Welcome to Spring Camporee

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We want you to have an amazing Range and Target Activities experience. We are volunteers from South Plains Council, and we are honored to be coordinating Spring Camporee, Top Shot Shooting Sports Adventure.

C.W. Post Memorial Scout Camp

Located in Post, Texas, C.W. Post Memorial Scout Camp is nestled between rugged ravines and scenic hiking trails and features a variety of outdoor activities. Located on the edge of the West Texas Caprock system, Camp Post's Western Theme is full of amazing landscapes and fun things to try!

Event Overview

First and foremost, this is a Scouting event. Everyone is expected to conduct themselves in accordance with the Scout Oath and Scout Law.

The 2025 South Plains Council Spring Camporee will have a Shooting Sports theme. The format will be a one-day, team-competition style event. This event, as well as all stations, will follow the guidelines outlined in the latest edition of the Guide to Safe Scouting and Range and Target Activities Manual. Each station will be managed by trained and certified personnel.

Each team will consist of four Scouts BSA-aged youth. Team members will typically be from the same unit; but mixed-unit teams can be formed by combining four scouts from different units, as needed. All Scouts will participate at each individual station, and when the station Is complete, the team will determine which team member's score will count for that station. The score will be noted on the team's scoreboard, the Scout whose score was selected will receive a wristband, and that Scout can continue to participate at all other stations, but their score cannot be counted for any other station; and scores cannot be switched once recorded. The Top Shot prize will go to the winning team as determined based on the highest combined score for all stations. Other prizes/awards will be given for the individual Scout with the highest score at each station.

For those Scouts who do not wish to participate on a shooting team, and Leaders, you can choose to participate on the Camporee Service Team, or CST. The CST will help the event run smoothly by performing activities such as the flag ceremony, providing directions to stations and other areas of camp, water restock at stations, bathroom check/stock, assisting at the stations, and other duties as needed. As a member of the CST you are eligible to receive service hours as approved by your unit's Scoutmaster.



Registration

Please be sure to fill out the entire registration form with your contact information, participant information, unit #, dietary needs and special needs. This information will help us to provide you with a great experience. This event is subject to weather conditions.

BSA Annual Health and Medical Record (Required)

This event does not require a medical professional signature on the Annual Health and Medical form.

On arrival to camp, all attendees (Scouts, adult leaders, non-participants, CSTs, RSOs and other staff), must submit a BSA Annual Health and Medical Record – Part A, B1 & B2 with immunization records written on B2 or attached and a copy of the family insurance card. This record is provided as a fillable PDF, and participants/guardians are encouraged to fill it out on their computer, then print the record (rather than printing the record and filling it out by hand). Doing this will improve the readability and accuracy of each member's medical information.

Refund Policy

Refunds must be requested by email to Nathan.Baie@scouting.org and need to include the following information: First and Last Name, Unit Number, and Reason for Request.

Refund requests received after a program has begun will be considered if there are extraordinary circumstances and the maximum refund will be 50%. Examples include: documented medical reason (doctor's note required), a death in the immediate family, or a natural disaster. No refund requests will be accepted after ten (10) days following the end of the applicable activity.

Approved refunds will be processed within thirty (30) days of their receipt in writing and made either by check or by credit card reversal, at the discretion of the council staff, to the original payer for individual registrations or the unit, in care of the reservation contact, for group reservations.

Your Visit to C.W. Post Memorial Scout Camp

Arrival

To ALL Scouts, adult leaders, non-participants, CSTs, RSOs and other staff: Friday evening, check in is from 6:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., or Saturday morning, 8:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. To maintain the integrity of the day's schedule, **No check-ins will be permitted after 8:45 a.m.**

The main parking lot is directly in front of the Camp Office. Please park in the main parking lot. To check-in, you will need to go to the Camp Office and please bring your medical forms for each person attending camp. It's easier on our Medic if the Troop brings everyone's Med Forms together in a folder or binder.

We CANNOT accept digital files of Med Forms.

At Check-In you will receive

- A wrist band this shows the staff which group you've registered with (participant, non-participant, etc)
- A Schedule of Events
- A Map of Camp
- Meals Food Allergy/Dietary Restrictions Card (if applicable)

Group Assignments

Whenever possible, participants from the same Unit will be grouped together, so be sure to include your Unit number during the registration process. Team members <u>must</u> be wearing a participant wristband to participate at the stations.

Meals/Dietary Needs

All meals are provided in our camp Dining Hall. There will be **NO** dinner served on Friday night, but we will offer a cracker barrel. If you arrive Friday night, you will be served breakfast on Saturday morning. If you are arriving on Saturday morning, please eat breakfast prior to arriving at camp. Everyone will be served Lunch on Saturday. There will be drinking water stations set up around camp. Additional snacks, treats and drinks will be available for purchase in the Trading Post.

Participants with special dietary needs, including allergies, must be noted during the online registration process so the proper accommodations can be made. You will receive your food allergy / dietary restrictions card at check-in. We will try to accommodate dietary needs as much as possible.

Health Lodge

The Health Lodge is staffed 24 hours a day by qualified medical personnel. For insurance purposes and for the health and safety of all participants, all accidents and illnesses must be reported to the Health Lodge and recorded. Arrangements have been made with local rescue squads and hospitals to handle any medical emergencies.

Participant Care

C.W. Post Memorial Scout Camp can reach temperatures over 80° in May. It is important that everyone **drinks lots of water** and stays hydrated. All stations will have drinking water as well as water in the Dining Hall.

It's vital for every person to wash their hands regularly. All participants are required to wash their hands before meals.

Fires

Due to the drought, all of Garza County, including Camp Post, is under a strict burn-ban. There will be no open flames or ash producing fires allowed. Propane-fuel fires only. There will be **NO** exceptions!

Bathrooms

Bathrooms are located to the left of the parking lot. They are stocked with toilet paper, paper towels and hand soap. If you run out of any of these, please notify a staff member. Please throw all trash in the trash cans provided. All feminine products should also go in the trash. Please turn off the lights and close the door behind you when you're done. This helps to keep the bugs and other critters out of the bathrooms. There will also be Porta-Potties around camp. These are regularly maintained by the company who owns them.

Trash

Pack it in – Pack it out! Please bring trash bags for disposal of your trash. All units must remove their own trash from their campsites. Please be considerate and leave your area cleaner than when you arrived.

Camp Attire

Staff will be wearing either a navy blue "STAFF" t-shirt, or be in an orange/yellow neon vest.

During the day, a Scout t-shirt and Scout shorts or pants are great.

Closed-toe shoes are required at C.W. Memorial Scout Camp. We have rocks, mesquite thorns as long as nails, actual nails, and biting/stinging insects and creatures at Camp. For that reason, please wear appropriate footwear.

Lost & Found

Lost and found is located at the Camp Office. Any items left at camp will be kept for two more weeks and then donated or thrown away. After the event, please contact camping@southplainscouncil.org regarding any lost items.

Parking

The main parking lot is directly in front of the Camp Office. Please park in the main parking lot.

Trading Post

The Trading Post will be open from 9am until 5pm. The staff has worked hard to fill the Trading Post with snacks, drinks and cool camping items! Please be sure to stop by and visit. Proceeds will benefit the South Plains Council and future events like these.

Wildlife Safety

At Camp Post we often have the opportunity to observe many types of wildlife that includes rattlesnakes and other snakes, lizards, horned toads, tarantulas and other spiders, raccoons, coyotes and many types of birds and insects. It is wise to remember that these creatures are the permanent residents of Camp. Please make sure everyone remembers to:

- Treat all animals with respect and observe from a distance.
- Do not follow, feed, tease or handle wildlife.
- Store all food in a secure place; personal vehicle, or daypack.
- All trash should be thrown away in a trash receptacle.
- If you discover a snake or an animal that is behaving strangely, please notify the camp staff immediately.

Adult Opportunities

Spring Camporee is for BSA-aged youth only. All participating youth must be registered members of a Troop, Ship, or Crew. Station Overview

Stations will consist of the following events:

- Rifle
- Shotgun
- Archery
- Tomahawk throwing

Each station will be one and a half hours total, including transition time. This means the station will take approximately one hour and 15 minutes, with 15 minutes transition time. It is imperative that each team arrive to their designated station on time. Once each member of the team finishes the station, they will come together to determine which Scout's score will count for that station.

The station lead(s) will enter the Scout's name and their score on the team's scorecard and will initial it. That Scout will then get a wrist band to indicate their score has already been used for a station and subsequent scores cannot be counted for another station. Once all stations have been attended, teams will turn in their completed scorecards to a staff member or CST. Once all scorecards are received, and scores are tallied, winners will be announced at the awards ceremony.

Disqualification Criteria

Anyone caught attemping to change their score, or attempting to circumvent the rules (e.g. switching wrist bands), will result in the **entire team being disqualified** from the event. Additionally, any behavior not consistent with Scouting's ideals will result in the individual(s) being asked to leave the property and could result in the disqualification of a team. All decisions made by the Camporee Chair are final.

Leaving Camp / Check Out

Any time you would like to leave camp, please be sure to check-out at the Health Lodge. It is important we know when you are gone.

At the end of camp, please check-out at the Health Lodge. At check-out, your Med Forms will be returned to you. We will also kindly ask that you complete a survey that will be emailed to you, to help us make Spring Camporee better each year.

Tips

- Please label belongings so we can help get them back to you.
- Check the weather the week prior and day prior to the weekend to be better prepared.
- Bring refillable water bottles to refill at the water stations throughout camp to stay hydrated.

Scout Ten Essentials

These are items every Scouts BSA-aged youth should carry with them when attending outdoor activities:

- 1. Pocketknife: A pocketknife is the all-purpose tool of the outdoors.
- 2. First-aid kit: Adhesive bandages, moleskin, gauze, antibiotic ointment, etc
- 3. **Extra clothing:** Have the clothing you need to deal with the extremes of heat, cold and storms.
- 4. Rain gear: Be prepared to face the elements with rain protection such as a shell jacket, pants and more.
- 5. **Water storage:** Hot and humid conditions increase your thirst, but you need to drink plenty of fluids in cold, dry weather, too.
- 6. **Flashlight or headlamp:** For setting up camp or walking trails in the dark.
- 7. **Trail food:** Rely on foods that are compact, high in energy and unlikely to spoil a small bag of granola, for example, and perhaps an energy bar or two.
- 8. Matches and fire starters: Carry several different kinds of fire sources so if one fails, you'll have a backup.
- 9. Sun protection: sunscreen of SPF 15 or greater and a hat, long sleeved shirt, etc.
- 10. **Map and compass:** Carry a map of the area you are exploring, along with a simple compass to help make your way through unfamiliar terrain.

Use or possession of tobacco products by anyone under the age of 21 is illegal in Texas. All camp buildings are smoke and vaping free. The only authorized location for adult smoking or vaping is the parking lot or your personal vehicle.

Directions to C.W. Post Memorial Scout Camp

C.W. Post Memorial Scout Camp is located just outside of the City of Post, TX, at 1730 FM 669. Look for the white stone entrance and flags just off the road. You will follow this road to a red gate and the Ranger's house. Continue on through another set of gates, past the climbing towers, to the parking lot.
