

Tiger Adventure Camp

June 25th to July 1st 2023

Welcome to the Far East Council Tiger Adventure Camp – a NEW CONCEPT CAMP at a new location which promises a true summer camp experience!

LOCATION: Camp Casey, South Korea. This location boasts miles of hiking trails, biking paths, and access to swimming pools. Units are free to utilize these facilities outside scheduled class time.



Introduction to Camp Activities

Scouts may choose to take place in a Kodiak Challenge all week or take merit badges throughout the week. Adults will be offered adult training including IOLS.

What is the Kodiak Experience?

The Kodiak experience allows participants to grow in their abilities as leaders during an adventure that tests them mentally and physically. There are three ways to ensure learning occurs on the trek:

1. Each day, Scouts will present at least one activity designed to reinforce the concept of one of the leadership skills.
2. During the trek, all staff will be watching for and noting when something occurs that reinforces a particular leadership skill. This may or may not be something that happened well, but something that can be learned from. These may be called out as they happen or written down for later discussion at a more appropriate time (e.g., on a later day after that topic is discussed in the trek).
3. Each day ends with a discussion of what happened that day. Youth will lead the group in an evening reflection session to discuss situations where leadership skills have come into play on the trek

experience, so the real-life experience of the adventure becomes reinforcement of the leadership lessons.

First Class Trail:

The FCT area will be open all morning as well as during free time for scouts to work on requirements leading to Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First-Class ranks. All sessions will tailor activities to meet the needs of the participating scouts.

Food will be provided for everyone who attends. Units will not be expected to cook any meals on their own, but they are welcome to bring additional food and cracker barrel items for evenings at their level.

Transportation: there will be van service to take Scouts to the aquatics facilities and Kodiak participants to their respective activities across camp. There will also be van service to bring participants to dining halls as needed. Some meals will be sit-down style and some will be delivered to the camp. Final meal schedules for units will be handed out on Sunday during check-in.

There will be van service from Bosan Train Station to the Campsite if requested. There will NOT be airport pickup service.

It is very easy to get to Bosan Train Station outside the Camp Casey main gate. Those flying into Incheon or Gimpo airport can take the train to Seoul Central Station and then the subway to Bosan.

Uniforms at Camp

- Class A: Morning and Afternoon Flags; Evening Meal; other times as identified
- Class B: During the day

Class A is defined as scout uniform shirt, neckerchief, slide, and appropriate shorts or pants. Closed toed shoes must be worn at all times at the camp.

Troop Leadership at Camp

The Scoutmaster, or designated unit leader, is in charge of the troop at all times. The Scoutmaster and other adult leaders have the primary responsibility for the care of all unit Scouts while at the Camporee. The discipline and organization of the troop is the Unit Leader's responsibility. However, The Unit Leader should utilize and support the Senior Patrol Leader's leadership during the Camporee. While the ultimate responsibility for the troop rests with the Scoutmaster (or designated Unit Leader), each troop is under the leadership of the Senior Patrol Leader. The SPL with assistance from designated ASPLs and adult leaders, will ensure that all members of the troop are where they are supposed to be at various times during the day and that they follow the Scout Oath and Law. The Troop SPL will also attend the daily SPL meeting as scheduled by Camp Staff.

Adult Pre-requisite Training – YPT and Others

All registered Scouters participating must have a current Youth Protection Training Certificate. Certification is valid for two years and must be current through the Scouters entire time at the Camp. Additionally, Scouters are encouraged to complete the additional on-line training opportunities available through scouting.org.

Medical Information Form

All participants – scouts and adult leaders – must have completed BSA medical forms. Each medical form requires a physician's examination and signature and parent or legal guardian's signature (for scouts). According to BSA policy, all scouts and adults must complete parts A, B, and C to attend long-term camp or a camping event of more than 72 hours. The medical forms are valid for one year.

Medications

All prescription medications required for scouts are the responsibility of each unit leader – to collect, store, and administer.

Refrigeration if needed is available – please identify this need upon check-in.

Emergency and Medical Care

The camp staff are equipped and trained for emergency care on site as needed. A vehicle will be available and on stand-by should a Camp participant require transport to Kathmandu for further care. We encourage unit leaders to provide first aid for minor cuts, small blisters, etc. using your first aid kit.

Emergency Procedures

The Camp staff may sound an emergency siren/bell at any time due to a lost scout, severe weather, or other emergency. If you hear this alert, you are to report to the appropriate meeting point as quickly as possible – for further instruction. These emergency procedures will be reviewed during orientation.

Special Diets

We can accommodate special diets for campers. Each unit leader should identify this need within three weeks of the start of the
