



# Normandy Camporee 2024

## Event Guide

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*In April 1994, the Charlemagne and Mayflower Districts hosted a 50th Anniversary Commemoration Camporee near Omaha Beach in Normandy, France. This event was for their Scout Troops and was eventually opened to the rest of the Transatlantic Council (TAC). The Normandy Camporee proved to be such a great experience for the families who attended that a decision was made to hold this camporee every five years. The early Camporees included a service project involving a beach clean-up. The French authorities have dubbed the Transatlantic Council, BSA as the “Custodians of Omaha Beach.” Due to the requests from our Scouting families, this event is now planned for every two to three years.*

*Our aim since these early years has been to provide the opportunity for a memorable experience for all Scouting families. During the Normandy Camporee 2014, a new Peace Bell was dedicated at the Bayeux Cathedral and was rung for the first time by an international delegation of Scouts. The Normandy Camporee 2019 marked the 75th Anniversary of the D-Day Landings and the 25th Anniversary of the first TAC Normandy Camporee. In 2022, the Normandy Camporee transitioned to serve more as an international event and among other Scouting groups, hosted 750 French scouts. In 2024 we will commemorate the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-day and again take on new experiences and create special memories! Join us and enjoy your continued adventure in Scouting!*

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## WELCOME

A warm welcome to all Scouts, Scouters and families! After a successful Normandy Camporee in 2022, we have been busy behind the scenes preparing for the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day in 2024.

This will be the 11<sup>th</sup> Camporee to commemorate the landing of the Allied Forces on the beaches of Normandy, France in 1944. This landing is marked in history as D-Day and was the start of a joint offensive that ended World War II. During the Camporee we pay our respects to those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

But we will also celebrate peace and the freedom in which we can live our lives today. The ending of World War II resulted in peace for all nations involved. Peace that must be kept and maintained, as Lord Baden-Powell already pointed out in 1926:

*“Peace cannot be secured entirely by commercial interests, military alliances, general disarmament or mutual treaties, unless the spirit for peace is there in the minds and will of the peoples. This is a matter of education.”*

For those who plan to visit us in 2024: the Normandy Camporee grew from a District-level event into a TAC showcase international camporee with participants from all over Europe, the US and the world! Our promise to you is that we will do everything in our power to make your stay as easy and fulfilling as possible.

Normandy 2024 will provide those who attend with ample opportunities to get educated. The volunteer staff has worked hard to supply all “ingredients” necessary for the weekend of the 19<sup>th</sup> to the 21<sup>st</sup> of April 2024 to be a lifelong memory.

The meaningfulness of the memories you make is dependent on the experience you create along the way. So please come prepared! Not only for different kinds of weather, but also with the knowledge of what happened in Normandy, the magnitude of the event, the sacrifices made, and the lessons to be learned.

Through the ‘TAC Normandy Passport’ App we provide you with information and guidance in the preparation for and use during the camporee. During your visit, the App will be your guide to locations, events, background information and a lot more. As we get closer to the event, we will add content about the program, places to go and things to do.

What we already can tell you is that we will uphold our Normandy Camporee tradition with a Saturday afternoon campfire on Omaha Beach and a Memorial Service at the Normandy American Cemetery on Sunday morning. New to the program in 2022 was a food truck rally at the Omaha Beach campsite on Saturday evening. This was such a success that we have invited the food trucks back again in 2024.

There is a lot to see and do, but how you spend this weekend is up to you. We invite you to make the most of it.

## PROGRAM

What constitutes success at the Normandy Camporee is not the event but rather the quality and variety of personal experiences that the participants have over the course of the weekend. ## Messengers of Peace

*Friday, April 19 through Sunday, April 21*

Activities and games that convey the Messengers of Peace theme will be accessible on the TAC Normandy Passport App. Some will be made available in advance of the Camporee to help units and families prepare, while others are intended for completion during the actual Camporee weekend. They are primarily group activities, although some are intended to be done individually. These activities and games help us to examine our attitudes, behavior and norms and encourage learning of respect and mutual understanding. In addition, your personal message of peace can be broadcast through on our Radio Station during the Normandy weekend (more information below).

## Radio Station

*Friday, April 19 and Saturday, April 20, D-Day Omaha Museum, Route de Grandcamp, 14710 Vierville-sur-Mer*

For anyone who wishes to share their own message of peace across the globe, an amateur "ham" radio station with a special callsign for the camporee will be operating with live shortwave radio connections with other radio operators around the world. You will be able to find them near the D-Day Omaha Museum located at the crossroads to the entrance of Omaha Beach Campground. There is also a challenge for Scouts to write a short message of peace for people and/or circumstances where such a message can make a difference. The 5 most moving and/or inspiring messages will be transmitted live on Saturday, with the Scouts who wrote those messages being invited to do the actual broadcast as part of a two-way contact with another station. There will be a certificate to recognize and prove that the actual message was sent and received.

Everyone is invited to stop by this open-house style event in the green space near the entrance of the Omaha Beach Campsite to learn more about Scouting programs with the Transatlantic Council and other International Scouting Organizations. This is your chance to network and see how to get more out of your Scouting experience! Representatives of the various groups (Kandersteg International Scout Centre,



Intercamp, BSA Venturing and Sea Scouting, etc.) will be presenting information and be available to answer questions. Open to Scouts and their families as well as leaders.

## Omaha Beach Campfire

*Saturday, April 20, 1600-1700, Omaha Beach at 14710 Vierville-sur-Mer*

The Campfire, together with the Memorial Service at the Normandy American Cemetery, are the two events attended by almost everyone participating in the Camporee. The Campfire is held on the sands of Omaha Beach, where 34,000 US soldiers came ashore on D-Day and 2,500 lost their lives. A campfire on the beach, while memorable, presents some challenges, such as wind, but its timing is always governed by the sea itself. The tide schedule for this camporee has dictated that the campfire is held on Saturday afternoon – starting at 16:00 in the village of Vierville-sur-Mer.

The Normandy Camporee Campfire is different than a traditional Scout campfire – with hundreds of units and groups participating, there isn't time to ask individuals to provide a skit or a song, and with the size of the audience, and the location, there are limits to what is feasible. As in past Camporees, the Campfire will be an opportunity to recognize the historic events of 6 June 1944 and also to recognize the accomplishments of our future leaders – recognizing Webelos Scouts crossing over to Scouts BSA; and Scouts earning the Eagle Scout Award. Top Achiever Scouts from other National Scout Organizations will also be recognized. Our campfire will also include additional interactive elements to appeal across the international audience and to support the role of all participants as Messengers of Peace.

The recognition elements of the campfire are planned as follows:

- **Second-year Webelos Scouts crossing over to Scouts BSA.** This is a cross-over recognition only and will not include Arrow of Light which needs to be done at a unit level (although this could be done by the unit at the beach or one of the other locations). Units will be asked to provide the number of expected Webelos (or former Webelos) to be recognized as part of the registration process. This part of the ceremony is attached to the campfire program at an adjoining time and location.
- **Eagle Scout Award, recognizing Eagle Scouts who have had their Board of Review in the last year.** Troops and Crews will be asked to provide the names of Eagle Scouts to be recognized as part of the registration process.
- **Recognizing Scouts from other National Scout Organizations who have achieved the highest rank in their respective organizations within the last year.**

Also, as part of the registration process, units and groups will be asked for the estimated number of vehicles they will be using to get to the Camporee. This is to allow us to plan for parking at the Campfire and Campground. **While on logistics please note...**

- **There will be a one-way system in operation along the road going from Saint Laurent-sur-Mer to Vierville-sur-Mer on Saturday afternoon** – this is to allow us to park hundreds of vehicles as quickly and safely as possible. Please follow the instructions of staff members directing you to parking.
- **Facilities in Vierville-sur-Mer are limited.** The camporee staff is arranging for portable toilets to be available near the campfire.
- Please consider using the time before the campfire at Omaha Beach to visit local memorials and museums – several of which are within walking distance.

## Memorial Service

*Saturday, April 20, 1000-1100*

As Messengers of Peace and Custodians of Omaha Beach, we honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country in 1944. We hope that everyone understands how the sacrifices made by the “Greatest Generation” have influenced the world we live in today and that our Scouts will lead into the future. During the Camporee weekend, the *Volksbund Deutsche Kriegsgräberfürsorge* will hold a special remembrance ceremony at the following location and all participants are invited:

This is an opportunity for youth members to meet up, discuss, and potentially swap patches, neckerchiefs, and other collectible items with fellow Scouts. Recipients of the highest awards in their respective countries' Scouting programs (Eagle Scouts, King's Award, etc.) are invited to attend this after-dinner reception which celebrates their achievements. This is a great opportunity for socializing and networking. Please be sure to indicate your intention to attend this event on the registration form.

## Closing Ceremony – Normandy American Cemetery & Memorial

*Sunday, April 21, 0930-1030, Normandy American Cemetery, 14710, Colleville-sur-Mer, GPS Coordinates: 49° 20' 55" N, 0° 51' 17" W*

On Sunday all participants in the Camporee are invited to attend the Closing Ceremony at the [Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial](#). **Arrivals are welcome from 0900. The ceremony starts promptly at 0930 with everyone already in place and will conclude at 1030.** We ask everyone to be in their full Scout uniform. Please keep in mind that everyone will be going to the ceremony at relatively close to the same time so what might be a normal 15-minute trip from Camping Omaha Beach to the Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial may take a bit longer. Please plan accordingly.

We have extended invitations to several dignitaries to join us on Sunday. Their participation may result in additional security measures to be enacted and may affect the time of entrance to the cemetery. Allow plenty of travel time from the campground to the activities. The ceremony will consist of opening remarks, Guest of Honor recognition, VIP speeches, as well as individual and unit wreath laying.

When you arrive at the Cemetery, please go immediately to the walkways around the tidal basin. Every unit (not just TAC units) should have a flag bearer. The flag bearers will line the area around the Memorial Statue. **NOTE: Unit flag bearers should report to the cemetery no later than 0910 near the Memorial Statue.**

**Note: Wreaths are available to purchase through the Normandy Camporee [registration site](#).**

**Participants who have purchased and/or requested to present wreaths will meet at the reflecting pool of the cemetery by 0910.** They will be coached by staff when to move forward and what to do. Yes, you can have an adult take pictures, and if you really need two people to carry the wreath you can do that too.

The ceremony will close with each individual or small group having an opportunity to place a tulip at a grave of their choice. These will be available at the front of the reflecting pool near the memorial. After the formal ceremonies are concluded, you may continue to visit the site on your own or prepare to travel home safely. Cemetery staff may be available for private tours around the grounds over the course of the day.

The Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial is hallowed ground. We ask that all Scouts and guests act respectfully during their visits. We are all Custodians of Omaha Beach.

# TRAVEL ADVICE

## By Car

If your travel plans take you in or around Paris, please be sensitive to the timing of rush hour traffic. For those traveling on the motorways (autoroute, autobahn), some roads in France are toll roads. You should have euro cash or credit cards to pay for the tolls.

Van or bus drivers may want to consider booking a hotel for Saturday night to get a better night's sleep. It is a long drive on a busy weekend for all of us so the more rest that you get, hopefully the safer the journey home will be. For your travel day as well, in some cases it cannot be avoided but working all day and then driving Scouts to Normandy can be just too much. Drive safely and use common sense. Please be reminded of [BSA's Guide to Safe Scouting](#), which states that driving time is limited to a maximum of 10 hours in one 24-hour period, regardless of drivers available. Frequent breaks are required, including rest, food, and recreation. Do not drive when distracted or drowsy.

## By Public Transportation

The closest train station to our Camporee location is Bayeux. There are no local buses that will take you directly to the campground. [NOMAD Calvados](#) (+33 02 22 55 00 10) provides scheduled service (Bus #120) from the Bayeux train station to Grandcamp-Maisy via Saint Laurent-sur-Mer and Vierville-sur-Mer.

## By Plane

The closest international airport is the Charles de Gaulle Airport, Paris (CDG). There is a regional airport in Caen, but it only services other parts of France, not including Paris. If arriving in Paris, we recommend either renting a vehicle in Paris or taking the train to Bayeux.

- **Camporee Staff will be welcoming participants and directing vehicle parking at the campground** during high movement periods to ensure a focused flow of traffic for all participants' vehicles and buses. This is also to ensure that local traffic is not burdened with our larger contingents.
- **Please ensure that you place your Vehicle Information Form (available for download from the registration page by 1 April 2024) in the front window of all vehicles to ensure we can contact you in case of an emergency.**
- **No buses are allowed to enter the campgrounds.** All buses will off-load in designated areas and gear can be transported by van to the campsite. We encourage Scouts to hike their gear in.
- Parking will be determined by security conditions established at the time. Camporee Staff will direct everyone to their parking locations.
- The campground roads are narrow and there will be lots of youth near the roads; we plan to do all we can to keep everyone safe - even if it is inconvenient.
- Check-out is possible during the following periods:
  - Sunday, 21 April: 0700-0830, 1130-1330
- If you plan to leave directly from the Closing Ceremony on Sunday morning, please respect campground quiet hours (until 0600) during packing. Consider packing your equipment in the morning but loading it after you return from the Closing Ceremony.
- **If you are staying in a bungalow you will be provided a checklist of what needs to be completed before and during your check-out.**
- Once your campsite/bungalow is packed up, please go to the Check-in/Check-out area and the Camporee Staff will make sure that your site is ready for check-out. Only then are you permitted to leave and will you receive your farewell packet, including event patches.
- Only then should vehicles (no buses) be brought onto the site to load up. Once loaded up, you may depart the campground immediately (or proceed to the line waiting to leave).
- **Please be patient!**

## Accessibility

Many roads and buildings in France were built hundreds of years ago and did not have modern disability equipment in mind. The French authorities have made many adjustments to local infrastructure to accommodate those in need, though these are not guaranteed. Many of the sights to see in the area involve a lot of walking over uneven terrain.

Some key points are accessible-friendly: some bungalows are handicap accessible, the Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial is evenly paved with ramps where necessary, and many museums are accessible-friendly. Our signature Omaha Beach Campfire will take place in the sand, however we will be near the promenade and will use a sound system.

## Electricity

Electricity in France is **220V** and accessed with a two-prong plug. Please bring the necessary adapters and check your electronics for 220V capabilities.

Camping Omaha Beach continues to upgrade their electrical infrastructure. Electricity is available at each of the permanent campsites, but the following adapter is required.

Participants should bring adapters with them. Only a limited quantity is available on site. The adapter can be purchased from various European online distributors.

## Groceries

The nearest grocery store to tCamping Omaha Beach is the **CocciMarket** located off of the rue Pavée (D514) in Vierville-sur-Mer. It may be possible to have pre-ordered items delivered to the campground (only on Wednesday and Friday). If this is your desire, please contact them directly to coordinate. In Bayeux, there are many stores but the largest are **Carrefour** and **E.Leclerc**. These are both excellent for camping and cooking items as well.

## Sustainability

### How Can You Help Make the Normandy Camporee Sustainable?



By following the Leave No Trace principles, even if you're not in the backcountry!

Our emissions of “greenhouse gases” – mainly carbon dioxide and methane – trap part of the sun’s heat in the atmosphere, warming the Earth. This is already causing extreme heat, droughts, rain, and floods, intensifying hurricanes, melting ice, raising sea levels, and harming the oceans – with worse to come. We all need to minimize our direct and indirect emissions, to help halt and reverse the warming.

When planning for Normandy, you can reduce your impacts in 3 key ways while still having the time of your life:

#### Transport

This is the biggest cause of emissions from camping. If you are arriving from outside western Europe, air travel will be unavoidable; consider [offsetting](#) your emissions, in programs available through the air carrier or elsewhere. While in western Europe:

- ⇒ First choice, if at all possible, is to take advantage of Europe’s extensive [public transport network](#).
- ⇒ Second choice is to organize a bus/coach. [Flixbus](#) has cheap coach travel.
- ⇒ If you must drive, share rides to fill your car, and use the most efficient cars available.

## Menu Design

This is the 2<sup>nd</sup>-biggest cause of emissions from camping. Help dramatically reduce the impact of your meals through smarter choices and more efficient planning. Beef has a much larger impact than any other food and can represent 1/2 – 2/3 of the emissions of your food consumption and preparation.

- ⇒ Increase focus on vegetables: in full plant-based meals, or as the main part of a meal that also includes meat.
- ⇒ Eat meats further down the emissions spectrum: beef >lamb >pork >chicken >fish.
- ⇒ Be creative: create great low/no meat menus, with cooking methods.

## Waste

Waste has an indirect impact on emissions, and a direct impact on animal life. A Scout is Thrifty.

- ⇒ Calculate and bring food portions properly to minimize waste.
- ⇒ Buy food in bulk, repack individually-wrapped food in reusable containers, and recycle packaging.
- ⇒ Avoid single-use gear.
  - Cooking: use gear that will last more than one campout.
  - Cleaning: bring a stack of quick-dry, reusable cloths, instead of paper towels.
  - Eating: use personal washable gear, not disposable.
  - Drinking: use personal reusable water bottles.

## Recycling in France

Waste disposal in France consists of several different bins for different types of recycling. As Scouts and participants, we need to ensure that we follow the French communities’ guidelines for recycling and waste disposal.

- Yellow (Recyclables)
  - Paper, cardboard, cartons
  - Plastic bottles, containers, film
  - Metal cans, tins, lids, foil



- Green (Glass)
  - White or colored glass of any shape



- Black (Waste)
  - Hygienic items: face masks, diapers, sanitary items
  - Non-recyclables: food waste, cigarettes, bones, mixed-medium items



**These rules must be followed when depositing waste at Camping Omaha Beach.** Camporee Staff will be on hand to monitor the use of the recycling bins at Camping Omaha Beach to ensure we are adhering to the French guidelines. Thank you for your compliance.

## Omaha Beach-Normandy Historic Trail

The Transatlantic Council Omaha Beach-Normandy Historic Trail is a popular choice for this weekend activity. The trail stretches from the American Cemetery at Colleville-sur-Mer to the beginning of the cliffs in Vierville-sur-Mer along the beach. One may no longer hike on the bluffs overlooking the beach due to dangerous conditions. The hike, other than tide conditions, is basically flat and can be completed in 2 to 3 hours depending on the age and experience of the people on the hike. It could take all day too. Please take the time to visit and read the inscriptions on the many monuments in the area.

Please pay attention to the tide schedule when it is published. At high tide the water comes up to the road and there is no beach. The tide also comes in very fast and not in a straight line. One should not hike either 90 minutes before or after the published high tide schedule.

There is an Omaha Beach-Normandy Historic Trail Patch, available for purchase at the Trading Post, which can be presented to those who complete the trail (this is done by the unit and not at the Campfire).

### **Note about the Omaha Beach Normandy Historic Trail**

When one reads the word "trail" one of course thinks of hiking. For long periods the trail from Vierville-sur-Mer to Colleville-sur-Mer is covered by the tide. There is a sidewalk from Vierville-sur-Mer to St. Laurent-sur-Mer (not far), and towards Colleville-sur-Mer (US Cemetery), that one can walk. The trail was originally designed when one could walk the cliffs overlooking the beaches. Those have been closed since 2001 due to erosion. The Omaha Beach-Normandy Historic Trail is completed by visiting Omaha Beach, the Normandy American Cemetery & Memorial, and Pointe du Hoc. This can be done on foot where possible and by vehicle.



# ACCOMMODATIONS

## Campground

**Camping Omaha Beach** is a 3-star campground which has extensive camping areas and bungalows. This campground has walking access to Omaha Beach, the site of our Campfire and Trading Post. There are numerous facilities and amenities on site. (Note: while there is a pool on site, this will be closed for the duration of the Camporee.)

The majority of the Camping Omaha Beach facilities are reserved for Normandy Camporee participants during the dates of this event. All reservations/bookings will be made via the TAC Normandy Camporee [registration site](#) and any special requests must be coordinated through the Normandy Camporee Staff.

## Campsites

For those choosing to camp you will be assigned campsites by the Camporee Staff, but if you have a preferred campsite, you can contact the Staff and inform them of your desires. Every effort will be made to accommodate your desires, but due to the magnitude of the effort they may not be able to guarantee all requests. Families are not obligated to camp together with their unit, though many families may wish to stay near their unit. The amount of space allocated to each unit will be proportional to the number of campers registered. **We will not have a waitlist for campsites.**

## Bungalows

A certain number of bungalows have been made available for use during the Normandy Camporee at Camping Omaha Beach. Information about the various options, including pricing, photos, location, and amenities can be found in the Bungalow Catalogue found on the registration site.

## Check-In Process

For those staying at Camping Omaha Beach, check-in will be at a designated location on the campground. Please check-in with your unit or group to receive your registration packet.

If you are attending the Normandy Camporee and are staying in a location other than Camping Omaha Beach and are not part of a unit that is attending, please check in for the event at the Hotel du Casino, Rue de la Percée, 14710 Vierville-sur-Mer, which is located just across the street from the Trading Post, to receive your registration packet.

**Everyone needs to register to attend this event and the activities. Your participant lanyard, received at check-in, will act as the visual indication that you are a paid participant of this event and authorized to attend certain events. This is essential to the security of the event.**

## Check-Out Process

When checking-out from the campground, please come to the Check-in/Check-out area of Camping Omaha Beach and a Staff member will assist you with the check-out of either your campsite or on-site bungalow. We will provide checklists at registration to ensure that all areas are maintained to the campground's standards. Once the departure checklist is completed and you are cleared by the Camporee Staff, you will receive your event patches and be free to leave the site.

Those staying in alternate accommodations will be free to leave after appropriate check-out with their hotel, B&B, Gite, etc. They will have received their event patches upon check-in.

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# HEALTH & SAFETY

## Health Forms

**BSA guidelines require that all BSA participants and staff at the camporee must have [BSA Annual Health and Medical Record Parts A, B1 and B2](#) completed for the weekend.** Please complete this form in case of an emergency so that Camporee Staff and First Responders can assist you safely. Since much of the participation in activities is with individual families or traveling together as a unit, the leader(s) in charge should keep the forms with them. Please provide any emergency information necessary on the required health form.

Please indicate an **on-site emergency contact** on your lanyard attachment for quick reference.

## Medications

Any medications brought to the camporee must be safely secured and stored in their original containers. A limited amount of medication may be carried by participants or staff for life-threatening conditions, including epinephrine injectors, heart medication, and inhalers, or a limited amount of medication approved for use in a first aid kit. The group leader should be aware of the medications taken by their members.

## First Aid & Emergencies

- **All injuries, regardless of where they occur during the weekend, are to be reported to the First Aid Staff.**
- First Aid Staff will be located at a designated location in the campground and near the beach during the Campfire.
- For minor cuts and bruises, treatment can be provided on site at one of the medical stations or may be handled by Scout Leaders or someone with First Aid training. As your group travels through Normandy, please make sure you have a First Aid Kit with you.
- If the situation is more serious or you are touring the area, do not delay in calling for help. The local French Emergency Management Teams have been notified of our presence and are prepared to respond appropriately.
- **The general emergency telephone number in France is **112****
- **112 is also the EU-wide emergency number that will contact emergency services, including police and medical, in any EU country or language.**
- The closest hospital with an emergency room to most of the camping and event locations is in Bayeux: Centre Hospitalier Aunay-Bayeux; 13 Rue de Nesmond, 14400 Bayeux
- Another alternative is in Caen: Centre Hospitalier Universitaire de Caen Normandie; Avenue de la Côte de Nacre, 14000 Caen

## Youth Protection

To comply with current BSA Youth Protection policies and intent, the following guidelines must be followed for the Camporee:

### Participants

- BSA-Registered Adult Leaders – Current BSA [Youth Protection Training](#) (YPT) is required. This applies to all BSA programs – Cub Scouting, Scouts BSA, etc.
- BSA-Affiliated Adults (i.e. Families/Guests of BSA Youth and Adults) – Must review [“How to Protect your Children from Child Abuse: A Parent’s Guide.”](#) **Completion of YPT is required for those staying at the campground** (in bungalows and camping), and highly recommended for all adult participants. Those without YPT must be escorted by Trained Adults when in the vicinity of Youth. This is especially important in the campground areas.
- Other National Scouting Organization (NSO) Adults – Completion of either YPT or WOSM-offered [“Safe From Harm for Volunteers or Staff”](#) training is required.

Two-Deep Leadership will be enforced at all times. As always, Scouts will follow the buddy system.

### Staff

- Current BSA YPT and BSA Hazardous Weather Training are required.

Non-BSA adults and staff volunteers can create a free [My.Scouting.Org](#) account and find the required course(s) under “My Training”.

## Security

Professional security guards will be onsite at Camping Omaha Beach. Normandy Camporee assigned Commissioners will roam the campground watching for people who should not be in our camping area. Units are free also to leave adults behind to watch their property, but in no case should a Scout be left unsupervised. Staff are not responsible for youth supervision.

At Camping Omaha Beach, there is a bunker that attracts youth, a cliff, and a steep path to the sea all which contain hazards.

**For security reasons, please do not bring large backpacks and other non-essential items to the Campfire or the Memorial Ceremonies. All items brought to these locations are subject to screening.**

We live in a world where we must be vigilant against terrorist threats. Your safety is our top priority. A large part of the Camporee fee is devoted to providing private security. We also work closely with the local police and security forces. In order to identify Camporee participants, lanyards are required for access to all events – **keep yours on your person at all times.**



## **Traffic Safety**

With the expected large number of participants, everyone should keep safety in mind with vehicles in the campground and on roads.

To ensure the safety of all participants vehicle movement will be limited inside the campground, but necessary during arrival and departure. When it is necessary to drive in the campground please drive slowly and follow all Camporee Staff directions and directional signs.

For travel to some of the program activities, please bear in mind that many participants will be traveling at relatively the same time. What might usually be a 15-minute trip from the campground to the Normandy American Cemetery may take a bit longer on Sunday morning. Allow plenty of travel time from the campground to all the activities and on your return.

For those staying at Camping Omaha Beach, to minimize risk to all participants **please do not use a vehicle to access the Campfire or Trading Post**. Please use the footpath from the campground to Omaha Beach for travel to and from the Campfire and Trading Post.

Roads in Normandy are narrow and with many blind corners. Two cars can barely pass on the road, and it has been the scene of several pedestrian and vehicle accidents with buses and cars driving too fast.

Walking on local roads is a very bad idea. **It is prohibited to walk on the road from Vierville-sur-Mer to Pointe de Hoc**.

Staff and local officials will do all they can to prepare for a worst-case traffic scenario. Be aware that local road closures will be in effect and barriers in place ahead of our Saturday afternoon Campfire. Please follow all instructions from Staff and local authorities.

## **Parking**

**All vehicles will be issued a parking pass that can be used throughout the Camporee.**

Parking cannot impede fire trucks or other emergency vehicles from reaching a campsite or activity area in the event of an emergency. All roads must be kept clear.

Follow the directions of the Camporee Staff and any posted signs. Please adhere to the rules that are given. These are designed to make it as easy and safe as possible for everyone to get to where they want to go.

## Weather

Normandy weather in April can bring sun, rain, lots of wind and cold. Please pack and dress for the forecasted weather and be prepared for it all to change quickly!

## Pets

Please be reminded that there are **no pets permitted at Boy Scouts of America activities or events, including the Normandy Camporee**. Likewise, there are no pets permitted on the campgrounds or in the bungalows (per our agreements with the campground owners). Anyone found with a pet will be asked to leave immediately. If you require a service animal, it is recommended that you secure accommodation outside Camping Omaha Beach.

## Alcoholic Beverages

Please be reminded that there is **no alcohol permitted at Boy Scouts of America events, including the Normandy Camporee**. Any adult or youth consuming alcohol during the Camporee will be asked to leave immediately.

## Knives

Sheath knives and knives with blades longer than 3½ inches are not allowed at the Camporee. If any are found, they will be held for the remainder of the Camporee by a member of the Camporee Staff.

## Firearms

For safety reasons, firearms, pellet guns, BB guns, bow and arrows or slingshots of any kind are not allowed at the Camporee without gaining specific permission from the Camporee Chair before the Camporee.

## Fireworks

Absolutely no fireworks are permitted.

# REGISTRATION

Registration for the 2024 Normandy Camporee should be accomplished at the following site: <https://www.scoutingevent.com/802-NormandyCamporee2024>

Units should only register once to ensure that all unit members are accounted for properly and streamline the process.

## Fees & Costs

2024 Normandy Camporee fees:

- Camping Participant - \$75 per person, including two nights of camping
- Bungalow Participant - \$60 per person, not including the bungalow cost(s)
- Guest Participant - \$75 (in-council) or \$100 (out-of-council)
- Per person means Scouts, siblings, parents, guests – anyone that will be a part of our program. Participants ages 4 and under are free of charge, but still need to be registered to receive a lanyard.
- These fees cover an event patch, camping reservations, security, parking, traffic control, emergency medical service, sanitation, trash removal, administrative costs, and program fees. This fee does not include food or admission to any museums.
- Arrangements may be made to arrive early and remain late on the campgrounds. Please indicate any extra nights in the registration process.
  - Camping - If you wish to stay extra nights at Camping Omaha Beach, then the cost is \$20 per person per night.
  - Bungalows – If you wish to stay extra nights, prices vary as determined by the bungalow chosen. Please book your bungalow for the two nights, then contact [TAC-NormandyCamporee-802@Scouting.org](mailto:TAC-NormandyCamporee-802@Scouting.org) with your extension request.
- All fees must be paid through the registration site. Forms of payment include all major payment cards (Visa, Mastercard, American Express, Discover). Units with a Unit Deposit Account may also pay with UDA funds.
- Some fees may be paid in installments:
  - Registration fees: 50% must be paid upon booking, with payment in full due by December 30, 2023.
  - Bungalow fees: 25% must be paid upon booking, 50% must be paid by December 2, 75% must be paid by December 30, and 100% must be paid by February 3, 2024.
  - Extra fees (Trading Post pre-orders, purchasing wreaths, etc.) must be paid in full upon booking.

## Refunds & Cancellations

- All participation cancellation notices, and refund requests must be submitted in writing. Verbal agreements are not final.
- 85% of the total amount paid can be refunded until 18 December 2023; 50% can be refunded until 31 March 2023. **From 1 April 2024, no refunds will be considered.**
- Reservations can be transferred between individuals within the same unit or group, but payments must be handled between the parties, not by the Council.
- Cancellations due to medical emergencies or other such unforeseen circumstances will be given the utmost consideration in favor of the registrant for any exceptions to this refund policy.
- Refunds will be processed within 30 days after the close of the event, with funds being returned to the original form of payment.

**NOTE: If the Normandy Camporee is cancelled by the council, the above will not apply and full refunds will be issued.**
