

Welcome Station:

- Check In
- Give instructions for hikes, stations and archery and a map
- Identify the location of your walk on a map and confirm your route.
- Learn about the surrounding area and path that you will be walking on.
- Identify appropriate clothes and shoes for your walk.
- Develop a plan for any trash that you find along the path.
- Check the weather forecast for the time of your planned hike.

Lions, Tigers, Wolves, Bears Hike:

- Explore outside with 6 Cub Scout Essentials.
- Go on a one-mile walk
- Identify things that are natural and things that are manmade.
- Take pictures along your walk or bring your sketchbook and draw 5 things you see.

Webelos Hike:

- Plan a two-mile hike.
- Go on your 2-mile walk while practicing the leave no trace principles for kids, outdoor code, and buddy system.

Station 1: Champions for Nature (CFN) - Resources

- Discover the difference between natural resources and man-made items.
- Discover the difference between organic, paper and glass waste.
- Discover the difference between renewable natural resources and non-renewable natural resources.
- Learn about the 3 R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle.
- Discover what happens to the recyclables, garbage, and wastewater in your community.

Station 2: Champions for Nature (CFN) - Threatened Species - Monarch Butterfly

- Explore the four components that make up a habitat: food, water, shelter, and space.
- Pick an animal that is currently threatened or endangered.
- Identify the characteristics that classify an animal as a threatened or endangered species.
- Explore what caused this animal to be threatened or endangered.
- Research what is currently being done to protect the animal.
- Participate in a conservation project. - Seed Bomb

Station 3: Wildlife

- Visit a place with a variety of wild animals. Select 1 animal and observe its behavior.
- Investigate how your animal coexists with other animals in the wild.
- Describe how humans interact with your animals ecosystem.
- Discover how wildlife management benefits your animal.
- Describe 4 different animals that you could see on your walk and separate into domesticated or wild.
- Identify six signs of any mammals, birds, insects, reptiles, or plants.

Station 4: Trees

- Identify six trees that are native to the area.
- Define how a tree is deciduous or evergreen.
- Determine if a tree is native or was introduced to the area. Describe how the tree is helpful.
- Find out how your tree deals with wildfire.
- Learn how wildlife uses your tree.
