Lunch on Saturday is included in the registration fee.

Camping is optional. There is no extra fee to camp with this event.

If you are camping Saturday night, you may add meal tickets for Saturday Dinner and Sunday Breakfast meals served in the dining hall (\$5 per meal, per person) or you may choose to cook in your campsite as a family or a Pack. Saturday dinner will be served at 6pm. Sunday Breakfast will be served at 8am.

Check-In

Check-in will open at 8:00 am in the main parking lot. Opening flags will take place at 9am on the parade field. Late arrivals need to head to the Trading Post to check in. All participants will receive a Camp Map and Schedule upon arrival. Closed toe shoes are required at camp for safety.

All youth and adults must have a copy of their medical form: Parts A & B. This form can be found at www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/ahmr and in the Attachments section of your registration.

We recommend that everyone bring a day pack, a refillable water bottle and a hat. Keep your sweatshirt or coat handy too as it can be cold in the shade and gets cold quickly once the sun goes down.

Camping Check-in

Friday Arrivals: Please include your estimated arrival time in your registration so we can be prepared to meet you and get you checked into your campsite for the night. Please aim for 5pm-8pm arrival. You will be able to drive to or near to your campsite to unload. All vehicles will need to be removed and returned to the parking lot immediately after unloading.

No activities or meal service will be provided on Friday night. The dining hall will be available to all until lights-out to eat dinner, socialize and warm up before bed. Coffee will be available in the dining hall in the morning by 7 am.

Saturday Arrivals: Please leave your camping gear in your car for the day and follow the regular check-in procedures when you arrive. After the closing campfire program ends (about 4pm) we will allow vehicle entry for unloading and setup in your campsite. Vehicles will need to be removed and returned to the main parking lot immediately after unloading.

Vehicles in Camp: It is imperative that you stay on marked roadways unless specifically instructed by the Ranger or designated camp staff/volunteers. Driving past road barriers can cause severe road damage that is extremely difficult, time consuming and potentially expensive to repair in addition to potential vehicle damage.

Camp Halloween Events and Activities

Costume Contest: Dress up in your Halloween best to participate in the first annual Camp Grizzly Costume Contest! Sign up when you get to camp. All costumes must be Scouting appropriate.

Haunted House: Fun for all ages! We aim to make our hauntings enjoyable for elementary aged children. The haunted house includes darkness, jump-scares, flashing lights, loud and/or “scary” noises and fog that obscures what lies ahead in the dark. A volunteer minder at the entrance can inform the cast inside if your youth would like a “practice run”.

Haunted Hayride: Take a hayride around Camp Grizzly! Gorgeous fall scenery combines with Halloween hauntings along the way! Also meant to be enjoyable for elementary ages with fun frightenings along the way.

Range and Target Activities: Lions/Kindergarten age youth may participate at the Archery and Slingshot ranges only. Tigers/First Grade age youth and up may also participate at the BB gun range. Parents should expect to assist their youth on all ranges.

Other Activities: Other available activities include a First Aid skills station, face painting, crafts, and more! Our other activities are run by volunteers from local groups and Scouts BSA units.

Trading Post: Camp Grizzly trading post will be open all day! Snacks, beverages and sweet treats of course. We will also be stocked with all your fall scouting essentials: Uniform parts, books, hats, neckerchiefs and more! This is the place to find your next favorite hoodie or other Camp Grizzly souvenir. Past event patches are available as well as our new Grizzly CSP (Council Service Patch).

Campfire program: The best part of the whole day! Participation is optional: Packs are welcome to submit skits, songs or stories for inclusion in the program to the Head Haunt (Program Director) by the end of lunchtime. Be ready to sing songs, be silly and laugh out loud together!

Saturday Evening/Sunday Activities for Saturday Campers

Evening Activities: (Times TBA) Cracker barrel & games in the dining hall for snacks, socializing and warming up before bed. The Haunted House will have its Final Hour for a few more trips through the fog.

Sunday Morning: Breakfast will be served at 8am for campers who have purchased meal tickets. A non-denominational Scouts Own service will be offered shortly after breakfast. Load-out start time is up to you – please be courteous to your neighbors. Pack up and load out must be completed by 11am.

Camping Notes

Tent camping only. We do not have space for RVs in campsites for this event. Campsite assignments will be made during the week of October 20th and communicated by Friday morning. Packs will be assigned together. All campsites are group sites: you will be placed with another pack or family if you are coming without your pack or don't yet have a pack. A Scout is Friendly and Courteous! (And is careful to be accurate with their Pack number when registering!)

You need to bring your own tent. Canvas tents have been taken down in most campsites for the winter. Many tents that can fit 2 people will fit on top of our wooden tent platforms and you are welcome to set up your smaller tents on our platforms. If most or all your group's tents are larger tents, ensure you select the option "we need flat ground for tents" in your registration so that we can do our best to place you in a campsite that has space and flatter ground for larger tents.

It gets COLD at night in October! Overnight temperatures in late October are typically in the 30s-40s. Frost is common. Bring your winter sleeping bag, a sleeping pad or air mattress and consider an extra blanket! Be sure to change into fresh clothes for sleeping. You will sweat during the day and your clothes will be wet (wet = cold!) even if they feel dry. A beanie, gloves and warm, dry socks may be important additions that help you sleep comfortably.

The scout shower house and lower lodge will be available for hot showers and indoor toilets. Porta-potties are available in campsites. Water may be turned off for the winter in campsites.
