This TrEx will offer 50 training options in the Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, Venturing, SeaScouts, and OA Programs, as well as courses that apply to many areas of Scouting for Scouters and Scouts. Additionally, TrEx will offer Merit Badge Classes, along with Childcare for volunteers/ parents attending TrEx:

There will be eight 45-minute periods with five minutes travel time in between periods.

There is no designated lunch period! Each participant should select a period to eat lunch. Please only eat/drink in the cafeteria (7th floor). B'Tech does not want us eating in the classrooms, hallways.

Please note that Brooklyn Tech H.S. will NOT provide any food on site. You must bring your own lunch AND eat in the WEST side of cafeteria or go-of-site for lunch. If you choose to eat off-site, consider taking a double lunch period.

Childcare:

In order to better support volunteers/parents attending TrEx, childcare is available for registered Scouts. To prevent the spread of the cold and flu, we are asking only healthy children be registered.

Please be advised, no food will be provided. The parent/guardian must provide their own lunch, snacks, and drinks. We do not have the ability to heat food.

IMPORTANT: Each child must be registered individually for childcare and will only be released to the named parent/guardian on the registration.

Merit Badge Classes:

This year we're thrilled to offer Merit Badge Classes for Scouts BSA Youth attending TrEx. Please see Course Catalog for badges being offered.

Please be advised, no food will be provided. The parent/guardian must provide their own lunch, snacks, drinks and or money. We do not have the ability to heat food. With consent from Parent/ guardian, Scouts BSA, Venturing age youth can exit the building and purchase food from nearby restaurants.

IMPORTANT: Each child must be registered individually, specifying pickup preferences indicating pickup or if the youth is allowed to leave the building on their own. For safety, Scouts BSA and Venturing youth will only be release to the named parent/guardian on the registration.

Please review the course schedule and descriptions. Some courses are offered twice to accommodate participation, unfortunately, some of your selections may conflict with each other.

Tailored for Unit Key 3 members or delegates with application, invitation, and organization manager access. Join us in the computer lab for a hands-on training. Registrants must come prepared with their username and password in ensure a seamless and productive experience.

Honor Guard and Scout Speaker Training

[two periods, once] Joe Schiltz **YOUTH**

Youth will learn practical public speaking techniques, tips on speechwriting, proper etiquette, and how to perform in the BSA Honor Guard for special events. Scouts who attend the training may be invited to speak at a GNYC special event later in the year. However, all Scouts will have an opportunity to participate in the BSA Honor Guard if they would like. Each Scout that participates in the BSA Honor Guard will receive a patch and will fulfill Community Service & Rank Requirements!

Running a Good and Safe Program: Scouts BSA and Cubs Leaders

[two periods, twice] Dorothy Young, Don Ghee, Tom Bain, Pat Bain
Encouraging all units to run both a good program and a safe unit at the same time providing a streamlined safety process for units to achieve as safe a unit as possible recognizing units that implement the streamlined safe unit program.

STEM: NOVA, SuperNova [three periods, once] Shawn Spencer, Barbara Spencer **YOUTH**

This class will provide all the basic training for an adult to become a NOVA Counselor and SuperNova mentor. Paperwork will be available for attendees to join the Council STEM Team. We will review the BSA STEM program and its awards, how to be a Counselor and Mentor, how to help the Scouts through the program, implementing the program in your unit, developing a STEM coord (youth and/or adult) and do some experiments/activities.

Inclusive Scouting "Documenting Violations for Protected Classes and Facilitating Conflict Resolutions" [two periods, once] Antonio del Rosario **YOUTH**

Join GNYC Board Member and Diversity Chair, Antonio del Rosario (DEIB Certified Cornell University), for a step-by-step seminar designed to empower youth and adult leaders with the knowledge and tools necessary to document and address violations related to protected classes: gender, race, religion, sexual orientation, disability, age, and nationality. This seminar ensures safety for all our Scouts and Scouters.

Scout Leader Life Balance [one period, once] Alex Agostini

Showing Scout leaders that they don't have to agree to everything that they may be asked to do, remind them that they do have a life outside Scouts. I use my own Scouter's life for examples. Very interested in hearing from session attendees for additional examples of how they manage the life and their Scouting Life.

Great Campfire Programs [one period, twice] David Turner **YOUTH**

How to keep your campfires exciting and beyond mesmerizing. Super for Cub and Scouts BSA leaders, as well as youth. Who doesn't love a campfire and new ways to keep them magical?!

SPECIAL NEEDS SESSIONS (3)

Special Needs Advancement [one period, once] Barbara Hartnett, Patricia Ortega

Having physical, emotional, behavioral, or developmental challenges does not have to prevent a Scout from advancing in the Scouting program. BSA allows for additional time in a Pack or Troop for special needs scouts in the form of Registration Beyond the Age of Eligibility. Scouts can also substitute Eagle Required merit badges or even alter requirements on the trail to First Class in certain situations. Come to this course to learn the options available and how to complete the administrative process to ensure that all your Scouts have the opportunity to advance. Bring questions, come, and discuss your needs, options, and solutions.

Inclusive Scouting

Scouting is an active program diversified and hands-on skills training which gives all youth the competence and confidence so essential to their well-being. NOTE: this is not ILST training – but a how to do ILST.

CAMPING SESSIONS (6)

Getting Ready for Summer Camp at TMR

Be Prepared for summer camp. Learn about new programs, traditions, what you need to know to get ready for camp. Learn about the Black Pug registration system, the parent portal, and selecting merit badge sessions.

Leave No Trace Awareness

It will be taught by the GNYC Outdoor Ethics Advocate and will include information on the LNT and Tread Lightly principles/ Awards/ use of the program in their units, and a couple hands on activities

BSA Short Term Camping Events Explained

As a part of the BSA's Short Term Camping Policy, all district and council events with an overnight component must meet NCAP (National Camp Accreditation Program) standards. This course helps define and explain the policy and GNYC application process.

Knots 101 [one period, twice] Ed Chan **YOUTH**

From Cub's Wolf scout to BSA First class there are 6 essential knots, 3 ways to keep the rope from unraveling and 3 types of lashings. Class will show Scouts how to tie knots, explain purpose of knots. For adult leaders, show different approaches to teach scouts how to accomplish the knots.

Be Prepared...For Medical Emergencies [one period, twice]

This course will provide leaders with knowledge and confidence to deal with medical issues that arise at camp or at meetings by discussing some possible stumbling blocks to ensuring the best care and decisions. The course is not designed to teach actual first-aid but rather to familiarize leaders with their responsibilities, common medical conditions, and devices and how to interact with medical personnel. Material will be drawn from real world scenarios from both the Scouting and medical fields.

Troop Talk YOUTH

A space for all to discuss good Troop practices and to develop solutions to problems they may encounter. An open forum where Scout Leaders can network and discuss issues and challenges they face.

Den Chief Training for Scouts

[three periods, once] Kevin Karlson YOUTH

It is full of fun, excitement, and information to help Den Chiefs do a good job. Den Chiefs are an older, experienced Scout or Venture-aged youth who assists with den leaders and pack leaders as required.

Prerequisite to be a Den Chief: Must be a scout for a minimum of one year, Scouts must have earned Second Class rank or above, and Scouts must have Scoutmaster or Crew Advisor approval.

Female Units Roundtable

[one period, once] Paul Romain YOUTH

Patrol Method

[one period, once] Anthony Bracciante YOUTH

Rationale for utilizing the patrol structure in Scouting. Emphasis on the functioning of the patrol as a team of peers of similar age that work together as a sub-unit of the Troop that learns by doing.

Giving Wings To your Eagle: EAGLE PROJECTS

[one period, twice] Anthony Byrnes-Alvarado

This course will seek to enable troop leadership and/or Eagle mentors to guide potential Eagles through creating and presenting a successful project. Taught from the perspective of a District Eagle Committee member, it will not focus on filling out the Eagle packet but rather delving into common project pitfalls and stumbling blocks and how to avoid them, or if necessary, address them.

ALL THINGS EAGLE

[two periods, once] John P. Walsh YOUTH

Group discussion forum where participants can discuss the various aspects relating to the Eagle Scout award. Actively seek class participation from Adults and Youth.

Trail to Eagle (Star, Life, Eagle)

[two periods, once] Alicia Clementi YOUTH

Star, Life and then Eagle - the emphasis changes from "skills" to service, merit badges and leadership. Gain an understanding of the requirements and timelines that are critical to achieve these ranks.

Trail to Eagle (Star, Life, Eagle)

[one period, once] Kevin Karlson YOUTH

Eagle scout workshop, a workshop to go over and explain the paperwork, project ideas, networking for merit badge counselors for youth looking to get help and advice (youth encouraged to bring their active eagle scout workbook) and adults looking to either give or receive advice on guiding one of their Scouts.

Troop/Unit Boards of Review

[one period, twice] Tom Kramer, Anthony Bracciante
Every rank in Scouts BSA requires a Board of Review for the Scout to progress. Come learn the who, what, when, where and why of Boards of Review and how they evolve as the Scout moves up the ranks. In this class you will learn the key resources and core principles to guide you to correctly and effectively run a board of review. We will review and discuss as a class commonly arising scenarios and learn what to do - and what not to do - to handle each of them. And we will show how Boards of Review support Scouts' progress in the program rather than stand as a barrier to be overcome along the way to earning ranks.

Planning the Eagle Court of Honor (ECO H)

[one period, once] Tim Thom **YOUTH**

Why do and what is the purpose of the Eagle Court of Hone? How do you prepare for an ECOH? What is the right way to conduct an ECOH? How is the ECOH different from other Courts of Honor and who should attend? Let's talk Eagle. You don't have to be an Eagle; you just need to have Eagle Candidates in the wings - and don't we all?

Merit Badge Classes (4) **YOUTH**



Citizenship in the Nation *Eagle Required

As Scouts fulfill the requirements for this merit badge, they will learn how to become active citizens aware of and grateful for their liberties and rights, to participate in their governments and protect their freedom, helping to defend their country and standing up for individual rights on behalf of all its citizens.



First Aid *Eagle Required

First aid—caring for injured or ill persons until they can receive professional medical care—is an important skill for every Scout. With some knowledge of first aid, a Scout can provide immediate care and help to someone who is hurt or who becomes ill. First aid can help prevent infection and serious loss of blood. It could even save a limb or a life.



Communication *Eagle Required

This clear and concise definition comes from the U.S. Department of Education: “Communication focuses on how people use messages to generate meanings within and across various contexts, cultures, channels, and media. The field of communication promotes the effective and ethical practice of human communication.”



Public Speaking

A lot happens during the course of every person’s life and your ability to communicate your feelings and ideas is the best way to connect to the larger world. Even if you haven’t stood at a podium on the stage and find the whole idea scary, sooner or later, someone is going to ask you to get up and say a few words. If you are prepared, it won’t be scary. It can even be fun.
