
Camp Details:

Directions to Camp Curran:

From the North: Take I-5 South towards Portland. Take Exit 127 (right side of freeway) and stay in the left two lanes. Turn left at traffic light onto SR-512 E towards Puyallup. Travel on 512 for approximately 5.6 miles. Take the Canyon Road exit towards Summit. Turn right onto Canyon Road E and travel for approximately 1.2 miles. Turn right onto 128th St E and in .2 miles turn left onto 50th Ave E. Travel down 50th Ave E for .3 miles and turn right into the Camp Curran parking lot.

From the South: Take I-5 North towards Seattle. Take Exit 127 (right side of freeway) and stay in the right lane for SR-512 E towards Puyallup. Travel on 512 for approximately 5.6 miles. Take the Canyon Road

exit towards Summit. Turn right onto Canyon Road E and travel for approximately 1.2 miles. Turn right onto 128th St E and in .2 miles turn left onto 50th Ave E. Travel down 50th Ave E for .3 miles and turn right into the Camp Curran parking lot.



Uniform and Clothing:

Day camp will be providing a t- shirt for each scout signed up! We ask that the Scouts wear these both days of the event! We will hand out the shirt on day one! The Field Uniform (Uniform Shirt, Neckerchief, Shorts) is not required nor needed, so please leave them at home. All campers are to always wear closed-toe footwear.

Vehicles:

When arriving at Cub Scout Day Camp, please park in the designated parking lot Vehicles must be **backed-in** to their parking spot, per camp safety regulations. The safety of the Scouts being the primary consideration, your full cooperation is appreciated.

Check-In and Check-Out Procedures: Every youth must be checked in and out both days at the check in table!

Arrival/Check-in Procedure: On Friday June 6th, check in will be 4-5 pm, Please contact event staff if you will need to arrive later! You will NEED! A Physical printed copy (A & B) medical forms for all people staying on property.

Checkout Procedure: Check out at the Checkout table, ensure to pick up any crafts or projects your scout may have created. You can collect your Health forms at the final checkout on Saturday!

What to Bring:

Cub Scouts should always bring their six essentials. This list provides the six essentials as well as additional items that they should have on them.

- Printed Physical Health form A & B
- Medications in original prescription bottles (If needed)
- Comfortable closed-toed shoes (No flip flops or Velcro sandals)
- Small backpack
- Sack Lunch for Saturday! (that does not need refrigeration)
- Water Bottle with Name on It
- Snacks
- Spare change of clothes
- Bug repellant
- Sunblock
- Poncho/waterproof jacket
- Personal First Aid Kit

What Not to Bring: Do not bring anything not allowed in Scouting. Please, even if your Scout has their Whittling Chip, do not send along a pocket knife. Do not bring any toys that resemble firearms, including squirt guns, and pop guns.

Allergies and Medications: If your Scouts have allergies or require medications, please follow the provided procedures to ensure their needs are met during camp hours.

Frequently Asked Questions:

Can siblings come to camp with their Cub Scout? What about other youth?

Only youth registered for day camp can stay on property for the event.

What if we arrive early?

Please remain outside the check-in area or with your vehicle until check-in starts. Event staff will be getting things ready until the official check in time!

Can the camp accommodate a person in our unit who has food allergies?

Please make sure to disclose any allergies or food restrictions during registration! The Event staff will reach out to make sure they can accommodate! If there are additional concerns please reach out to Rachael.weaver@scouting.org.

Can Scout bring cell phones?

We ask that Scouts keep any electronics they may have away during the event. Keep in mind this is a camp setting and there is a chance that the electronics get broken. This is not the camps responsibility and is a family choice.

What if there are mobility concerns?

All buildings are accessible. All program areas have accessibility. Several of the hiking routes would be challenging. Please reach out with any concerns and we can make sure we are properly prepared! Email any concerns or questions to phcdaycampdirector@gmail.com.

Can we buy camp shirts before camp?

No. All registered youth campers will receive their camp shirt during the first day.

Will my scout earn advancement requirements?

Cub Scout Day Camp is a supplement to the Pack program. Scouts will be working on some electives. Each scout will receive a list of what was worked on through the camp. It is up to the Pack to award these advancements, Day Camp won't sign off but will provide the info!

What if my family can't afford the cost of camp?
