Campsite Program

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 situation, FSSR has had to make several changes to its program offerings. Despite not having some of our favorite evening programs this year, this is an opportunity for us to help facilitate your unit's campsite program!

Upon arrival at FSSR, each unit will be given a campsite program guide, developed by our Program Director, Bret Nadolski. Units will be encouraged to participate in a variety of campsite-focused programs, such as the dutch oven cookoff, gateway competition, and evening smores made over the campfire!

Any unit wishing to bring more than two adult leaders (registered Scouters over the age of eighteen) may do so.

Additional Adult leaders beyond the two free will pay the Adult Leader Fee of \$150.00.

ADVANCEMENT at Fort Steuben SCOUT Reservation

The merit badge system is the core of Scouts, BSA advancement and as such it is the foundation of our daily program. Merit badges are designed to introduce Scouts to new skills, experiences, and knowledge in a variety of different subjects. At Fort Steuben we believe we have a duty to offer a diverse selection of quality merit badges to reflect this purpose. Our merit badge selection has grown to over 40 classes, and offers badges taught in program areas such as Ecology, Aquatics, Sports, STEM, Outdoor Skills, Shooting Sports, and Citizenship.

The Trailblazer program is Fort Steuben's first-year Scout experience. Scouts who participate in the program will spend the week working on requirements for Tenderfoot through First Class ranks in the morning, while the afternoon will see them earning merit badges at Handicraft and the Waterfront.

By the end of the week, scouts in the program should be nearly done with all of the requirements for Tenderfoot through First Class and have earned a few merit badges in the process. We do not sign off on requirements in the Scout's handbook; however, we provide documentation to Scoutmasters that serves as the record of the Scout's advancement. We encourage Scoutmasters to reinforce the development of these skills by working with Scouts to verify the completion of these requirements. Scouts who participate in the Trailblazer program will go to an outpost outside main camp on Thursday evening. Trailblazers should bring a backpack with them to camp in order to transport personal items to the overnight site.

Ecology and Conservation are at the heart of our **Nature** program area at Fort Steuben Scout Reservation. With nearly 500 acres of forests filled with flora and fauna, the program here is all about getting outside and learning about the natural world and all of the things it offers us – as well as what we can do for it! Merit badges here focus on the observation and study of the natural world and on the impact that humans can have on it.

Our Nature program area also collaborates with our STEM area in order for Scouts to complete research-based requirements for Merit Badges! Scouts may use one of our many iPads during class throughout the week, which are provided by our partners at the Ohio Oil and Gas Energy Education Program.

Scoutcraft



One pillar of the Scouts BSA program is developing youths' knowledge of how to live in the outdoors. **Scoutcraft** is where Scouts can develop skills that are critical to living and learning in the outdoors, while developing essential leadership and teamwork skills. From cooking meals over a fire, to building your own survival shelter and sleeping in it overnight, Scoutcraft is sure to ignite the inner survivalist in anyone.

Most of the merit badges offered at Scoutcraft are perfect for more experienced Scouts who enjoy working outdoors. Many merit badges require hard work and completion of prerequisite requirements in order to earn them at camp. It is highly recommended that Scouts taking these merit badges have the prerequisites done by the time they arrive at camp.

One of the many highlights of a Scout's experience at summer camp is the opportunity to shoot a rifle, shotgun, or bow. While shooting comprises the majority of the time spent on the Range, every Scout who participates will go through a safety course taught by our National Camping School certified Safety Instructors and is supervised at all times while on the shooting range. Because of the nature of these types of programs and the risks they involve, we strongly recommend that only Scouts over the age of 14 be allowed to participate. However, as always, we will welcome any Scout whom the unit leaders and parents believe can safely participate.

It should be noted that all of these merit badges have additional fees associated with them which help to offset the program's ammunition costs.








As always, safety is our top priority here at camp. Our waterfront staff employs a number of techniques to keep the area safe, and all guests of the camp are required to abide by these safety procedures.

Any guests wishing to use the waterfront during their week at camp will be required to take the BSA Swim Test, after which they will receive a Buddy Tag that will be used whenever you are at the waterfront. Further details on how the Buddy Tag system works will be provided upon your arrival at camp when your unit first visits the waterfront.

Finally, if you plan on taking merit badges at the waterfront, we recommend that you bring swimming trunks, shoes that can get wet, and an extra towel or two. Goggles, nose plugs, and other swimming aids are encouraged for any who wish to use them.


Please keep in mind that every waterfront badge involves extensive time in and on the water, and passing the BSA Swim test is required for all badges.



Creativity and skillfulness are hallmarks of the Handicraft program. If you like to make things with your hands, come up with games to play, or love being behind a camera, then Handicraft is the program area for you!

The merit badges here are perfect for Scouts of any age or experience level, and many of them will have you create works of art you can take home to show your family at the end of the week. Even without prior experience, many Handicraft badges can be started and completed during your stay at camp, but as always, it is important to be prepared for the class by reviewing merit badge requirements and reading the merit badge book prior to your arrival at camp.

All Scouts taking Handicraft merit badges should remember to bring extra money to purchase craft supplies at the Trading Post. Costs for each badge are detailed in the MB Course Catalog located in the Appendix.

Merit badges taught at the Public Safety area have prerequisites and for some badges, Scouts must have some basic skills before attending.

ADULT LEADER EXPERIENCE

At Fort Steuben Scout Reservation, we recognize the commitment that leaders make when bringing a unit to camp. In an effort to thank you for this dedication to Scouting, we would like to provide you with an outstanding Adult Leader Experience.

LEADER MEETINGS

Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 9:15 am, the camp administration will hold a meeting with all adult leaders in order to ensure that your unit is informed on the most up to date information about your week at camp.

LEADER TRAININGS

Scoutmasters will have the opportunity to participate in B.S.A. Adult Leader Training including, Safe Swim Defense - Safety Afloat, Climb-On Safely, Youth Protection and Merit Badge Counselor Training.

VOLUNTEER COMMISSIONER CORP

Any Scoutmasters or adult leaders with free time in the morning are encouraged to join the Commissioner in his daily campsite rotation. Each morning, the Commissioner will visit each campsite and assess the unit's effort based on several criteria. Throughout the week, we will recognize the best campsites with the famous Red Lantern Award. Other adult leaders willing to help with this process can meet the Commissioner after the morning adult leaders' meeting at the Shower House. Most assessments are completed by 12pm each day.

STEAK & EGG BREAKFAST

If a unit is successful in bringing 85% or more of their registered Scouts to camp, the adult leaders will be treated to a complementary Steak and Egg breakfast hosted by our Scout Executive, Dan Bettison. The day of the breakfast will be announced the day prior at camp.

Fort Steuben Scout Reservation understands that Adult Leaders are an invaluable part of Scouting, and we thank you for bringing your unit.

FSSRTRADING POST_

The Trading Post at Fort Steuben is the place to go for all of your camp purchases. The Trading Post is stocked with all of your summer camp essentials, including: raincoats, water bottles, merit badge supplies, and even bags to carry everything in! If you fancy a mid-day snack, the Trading Post is also stocked with all manner of food supplies, including the ever popular slushies and pop. Should a Scout be found to have any of these items or other items deemed dangerous to the general well-being of our campers, disciplinary actions will follow that may result in the dismissal of the camper in possession at the discretion of the Camp Director.

YOUR HOME FOR WEEK

CAMPSITES

Fort Steuben maintains and operates 10 campsites on property, all within a short walking distance of the Dining Hall and most program areas. Each campsite comes with its own unique feel and history. Whether it's your 1st or 25th year coming to Fort Steuben, finding the right campsite for your unit is essential to the camping experience. Each campsite is equipped with a fully stocked latrine and running water, and a few picnic tables.

Because of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, Ohio River Valley Council leadership has decid- ed that FSSR will not be providing units with tents, cots, or mattresses. It is the unit's responsibility to bring enough tents to adequat- ley house their participants for the week. Youth Protection policies must be enforced at all times while planning your campsite arrange- ments. *Each unit must have two registered, Youth Protection trained adult leaders over the age of 21 camping in their site throughout the week. ANY adult leader wishing to camp at FSSR must be Youth Protection trained.




Each campsite is also equipped with an established fire pit. We encourage troops to have campfires in their site (with supervision) and will provide the tools to make sure your campers are kept safe!

Girl Troops Welcome!

Any unit that might have a "sister unit" must camp in separate subcamps and have their own adult leaders.

Fort Steuben Scout Reservation allows Scouts to bring their bicycles to camp in order to ease transportation between Merit Badge Courses. Scouts must follow all rules given at the Bicycle Safety Meeting at the beginning of the week, Sunday evening, or else they will lose the privilege. Scouts MUST wear helmets at all times while riding bicycles.


BE PREPARED! Scouts who bring bikes to camp should be somewhat experienced bicyclists. FSSR's rideable terrain consists of grass and gravel.



At FSSR, we want you to be as prepared and as comfortable as possible! In order to assist that effort, please use the following pages to gain more information about a campsite that you are interested in, or are already occupying. If there is ever a logistical concern, please do not hesitate to contact the Camp Director or Program Director!

Shoshone Dall

Shoshone is FSSR's largest campsite, and is designed to fit three units, two smaller ones and one larger one, in three sub camps. Shoshone is located near the parking lot, Handigraft Area, and the Trading Post.



Huron

Huron is a small campsite, and is designed to fit one unit. Huron is located on the south end of camp and is near the Handicraft program area, parking lot, and the Cherokee campsite.




Chippewa

Chippewa is a moderately sized campsite, and is designed to fit two units, in two sub camps, or one large unit. Chippewa is located near the Handicraft area, parking lot, dand the Shoshone campsite.



Cherokee

Cherokee is a larger campsite that can fit one large unit in subcamps 1 and 2, and a small unit in subcamp 3. Also, three small units could occupy each seperate subcamp. Cherokee is next to the Trading Post and the Huron Campsite



Once your troop arrives at FSSR, each car in your caravan will be greeted by a staff member and will receive further direction based on whether they are hauling a troop trailer, staying for the whole week, or just dropping Scouts off.

Drivers who feel comfortable parking their trailers in their campsites are permitted to do so themselves. If not, our maintenance staff can park a unit's trailer with a tractor upon request.

Seneca

Seneca is a moderately sized campsite, and is designed to fit two moderately sized units in two seperate sub camps. Seneca is located near the Dining Hall, Chapel, Trading Post, and the Mandan Campsite.



Mandan


Mandan is a moderately sized campsite that can comfortably fit one large unit or two smaller units, in two sub camps. Mandan is located in the center of main camp, right across from the Dining Hall.



Shawnee

Shawnee is a moderately sized campsite that can host one unit per subcamp, or one large unit in both subcamps comfortably. Shawnee is located near the Trailblaer porgram area, parade field, and Dining Hall.





Mohican

Mohican is a moderately sized campsite that can host one unit per subcamp, or one large unit in both comfortably. Mohican is located on the north end of camp and is across the road from the Nature program area.

Apachea Che

Apache is a large campsite that can comfortably fit one large unit or two smaller units, in two sub camps. Apache is located on the north end of camp and is near the Sports, Nature, Shooting Sports, and Scout-Craft program areas.




Sioux OUI

DINING at Fort Steuben

For 2021, Fort Steuben will serve meals in a modified cafeteria style. Each camper will receive an individually prepared meal and set of plastic utensils upon entering the dining hall. There will be several recycling cans stationed around the Dining Hall and Ken Moore Pavilion in order to reduce the amount of waste produced at each meal. Dining at FSSR will look different in comparison to years past because of new food service guidlines and COVID-19 policies. FSSR's dining experience is subject to change.

During each meal, the Fort Steuben staff presents a program consisting of a mealtime knot, a song, and other activities to get scouts engaged and energized for the day of program. Please submit a dietary needs form to the ORVC service center no later than June 1st, 2020 concerning special dietary needs. We will make every best effort to accommodate your needs; however, late notification of these needs may result in them not being met immediately upon arrival.

Youth Protection Begins With YOU

ALL units will be expected to follow Youth Protection guidelines and BSA policy when traveling to camp and while participating in summer camp activities at FSSR.

Please ensure that ALL registered adult Scouters attending summer camp have Youth Protection Training completed before arriving at camp!

HEALTH

ANNUAL BSA HEALTH FORM

The BSA requires a physical evaluation be completed annually for both Scouts and Adult Leaders attending summer camp. A health form, parts A, B, and C, signed by a licensed Health Care Provider and dated within 12 months from when the person will be attending camp must be on file at the camp's medical facility. The form is good for one year through the month in which the form was completed. For example, if a Scout has a form filled out in July of this year that form is good for all scouting activities through July of next year. We suggest that Scoutmasters organize their participants' medical forms before arrival at camp, to ensure a smooth and quick check-in process at the Health Lodge.

MEDICATION

Only refrigerated or injectable medications are required to be stored at the Health Lodge with the Medical Officer. Other medications should be kept by the unit leaders, alongside a medical log and lockable container to use for storing the unit's medications. It is the responsibility of the unit leader to ensure the timely distribution and logging of all medications given to members of their unit.

Units may request a lockbox for secure storage of medication if a trailer is not kept in the campsite. Medications can also be dispensed by the Health Lodge, at the request of a parent or guardian of the Scout; however, the unit leader will remain responsible for ensuring all campers receiving medication from the Health Lodge arrive and take the medication.

Any medications to be distributed by the Health Office for your unit must be turned in during Sunday Check-in. Medication should be placed in separate containers for each scout, including instructions for dispensing (how many, when, through what method, etc.). We ask that campers bring only medication being taken under a physician's direction. The medications must be in the original container and clearly marked with the contents, dosage instructions, camper name, and camper's unit number.



COVID-19 WAIVERS AND POLICIES

Due to the ongoing global pandemic, FSSR and the Ohio River Valley Council has developed a set of policies to minimalize the chances of spreading COVID-19. Any scout, adult leader, or approved volunteer planning on being at FSSR must arrive with a completed ORVC COVID-19 waiver. Waivers are included in the appendix of this leader's guide.

If a Scout or adult leader who plans on attending FSSR for summer camp 2021 is experiencing ANY symptoms of COVID-19 five days prior to their camp session, they must stay home. Refunds will be offered to any participant who this might unfortunately apply to.

Please reference the ORVC's COVID-19 policies in the appendix thoroughly prior to arrival at FSSR.

NOTICE

Our group of Health Officers noticed that some of the most common visits to the Health Lodge are due to tick-bites.

FSSR encourages Scouts to use our private, state of the art shower facilities every day, and check themselves for ticks regularly.

If a tick is discovered and removed at the Health Lodge, it will be recorded in the medical log, and the Scout will receive an informational paper on tick-bites and their possible hazards. The date of the tick bite will be recorded on the paper given to the Scout.
