Requirement 5

Scouts should review this requirement and and be prepared to discuss. It is strongly recommended that Scouts bring any notes or supporting documents they may have to help show the counselor that they have prepared for discussion of these items. A portion of the class will be devoted to open group discussion on each of the Scouts' readings.

Requirement 6

This requirement will NOT be covered within the class, however Scouts wishing to be considered for completion of this requirement should bring adequate documentation to show that they have completed one of these requirement components. Adequate documentation is not a letter from your parent, but rather a letter or note on organizational letterhead from a representative of the organization where you performed your activity hours. It is best not to stray too far from the stated requirement.
