## Remembering The Fallen and Honoring The First Responders 2001 - 2021



A 15-year-old Eagle Scout was responsible for bringing this 650 pound piece of history to Windermere, Florida.

From proposing the memorial, requesting the artifact from The Port Authority, to working with engineers and architects, to pitching UPS for \$1,200 in free freight shipping.

Jeffrey Cox's Eagle Scout Project, resulted in a moving 9/11 Memorial in Windermere.

The memorial also includes

hand painted tiles for each country that lost people in the attack that day. Scouting makes a positive difference while creating a story of our own.

Jeffrey is one of 72 million Millennials today. The Millennial generation was shaped by the following events: non-traditional families, technology, mass shootings, the war on terror (9/11), and the great recession. They were born between 1982 through 2000 (21 to 39 years of age). Currently, they are the largest generation in the United States.

Use your creativity in your ticket writing; no two tickets will look exactly alike.

Don't forget to use the skills you have learned at Wood Badge.

The ticket consists of three parts:

- ⇒ A description of your Scouting role;
- ⇒ A statement of your vision of success;
- ⇒ A plan of action composed of five significant goals that can be attained within 18 months.



Make your goals S.M.A.R.T. Ensure each address who, what, where, when, why, how measured, and how you will determine the task is complete.

### What's a cracker barrel?

It's an evening snack and time for fellowship with other scouts. The term "cracker barrel" is said to come from the time when people would shop at their local General Store and gather around the cracker barrel to sit and visit with others in the community.

The food is kept simple; cheese and crackers, summer sausage, pizza bites, nachos, buffalo wings or hot dogs cut up in barbeque sauce for example. Cracker barrel is all about visiting with other scouts and leaders, telling stories and tales of adventures had since the last time they met.



# ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES... KNOW YOUR JOB!

## THE PATROL LEADER



Take a leading role in planning and conducting patrol meetings and activities.

- Encourage patrol members to fully participate in the Wood Badge course and to achieve all they can.
- Represent the patrol as a member of the patrol leaders' council (PLC).
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.
- Practice using the leadership

and team skills being presented during Wood Badge presentations.

- Ensure that daily patrol self-assessments are carried out in a timely, effective manner.
- Provide patrol members with all the resources and information they need to succeed.
- Empower the patrol to become a high-performance team.
- See that the patrol is prepared for all course presentations and activities.

## THE ASSISTANT PATROL LEADER



Assume the responsibilities of the patrol leader whenever the patrol leader is unable to do so.

- Encourage patrol members to fully participate in the Wood Badge course and to

achieve all they can.

- Assist the patrol leader in empowering the patrol to become a high performance team.
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.

## THE PATROL SCRIBE



Provide interesting and timely material about the patrol to the publisher of The Gilwell Gazette—the daily newspaper of the course. Patrol articles should be submitted daily prior to lunch using the forms provided in

the Patrol Leaders Guidebook.

- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.

## THE PATROL CHAPLAIN AIDE



In concert with the chaplain and with the other patrols and with the assistant Scoutmaster assigned to coordinate their efforts, the patrol chaplain aide will

- Learn what resources are available that can be used for religious observances during

the course and make that information available to the rest of the patrol.

- Develop and help present the participants' Interfaith worship service.
- Assist in conducting any other religious observances that may arise during the Wood Badge course.
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.

## THE PATROL MEMBER

For a patrol to succeed as a team, each of its members must

- Fully participate in the Wood Badge course and achieve all he or she can.
- Practice using the team development skills introduced during Wood Badge presentations.
- Help his or her patrol meet its obligations to fulfill assignments including the development and presentation of the patrol project.
- Set a good example by living the Scout Oath and Law.
- Have fun!

## THE SERVICE PATROL

- Be responsible for the general cleanliness of the camp, especially for the shower house, meeting areas, camp sites and the campfire circle.
- Assist the quartermaster with the evening cracker barrels.
- Lay campfires, when requested, and extinguish the fire when done.

## THE PROGRAM PATROL

- Conducts the morning flag-raising ceremony.
- As part of the flag-raising ceremony, present a brief history of a historic flag and lead the group in a song associated with that flag.
- Lower the flags in the evening.
- Provide leadership for the Day Four participant campfire.
