CAN YOUR SCOUTS SURVIVE 2 NIGHTS AND 3 DAYS OF WINTER CAMPING?

Scouts will camp out for **three days and two nights** in Winter Camping Conditions. This is a full weekend event.

Program Saturday will be the Klondike-Derby and Trekker Challenge, followed by Camp wide campfire full of Scout Spirit and Fellowship.

Standard Derby Sled Run.

Scouts may compete in the standard Derby Sled Run as part of a Sled Team. This is recommended for Scouts working on their trail to First Class Rank. **Scouts build a sled prior to the event and pull the sled over a nine competitive station route. The team with the most points wins.**

Backpack Trek: There will be a special Backpack Trek recommended for Scouts who are 1st Class Rank or Higher. These Scouts are known as the Trekkers and are comprised of 2 or 3 Scouts in each team NOT

to exceed two years in age difference. Each Trekker must carry their gear on a homemade pack frame.

Webelos & Arrow of Light

Are invited to attend on Saturday and compete in a special Webelos/AOL classification. We encourage Troops attending to sponsor Packs, so that Webelos/AOL's can experience the future Leadership and Teamwork, they will be a part of when they crossover.

Let's Grow and Spread the Promise of Scouting

We are providing the attending Troops the opportunity to invite potential recruits for the Saturday event (Derby Sled Run) to participate with the sponsoring Troop. Optionally an invited recruit may participate in the full weekend campout with the sponsoring Troop as long as they have the equipment and clothing

required. Let's show them what Scouts really do.

Lunch: New this year, we will be allowing for a two hour break 11:30am - 1:30pm. It is STRONGLY encouraged that the **Scouts** cook lunch and not the Adults.

FEES:

This year's event is on Track to being a free event again this year. But this is Subject to Change.

Klondike Derby Sled Team

Each year men and women compete in a dog sled race of over 1000 miles across the bitter frozen mountains and valleys of Alaska. That race is called, the Iditarod Race. Our Klondike Derby race will be similar to those races. Sleds resembling those dog sleds are to be built by the Packs & Troops, this journey is recommended for new Scouts thru First Class Rank, with Scouts pulling the sled instead of dogs. On the sled will be the equipment for a team of Scouts who will travel the imaginary Klondike Derby trail.

The Klondike Derby Trail will start at the town of Anchorage, (General Headquarter) and each team will visit various northern towns of the Yukon Territory and Alaska. All sleds will be inspected before heading out on the trail to assure the team is prepared for the tough race ahead. There will be a competitive sled race at one station along the trail, two sleds per heat.

At each town, along the Klondike Derby trail, the Scouts will be given a practical problem involving basic scouting skills. The team will be awarded a number of gold points, depending on how well the team works together on the challenges at that town. After traveling to all nine towns and crossing the finish line at the end of the trail, the sled equipment will again be inspected for lost items and points earned will be totaled up.

Time is important, but scouting skills are more important. A sled team's score at each town depends on their proficiency of the challenge at that town. The best time on the trail will be used in the event of two sleds earning the same number of points.

Trekker Team Challenge

Some who have heard the call of the Iditarod Race, have met the challenge as part of a team with the help of their sled Dogs sometimes returning year after year to improve their skill and endurance. A chosen few reach the pinnacle of what the Iditarod has to offer, to be left with a thirst for more. They may want to compete without the assistance of the Dogs in the sled team, or they may want to test and build up their endurance for challenges such as peaking Mount Everest.

Scouts will be a part of a two-to-three-person Trekker Team, where they will be given advanced challenges, they will need to manage their time, knowledge, and energy to have even a chance of completing the course. Not all will complete the course and completion does NOT guarantee a win. Will you BE PREPARED? Will you exemplify what a Scout IS and PROMISES to be?

PLEASE NOTE: Units should let us know if they are participating in this years event. We ask that you do this as soon as possible. We need to know before December 1st, 2025 whether or not the Unit is willing to run a town/stop for the event. And finally by December 31st 2025 we need to know the estimated number of participants from the Unit that will be in attendance.

Who Can Attend (ALL ATTENDEES MUST SUBMIT CURRENT A/B Health Forms)

Adults:

ONLY Registered Adult Leaders may attend. Youth Protection Training (YPT) MUST BE CURRENT for all Adult Leaders and Volunteers, adults not meeting this requirement will be asked to leave. **No adult will be permitted to guide or participate with a Sled or Trekker team, said team will be Disqualified.** Only Parents allowed to attend MUST BE Registered adults and they should only attend to meet BSA safety requirements and/or volunteer for staffing events. This is not an event for the Scoutmaster Nap.

Scouts:

Male/Female 10 thru 17 years of age are welcomed. Sled teams maybe Co-Ed but Trekker Teams MUST be of same gender. Trekker teams MUST be within 2-year age range.

Webelos:

Male/Female of Webelos age welcomed accompanied by an Adult. May participate in Sled team ONLY. Due to the Guide to Safe Scouting, Webelos will only be allowed to participate in Saturdays main event.

Recruits:

Male/Female of Scout age (11 to 17) are invited to attend in ether the full weekend or just the Saturday Main Event. The Recruit MUST be sponsored/attached to an attending Troop and are the responsibility of that Troop. The Recruit MUST Check-in on arrival and Check-out when leaving.

Non-Scouts/Cubs/Children/None Participants/None Volunteers:

Do to Safety Reasons and Space Limitations are NOT permitted to attend.

Payment:

This year's event is free sooo.... Troops are still responsible for own meals as they are NOT provided as part of the event.

Classes of Participants:

There are three classes of participants:

Class A	Klondike Derby Sled Team:	Four to Eight Scouts (Recommended for Trail to First Class)
Class B	Klondike Trekker Team:	Two or Three Scouts (Recommended for Leadership Ranks)
Class C	Webelos & AOL:	6 - 8 Webelos/AOL make a team. (Scout BSA Scout may not be part of a Sled)

At the Event

Troop Check In

Check-in time is Friday evening. Units will check in at the Pavilion, located just past the main gate across from the Trading Post. Units will be notified of their campsite assignments via email no later than one week before the event. One vehicle is permitted only to drop-off a trailer if the Unit has been assigned a campsite. This vehicle MUST be out of camp after dropping off the trailer. NO OTHER VEHICLES WILL BE ALLOWED PAST THE GATE NOR WILL VEHICLES BE ALLOWED DURING PLANNED EVENTS, NO EXCEPTIONS (between the hours of 8am thru 6pm).

Possible Recruits Must also check-in on arrival, the sponsoring Troop is responsible for the Recruit the duration of their participation. The Recruit MUST also be checked-out before they leave the site. Both Check- in and Check-out will be handled at Pavilion.

WEBELOS/AOL and Recruit - SATURDAY CHECK IN:

Webelos/AOL, checking in on Saturday, must park in the parking lot and come to the Anchorage headquarters near the Pavilion with their sleds fully loaded ready to go by 8:30 AM. Webelos/AOL will follow the same agenda as Scouts.

Campsite Assignments:

Campsite assignments will be prioritized for the Units assisting in the running of stations/towns for the event. When campsites are full, units will be assigned a camporee style site, which will be setup in the main field between the pool and the main entrance. No troop will be guaranteed a requested site or a site exclusive to a single unit. Units need to be prepared that they maybe asked to share a site with another unit. There are no fees for participation, however **REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED**. This is a **Winter Campout**, no cabins will be made available to units and there is only one site with lean-tos. **BE PREPARED**.

Recognition:

Klondike Derby Race patch will be awarded to each registered Participant, Webelos/AOL and Scouter attending. Special awards will be presented to the top three teams in each class,

Scouts, Webelos/AOL and Trekkers. There is also a Special sled flag contest with awards given to the top three sled flags. **NOTE: Only full weekend Participants will qualify for Awards. With exception only given to Webelos/AOL. Remember this is a FULL WEEKEND EVENT.**

Weather:

The Klondike Derby Race may be postponed in the event of severe rain or blizzard conditions on the Primary event date, we will attempt a make-up date. However, if this does not workout. The budget for this event will be used to support another event sponsored by the Crossroads District. Weather and conditions for the event will be actively monitored and Postponement will be declared no later than early Friday the day of the event. Therefore, pre-registration is important in the event of a postponement. If you are registered, you can be contacted. No Refunds of Any Kind will be given as this is a free event. Please plan accordingly.

Lunch:

Saturday Lunch is a competitive event. There will be an actual lunch break this year, 2-hours in fact, plenty of time to get your cook on.... Scouts get their cook on, that is. That's right leaders you are bared from cooking during lunch. If an adult gets caught, so much as touching a spatula... DISQUALIFIED! Scouts go wild, have fun, be inventive. The Judges are coming!!!

Clothing:

All Scouts should be properly clothed; waterproof footgear, heavy socks, jackets, gloves, etc. **Inadequate clothing will disqualify a scout.** Each participant will be checked for adequate cold weather clothing and footgear by the Inspection Team. Any team member not complying with team specifications will be disqualified. Unit leaders will be responsible for their teams. **DO NOT BRING** (Applied to Youth)

1. Cellphones
2. Headphones
3. Wireless Speakers of any kind
4. If it plugs in, charges a battery or uses a battery and is not a flashlight... DO NOT BRING IT.

Sled Specifications

1. Sleds must look like the standard Klondike Sledge (specifications on figure 1, Page 7).
2. Unloaded sleds should weight approximately 30 lbs., loaded sleds about 50 lbs.
3. Sleds must be at least six feet long.
4. Height of hand rail; minimum 39 inches; maximum 45 inches.
5. WHEELS are not mandatory and will be allowed on the sleds. During the actual speed race, however sleds will be put into heats with and without wheels to be competitive.



Klondike Derby Sled Team & Webelos/AOL Sleds

Each team will carry the following equipment on their team sled:

- Points will be deducted from the total score for each item missing.
- The number of Scouts out, must equal the number returning. Unusual circumstances must be reported to the Klondike Governor, Jacob Jewett.



 9. Matches, Flint & Steel, Homemade Fire Starters (SHB page 389)
 10. Water Bottle Filled with Water
- One Neckerchief
- One Pair of Water-proof Boots
- One Eating Kit (SHB page 301)
- Scouts BSA Handbook

- 100 feet of light twine
- 1 – 10'X10' tarp or heavy plastic
- 1 – Pot with Cover, (about 4 quarts)
- 1 – Blanket
- 8 – 12'x1/4" lengths of rope
- 1 – Notebook and pencil
- 1 – Wrist Watch.
- Original Patrol/Team Flag on 6' pole
- 3 – additional poles 6' to 8' long
- 1 – Sleeping bag
- 1 – Tent, (two man tent or larger)
- 1 – Hatchet with sheath (SHB page 383)
- 1 – Camp Saw (SHB page 382)



FLAG CONTEST – 2026 Klondike Derby Sled RACE

The 2024 Klondike Derby Race will include a sled flag contest which will recognize the best flag. Since all teams must have a flag on their sled as part of the equipment check-in, every team will be entered into the flag contest.

CONTEST THEME: “The Future is Now!”

RECOGNITION:

The three best flags will receive special ribbons. There will be a first, second, and third place ribbon. Points will be awarded to every team depending on how close their flag follows the contest rules.

JUDGING PROCEDURES:

1. The Sled Flag Contest Judge will be near the equipment inspection station.
2. The judge will review each flag with the judging criteria listed below.
3. Points will be given after all flags have been judged.
4. The condition of the flag following the race will determine any ties.
5. Ribbons will be awarded at the Sunday awards ceremony. You **MUST** be present to win.



Originality	30 Points Possible
The flag should depict the “The Future is Now!” theme in picture or words. The design should be unique. The team name must be properly identified in print, picture or design. (e.g., Husky team would have a flag with a dog design.) The unit number should appear.	Theme = 9 Points Design = 9 Points Team Identification = 6 Points Troop Identification = 6 Points
Workmanship	18 Points Possible
The flag should demonstrate youth workmanship and initiative. It must be fully homemade. Team members should be directly involved in actual construction. The construction should be uniform.	Creativity = 6 Points Flag Construction = 6 Points Flagstaff design = 6 Points
Suitability	12 Points Possible
The size and shape should conform so that it is pleasing to display. It should have good mobility and fly in the wind when attached to the sled	Height = 6 Points Size & Shape = 6 Points

The Klondike Sled


While your own design may be accepted, this diagram shows an Authentic Sled. You may paint them bright colors but it is recommended to varnish or wax the bottom of the runners. Accessories may be added. A canvas snow guard for the front and sides will help you protect your gear and keep it in your sled. We also highly recommend that the sled be built using screws instead of nails and that pilot holes are drilled first before the screw is used to prevent the wood from splitting. The towing bridle of rope, should be about 20ft.

Trekkers Challenge

The Trekker Challenge is designed to challenge experienced Scouts who are 1st Class Rank or Higher. As this may be a new concept to some, we ask that leaders read these notes thoroughly with your Trekker teams. If you have questions, feel free to contact Jacob Jewett via email at jj@jacobjewett.me or you may text or call him at 609-206-9576. Each team must carefully plan to carry all of the equipment the team considers necessary to survive a three day-two-night trek across frozen wilderness.

Each team must prepare a **typed list of all the equipment** they are carrying. This list will first serve as a checklist for the team and then as a checklist for the judges. The judges will evaluate the team on how well they have prepared for the trek AND how well they have packed their equipment. Note: The team is **not** required to have with them survival food for three days rations.

Each team will compete in all town events designed especially for Trekkers; these events will be challenging. Requiring the team to fall back on skills that learned in the Trail To First Class and improved on in their journey to Eagle. It will require Leadership and strengths of each member of the Team.

The cooking event should take no more than 90 minutes. There will be a special area ready, Trekkers may use personal backing stoves, use charcoal briquets or build a cooking fire. But unlike Sled Team, they must start from zero. The team of two or three must create a **culinary delight**. It is not intended to be a survival meal. Burnt or tasteless food will LOSE POINTS! A Heat-n-Serve meal will get NO POINTS! The team should plan to create a well-balanced meal suitable for winter camping. Judging will be based upon planning, preparation, execution and TASTE!!!! Plan enough food for the team member's lunch and enough for the one judge. Scoring will be subjective, but fair. For reference, watch a few episodes of The Iron Chef! Aluminum Foil Cooking is recommended, but it is not required that it be in one Aluminum Pouch.

Each team will operate under the BUDDY SYSTEM and can be made up of 2 or 3 Scouts, no more. If you have more scouts, create more teams. This is a test of individual skill and knowledge as well as planning and teamwork within the buddy system. Each team will face the following scenario: Like the other Teams competing in the Klondike Derby with Sleds. They themselves started out the Journey as part of Sled Team, unfortunately some of their dogs have become injured and other members on the team have fallen ill and can no longer continue desperately in need medical attention.

Your team has been chosen to make the trek back to the base camp and get help. You must equip yourselves with all of the essentials for surviving a three- day / two-night trek across the frozen wilderness, much of that across deep snow. Each Backpack Trekker must make a homemade pack frame. **The backpack must be worn while traveling all events.** The backpacks must be removed at the cooking station or any station where safety is a concern. The backpack should be sturdy enough to last the whole trek as your life would depend upon them in the frozen wilderness. Manufactured / Purchased Backpacks will disqualify the team from top prize of the Trekker Challenge.

The purpose of this challenge is to test each team's knowledge and skill in outdoor winter survival. Therefore, we will NOT provide a specific equipment list beyond the few items necessary listed on the next page. By now the older scouts should know what is essential and what is not. They can check the Scout Handbook as well as many books in the public library for information.

Minimum Individual Equipment

**BSA Scout Handbook is your Friend*

1. The Homemade backpack is essential for each trekker and must be made by the Scout.
 - W. Ben Hunt and Gil Gilpatrick have both published books and diagrams
 - Visit your library or look them up on the Internet.
 - On the Internet you will also find various Scouting resources essential to your journey by using Google or Bing.

For help on building your homemade backpack, Thom Shoop who ran the Klondike for 16 years has put together a really nice Pinterest page with some great examples. You can essentially visit this address www.pinterest.com/thomshoop/backpacks and check it out.

2. **A typed list** of all equipment that the Backpack Trekkers are carrying.

Minimum Team Equipment for Cooking Event

Food to cook for the Cooking Event.

Optional Backpack stove or 20 Pieces of charcoal

(wrap them in newspaper to essentially help keep your other equipment clean)

- Small **shovel** for moving hot coals.
- **Food List** for the noon meal.
- **Menu** for the noon meal.

Each team must carefully plan to carry all of the equipment it considers necessary and essential to survive a three day - two night trek across frozen wilderness and to compete in all nine station events.

Each team must prepare a **typed list of all the equipment they are carrying**. This list will essentially first serve as a checklist for the team and then as a checklist for the judges.

The judges will evaluate the team on how well they have prepared for the trek AND how well they have packed their equipment.

THE REST IS UP TO YOU!! - BY NOW, EXPERIENCED SCOUTS SHOULD ESSENTIALLY KNOW HOW TO PACK THEIR OWN GEAR AND USE IT PROPERLY.

Home Made Backpack Judging

A Trekker Team is not required to carry a flag.

Instead, the Backpack Trek Team will be judged on the quality of their homemade backpacks.

Judges will award points for design, craftsmanship, functionality, and durability. Durability will be judged at the end of the day.

Essentially... Basically.

Other Important Information

Rules

Electronics - Please leave these at home.

- Headphones, Earphones and/or Speakers (Bluetooth/Wired)
- Cellphones, Tablets, Computers and Handheld games.
- If it plugs-in or needs a charger and it is not exclusively a flashlight... Leave it at home!

Vehicles - One (1) Vehicle will be allowed to a campsite to DROP OFF a trailer at a site. If the troop did not bring a trailer, One (1) Vehicle will be allowed to the site to drop off DROP OFF sleds or DROP OFF Troop equipment. Once the DROP OFF task has been completed all Vehicles MUST be parked in the parking lot.

Fires (Cooking/Heat) - Cooking Stoves are highly recommended. Fire cooking/heat is permitted in the Campsites in the pre-established fire rings. If your unit is assigned a Camporee Style site in the Field next to the main parking lot. Please plan on bring an above ground portable fire pit with at least 4-6" clearance between the fire pan and the ground.

IMPORTANT: If the unit is assigned a Camporee Site and chooses not to bring an an above ground portable fire pit, the unit will NOT be permitted to have a Campfire in their site. ALL UNITS MUST PROVIDE OWN FIREWOOD.

Participants / Visitors

- **Adults:** All Adults MUST be Currently Registered Leaders with Valid Youth Protection Training.
- **Youth:** Must be Webelos/AOL/Scout aged (10 to 17 years old) and ether a current member in the BSA or a recruit with a completed membership form.
- **ALL IN ATTENDANCE MUST BE REGISTERED FOR THE EVENT.**

Campsites - ALL campsites are assigned, with priority going to Units that are running Towns/ Events. Some sites maybe shared to accommodate for two deep leadership or attendance capacity.

Awards - While ALL units are welcome to participate in the Klondike. This however is a FULL WEEKEND event. A Sled Team / Trekker Team / Unit must attend the full weekend and be present during the Awards Ceremony to qualify for an Award. Webelos/AOL Teams are exempt from this requirement.

SEQUENCE OF EVENTS - KLONDIKE DERBY

Friday Night

Check In. FINAL UNIT REGISTRATION

1. Upon arrival, the adult unit leader will go to the Pavilion next to the pool for Unit Registration and confirm their number of Scouts and adults. Provide a roster to the health officer.
2. At 8:30 PM there will be a Cracker Barrel at Dinning Hall at least one leader and acting SPL and ASPL must attend.
3. Last minute updates to Saturday Schedule will be discussed.

Saturday - 9am

1. **STATION #A. SLED TEAM CHECK-IN / INSPECTION**
 - Team leader and Sled Team will report for Check-in at Anchorage headquarters.
 - Here the team and sled will have a general inspection.
 - If the team has a flag, Please visit STATION #C for the FLAG CONTEST.
 - Each team will receive a dispatch sticker which will indicate where to go for the first station. **BE SURE TO GO TO YOUR ASSIGNED FIRST TOWN FIRST.** All towns **MUST BE VISITED IN ORDER** and the problem at each town must be solved to successfully complete the Klondike Derby Race.
2. **STATION #B TREKKER TEAM CHECK-IN / INSPECTION**
 - Trekker Team will report for Check-in at Anchorage headquarters.
 - Here the team and Backpacks will have a general inspection.
 - Each team will receive a dispatch sticker which will indicate where to go for the first station. **BE SURE TO GO TO YOUR ASSIGNED FIRST TOWN FIRST.** All towns **MUST BE VISITED IN ORDER** and the problem at each town must be solved to successfully complete the Klondike Derby Race.
3. **STATION #C FLAG CONTEST**
 - At this station the sled team's flag will be judged. This is the first station where points will be given to a Sled Team.
4. **GO TO YOUR FIRST TOWN USING YOUR MAP & COMPASS**
 - If you arrive at the correct first town the mayor will award your team six points.
5. **THERE ARE NINE (9) TOWNS.**
 - Backpack Trekkers and Sled Teams must visit all 9 towns.
 - Teams **MUST** manage their time.
6. **Lunch / Stations Closed 12pm - 1:30pm**
 - All Stations will **CLOSE** for Lunch 12pm and Re-open at 1:30pm
 - Sled Teams will be allowed to leave their Sleds where they are at the beginning of Lunch, and resume from that location after Lunch.
 - Sled Teams will be making their own Lunch in their Assigned Campsite.
 - Trekkers will be making their own lunch in a Designated Location.
 - **ADULTS / LEADERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO PREPARE, ASSIST OR COOK LUNCH.** Exception **ONLY** for Webelos/AOL Teams.

All Stations Close at 5:30pm
7. Back to **STATION #A** for Sled Teams and **STATION #B** for Trekkers
 - Final Inspection
 - End Time Recorded
