thesis or project reports to the Dean of Doctoral Programs and/or President of the University of Scouting and/or the Council Training Chair not later than November 1st immediately prior to the desired convening of the University at which the Doctoral certificate is requested. Anytime during the year prior to November 1 is acceptable.
 - ✓ The candidate will present his/her work to a panel for evaluation and acceptance. The panel shall consist of a minimum of three individuals one of whom will be the Dean of Doctoral Programs. Presentations are expected to last approximately 45 minutes. The candidate is expected to make a presentation lasting approximately 30 minutes and the remaining 15 minutes for the panel's questions. Doctoral presentations are made outside the scheduled time of the University as mutually agreed upon by the candidate and the Dean.
 - ✓ Candidates should be prepared to respond to questions about their project including technical/detailed questions regarding references, research and/or conclusions from the effort to defend their conclusions and recommendations.
 - ✓ The Dean of Doctoral Programs need 3 copies of your presentation one for each panelist brought to the event and an electronic version in advance so we can select and prepare the review panel.
 - ✓ Preference is to do prior to the University and we can arrange a location. Also need to know what if any support you need projector, screen, etc.
 - ✓ If your project has stalled or you otherwise need some assistance, contact the Dean of Doctoral programs or the registrar to schedule a time during the University to meet and develop a plan to resuscitate the project. **Course #906** provides a scheduled time to work on recovering.

9:00-11:50 am 1:00-3:50 pm ECSI Certification – Wilderness First Aid: This is an ALL DAY Course. (BSA Course Credit NO2) There is additional expense for this course.

Provides Scouting leaders with Scouting-approved Emergency Care and Safety Institute (ECSI) certification in Wilderness First Aid. This certification is recognized to fulfill the first aid training requirements for high adventure bases such as Philmont and Sea Base. Note that Philmont will require 3 qualified participants per crew in 2025. Units that undertake adventure trips in areas where professional medical care is more than 30 minutes away are strongly recommended to have leaders certified in Wilderness First Aid. This is a blended course that requires completion of a 10-hour online knowledge course and exam, followed by in-person skills review and testing at University of Scouting. *Class size limited to 12.*

SPECIAL NOTES:

- 1. Students must be at least 14 years old.
- Certification in cardio pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) is bundled with this course.
- 3. This course provides a complete certification in both CPR/AED and Wilderness First Aid. Students must complete the online ECSI course for Wilderness First Aid as a pre-requisite, and then complete the in-person skills test during University of Scouting.
- 4. The online portion of this course takes about 8 hours for Wilderness First Aid. These online course has tests that and a passing grade is required to get the certificate. The online course completion certificate must be presented to the instructor at University of Scouting.
- 5. Contact Norm Effinger (nte@cox.net) to get links to the appropriate online courses. The online portions require the student to create an account with ECSI and pay online approximately \$40 for Wilderness First Aid. Students are responsible for paying the fees for the online portions. This is separate from and in addition to the UOS class registration fees.

American Red Cross CPR/AED/First Aid (3 hrs) (BSA Course Credit N01/N06) There is additional expense for this course.

American Red Cross Adult and Pediatric Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) with automatic external defibrillator (AED) and First Aid certification course (2-year cert). Covers first aid responder's actions for life-threatening injuries until medical help arrives and how to treat minor injuries/illnesses. This is a blended learning course with a 2-4 hour online portion to complete prior to the in-person skills validation. If the online portion is not complete, you will not be allowed to take the course. *Class size limited to 12*. No minimum age requirement, but youth registrants must be strong enough to compress an adult mannequin chest for certification.
