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Registration: Registration is open and available until September 20th.

Registration is a four step process:

- 1) Log on to the website listed above
- 2) Register your unit participants using the unit roster.
- 3) Parents may pay using the Parent Portal after registration is complete.
- 4) Registration closes on Sept 20th at Midnight.

Cost: \$35 per Cub Scout or Adult Leader/Parent – REGISTRATION

\$25 per Staff Member (Troop Scout youth staffing the event are considered Staff)

What does your fee buy? A safe, fun weekend of camping, campsites, event patch, and a Cracker Barrel; All meals on Saturday and breakfast on Sunday for Cub Scout participants. Troops have their own Cracker Barrel and movie on Sat Night.

No on-site Registration: We need to know how many scouts and parents will be attending. It makes for a better camp out when we have an accurate count of the participants, to adequately plan for supplies, staff and food. If you need to add participants after Sept 30, please contact Mrs. Bose.

Camp: Camp McLoughlin has limited “easy access” camp sites. Any special needs will be accommodated to the best of our ability. CPAP users are directed to bring battery & inverter, as there is NO electricity.

Campsites: Small Units may be sharing campsites.

BRING A TENT, canvas tents have been put away for the season.

Dietary Restrictions: Please explain any dietary restrictions on Registration form. These will be handled to the best of our ability by our kitchen staff. If you need to bring your own food, please label all, and note this on the registration form. You will be advised on how to handle at registration.

Arrive no sooner than 5:30 Friday Sept 25th.

When you arrive: Have ONE adult bring the following:

- 1) Medical Forms for ALL participants
- 2) Roster with all Participants

They will receive: A camp map with your campsite location, and a schedule of activities.

No Friday Dinner: Dinner is NOT provided. Please eat BEFORE coming to Camp, or bring your own dinner.

7:00 PM Friday: There will be an informal Cracker Barrel and patrol activities in the dining hall.

(A “Cracker Barrel” is a meeting with snacks)

Medical Forms: Every participant (person on camp property) **MUST** have the Scout medical form with parts A & B Completed. No Exceptions.

First Aid: We will have a trained medic at camp for any medical needs. They will be located in the Health Lodge. We will have a radio in the Main dining area for emergency communication.

Dress Requirements: PLAN ACCORDING TO WEATHER! Fall weather can change overnight, so be prepared for the cold.

The Field Uniform is the official Cub Scout uniform shirt, neckerchief and slide, and pants if owned.

The Field uniform should be worn at:

- 1) Closing FLAG Ceremony (evening)
- 2) DINNER Saturday and Sunday Breakfast
- 3) CHAPEL Sunday morning

The rest of the time you should dress according to activities & weather. Scouting or Pack T-shirts are appropriate but not required.

Packing List: Augment your camping packing list with wintry items just in case — like water-proof coats, thermal wear, plenty of socks, gloves or mittens, hats and hiking boots that have sufficient traction for potentially slick trails. Make sure to mark everything with the camper’s name and unit number:

- **Tent**
- Backpack
- Water bottle
- Flashlight/headlamp
- Cub Scout 6 Essentials

- Field Uniform
- T-shirts
- Pants
- Hat
- Extra shoes/hiking boots
- Socks
- Sweatshirt or jacket
- Trading Post money
- Sleeping bag
- Cot or sleeping pad
- Pillow
- Personal toiletries
- Medical Form
- Medication(s) (in original container)

The following list is suggested items but are not required.

Group equipment:

- Group First Aid Kit (only to be used for minor cuts and scrapes; all major medical needs must be taken care of by the camp medic)
- Hand soap
- Dining fly or pop-up canopy
- Lantern
- Camp chairs

- Hammer
- Rope
- Clipboard
- Permanent marker to label possessions.
- Wagon to haul gear to campsite (no cars allowed to drive into camp)

· **Water in campsites may be turned off due to weather.** Please bring containers that can be filled at the dining hall. We do have a few at camp that can be checked out.

CAMP RULES

Every camp has rules specific to their property and programs. The rules listed here are some of the general rules that are enforced at all our council camps.

- No Swimming at Camp. Do not enter the Lake for any reason.
- Use the buddy system.

(Single Gender or there must be three people in the buddy group. “Rule of Three”)

- Be considerate of everyone’s feelings. No hazing, initiations, or bullying. BE KIND
- Wear close-toed shoes at all times. Flip-flops may be worn in (not to) the shower house.
- Do not cut down trees or branches. Only use already downed or split wood for firewood.

- Do not deface, destroy, or purposefully damage camp's or other's property.
- Stay within the boundaries of camp.
- Folding pocket knives and multi-tools are allowed for Scouts BSAs who have earned their Totin' Chip.
- Cub Scouts may use pocket knives under adult or staff supervision. Cubs need to have earned their rank specific knife safety adventure.
- No sheath knives or spring-assisted knives are allowed at camp.

Prohibited and Restricted Items

- **Tobacco products (smoked or smokeless), e-cigarettes, & vapor cigarettes:** The use of tobacco products, e-cigarettes, and vapor cigarettes by anyone under the age of 18 is strictly prohibited by both federal law and BSA policy. Adults may use such products and items only in designated area – check with camp leadership for where those areas are. Outside of the designated areas, all council properties are tobacco-, e-cigarette-, and vapor cigarette free zones. That includes all buildings, campsites, trails, and program areas. Smoking in view of any Scout is strictly prohibited.
- **Alcohol, marijuana, and other drugs:** It is the policy of the BSA that the possession or consumption of alcohol, the possession or use of controlled substances, including marijuana, and/or being under the influence of alcohol or controlled substances are not permitted on property owned and/or operated by the Boy Scouts of America, or at any activity involving the participation of youth members.
- **Weapons:** No weapons of any kind are permitted at camp. Weapons are not permitted to be stored in vehicles in camp parking lots.
- **Fireworks, exploding or gunpowder-operated items:** BSA policy strictly prohibits these types of items. Should they be discovered, the person(s) who have or use them will be required to leave camp for the remainder of the session.

- **Pets:** No participants or visitors are allowed to bring pets of any kind to camp, including dogs of any size, leashed or not. Service animals must be certified as such and appropriate documentation must be shown to camp management upon arrival at camp.
- **Bicycles:** No bicycles are allowed at Webelos Woods
- **Chemical Fuels:** Gas-fueled lanterns and stoves may be used for outdoor lighting and cooking. Canister-type fuels are recommended over liquid. A knowledgeable adult must light and refuel gas-fueled devices; fuel should never be handled by Scouts. The use of gas-fueled items in a tent is strictly prohibited. The use of liquid fuel as a fire-starter is strictly prohibited.

Program Addendums

Dutch Oven Cook-Off: Saturday evening there will be a Dutch oven cook-off. We do have extra Dutch ovens that can be checked out if you do not have your own. These should be returned clean at the end of the night. You will need to bring whatever ingredients are needed for your creation. Entries will be judged by the cooks. God bless the cooks!

Glow Parade, Fire Bowl, and Haunted Hike: Saturday night wrap up will include a glow parade throughout camp that ends in a glow party at the fire bowl. There will be an activity at handicraft where each scout can get a glowstick. There will also be a limited selection of glowsticks for sale in the trading post. Please feel free to bring your own if you would like to be extra bright.

During the glow party the Arrow of Light scouts will be invited to go on a haunted hike if they dare. This is a short hike that goes to the edge of the property, but does not leave camp. Troop scouts will be dressed in costume along the path. While this is not intended to be overly scary, kids will be tired at the end of the day and can react differently than normal. There is a small patch given out at the end.
