General Information

Rainbow Council, Boy Scouts of America and Constellation Generation, Dresden Nuclear Power Station have been in partnership for several years providing youth the opportunity/education of Science – Technology – Engineering - Math (STEM). Dresden Station provides professional experts that can provide their experience and expertise to the STEM program. Not all merit badges are STEM, but are hobbies of employees and outside professionals.

Dresden Station Unit 1 was the first privately financed nuclear power plant in the United States. Unit 1 is a Boiling Water Reactor (BWR) by General Electric and began operation in 1960 creating 197 MW of electricity. Dresden Unit 1 was retired in 1978. Unit 1 is currently at SAFSTOR (SAFe STORage) status.

Dresden Station Units 2 and Unit 3 began operating in 1970 and are Boiling Water Reactor (BWR-3) designed by General Electric. Each unit produces 940 MW of electricity respectively, enough electricity for 1.5 million homes. Both units are designed to operate for 2 years continuously providing carbon free electricity before re-fueling. Dresden Station employs approximately 600 full time personal.

Rainbow Council is chartered by the Boy Scouts of America and serves communities in Will, Grundy, and Kankakee counties. Rainbow Council is in Lockport, IL at the George S. McGee Service Center. Rainbow Scout Reservation is located on 700-acre scout reservation near Morris, IL. The camp is open year-round supporting all Scout programs and maintains nationally accredited camp status.







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Scouts BSA and Camping at Rainbow Scout Reservation

All registered Scouts BSA are encouraged to take advantage of this camping opportunity. There will be many program activities available for scouts attending camp. All youth participants must attend Merit Badge Clinic and ride the buses to and from Dresden Station. Adults/Parents and Troop Leaders shall be responsible for providing supervision at camp during the entire event. This will be a Jamboree style camping event. If your troop would like to camp alone we will have a couple campsite reserved. Mandatory Boy Scouts of America health form section A and B must be turned in to medical staff upon check-in. HEALTH FORM A & B WILL NOT BE RETURNED BE, Bring copies. Scouts will be required to register for weekend camping at www.rainbowcouncil.org or https://scoutingevent.com/702-68442. No camping equipment will be provided. If your scout does not arrive with their troop, they must be accompanied by a parent/guardian to the office to check in to ensure all paperwork is complete. Parents/guardians are responsible for there child and Troop leadership assumes responsibility.

Transportation

Program Description for Camp Activities

The program is constantly being developed for activities at camp by Dresden Merit Badge Committee. Examples are but not limited to: Movie and popcorn in Dinning Hall Friday night, touch a truck experience, Rifle and Shotgun shooting, COPE course, waterfront activities (if trained staff is available), and fellowship. The program is organized by a dedicated group of volunteers and cannot guarantee availability of program. Rainbow Council would remind all campers that no program nor lunch will be offered at Rainbow Scout Reservation camp during Merit Badge Clinic hours. No camping equipment will be provided.





Adults/Leaders

Adults/Leaders are encouraged to attend the clinic and camping program. There is no fee for Adults/Leaders attending Clinic Only and lunch at Dresden Station will be provided. Adults/Leaders are required to register at www.rainbowcouncil.org or https://scoutingevent.com/702-68442. All adults (Guardians/Parents) staying on RSR property for the weekend must have mandatory Youth Protection training. The fee will be \$55, all-inclusive with food provided. *Proof of YPT training will be required during check-in. Mandatory A and B health form required. Bring copies, they will not be returned.* Adults can stay back at camp if they choose. No program or food will be available during Clinic Hours between 7:35 AM – 6:30 PM at Rainbow Scout Reservation. Volunteer opportunities are available to adults that can provide labor/skill at camp to repair/clean/maintain the property. Lunch can be provided to those wishing to volunteer at camp. Must notify event coordinator in advance before closing of registration. No camping equipment will be provided. Adults, Guardians, and Troop leaders are responsible for their youth.



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RSR Shooting Sports

If your Scout enjoys Shooting Sports, Rifle, Shotgun, and Archery will be offered during open program. There is no additional fee. Mandatory safety brief is required. Ranges will operate on a first come first serve basis. Adults are welcome, but youth come first.





RSR COPE Course

Scouts must be 13 years of age or to participate. Scouts 11-12 years of age may participate at directors' discretion. Weight restriction of 250#'s applies to all participants.

If your Scout likes to Climb, Repel, Zip Line, or Hi Ropes this is for them. This is optional and will be first come first serve basis. There is always a possibility that not all parts of COPE course will be open based on availability of qualified supervision. Mandatory safety brief is required. Safety brief will be given at COPE field as participants arrive for activity.







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Waterfront

Rainbow Scout Reservation waterfront may be open for swimming during open program if Aquatics director is available. This is optional and will be fist come first serve basis. Swim checks are mandatory and buddy system will be enforced. Aquatics director has discretion on accepting or denying current year swim tags. Waterfront will only be open with an approved Aquatics Director and Staff. Waterfront will only be open during program hours of 4:30 PM to 6:30 PM on Saturday.





Trading Post

Rainbow Scout Reservation Trading Post will be open during program on Saturday and Sunday. Snacks, Drinks, and Scouting items will be available for purchase during this time.

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Rainbow Scout Reservation strives to serve its campers nutritious meals which meet or exceed all applicable requirements and standards. The variety of foods available at meals is usually adequate to suit the nutritional needs of most campers. In order to meet the needs of participants who have special dietary requirements due to allergies, food intolerances, or other health issues, as well as those who have religious dietary requirements, it is necessary to obtain as much information as possible prior to arrival at camp. Please be as specific regarding exact nature and severity of any allergy or intolerance. This information is necessary to determine whether the individual can simply avoid eating certain foods, whether we need to assess all ingredients in every food, or whether offending foods can or cannot be stored or served where they may contact the individual or things he or she may eat. Additionally, extra time may be required to obtain special foods such as gluten-free breads or vegetarian, vegan entrees or foods made in nut free environments. While RSR attempts to provide meals, which meet these special needs as much as possible, it is still the responsibility of the individual to avoid those foods which he or she is unable to eat.
